New Labor Bill For Mexicans To Be Introduced By Cong. Mahon

Congressman George Mahon reports from Washington that on Monday of this week, he introduced a bill which would permit Mexican families and their children to assist in the cotton harvest this fall. The 81st Congress, through an amendment to a labor bill, added in the Senate, had approved legislation prohibiting labor by children under 16 years of age in agriculture during school hours.

According to Mahon the provision on child labor has proved unworkable; it has disrupted the work of many of the schools, slowed down the cotton harvest, and diminished the chance of the children of Mexican families to go to school by denying them the income they normally secure from the cotton harvest. Moreover, it is argued that the matter of child labor in agriculture and the question of school attendance are problems that can best be handled by the states and not the federal government.

Mahon's bill provides that restrictions as to child labor shall not apply to the harvesting of basic crops. The bill has been referred by the Speaker to the House Committee on Labor for consideration. In introducing the bill, Mahon said, "We are being called upon by the government to produce 16 million bales of cotton this year in the interest of national defense. There is no use to try to produce a big crop unless we can harvest it."

A further effort to improve the chances for securing labor for the cotton harvest, Mahon has appeared before the House Committee on Agriculture and urged passage of the Poage Bill, which is designed to greatly increase the availability of labor from the Republic of Mexico.

Farmers are deeply concerned over the threat of a labor shortage for the harvest of the cotton crop. Members of Congress who are aware of the situation are seeking to be of all possible assistance. In addition to the bill by Mahon, bills of somewhat similar nature have been introduced by congressmen Fisher and Rogers of Texas. The problem is to devise a measure that can win the support of a majority of the Members of the House and Senate.

Brick Laying On Methodist Church Started Today

Rev. O. B. Herring, pastor of the First Methodist Church, announced this week that the steel for the new Methodist sanctuary has arrived and masonry began early in the week. Laying of bricks was scheduled to begin Thursday.

Approximately \$71,000 is now in the building fund toward the new structure which will cost about \$100,000 when completed. L. A. Harral said that it would probably be the first of the year before the new building is finished.

The semi-Gothic structure, with a tower and spire, will be connected to the old church by a cloister. The entire new building will cover an area of 47 by 115 feet. The sanctuary will be 45 x 72 ft. and will seat 400 people. The balcony will seat 100. The pastor's study and the choir room will be located at the rear of the first floor. At the front of the building on either side of the foyer will be the prayer room and the "mothers room."

The present building will be converted into an educational building upon completion of the new sanctuary.

Youth Is Critical From Gun Wound

Robert Woodfin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Verl Woodfin, is in critical condition in Mercy Hospital as the result of a shooting accident Monday evening about 7 o'clock. A bullet from a .22 entered his left cheek, just below the eye, and lodged within an inch of his skull on the right side, when the bullet was accidentally discharged from the gun.

Woodfin and two other youths, Jim Porter and Richard Gentry, were returning to Slaton after rabbit hunting in the canyon. They were nearly to town when the gun was accidentally fired, critically wounding young Woodfin.

His condition was described as "fair" Wednesday, and attending physicians gave him a fair chance to survive. Nurses at the hospital reported that he had rested comparatively well Tuesday night.

Woodfin's 19th birthday came on Wednesday, March 21, two days after the tragedy.

He is an employee of the Santa Fe Railway company here.

High School Boys Invited To Join Civil Air Patrol

The Civil Air Patrol, a national organization attached with the Air Force, designed to promote interest in aviation, announces that any young man in this area interested in flying should contact R. J. Chatham, the commanding officer of the Lubbock flight, in Lubbock, or Rev. Earnest M. Smith, chaplain of the Lubbock flight, in Slaton. There is no charge for joining the organization, but a small monthly fee will be required.

Some of the duties of the Civil Air Patrol include rescue missions, in which flights are sent out in search of planes which have crashed (both civilian and military) and mercy flights, such as flying ill patients to hospitals, etc.

A cadet program is offered for high school boys. Cadets and seniors receive ground schooling or hanger flying, which consists of navigation, meteorology, and instruments (blind flying). The AF furnishes the Air Patrol with surplus equipment, such as light planes and radio equipment. A plane is not available for the Lubbock unit at the present time, however, if the unit becomes strong enough it will be possible to obtain one.

Lt. Col. Franklin E. Welch is the chief of staff of the national organization in Washington, D. C. Major Magee is commander of the Texas Wing, and R. J. Chatham is in charge of the Lubbock flight of which Slaton is a part.

Meetings are held at the Lubbock Municipal Air Port every Monday night at 8 o'clock. Any boy interested in the Civil Air Patrol can contact Mr. Chatham or Rev. Smith for further information.

A. B. Gustavus To Represent Local WOW At Meeting

A. B. Gustavus, 220 South 4th St., Slaton will be a delegate to the Head Camp meeting, Texas jurisdiction, of the Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society, April 2 to 4, at Fort Worth.

Preceding the business sessions starting Monday afternoon at the Hotel Texas, there will be a joint reception at 7 p.m. Sunday, April 1, at Hotel Blackstone for delegates and national officers of both the Woodmen of the World and Woodmen Circle which also is holding a convention in Fort Worth. They also will join in a memorial service following the reception and hold a joint opening session Monday morning in the Recreation building.

National officers of both societies will be honored at a luncheon Monday noon. Preceding the first business session Monday, a flag and flagpole will be presented to the city by President Farrar Newberry of Omaha, Nebraska, in behalf of the Head Camp.

More than 600 delegates representing 73,000 Texas Woodmen will attend the meeting, arrangements for which were made by State Managers Nobel T. Lee Northeast Texas, Dallas; George W. Hine, Sr., Northwest Texas, Abilene; Roy W. Martin, Southeast Texas, Houston, and R. N. Dossman, Southwest Texas, San Antonio.

E Bonds May Be Held In Reserve

DALLAS, MARCH 16. Congress has just completed legislation that will postpone "writer's cramps" and other inconveniences for millions of Americans who bought United States Defense Bonds during and since World War II.

Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Defense Bond chairman, received notice Tuesday from the Treasury that the Senate has passed and sent to the president a bill giving owners of Series E bonds the option of holding their bonds for all or any part of another 10 years, with accrued interest. The bill, passed by the House several weeks ago, will go into effect on May 1, tenth anniversary of the beginning of Series E bond sales and, consequently, the date on which bonds sold on May 1, 1941, will reach maturity.

"This legislation is going to save bond owners a lot of time and trouble," Mr. Adams said. "Many of the people who own Series E bonds will want to re-invest the money as they mature. If this bill had not been passed, they would have needed to take their bonds to the bank as they matured, sign them and have new bonds issued."

"When you have literally hundreds of these bonds, as many Texans do, signing them for redemption can be a tedious job that results in a tired and aching hand."

Mr. Adams said that the automatic extension applies only to Series E bonds. He emphasized that the extension is purely optional with the bond owner and that the holder of maturing Series E's can cash them in for full value at any time.

Owners electing to hold their bonds under the new plan will receive 2 1/2 per cent simple interest on them for the first 7 1/2 years of the extension and interest during the final 2 1/2 years at a rate to bring the total interest to 2.9 per cent compounded. The 2 1/2 per cent interest during the earlier years of the extension is a somewhat better return than for new bonds.

"Now the owner of Series E's who wants to reinvest his money as they mature only has to hold on to them," Mr. Adams said. "If he holds them for the full period of the extension they will pay him a return of 78 per cent on his original investment."

He said that the bill would also keep a lot of money in savings that otherwise would pour into the spending stream and add to inflation.

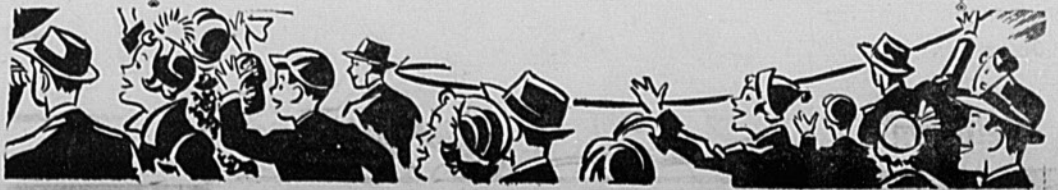

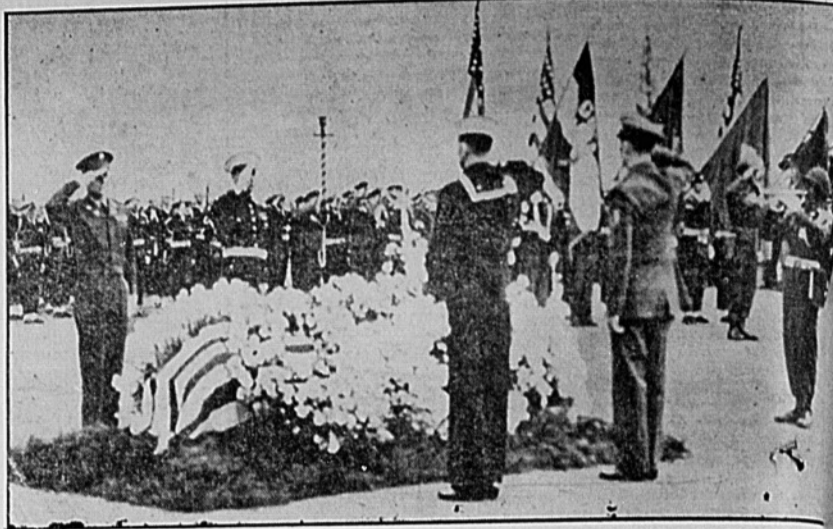

Should We Look To The Future?

That Slaton is in the best position to develop into a substantial small city of home loving people who can build up a community of well balanced incomes and modest living expenses is evidenced on many sides, but to get the job done, some careful planning should be done immediately.

To let the town mushroom into a poorly planned, loosely knitted city would be the easiest way at the present time, by ignoring the facts and let the future take care of itself.

How should the streets be laid out? Should the residential and business sections be kept restricted? Should ground be purchased now for future parks or should these things be left up to the folks who will be here ten or fifteen years from now? Does Slaton own enough ground at present to insure proper room for school buildings? Municipal buildings? Is our water system being planned so that it could care for fifteen or twenty thousand people?

In many way Slaton is in excellent shape to become a progressive, prosperous town several times as large as it is now, the streets are wide, the business firms are becoming more and more aggressive each year, the people are all interested in the progress of the town and there are few communities the size of Slaton where the people feel as patriotic to their town as they do here. This is proven by the fact that the Slatonite goes to so many former residents of Slaton who still feel that Slaton is their home town. It is also a fact that a great many people who have reached the retirement age have settled down in Slaton, or, have come back here to make their homes after having moved away but found other communities not to their liking.

Slaton needs a planning board of men who either have the knowledge to plan the future or who will call in the experts to give us the proper advice and then to act upon such knowledge.

Such action would take the full hearted cooperation of practically every one in Slaton and the expenditure of some money. Such funds spent now would save a lot in the future.

A German Opinion

TO THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR:

In your editorial, "Mr. Hoover's Warning," you are declaring "... Mr. Hoover is quite right in saying that America cannot 'create their spiritual forces' for Europeans..." Provided I grasp the meaning of the sentence aright, your opinion seems to offer the key to considerable American disappointment about the military inactivity of some other European friends.

At the risk that you may be shocked or annoyed, here is my personal opinion: The lack of European spiritual forces is—at least partly—an American product. The average European is impoverished and living on a modest standard; the average American, visiting Europe, likes to show his superior standard of living, as measured by jazz, cars, dollars—or war material. Consequently, an American is considered here as wholly materialistic, as an ever-calculating profiteer.

As long as the American system was victorious, to follow in its shade was easy business. But now, the Communists profit by the feeble points of this system of dollar-measuring, of war-material-mindedness, by using and stressing the superiority of individual courage, of instinct, and by exploiting the human traits—hate and envy. Your real friends will show soon in the sieve of troublesome days.

Postwar years brought a considerable sum of psychological failures by the western powers, and so many contradictory ways in politics that the average German (re-educated since 1945) is unable to understand or to meet the American point of view. Last Gallup tests of December showed anti-military votes by 85 per cent in southern Germany. No government could bridge such unwillingness to fight, although 95 per cent of our folks unite in anti-Communist feeling.

The solution offers a psychological problem on the broadest basis, beginning with American self-examination, leading along the narrow streets of modesty and humility to a western world, where everybody feels responsible to carry his part of the common burden. Suppose, a business for the best people on both sides of the Atlantic.

In Korean Fields

Thus far there has come from Korean rice paddies no such mutedly eloquent appeal as John McCrae's "In Flanders Fields." Instead there is backbiting in portions of the American press as to whether other members of the United Nations have contributed their proper share of the wounded and dead.

A UN report recently listed Turkey as third after the Republic of Korea and the United States in numbers lost facing Communist aggression. Britain has the third largest number of men engaged, 22,000, including sea and air forces. The French battalion has lost 33 per cent casualties, and Filipinos, Dutchmen, Greeks, Australians, and others have added to the numbers.

Now a communique from Eighth Army Headquarters sums up casualties sustained by South Korean forces as 169,000, or more than three times the total for all other Allied forces, though the number of South Koreans engaged is somewhat less than the number of Americans.

Whatever may be argued about contributions to an international police action or about responsibilities of some UN countries elsewhere, it can hardly be said that the Koreans are not fighting their own war.—From The Christian Science Monitor.

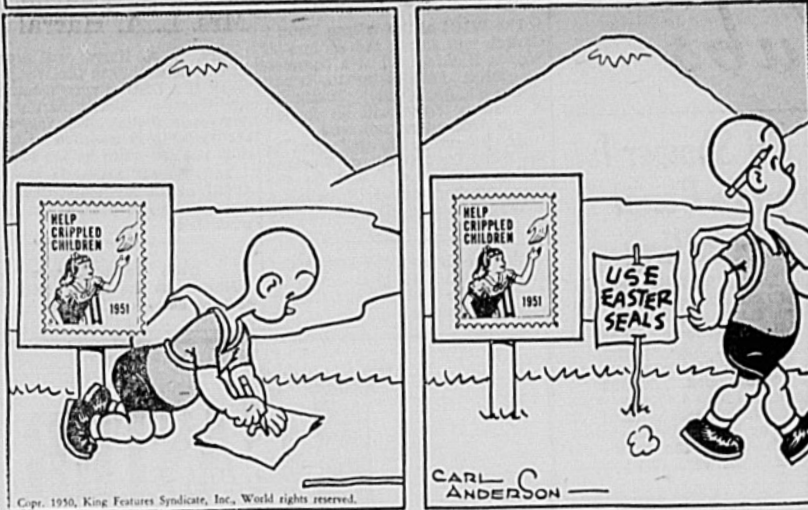

Cancer Research

A new microscope now in use at the Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research, New York City, makes it possible for freshly prepared sections of living tissue to be viewed through three different ultra-violet wave lengths. The specimens can also be photographed through the microscope and the photos may be projected or reproduced on color film. The instrument is said to reveal structural detail in a way never before accomplished.

CHICK CHATS

Presented By Dr. Salsbury's Labgortories

DO THIS BEFORE CHICKS ARRIVE

When you enter a house, you like a feeling of warmth and comfort to sweep over you—especially during chilly late winter or early spring months. The same holds true for baby chicks.

When your new batch of chicks is placed under the brooder, make certain litter and pen have been thoroughly warmed by the brooder stove. It's just one of the duties a raiser should attend to at least 48 hours before chicks arrive.

In addition, you'll want to take care of other management details. For instance, what about the arrangement of equipment? Feeders should be spread fanwise with the ends under the hover. In this way chicks can work toward or away from the heat as they want without having a feeder in their way. This arrangement is especially important when an electric brooder is in operation.

A Wire Guard

You'll also want to provide a wire guard around the brooder, for the first few days anyway. A guard about 12 inches high may be used to form a ring around the stove about two feet from the edge of the hover. This prevents chicks from wandering too far from the heat. Some raisers erect a ring of building paper or rolled corrugated cardboard. If this is done, place the loose end of the paper on the outside of the ring to avoid making a pocket which might cause chicks to crowd and smother. Leave sufficient paper on the loose end so that you can increase the size of the ring as chicks grow.

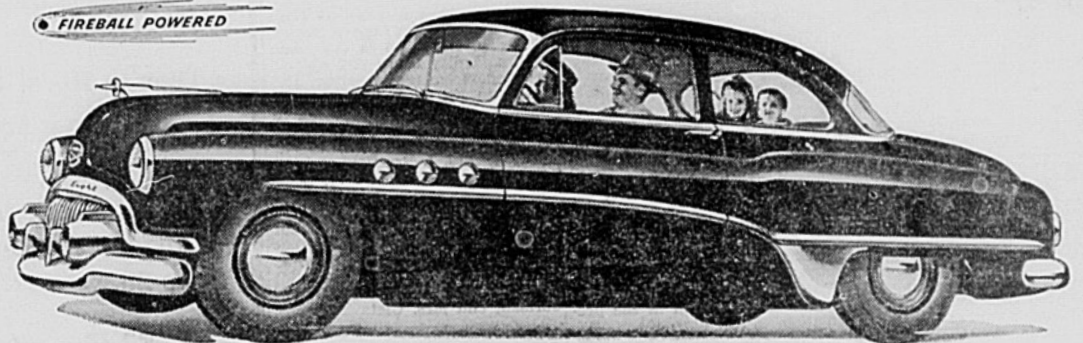
Prevent Litter Eating

To prevent litter eating, you may find it advisable to cover the litter inside the brooder ring with heavy kinked paper or cotton cloth sack-material. Make sure you do not use burlap for this purpose. Chicks will pull out strands and swallow them if you do.

Also plan to carry out strict sanitation in the brooder house. Have a pair of rubbers or overshoes near the door to slip over your shoes each time you go inside. A cloth or gunny sack soaked in disinfectant may be used to wipe off shoes. It is also recommended that you keep a brush and disinfectant solution in the house so that you can sanitize feeders and waterers regularly.

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

This week's recipe is the favorite of the John Berkley family. It is Mrs. Berkley's method of preparing Lemon Meringue Pie.

- ½ c. water
- 7 tbs. cornstarch
- 1½ c. water
- 1¼ c. sugar
- 3 egg yolks (slightly beaten)
- 2 lemons (rind and juice)
- 1 tbs. butter
- 1 baked pie shell
- 3 egg whites
- 2 tbs. sugar
- 1 tsp. lemon juice

Mix ½ cup sugar and cornstarch to thin paste. Combine 1½ cups water and sugar in top of double boiler and bring to boil over direct heat. Add the cornstarch paste and cook for few minutes until thick and smooth. Pour over slightly beaten egg yolks. Return to double boiler and cook for one minute. Add grated lemon rind

lemon juice and butter and blend. Cool, stirring occasionally. Pour into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff. Add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add lemon juice. Pile on filling and bake in a slow oven for about 15 minutes or until the meringue is firm and brown.

Mrs. Berkley says this makes a very good dessert and she has had quite a lot of success with it.

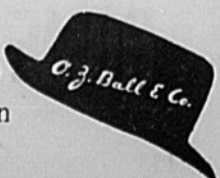

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West Texas Roundup

Five men are facing a Gaines County grand jury today in connection with an alleged ring which stole 6,740 feet of four-inch drill pipe from the K. J. Mannion Drilling Company at Cedar Lake January 2.

The men are Ed Burge, Albany, 35; H. W. White, 40, Seagraves; Syeril Aduddell, 45, Seagraves; Sohtry Connell, 50, pumper at Cedar Lake; and R. L. Heady, 22, Breckenridge.

Last of the four men were taken into custody in Seminole on Wednesday afternoon to climax more than a month of investigation by Deputy Sid Johnson, Texas Ranger John Woods of Midland, Special Agent George Roby for several gas companies.

Pipe involved in the case is long gone—officers traced it to a dealer in used pipe in Snyder and to Southern Gas Co., which put the pipe into its lines in the Farmington area in northwestern New Mexico. Drilling tools had been sawed off the ends of the pipe to facilitate its use as pipeline pipe.—The Seminole Sentinel.

A tiny calf, weighing only 15 pounds was born Saturday at the B. R. Stovall farm, west of town about six miles. The midget calf is perfectly developed and seems normal in every way except for size, according to the owner. "Calves normally weigh around 60 pounds at birth," Stovall said.

The Stovall family have had many calves since word of the unusual calf got around. "Mother cow of the new baby calf takes it all in her stride and seems not at all taken back by the unusual weight of her latest offspring," the Stovalls said.—The Morton Tribune.

The second annual three-day vocational guidance program, offered to all students of Levelland Senior High School, will get underway Tuesday with persons prominent in 23 different fields of life's work ready to offer their aid to high school students seeking to find a field of interest.

Of greatest importance to seniors, the program will nevertheless embrace the entire 271 students who have already taken the initial step in the 1951 program by indicating their preferences of life work (or what they now believe to be preferences) on slips of paper. Each student has listed three choices, and in each field that was selected by a least five or more students, a local businessman, prominent in that field, has consented to talk to the students.—The Hockley County Herald.

Local oil interest flamed anew Thursday with the announcement that oil had been discovered by the Magnolia's No. 1 Tom Peay in the Lower Permian.

Located three-quarters of a mile west of the old Florey, a drill stem test was run Thursday morning from 8170 to 8200. Gas came to the surface in four minutes. The flow was gauged for one hour and fifteen minutes and made 28.87 barrels of oil.

The oil is said to be coming from the Lower Permian. Operators were not expecting oil from this depth and its discovery came as a surprise.

The 14,000 foot wildcat was scheduled to drill ahead. The deep exploration is being drilled 1,736 feet from east and 579 feet from south lines of section 6, league 314, Gaines County school land survey.—The Andrews County News.

The grotesque front and back wall of a homemade plywood trailer and the charred body of its owner, burned beyond recognition, were all that remained Friday morning of a 10:30 p. m. Thursday night fire at the Levelland Trailer camp which claimed the second life by fire here within two weeks.

The man, 40-year-old W. E. (Shorty) Miller, auto mechanic, and resident of Levelland for one year, suffocated and burned in the fire believed to have been started from a cigarette.

Chief H. B. Johnson said that the body was found on the floor beside the bed indicating that the victim attempted to get out of the flaming 8x10 foot makeshift home. All indications pointed to the fact that Miller suffocated before he burned.—The Levelland Sun-News.

Open house and formal dedication of the new \$550,000 Brownfield High School, located on East Broadway, will be held Monday, March 12, beginning at 6 p. m. according to information received from O. R. Douglas, superintendent.

The high school student council, of which Dale Cary is president, will be in charge of the open house, which will be held from 6 p. m. until 8 p. m. Students will conduct tours through the building, and the high school band, under the direction of Harold Mulkey, will furnish music for the period. Refreshments will be served by

the high school home economics department, headed by Misses Wanda Terry and Dorothy Smith.—The Terry County Herald.

Building in Brownfield finally hit a snag during February in the form of credit restrictions, government regulations and a normal seasonal slump. The total of only \$65,100 in building permits for the month is more than \$200,000 less than permits during January.

However local builders pointed to an increase in remodeling and additions as a possible stopgap before government regulations ease off, if they are going to ease up.

Of the 18 permits issued at the City Hall, eight were for some type of construction adding on to homes or buildings already built. Less than a fourth of the 49 permits issued during January was for this type of building.

Total for 1951 thus far is \$352,100. The record 1950 total was \$2,117,225.—The Brownfield News.

Union Oil Company of California No. 3 Stitt, on the southwest side of Brownfield, South-Canyon field in east-central Terry county has been potential for 928 barrels of 44-gravity oil.

This was based on actual flow production during six hours through a one and one-quarter inch opening. Casing pressure was zero and pressure on the tubing was 150 pounds.

No water was present. Gas-oil ratio was 604:1.

Top of pay is 10,110 feet and total depth is 11,000 feet. Five and one-half inch casing is cemented at 10,789 feet. Production is coming through perforations at 10,110-10,128 feet after being acidized with 500 gallons.—The Brownfield News.

Fertilize Vegetables

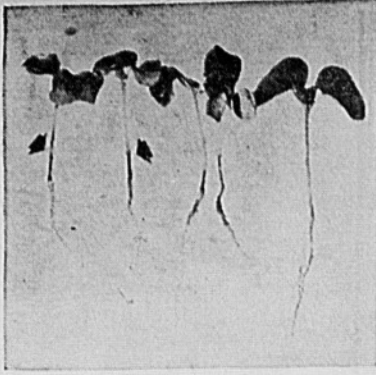

SORE SHIN or "Damping-Off" of cotton can be controlled

Sore shin or "Damping-off" is a touchy subject with many a cotton grower. It is hard to understand why your small seedlings should partly or completely die soon after they have come up. And it seems strange that this should happen in what ought to be your better soils — the heavy soils and those rich in organic content.

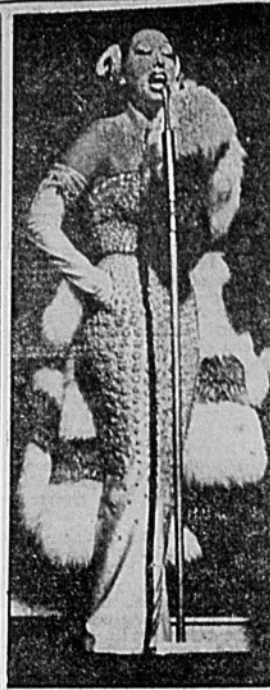
Because it happens most often in cool, damp weather, you may blame the bad weather when sore shin attacks your seedlings. Actually this is caused by fungi or bacteria that live in your soil, or in or on your seed. Cold and moisture cause these fungi to thrive at your expense.

A change to warm, sunny weather sometimes stops an

attack of sore shin. It's much better, however, to prevent this disease before you plant your crop. Treatment of cotton seed with an organic mercury disinfectant has been proved to stop most losses from sore shin as well as losses from seed rot. This treatment kills the disease fungi on and in the seeds and protects both seeds and seedlings as they come up.

You can treat your seeds yourself, or have the job done for you. In either case the chemical costs less than 10¢ per acre, which is about one-fiftieth the cost of replanting. The County Agent can tell you more about the value of seed treatment and where you can get treated cotton or your own cotton treated for you.

The Hired Hand—Peculiar cloud formations Friday morning and noon caused considerable comment. At least four of the thin, white cloud formations lying across the sky in a southwest-northwest direction were seen.

Three of them moved across the sky in a southeasterly direction during the forenoon, but the fourth suddenly formed almost overhead about noon. This last cloud dissipated after a short while, and then reformed at about 45 degrees in the eastern sky.

The clouds were at an altitude of some 7,000 to 8,000 feet, well below the cirrus clouds above, and yet above the small cumulus clouds which finally were swept away as dry, dusty wind moved in from the west.

The clouds marked a trough line—the line dividing a warm front from a cold front, and high velocity winds would have been found in their vicinity.

An undue amount of turbulence along this trough line caused the condensation into visible moisture droplets resulting in a cloud of unusual whiteness.

The narrow confines of the trough line caused the clouds to be neatly symmetrical. They were pretty, but we would just as soon not had them, nor the wind-blown sand.

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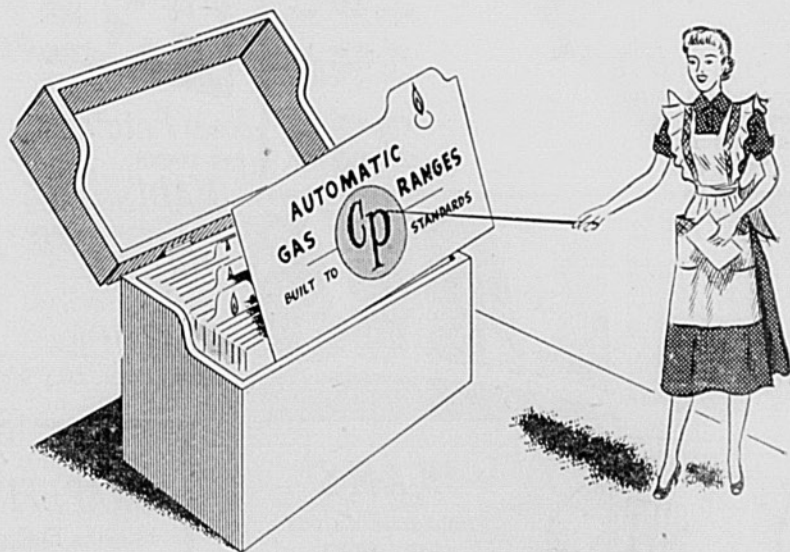
