Add well beaten egg. Spread half the dough in bottom of a greased 9 x 9 inch pan. Spread jam over dough. Cover with temaining dough. Bake in a hot oven (400 deg. F.) for 25 minutes. 



egg 1 orange peel

21/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon soda

½ teaspoon salt ½ cup chopped nuts, if desired.

Sift flour, Measure. Sift again with baking powder, salt and soda. Put orange peel through food chopper. Cream shortening, add honey gradually. Add beaten egg and orange rind, and nuts if used. Add flour mixture and milk alternately. Turn into a greased bread pan. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Bake for one hour and ten to fifteen minutes, or until done.

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
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
