J. S. Edwards, Sr., Pioneer Banker And Business Leader Laid To Rest

With the death on November 22 of J. S. Edwards, Sr., banker, land owner and noted philanthropist, Slaton lost one of its most highly respected and distinguished citizens. The Slatonite joins a host of friends in extending sympathy to all upon whom bereavement has fallen.

A native of North Carolina, J. S. Edwards was born Sept. 8, 1877. Coming to Grayson County, Texas at the age of seventeen, he began laying the foundation for a business career that led to fame and fortune. April 11, 1901 he married Miss Alice Rhodes. Three children were born to this union. He is survived by his wife, two sons, R. E. Edwards, of Seagraves, and J. S. Edwards, Jr., of Slaton; one daughter, Mrs. Howard T. Swanner of Slaton; nine grandsons, one great granddaughter, a brother of North Carolina, and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Edwards was a successful banker, land and cotton gin owner in Oklahoma and Clovis, N. M. before coming to Slaton in 1911. He developed the Clovis town site also the town sites of Cross Plains and Earth, and at one time, owned and operated thirty seven gins. He organized the First State Bank in Slaton in 1911. In 1932 after the economic world had been rocked by the depression, he organized the present Citizens State Bank, and was chairman of the Board of Directors at the time of his death.

A successful financier in every sense of the word, yet he will long be remembered by his charitable and Christian acts. It can truly be said of J. S. Edwards that he was an honor to his family, and to his friends, and to the great God who gave him life. He was present when the Methodist Church in Slaton was organized in 1911, giving generously of his time and means to all churches. He retained his church membership throughout his life with the Methodist Church, Mill Springs, N. C.

Funeral services, with Williams Funeral Home in charge, were held at the Methodist Church, Slaton, Rev. O. B. Herring and Rev. W. F. Ferguson conducted the services in the presence of many friends and relatives.

Pall bearers were George Green, J. H. Brewer, Max Arrants, R. C. Ayers, Sug Robertson, and B. G. Guinn. Interment was at Englewood Cemetery.

Plans are all set and practically all of the work is completed for the turning on tonight of the vapor lights in the business section of Slaton by the new photo electric relay system.

There are 29 of the lights all mounted on the latest styled standards. The vapor lights are far more powerful than the old style incandescent lights that have been in use in Slaton for many years. They are more economical to operate. Many cities over the nation are installing the new vapor lights.

The photo electric relay system is something new for Slaton, as in the past the turning off and turning on of the lights has been done manually. From now on the amount of light that comes from the sun will automatically turn the new lights on or off.

The new lighting system has been on order for almost a year and it is a red letter day today for Slaton so far as lighting is concerned. The business section of Slaton has been well lighted in the past, but the addition of the new vapor lights will make Slaton one of the outstanding towns on the South Plains.

MORE PAVING FOR SLATON

Completion of the four blocks of street paving that has been under construction for several months was expected to be done today. The streets that are being improved are three blocks on Garza and one block on Division.

The three on 15th street connect Garza to Division and will make the cross street an all weather street and allow crossing from Garza to Division at any time of the year. This is a much needed improvement as in bad weather the cross streets from the business section west have often been in bad shape.

The other block that will be completed is the block on Division street between 9th and 10th street. This block has long been in need of paving and will take some of the traffic from Lubbock and Garza street. Of course the completion of the work depends upon the weather.

City Dads Asking \$75,000 In Bonds

Even though it is worded in typical legal style, and somewhat difficult to fully understand, it is to the interest of every property owner in Slaton to read carefully the notice in this paper concerning the proposed bond election that is to be held in the Chamber of Commerce office on Saturday, December 9th.

For the benefit of the Mayor and the Commissioners, as a guide to what the people want done here in the way of improving the public facilities, it is the duty of every property owner to go to the polls and vote, either for or against, the issuance of the bonds.

The amount to be voted upon is \$75,000.00 to be retired within 20 years with the money to be spent upon the water system, sewer facilities and paving, in equal amounts of \$25,000.00 each.

There is little room to argue as to whether the town needs to expand both water and sewer systems, and although Slaton has many miles of paved streets as any town its size in West Texas, there is a great demand for further development of paving, by home owners all over the town. The paving that the city pays for is only the intersections.

The three projects may be voted upon separately and a voter may vote for one, two or three of the projects or vote for or against them all.

Only property owners who own real estate in the city limits are qualified to vote in this election.

Section 6: Notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of said election ordinance at three Public Places in the City of Slaton, Texas, and at the City Hall Building, and such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the Slaton Slatonite, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Slaton, Texas, and the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election; and in deference to the provisions of Article 5, of Section 1, of the Charter of the City of Slaton, Texas, such notice shall be published one additional week prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor and City Secretary shall cause such notices to be prepared and published and posted as provided for herein and shall make due returns of the publishing and posting of same to the City Commission.

Section 7: Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the City Secretary of the City of Slaton, Texas, for canvassing by the City Commission and shall return the ballot boxes to the City Secretary for safe-keeping.

The manner of holding such election and making and canvassing the returns thereto shall be governed by the general election laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the provisions of the hereinabove mentioned statutes, and the City Commission will furnish the necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite for said election.

Section 8: The fact that it is affirmatively found by the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, that there is an urgent need to proceed immediately with the extension and improve-

ment of the streets, alleys and highways of said City, and the Water System and Sanitary Sewer System of said City, in order to make the same more convenient for the public at large, and to protect and preserve the health and welfare of the citizens of Slaton, Texas, creates an emergency and public necessity demanding that the rule requiring the reading of this ordinance on more than one day before final passage be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended; and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this 13th day of November, 1950.

MANAGING THE LAYING FLOCK

A well located and well built laying house is a sign of good management—and it will go far in giving the poultry raiser maximum egg production and a saving in labor. But it's inside the laying house where good management really pays.

Yes, a healthy flock of pullets quartered in a good laying house is a good beginning, but there is much more to be done before that laying flock begins to bring in the profits.

Watch Layers Closely

Once the flock gets into heavy production, a poultry raiser should visit and observe his birds with great regularity. Of course, much of this can be done during egg-gathering trips to the laying house, but all too often many raisers neglect to look over the birds even then. By being constantly alert, a poultryman can spot layers out of condition or showing signs of a contagious disease. He can then separate such birds from the rest of the flock, treat them, and do whatever is necessary to restore their good health—without endangering the other birds.

The poultry raiser should also keep the house well ventilated, so that litter does not become damp and cold. Keeping the house warm and dry is highly important to successful and profitable egg production.

In addition, there should be plenty of feeders and waterers, at least 1 ft. of feeder space for every 4 birds and one 5-gal. waterer for every 100 birds. It is important to have enough nests to prevent dirty eggs, so allow 1 nest for every 5 birds.

Keep A Clean House

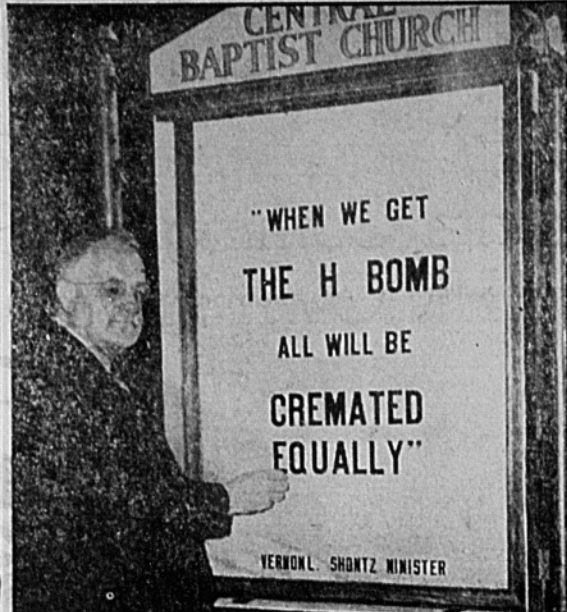
Naturally, you should maintain strict sanitation. Clean and disinfect waterers and feeders regularly. And keep clean nesting materials and well-stirred litter in the house at all times. Above all, keep your flock comfortable in a clean laying house.

Here are some additional pointers to keep in mind:

- 1. Cull the flock regularly.
2. Use artificial lighting to provide your layers a 14-hour working day.
3. Follow feeding schedules closely. Do not make sudden changes in your management program.
4. Arrange all laying house equipment conveniently.
5. Check birds regularly for lice and mites.
6. Keep the house free of drafts.
7. Gather eggs in wire baskets.
8. Give birds regular worming treatment.

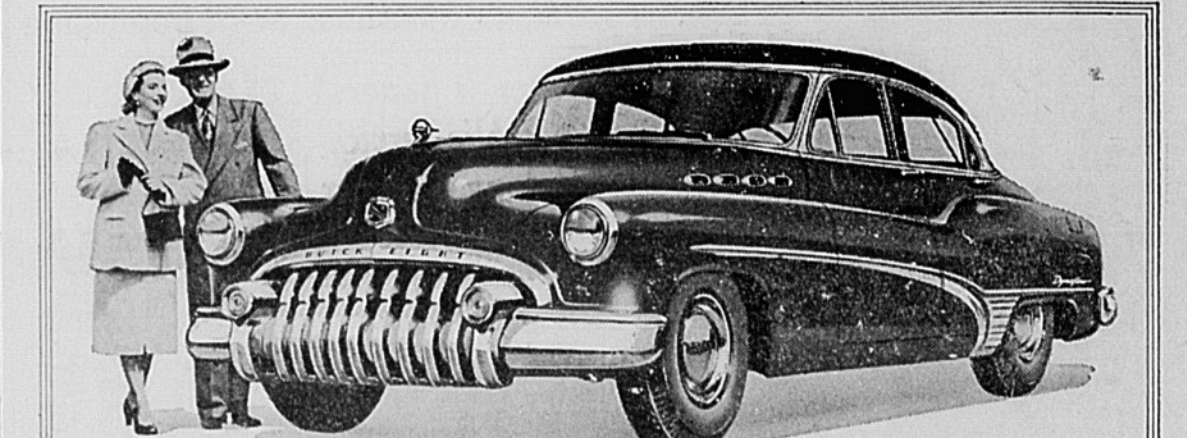

'Weaker' Sex

Although the old belief concerning the inferiority of women still lingers, the so-called weaker sex is physically superior to men, declares Louis I. Dublin in the December Reader's Digest. Mr. Dublin is vice president and statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. His article, examining the statistics on the young and old of both sexes, is condensed from Your Life.

Throughout the entire life span, the female mortality rate is lower than the male. Nature makes some allowance for this by arranging that 106 boys are born for every 100 girls. The ratio of female survival is higher even before birth, for prenatal mortality from miscarriages and stillbirths is considerably higher for males. Infectious diseases of childhood, except whooping cough, are more often fatal to boys than to girls, and accidental deaths are one and one-half times as frequent among boys.

In early adulthood the mortality rates of both sexes are almost even, but women still have the advantage: at 25 a woman has a life expectancy of 44 years, as against 42 for the man of the same age. Widows outnumber widowers 55 to 45, the wide ratio being partly due to the fact that most women marry men older than themselves.

The female intelligence is not inferior, Dublin says, but only different. Investigators have found that in certain subjects girls excel, in others boys are ahead. Girls and boys score about equally in I. Q. tests.

Women lose more time from work, as a result of illness, than do men, but this indicates merely that women pamper colds and other mild indispositions while men do not. Such pampering frequently prevents the development of more serious illness and may be one reason why women live longer.

More women than men attempt suicide, but men's efforts at self-destruction more often succeed. Possibly women do not really want to kill themselves, Dublin observes, but want only to draw attention to their grievances.

Since more women survive, the greater share of the nation's wealth is controlled by them. They are beneficiaries of 80 per cent of all life insurance in the United States, and receive 71 per cent of the estates left by men and 64 per cent of those left by other women.

Christmas Trees A Fire Hazard

Christmas, the traditional season of happiness and goodwill, is marred in hundreds of American homes each year by Christmas-tree fires. Warning against this hazard, in The Reader's Digest for December, Donovan Fitzpatrick and David A. Weiss state: "The outstanding Christmas killer is the evergreen tree." Last year 52 people burned to death in Christmas fires. Hundreds are injured and more than a million dollars' worth of property is destroyed, each Yule season, from the same cause.

The Digest article, condensed from The Rotarian, says that many people believe certain chemicals will render a tree fireproof or fire-resistant. Underwriters Laboratories engineers, however, say they have yet to test a solution they can recommend. A fireproofing "paint," tried on his own tree by an officer of the National Bureau of Fire Underwriters, did make the tree fire-resistant but gave it "such a sticky, brown appearance" that its beauty was destroyed. A Department of Agriculture booklet, "Fireproofing Christmas Trees," has been discontinued: the solution it recommended was found to lessen rather than increase the tree's resistance to ignition.

Faulty wiring of lights is a notorious cause of Christmas-tree fires. The article urges that wiring be checked for worn spots and loose connections, that no electric bulb touch a branch and that lights be turned off when the family leaves the house or retires for the night.

Other means of avoiding a Christmas fire tragedy: Keep the tree outside until a few days before Christmas and, once it is inside, keep it moist by cutting the trunk on a diagonal and placing the base in water. Never use lighted candles. Remove accumulations of gift wrappings. Use only fireproof decorations, never cotton or paper. Get rid of the tree by New Year's Day.

Property Owners Should Vote Dec. 9th

That every additional tax burden makes for inflation cannot be successfully denied, but neither can the fact that it takes money to keep a town or community in good running order and every town, to insure progress and continued growth, must not only keep all public utilities in good repair, but must, at regular intervals, pave more streets, increase and enlarge its water distributing system and give sanitary service to its residents.

Slaton is no exception and the proposed bonds that are to be voted upon on December 9th should be given close consideration by the property owners of Slaton and every property owner here should go to the polls and vote on December 9th for or against the issuance of the bonds.

The welfare of the community should be one of the chief interests of the property owners of Slaton, for upon the continued increase in value of property in Slaton depends upon the investments each one has made. That Slaton cannot continue to grow and attract new citizens is a self evident fact, if public service expansions are made, if one considers the fact that the town has grown from 3600 to over 5000 within the past ten years, almost 40 per cent.

Not only does Slaton need all of the suggested improvements that the proposed bonds call for, but there are a number of other things that the town will need before long if Slaton is to keep pace with other towns in West Texas.

One is a modern swimming pool for the good health and amusement of the young people of this area. Any town that hopes to grow in the future must keep as many of its youths at home as possible and there is nothing that makes young folks migrate to other localities as the lack of amusements and interest of the town folks in their welfare.

A modern swimming pool would pay for itself if the City Commission or some other public interested organization could get it constructed and all that is needed is a sponsor.

Nearly every forward looking town on the South Plains has a modern swimming pool, and if Slaton does not get one before long we will be as far behind times as the School Commissioners were a good many years ago when they failed to take advantage of the Government building program that would have enabled them to have built school buildings that would have given Slaton facilities that would still be adequate and a credit to the town.

Slaton is headed in the right direction and not only should the proposed bonds be authorized, but more improvements should be done and done soon.

Bovine Mastitis

Perhaps coming years will bring a "sure cure" for all types of bovine mastitis, but that cure isn't here yet, a veterinary medical bulletin declares. Penicillin, streptomycin, and similar drugs have a definite place in mastitis control programs, but such drugs are useful only against certain types of germ caused mastitis. They are powerless against noninfectious cases, which are more common than some farmers believe, the bulletin states. Drugs used against noninfectious cases actually may do more harm than good because they often aggravate the injured udder.
