## Good results obtained by Jaycees in civic survey for improvements

"Good Results" was the report from the Slaton Junior Chamber of Commerce concerning their civic survey conducted recently.

Some 68 different types of suggestions were received, telling the group of young men of

different ways in which Slaton might be improved.

The top 12 suggestions, in order of frequency received were as follows:

1. Clean vacant lots, alleys and ditches.
2. Improvement and beautification of Texas Avenue.
3. More playground equipment, drinking fountains, and improvement of present park.
4. Rest rooms, kitchen and general improvement of Scout Hall.
5. Traffic regulated by police department during busy hours at schools.
6. Improve, rebuild, or erect a better, more usable Clubhouse with more emphasis on kitchen facilities and meeting rooms.
7. Insect control by spraying, cutting unnecessary vegetation, garbage control, and control of lakes.
8. Cleanup around schools, and secure more playground

equipment for schools.

9. Improve public library.

10. Street lights in residential areas.

11. Park and equipment for Southwest Slaton.

12. Move football stadium behind new high school.

Jaycee-ettes assisted the Jaycees in solicitation of suggestions in the survey.

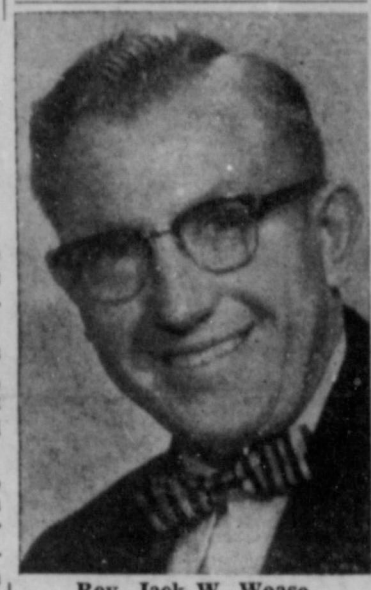
### Too much liquor for one pickup

Tuesday morning officers from the Texas Liquor Control Board office in Lubbock were driving back to Lubbock after having been to the Slaton Police Department to pick up a truck load of confiscated beer and wine.

As they passed the drive in theater on their way back into Lubbock, a highway patrolman met them. He radioed to the Slaton police notifying them that a load of beer was on the highway, asking them to come and pick it up.

Police Chief Bill Daniels told the probably-red-faced patrolman that it was Liquor Control Board officers that had just left his station. Incidentally, the pick-up had 912 quarts of beer and 113 pints of wine on it.

The revival will continue through October 12, with services at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. daily.

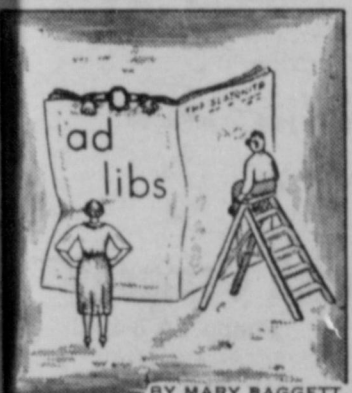

After a taste of victory, the Tigers from Slaton High School will be looking for a second win Friday night when they meet the Abernathy Antelopes in Tiger Stadium at 8 p.m.

Coach Leonard Ehrlie said this week that the boys were in good shape for the game. He also said that Jerry "Red"

Allen would probably be back for the game after being sidelined during the past two games because of injuries.

Abernathy last week downed Dimmitt 12-6, giving them four wins no loss record for the season.

Previously they had beaten Sundown 30-8; Tulia 16-14; and Spur 20-8.

According to Ehrlie, Abernathy presented a "booger on our hands," but with improvements as the season has progressed, the Tigers should be ready for a good scrap.

The game will be Slaton's fifth, after having been previously downed by Canyon, Seagraves, and Stamford, and their victory over Frenship last week.

Directors of the Garza County Community Chest set their budget for the up-coming fall drive at \$500 above the total for 1958. Asked in the new drive is \$12,500 for 11 participating organizations.

The five-day county-wide fund raising campaign for Post and Garza County has been set for November 17-21.

## Increase in fines for repeat violators being assessed by Slaton city court

Fines ranging from \$10 to \$150 have been assessed the 87 persons on whom complaints have been filed in corporation court, according to records at the Slaton Police Department.

Traffic violations have brought fines up to \$35, while citations of simple assault and drunkenness have brought fines up to \$100. One vagrancy charge carried a fine of \$150. The higher fines were assessed on cases in which the person fined had been charged previously with the same violation.

During the week ending Tuesday, September 30, 12 persons

were jailed for drunkenness, one for driving without a driver's license; one for discharging firearms within the city limits, five for disturbance, two for trespassing, one on a traffic violation, and three for vagrancy.

State Liquor Control Board officers this week took possession of 912 quarts of beer and 113 pints of wine which had been confiscated recently by Slaton police and county officers in raids in Slaton.

The liquor was valued at bootleg prices in Slaton at "in excess of \$1,000."

## Role of newspaper played up during newspaper week

Newspapers the nation over will observe National Newspaper Week beginning today and continuing through Wednesday, October 8.

The observance is scheduled to point out the role which newspapers play in the day-to-day life of the American public, and the services which papers can render its readers. Editorials in this week's Slatonite point out some of the aids and responsibilities of newspapers, and a picture-feature page shows the many phases of community life touched on through the year by the newspaper.

A DISPLAY in the windows of The Slatonite will take viewers through the motions of putting out a newspaper ... from the time a person calls in a news item until it appears in print.

Community newspapers, though often thought of as competitive in nature with their neighboring city's dailies, play an entirely different role in getting news to the readers. Instead of attempting to cover items which deal with national, international, and state-wide events, the community newspaper's role is to cover events which deal directly with its readers ... the down to earth, every day items which happen in the community itself.

NAMES MAKE news in anybody's newspaper, but especially so in the community newspaper. During the past two weeks, issues of The Slatonite have carried names of nearly 2,000 individuals.

Pictures of local events do much to enhance the readership of the community newspaper—an innovation which has come into being within the last few years.

NOT ONLY is a newspaper careful in its selection of news copy, but also screens its advertising copy to avoid publication of misleading offers which might tend to endanger its readers.

Within recent years floods of classified advertising—much of it accompanied by advance payment — have offered "get-rich-quick" deals for people to invest in. More often than not, newspapers refuse to accept this type advertising.

**THE JOURNALIST'S CREED**

I believe in the profession of Journalism. I believe that the public journal is a public trust; that all connected with it are, to the full measure of their responsibility, trustees for the public; that acceptance of a lesser service than the public service is betrayal of this trust.

I believe that clear thinking and clear statement, accuracy, and fairness, are fundamental to good journalism.

I believe that a journalist should write only what he holds in his heart to be true.

I believe that suppression of the news, for any consideration other than the welfare of society, is indefensible.

I believe that no one should write as a journalist what he would not say as a gentleman; that bribery by one's own pocketbook is as much to be avoided as bribery by the pocketbook of another; that individual responsibility may not be escaped by pleading another's instructions or another's dividends.

I believe that advertising, news and editorial columns should alike serve the best interests of readers; that a single standard of helpful truth and cleanness should prevail for all; that the supreme test of good journalism is the measure of its public service.

I believe that the journalism which succeeds best—and best deserves success—fears God and honors man; is strongly independent, unmoved by pride of opinion or greed of power, constructive, tolerant but never careless, self-controlled, patient, always respectful if its readers but always unafraid, is quickly indignant at injustice; is unswayed by the appeal of privilege or the clamor of the mob; seeks to give every man a chance, and, as far as law and brotherhood can make it so, an equal chance; is profoundly patriotic while sincerely promoting international good will and cementing world-comradeship; is a journalism of humanity of, and for today's world.

**OFF-YEAR PLATFORMS**

Roscoe Drummond, one of the more astute Washington correspondents, thinks the major parties should write platforms on which congressional candidates could run in off-year elections. It is his idea that this would encourage more citizens to vote on the basis of party responsibility and party accountability.

The proposal is worth mulling over. In present circumstances the voter has almost no way of finding out anything about a party's legislative plans for the ensuing years. As a result, those who think it best to vote a straight party ticket must do so without knowing what their party intends to do in Congress. It is a fair guess that many voters who might otherwise be guided by their party preference vote, instead, on the basis of a candidate's personal qualifications.

That may be the most sensible basis, after all. Yet party leaders seem to like the idea of party accountability. Republican and Democratic congressional platforms might be the best way to foster that.

The party guests who get too high are likely to feel lowest the next day.

**State Fair ready for 73rd opening in Dallas next Saturday, October 4**

All is in readiness for the 73rd edition of the State Fair of Texas, America's largest annual exposition.

The fair opens Saturday, Oct. 4, and the spic-and-span fairgrounds awaits the expected two-and-a-half million visitors who will flock to the 187-acre \$35,000,000 State Fair Park during the 16-day run.

The emphasis on the 1958 State Fair program is on fun for all the family. There are great shows like "The Music Man" and "Ice Capades," big-time college football games like SMU-Notre Dame, Texas-Oklahoma and SMU-Rice, and personal appearances by such entertainment personalities as Tennessee Ernie Ford and Molly Bee, Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence and George Gobel and "Red" Foley.

A record entry list appears in prospect for the Pan-American Livestock Exposition during the first week of the fair, the Junior Livestock shows during the second week and the horse shows which will be featured all three weekends.

The fair this year is saluting "Higher Education in Texas" and daily appearances at the fair have been scheduled of out-

standing college marching and concert bands, drill teams, drama, opera and dance groups. Daily free home-sewing fashion shows will be staged in the Women's Building, and entries in competitive divisions of the Women's Department indicate a greater interest than ever before in this phase of the fair.

The Texas International Trade Fair, featuring exhibits by foreign nations from all over the world, will be inaugurated at the 1958 fair. The 42nd annual Southwestern Automotive Exposition will sport a number of the new 1959 model cars. The "Agricade" will depict the progress of agriculture in Texas over the past generation.

"The Music Man" and "Ice Capades" both have daily performances during the fair. Special events include Rural Youth Day and the SMU-Notre Dame grid game Oct. 4, Tennessee Ernie Ford Show Oct. 5, Tito Guizar Show Oct. 6, Meredith Willson conducting the fair's Music Festival Oct. 7, Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence Oct. 9, "Sky King and Penny" children's show Oct. 10, Texas-Oklahoma football Oct. 11, Achievement Day Oct. 13, East Texas Day and the George Gobel Show Oct. 14, "Red Foley Jubilee Oct. 15.

## Insects may be smarter than humans they don't exceed safe travel speed

That fable about flies streaking 820 m.p.h. is for the birds. Top speed for insects is about 35 m.p.h. in short sprints, according to a British professor of entomology.

And you'll never catch a horsefly going faster than 15 m.p.h., he says.

Even if insects could travel faster, they'd have horse sense enough not to, insect lovers claim. Too many dangers from traveling fast, they point out.

The same is true on the highway—traveling fast is pretty dangerous there, too. But a lot of humans, apparently, don't have the sense of insects when it comes to driving a car.

Speeding is a factor in about 4 out of 10 fatal motor vehicle accidents, according to the National Safety Council.

You don't necessarily have to exceed the posted limit to be speeding, the Council points out. Observe the limit in a 25 m.p.h. zone during a blizzard and you may end up with a ticket.

"Speeding," the Council says, "increases the likelihood of an accident. The greater the speed the less time you have to react in emergencies. It takes longer, naturally, to stop a speeding auto than one moving slowly.

"Besides, speeding is costly. It can cost you money—and maybe your life."

## Educational Correspondence group adding to foreign relations of U.S.

High School students in Latin America are reading more English and U.S. students are reading Spanish with greater interest thanks to an organization that is now headquartered at Texas Tech.

Called the "Oficina Nacional De Correspondencia Escolar," the organization has as its director Dr. Haley D. Oberhelman, assistant professor of foreign languages at Tech. Its headquarters were moved here from the University of Kansas when Oberhelman came from that institution to join the Tech faculty.

The American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese sponsor the organization that is also known as the National Bureau of Educational Correspondence. Oberhelman said.

"Names of Latin American correspondents are furnished to

American students of Spanish by the National Bureau," he explained. "The Latin-American students will answer in Spanish the letter they receive in English from high school students in the United States."

"Letters from Spanish-speaking boys and girls make modern Spanish America and Spain come alive for language students here," Oberhelman pointed out.

Between 1,500 and 2,000 names of Latin-American students are furnished to U. S. students each year, he said. This means approximately twice that many are writing letters to each other.

Most of the Spanish correspondents live in South America, Mexico and islands of the West Indies.

Bad Manners But Good Advice (Luke 14:1-11)

If a socialite or some other person who is up on the latest etiquette, would read this passage, they would be horrified at what Jesus had done here. For two rules of etiquette were broken. One is that you should never discuss religion; the other is that you should never reprimand your host or your guests. But here in this passage we see Jesus reprimanding his hosts and fellow guests on their at-

titude about the Sabbath Day and about their pride.

Many of us wonder what Jesus would do if he came and visited our world as it is today. He would probably go about teaching the right way to live our Christianity. One subject that would be brought to the attention of those professing Christianity would be their attitude towards the Lord's Day. Jesus reproved the Pharisees for treating it too legalistic. But He would probably reprove us for treating it too liberally. For we should remember that the Lord's Day is to be not only a day of rest, but one of physical and spiritual renewal; a day of study and worship; a day of fellowship with our God and our fellowman, which typifies the eternal Sabbath in glory.

Another subject would be our pride and our selfishness. Just as these Pharisees sought to get the highest places of honor at the table, so do we seek the highest places of honor, selfishness and ill-manneredly. Just as the Pharisees ill-manneredly tried to get the highest honors, so do we. It is funny how closely good manners and good morals are connected. A person with a good heart will never be ill-mannered. Such a person may, unwittingly, transgress some of the rules of etiquette, but he will never intentionally hurt some one's feelings. He will not take advantage of another person. A gentleman is a gentle man. A lady is a gentle woman. And this spirit, in its purity, comes only from Jesus Christ.

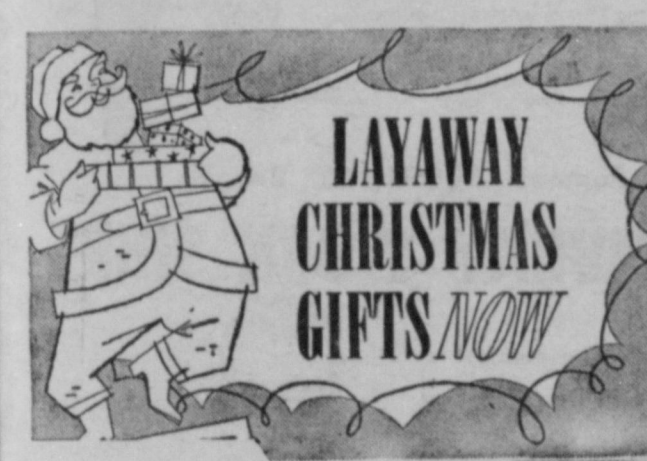
This was what Jesus was trying to show to His host and fellow guests — that they should treat the Sabbath, not literally, but spiritually, and that they should be humble, not proud and selfish. This, too, is what Jesus is trying to teach us through this portion of the Bible. As Christians, we should remember that others are watching us in the way we live. We are their "Bibles" in that we show God through our actions. So let us be true "Walking Testaments" of God's Word!

# Season's first victory comes Friday from Frenship as Slaton Tigers win 42-12

With Pat Adamek leading the way, the Slaton Tigers broke into the win column for the first time this year with a 42-12 victory over the Frenship Tigers. Adamek scored three touchdowns and was the leading ball carrier with 149 yards in 10 carries. This gave him a 14.9 average.

Slaton received the kickoff at the start of the game, and returned it to their own 43 yard line. Adamek in two slashes at the line had moved the ball to the Frenship 38, where on the next play fullback Howard Limmer went off-tackle for the TD. Sanders carried for the point.

**FRENSHIP RETURNED** the kickoff to their own 25. After picking up a first down on their own 43, they were forced to punt. Adamek returned the ball five yards to the Slaton 22 yard line. Limmer was held for no gain, then Adamek moved for four and Giles Smith fumbled. Frenship recovered in the air and moved the ball to the Slaton 15. Two passes were completed by Frenship for a first down on the five. A one-yard gain off tackle moved the ball to the four. Two straight 10-yard losses moved the ball back to the 24, and a fourth down pass was incomplete.

**ADAMEK CARRIED** five yards for the Tigers; Limmer for 17 and a first down on the 42 yard line. Sanders then ran a keeper picking up five yards; Smith went over tackle for two and Adamek moved over to the left, picked up a key block and out-ran two defenders to the goal line. That put another 51 yards and a TD to Adamek's credit. Sanders again ran the point, making the score 16-0.

Frenship took possession on the 20 yard line, followed by an off-side penalty and two four yard gains. That moved the ball to the 33, where they were forced to kick on fourth down.

**SLATON TOOK** possession on their own 35 yardline, where Smith lost two yards, and Adamek moved around right end for 47 yards and a first down on the Frenship 15. Smith carried two plays for a first down on the one yard marker. Adamek went around right end for the score, and Smith failed to carry for the point. That left the score at 22-0.

The Frenship Tigers took the kickoff to their own 21 yard line in three plays, picking up a first down on the 31, where on the fourth down they were forced to kick.

**JAMES COLE** took the ball for Slaton on his own 35 yard line, cut to his right and moved 87 yards down the sideline before being brought down from behind on the eight yard line. Bill Barry made five, and half-back Taylor scored from the three yard line. The point was not good, leaving the score at 28-0. The half ended a few plays later with Slaton holding the ball on the Frenship 45 yard line.

Beginning the second half of play, Frenship took the kickoff and drove to the Slaton 35 before losing the ball on downs.

In three plays Slaton had a first down on the Frenship 15. Sanders ran around end for three yards, and Adamek went for 15 yards around left end and the score. The point was good.

**AFTER TAKING** the kickoff Frenship picked up six yards in two plays. Attempting to punt on fourth down, they fumbled, and Slaton recovered.

Slaton ran two plays to the eleven, threw an incomplete pass and fumbled with Frenship recovering on the five. Frenship drove the length of the field in 11 plays, scoring over center from the four. The

point attempt was unsuccessful. Slaton returned the ball to the 30 yard line, where Taylor failed to gain in three tries and fumbled the fourth down kick, which Frenship recovered on the Slaton five. Frenship scored in two plays.

Slaton returned the ball to their own 40 on the kickoff. Three plays had moved the ball to the Frenship 25 yard line, where Taylor went over left tackle for the touchdown. The score stood at 42-12. The game ended a few plays later with Frenship holding the ball on the Slaton 38 yard line.
