The year of 1925 is yet young but within the past two months Slaton has put over a \$225,000.00 Cotton Oil Mill, a modern fifty room hotel, a White Way covering ten blocks, contract has been let for approximately \$100,000.00 in water and sewer extensions and a paving program of twenty blocks has been tentatively arranged. This has been accomplished by a straight away pull and the end is not yet. Dozens of new residences are in the course of erection and more than that number will be started immediately. The demand for modern homes is far

above the supply. Yet notwithstanding all this real estate values in the city are far below other cities less fortunate. Business lots can yet be purchased for \$1000.00 while residence lots in various parts of the city range from \$100.00 to \$1000.00. A number of brick business rooms are contemplated work being held up only for the arrival of material. The Chamber of Commerce, through its board of Directors and Secretary, J. J. Ross are ever ready to listen to any proposal that will tend to upbuild and no meritorious proposition has yet failed.

Man Shot And Killed In Tragedy Near Southland

Word was received here Tuesday morning of a shooting tragedy occurring four miles east of Southland. The victim of the affray was Mr. Roy C. Dalton, said to be a large land owner that section. He was said to have been shot four or five times by Mr. Al Lumen who lived near Mr. Dalton.

The victim of the tragedy was shot about nine o'clock Tuesday morning, dying about one hour later. The body was carried to Lubbock and is being held there pending funeral arrangements. Friends of the dead man say that interment will be made at Lubbock.

Mr. Dalton was a brother-in-law of Sheriff Bud Johnson, of this county.

A Slatonite reporter who went to Southland Tuesday afternoon was advised that Mr. Lumen had surrendered to the authorities at Post following the shooting.

It was said that Messrs. Dalton and Lumen had disagreed over a survey of land purchased by Mr. Lumen from Mr. Dalton. It is thought that the shooting grew out of a dispute over the surveying of this land.

We are advised that both men have families, and that they had been considered by neighbors and acquaintances to be good friends. To say the least, it is all very sad, regrettable affair.

Skull Found In Canyon; Police Chief Investigates

Last Tuesday Police Chief Sam Selman was called by telephone and was told of the discovery of a human skull in a cave in the canyon below the low-crossing northeast of town. He went the scene at once and brought the skull back to town with him. It had been found by a Mr. Blair living near place of the discovery.

The skull appears to be that of a white man. A break in the skull extending from the right temple upward across the forehead above the right eye socket makes it appear possible that death was caused by a heavy blow in that part of the head.

A few other bones were found along with the skull. These were partially covered with dirt in the cave.

The skull will be found at the City Hall by any who want to view it. Chief Selman states that he intends to go back to the scene and make further investigations to determine what else may be learned in connection with this unusual discovery.

Other houses were endangered due to the high winds. The Suiter home, only a few feet distant, was somewhat damaged.

The Jordan House was owned and operated by Mrs. J. J. Jordan. We are informed the loss was partially covered by insurance.

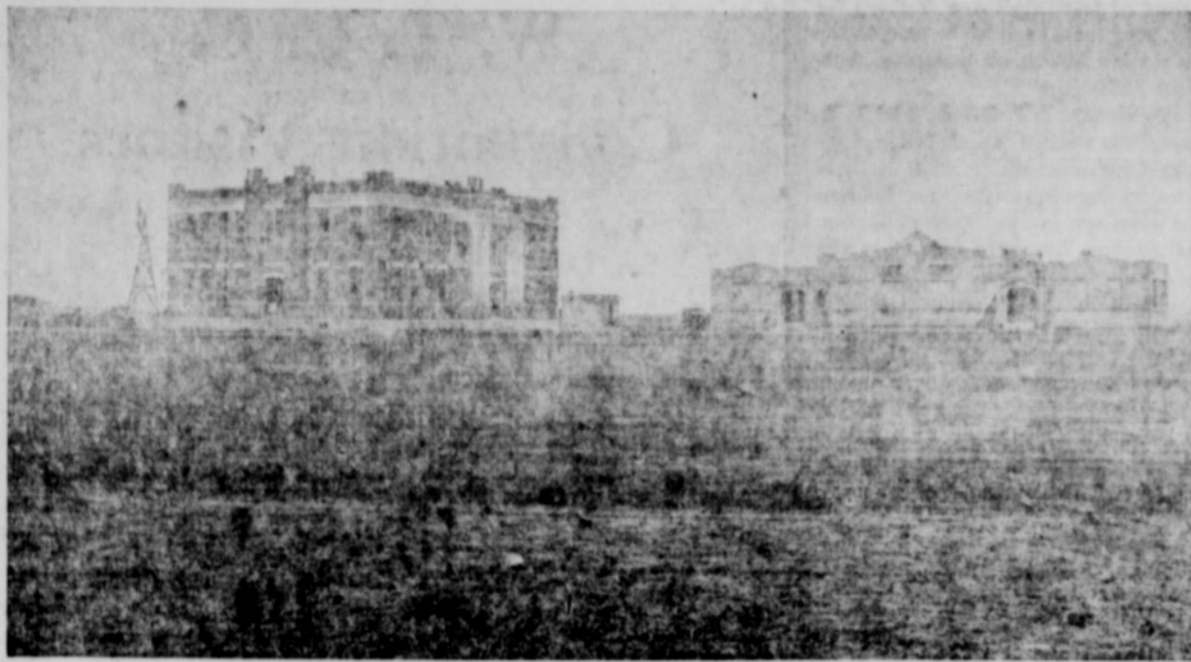

Interesting Facts About Slaton and This Vicinity

Population 5,500. Located on South Plains of Texas in southeast corner of Lubbock County, a Division point on the Santa Fe Railway, 132 miles south of Amarillo and 106 miles north of Sweetwater.

Farms Springing Where Cattle Recently Roamed

Mr. Highsmith, Convention Manager, of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has just completed a tour through this section in the interest of the Slaton district meet. He reports that conditions in this territory are among the most promising he has found any where in West Texas. While it is dry throughout the territory farmers seem hopeful and expectant of sufficient rainfall to insure a crop. Wheat he states looks promising and farmers are everywhere plowing getting ready to plant their cotton corn and other crops.

The activity in this section he states is greater than in any part of the state over which he has traveled. New farms are being put under the plow. Hundreds of new homes dot the prairies. New towns are springing up where only a few months ago the cattle roamed. Instead of four stores as a year ago in Levelland there are now 44. The sound of the hammer could be heard in the erection of new store buildings and new homes. Muleshoe is another town taking on a rapid growth. Anton is a town only three months old but boasts of a fine new

brick building that will be used for general merchantile purposes as well as house the post office. Littlefield in that same section is building rapidly.

Another town in West Texas that has progressed at rapid strides south of Slaton is Seagraves. Many new houses have been erected in the past twelve months, and the population trebled.

At least three new railroad projects are causing excitement to run high in this section of West Texas. The new charter granted a few days ago has put Castro County and Dimmit on the path to development and prosperity. Other towns along that proposed line are enthusiastically looking toward the future.

Seminole is hopeful for the rehabilitation of the old Midland Northwestern. Mr. Highsmith reports that at a banquet of Seminole citizens more than 150 were present and all were optimistic concerning the future of Gaines County.

A new railroad from Lubbock thru Levelland and into Morton County, is largely responsible for development in that direction. Lands long held for
