BETTER TEACHING

Much concern has been expressed, during the past year or so, about the decline of student interest in science. An increasing number of those concerned have come to the conclusion that one of the causes for this decline is poor teaching in high schools. That, in turn, may be the result of poor teaching a generation earlier.

Whatever the cause, the fact is that the nation's colleges and universities are not graduating enough scientists and engineers to meet the expanding needs of our society. That goes back to the fact that too few high school graduates are going into science when they get to college.

At is apparent, then, that more high school students must be encouraged to take an interest in science, and that they must be stimulated to the point of wanting to make science or engineering their life work. The National Science Foundation is undertaking to do something along these lines. It is financing an experimental program for invigorating high school science teaching. This will be done by offering advanced night classes, at selected colleges, for high school science teachers. Credit given for these courses may be used toward a master's degree.

To begin with, such courses will be offered at Antioch College in Yellow Springs, Ohio, and at Reid College in Portland, Ore. If the experience there is successful the science foundation expects to extend the program.

Other factors besides uninspired high school teaching are obviously involved in this matter. The whole complex question of the public's attitude toward science and scientists comes into it. Nevertheless, the National Science Foundation's experimental program is a sensible approach. If high school science teaching can be improved, student interest and capability will surely increase.

LIVE AND LET LIVE

One of the relatively unsung discoveries in the field of human relations is that it is possible to have competition without hostility. It has been found that rival enterprises can both profit by competition.

For instance, when radio first became a power in the land some years ago there was general dismay among newspaper publishers. It was freely prophesied that as more and more people listened to radio the newspaper's importance would dwindle. Actually, listening to news programs on the radio whetted the public's appetite for the fuller treatment of the news that only the newspaper could provide. Radio stations and newspapers worked out ways of living together, and both

A more recent instance involves the hotel business. A few years ago, hotel owners were generally disturbed when the motels came along and began to cut into their business. There was talk of the old-fashioned hotel being on the way out. As one speaker said at a recent meeting of hotel men, "If you mentioned motel at a hotel convention five years ago you would have been thrown out."

But today, said this man, "there is an excellent relationship between us." He noted that when the motels are full they send the hotels their business and vice versa. The moral of all this is that competition does not need to involve hostility and cutthroat tactics. In both business and international relations working together rather than at cross purposes often does wonders for both parties involved.

A CHANGE OF MIND

The late Judge Jerome N. Frank had one rare quality. He could change his mind on an important question. For too many people this mental exertion is impossible.

A well known figure in New Deal days, Frank had been chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission until 1941, when he was appointed judge of the United States Court of Appeals. The particular change of mind which made the most profound impression occurred over his 1938 advocacy of isolation.

In that year he published a book, "Save America first," which urged ignoring the fate of foreign nations. Hitler's defeat of France in 1940 changed his mind, as it showed that here was a menace that treatened the world, even the United neighbors and friends in our re- ans, and family, States. 

In 1778 the British ship Active captured Captain Olmstead's fishng boat upon the open sea and ook his three-man crew aboard to help sail a war cargo to New York But Olmstead and his three mer rove the British below deck. While Olmstead headed for New Jersey his men kept up a battle with the crew below. After two days the American brig Convention hove to and took over and its captain Thomas Houston, claimed the Active as a prize since there was still fighting going on.

Olmstead protested, but the brig brought in the prize to Philadel-

Under the Articles of Confedera tion states like Pennsylvania had set up admiralty courts to decida claims arising at sea. The Philadelphia court gave Olmstead only


one-fourth the prize.
So Olmstead appealed to the committee of the Continental Congress named to review all cases of capture at sea. It decided for Car tain Olmstead. The Pennsylvania court at once denied the commit tee's right to upset its jury's ver

Meanwhile, we had given up the Articles of Confederation and adopted the Constitution which odged admiralty powers in the

federal government. For thirty-one hard-fought years the case shuttled between state and federal courts. Everybody got int the act-the governor, the legis lature, Congress, and even Pres dent Madison.

In 1809 the U. S. Supreme Cour upheld a lower court which had decided that the Committee of Congress was right. This was a vic tory for Olmstead.

In this showdown Pennsylvania called out her troops. Rebellion spread, The U. S. Marshall swore in a 2,000 man posse to take over the prize money for Olmstead. Finally when President Madison himself said the Court had the backing of the U.S. Government, the Pennsylvania legislature gave in. Poor Olmstead at 83 got his ney, but he won a bigger




