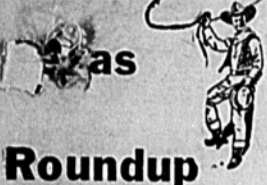

In line with recommendations recently made by Henry Eidson, of Ray C. Ayers & Son, urging the farmers who expect to plant wheat next season, to plant the better strains of seed, the Texas Technological College has the following to say:

Reasons for the emphasis wheat interests are placing on encouraging farmers to plant high quality grain next season are explained by Dr. A. W. Young, Texas Tech College plant industry department head.

Certain varieties of wheat, such as Chief Kan, and, to a lesser extent, Black Hull, are very low in gluten, the quality that causes bread to retain its shape after yeast makes it rise. Because these varieties are suitable only for use as feed, crackers and macaroni, elevator operators are paying rather drastically reduced prices for the grain wherever it is recognized.

Recommended wheat varieties for the plains area are Comanche, Tenmarq, Turkey, Westar and Wichita. On experiments conducted at the experiment station near Amarillo, Westar yield compared favorably with that of the less desirable varieties.

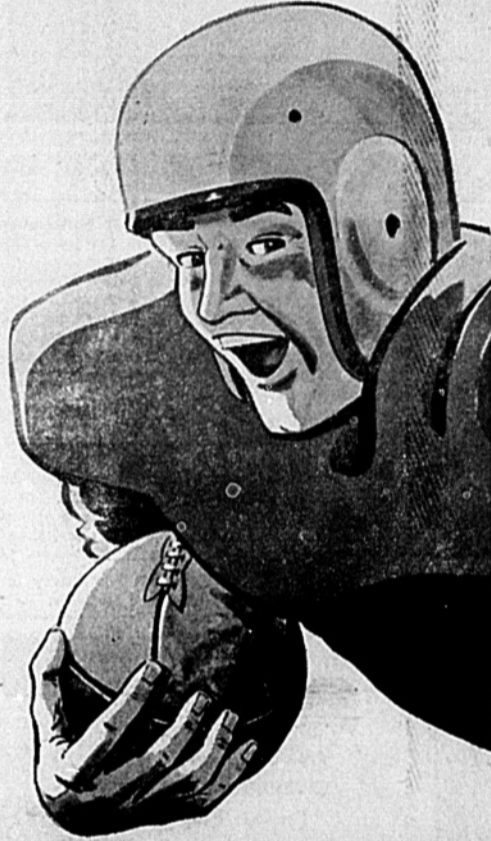

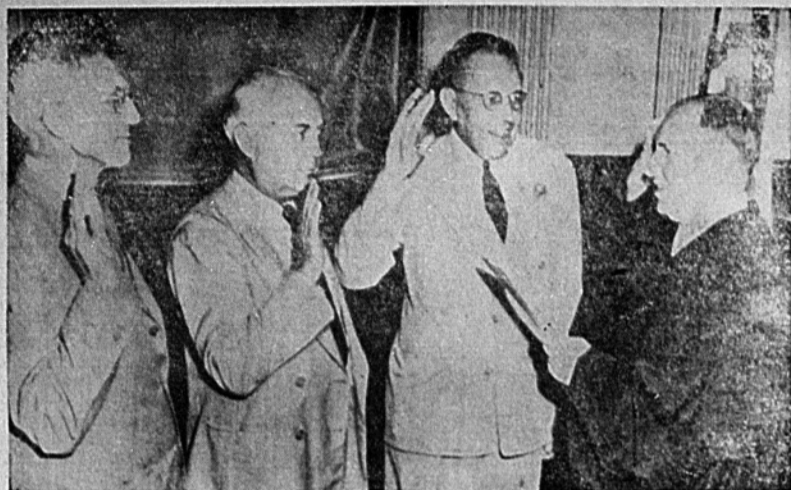
## Celebrate India's Dominion Status

Texas Tech Notes

LUBBOCK, Sept. 18.—Exhibition marching drills will be presented this year at Texas Technological College football games and other school events by a precision drill platoon organized from advanced ROTC students.

LUBBOCK, Sept. 18 — Much colorful history of early days in West Texas is revealed in a complete file of The Texas Spur, a weekly newspaper established at Spur by the late Oran McClure in 1909, which this week was given to the Texas Technological College library.

The newspaper files were dis-

covered, stored in a garage, by Neal Chastain who had purchased the old McClure homestead. The papers had been moved to the garage when fire destroyed the McClure home in 1931. Charles Senning of Spur and El Paso, a former Tech student, suggested that the papers be given to the college. Through arrangements with George S. Link, Jr., and the editor the files are to be brought up to date.

LUBBOCK, Sept. 18—Recognizing the growing importance of photography in news writing and advertising, Texas Technological College next year will offer two new courses in photography, mak-

ing a total of four photography courses taught in the journalism department.

Basic courses feature developing and printing process with emphasis on picture composition, while advanced courses link photography with writing, spot news coverage and advertising.

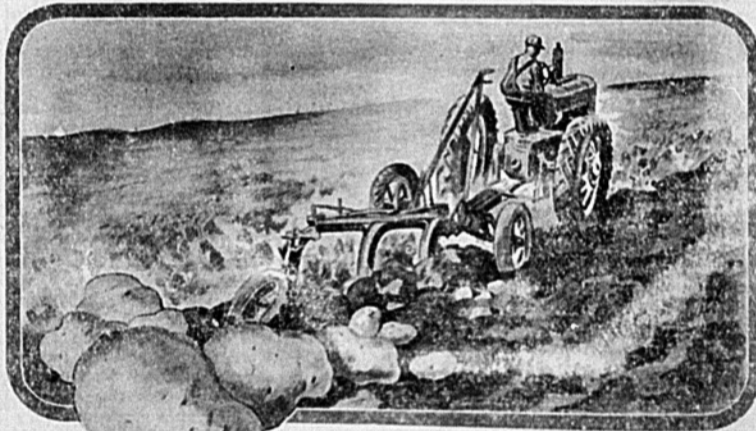
I figure that if everybody looks after the "little things," maybe the bigger things will take care of themselves.

He wants to die with his boots on, but not, of course, on the lone prairie.

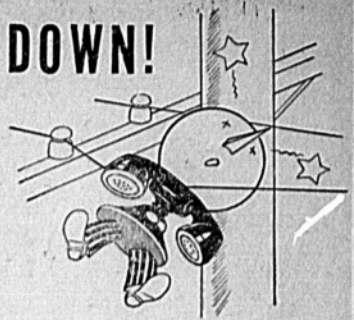
**Trends Govern Value**

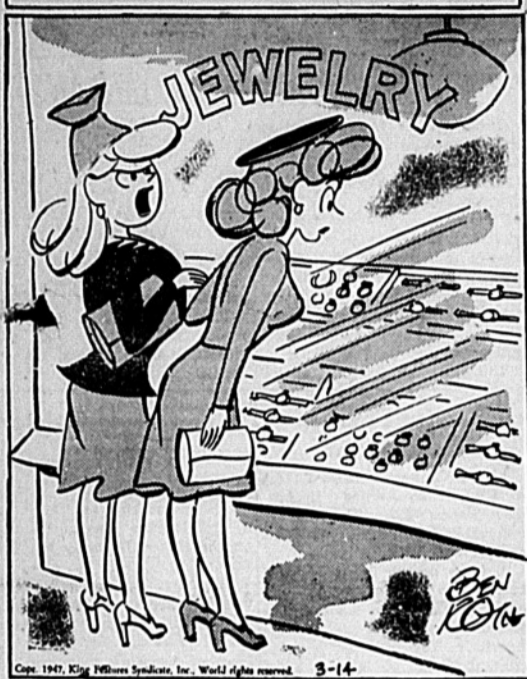

**EIGHT STEPS FOR HOUSING FLOCK**  
 When the time for housing your birds arrives, the task will involve several different steps, if executed properly. There is more to 'fall housing' than merely bringing the flock in off the range and placing the birds in a laying house which perhaps has lain idle and neglected throughout the summer.

Here is a comprehensive eight-step housing schedule which will serve on practically all poultry farms:

1. Check over the laying house for necessary repairs. Old houses usually need a few boards replaced, a new window-pane or two, installing done, or electric lighting system repaired.

2. Check the laying house equipment—waterers, feeders, nests, and roosts. Are you sure there is an adequate amount of equipment for the number of birds in your flock.

3. Now get to work on your cleaning and disinfecting job. Remove all old litter, and then scrape, sweep, and scrub the whole interior of the house. Don't let dirt invite disease.

4. After the house has been disinfected and has dried, put down clean litter. You'll probably want to start with about three inches on the floor, building up to a depth of six or seven inches as the season progresses.

5. With the house in shape, you're ready to house the birds. As you assemble the flock cull out the underdeveloped birds and plan to take them to market later. Don't house more birds than floor space permits—allow three square feet per bird for Leghorns and four square feet for heavy breeds.

6. While birds are being handled for housing, you may want to give each chicken a worming capsule.

7. At the same time, examine each bird for lice—and de-lice, if necessary, using an individual louse powder treatment.

8. If you failed to vaccinate earlier for pox or laryngo, and either of the diseases now threatens, housing time provides a good opportunity for you to immunize the birds against these diseases.

**Arsenic Eaters**  
 It is said that in Styria, Salzburg, the Tyrol and other sections of Austria, white arsenic is given to cattle and horses to render the skin bright and glossy. In addition it has been ascertained that the peasants in these provinces consume it daily, asserting that it increases the appetite, weight and strength and clears the complexion. They gradually accustom themselves to quantities which would prove fatal ordinarily and despite the practice appear to be healthy and long-lived.

**T.B. Declines**  
 In 1926, 47.3 per cent of the school children tested in one investigation in well-selected grade schools showed a positive tuberculin test, but by 1944, the percentage of positive reactions had fallen to 7.7 per cent. Although a positive reaction to a tuberculin test does not necessarily indicate a case of tuberculosis, the effectiveness of tuberculosis control measures is best determined by the tuberculin test.

**Controlling Weeds**  
 Most weeds can be kept under control by crop rotation and good cultivation made at the proper time. Chemicals for weed control have received attention in the last few years. Sodium chlorate can be used on small areas (¼ acre or less) for bindweed, Johnson grass and Bermuda grass. Sodium chlorate gives best results when applied in October or November as a dry powder at the rate of four pounds per square rod, advises Oklahoma experiment station.

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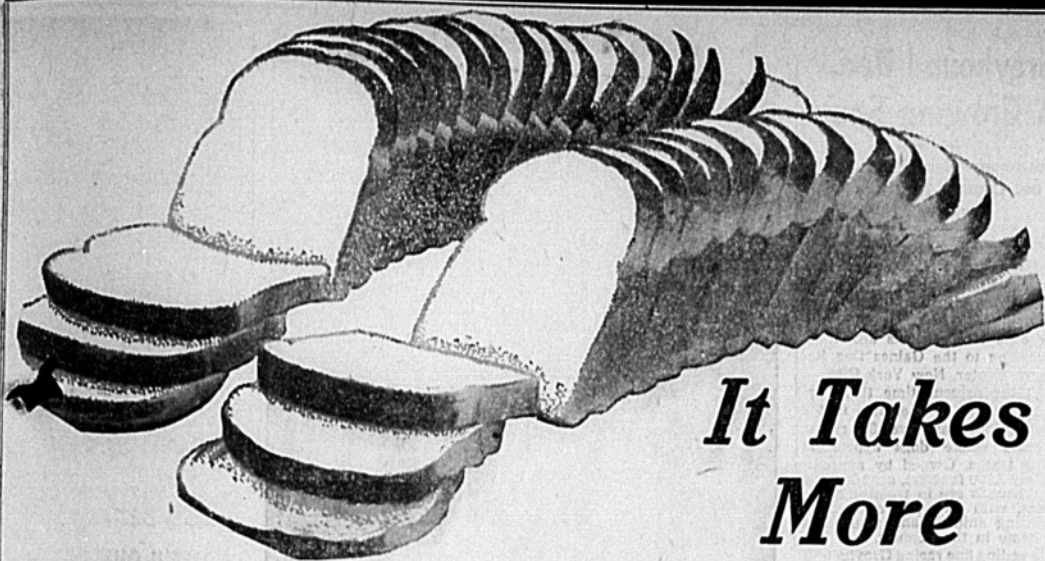

He flew in from Boston, spent the week-end at Hyde Park and then flew to Washington where he appeared at the Senate War Investigating Committee hearings. Accused of receiving favors from John Meyer, public relations man for plane builder Howard Hughes, Roosevelt admitted to the committee that he may have "inadvertently" violated an order by Gen. H. H. Arnold, war time army air forces chief, forbidding air force officers to accept favors from war contractors.

#### Killing Ants

Ants can be controlled in yards or gardens by deep cultivation several times in fall, winter and spring to break up the ant colonies and to partially destroy them. For those that remain, mix one ounce of Paris green with one pound of brown sugar and scatter at the rate of one pound to 10,000 square feet. Colonies still remaining can be killed by putting small amounts of carbonyl sulphide in the openings and then closing the entrance to the nests.

#### No Nutmegs In Connecticut

Connecticut, the "Nutmeg State," produces no nutmegs. Most of this ancient spice still comes from the East Indies. The name derives from colonial times when a visiting English doctor said that Connecticut people were using the by-products of their shoe peg factories to make nutmegs.

#### Nerves Affect Vision

Americans in large numbers, especially the younger generation, are getting "nerves" which, say some observers, are having an adverse affect upon sight. Worry and fretfulness are believed by some investigators to be a contributing factor in the increasing prevalence of glaucoma, a serious eye condition in which the pressure in the eyeball rises above normal. **Greyhound Racing  
A Growing Sport**

**Numerous Kennels Throughout Country Provide Stock for Track Use**

Greyhound racing, which in England and Ireland lures more patrons than horse racing or any other sporting activity, is fast coming to the front in this country as a major sports attraction, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

At the present time there are 18 dog tracks in operation in the United States, and over 500 racing kennels whose dogs appear at these tracks. Owned by approximately 2,500 fanciers, around 6,000 Greyhounds are in training at all times, with an equal number of breeding animals and youngsters at home in the kennels.

Breeding fine racing Greyhounds oftentimes has proven a profitable occupation. Well-bred pups bring high prices—\$500 to \$1,500, and exceptionally promising young stock has brought as much as \$3,500. Most of today's racing Greyhounds are raised in the West by farmers who breed a litter or two a year as a hobby or sideline to their regular farming activities. Recent years have seen the establishment of numerous elaborate kennels built for the express purpose of raising racing Greyhounds. While breeding activities are centered in the Middle West and West, Massachusetts has in the past 10 years come to the fore as a breeding state and now produces around 1,000 racing dogs every year. Most Greyhound track stars can trace their ancestry back to the

same forebears, as they are almost all of the same general bloodlines. The names of famous Greyhounds of the past appear in the pedigrees over and over again, making racing Greyhounds practically all one large loosely-knit family. One of the best-known racing dogs of the past century, whose name appears in many Greyhound family trees, was Master McGrath, an Irish dog. His picture was stamped on Irish coins, and a memorial statue of him was erected in Ireland. A name which shows in the pedigrees of nearly 65 per cent of modern coursing dogs is that of Mutton Cutler, another Irish dog, and a prolific sire of racing champions. The outstanding American sire of today is Never Roll, who stands at the top of the current list of sires of track winners.

Greyhound track racing started in this country about 1906. The invention of the electric rabbit by Owen Patrick Smith gave the sport its first genuine impetus. Smith promoted racing meets throughout the West, and at Emeryville, California, in 1919 the first really successful meeting was held. By 1926 dog racing had achieved national prominence and its sponsors were reaping handsome financial rewards. After Smith's death in 1927, Greyhound racing fell into the controlling hands of an unsavory group who all but ruined the sport. Although the dishonest element has long since been banished, dog racing still suffers the effects of this unfortunate period. Conducted under state sanction and supervised by state appointed regulatory bodies, Greyhound racing is actually one of the cleanest and fairest of all American sports, the Center states.
