

## Slaton Woman Injured In Attack By Negro

Mrs. R. L. Henry, wife of a local switch engine fireman for the Santa Fe, is yet in a very nervous state as a result of an attack upon her last Saturday night by a negro who made his way into the Henry home in the east part of town. Mrs. Henry, it is reported, was awakened by the presence of the intruder, and upon screaming to give the alarm, was struck in the face with a claw hammer.

Neighbors hearing her screams soon gave a general alarm, and although officers and many citizens of the town searched all night and the following day for the assailant, and several arrests were made, his identity was not known until late Sunday night when a negro, giving his name as Dan Henderson, was arrested by night Marshal George, and after a severe grilling confessed to the crime, stating only robbery was his motive in entering the Henderson home. He, together with his wife, were carried to Lubbock and lodged in the county jail, where they are awaiting action of the grand jury for this and many other confessed offenses.

When Henderson entered the Henry home, Mrs. Henry had retired for the night with her three young children, her husband being at work with the local switch crew.

In the arrests Saturday night and Sunday, of some eight or ten negroes of the town, several were found to be carrying pistols.

Late reports from Doctors H. F. Miller and wife, attending physicians, are to the effect that Mrs. Henry is improving nicely.

## Much Dreaded Pilferer Caught Sunday Night

Some three weeks of uneasiness, and more or less excitement, of Slaton citizens was, to a great extent, brought to an end Sunday night when night Marshal U. L. George arrested a negro, age about 23 or 24 years, giving his name as Dan Henderson, and carried him to Lubbock where he, together with his supposed wife, was landed in the county jail.

George got a good clue as to who this burglar and pilferer was when, a few days ago, a negro woman brought to him an insulting letter written by this negro man, in which some very abusive and vulgar language was used. Unprintable words appearing in the letter, Mr. George says, corresponded to words and sentences that were written from time to time on furniture and walls in various homes of the town.

So Sunday night, immediately after hearing of a couple of homes being burglarized, Mr. George, in company with Messrs. T. and P. O. Williams, went to the E. E. Wilson home where they secured a little information from a negro servant, and from there to the servant house of Mr. Forest, where they found their man, and after locating a pistol holster, which they recognized as the one lost by Mr. Dorsett, the baker, the negro admitted to most any recent theft to which his attention was called, according to Marshall George, who, with one of the Williams boys, carried him to the city jail, while the other Mr. Williams kept charge of the house.

After putting the negro in safe keeping, Mr. George and Mr. Wil-

liams returned to the servant house, accompanied by Ben Dodgen and Ott Patterson, and a complete search of the premises was made, and much of the goods which have been stolen during the past three weeks were recovered and are being returned to the owners.

Among the articles recovered and homes from which they were taken are: Electric Iron and Fountain Pen, from Henry Jarman; Wool Dress and Crepe Dress, Rev. Owens; Silk Crepe Dress, Clock, Chest of Silverware and Silk Hose, Mrs. Diamond; Overcoat, J. G. Levey; Coatsuit, Jersey Waist, Silk Dress, and other articles, from Thaxton home; Kodak, Mr. Snyder, 38 Colts police special revolver from Mr. Dorsett, the baker, and there are probably numerous others. Most of the goods, we understand, have been returned to the owners.

Among confessions made by the negro was that of assault upon Mrs. R. L. Henry last Saturday night, when he entered the Henry home in the east part of town.

At about four o'clock Monday morning night Marshal George and Chief of Police Sam Selman carried the negro and his wife to Lubbock where they are being held waiting action of the grand jury.

Yesterday city officials received a call from the Sheriff at Paducah stating a negro, said to be Cecil Jordan, who Henderson states was his partner in many of the burglaries, had been arrested there, and Chief Selman went today to Paducah to return the prisoner to Lubbock county.

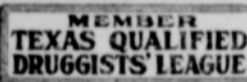

In a last Friday's daily we observed the ex-mayor of Wichita Falls had been sentenced to three years' imprisonment for manslaughter, a case in which he shot and killed his young son-in-law, while the boy's mother pled with the mayor not to shoot. Immediately beneath that news item was one carrying a California date line in which a man had been given from three to thirty years for assault, in a case where nobody's life was taken. This man was denied a new trial, which in all probability was justice to society. But in Texas our courts, in many instances, are prone to let criminals run loose. If ex-Mayor Collier serves his three short years, which is altogether unlikely, he should spend all his spare time off the rock pile congratulating himself over the fact that he lived in Texas, and that the death penalty was not inflicted.

**Conway Tearle Qualified In Great "He-Man" Role**

Well-Known Actor Has Run Gamut of Experience from Prize Fighter to Movie Star—Has Played Opposite World's Greatest Actresses.

Conway Tearle, who was selected from practically the entire array of male screen talent to play the strong, virile role of Stephen Ghent in "The Great Divide," which comes to the Custer Theatre on Friday and Saturday, April, 3rd and 4th is essentially a man's man. But in spite of his rugged physique and his love for the outdoors this Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture marks one of the few opportunities Mr. Tearle has had to play other than evening dress parts.

He was born in New York City, of a long line of theatrical people. His mother's family has been a family of actors since 1712. His maternal grandfather, William Augustus Conway, was considered the outstanding Shakespearean actor of the middle century.

When Mr. Tearle was five he played his first part, that of young Damon in "Damon and Pythias." He went to school in England.

While "between engagements" in London he took half of his fortune of one hundred and fifty dollars and bought a ticket to New York. He lost all but thirteen dollars of his remaining seventy-five at poker coming over, but the day after he landed he was signed for a part opposite Julia Marlowe—in which he never appeared.

Tearle went into motion pictures in 1916 with Ethel Barrymore. He had just finished two years in "Mid-Channel" with her and when she was signed to "The Nightingale" she insisted that Mr. Tearle work opposite her.

He played Kelly Neville in "The Common Law" opposite Clara Kimball Young and six years later in the revival with Corinne Griffith. He looked ten years younger than he did the first time he played it, in the opinion of his wife, Adele Rowland, the vaudeville star.

"The Eternal Flame" and "Ashes of Vengeance" with Norma Talmadge were popular pictures. Best of all he liked his part in "One Week of Love," for practically all of the scenes were out of doors and he worked with his favorite horse.

Baroudi in "Bella Donna" is the part he liked least.

In "The Referee" he played a prize-fighter's part, one which was not difficult for him to portray since in his youth he spent two years as a professional boxer in London.

In "The Great Divide" he plays a strong role which presents the figure of Stephen Ghent, a rough, unpolished product of the West, a half brutal but at the same time a fascinating creature. Alice Terry is the eastern girl who is bought by him for a chain of nuggets. Others in the cast include Wallace Beery, George Cooper, Zasu Pitts, Huntly Gordon, Alan Forrest and Ford Sterling.

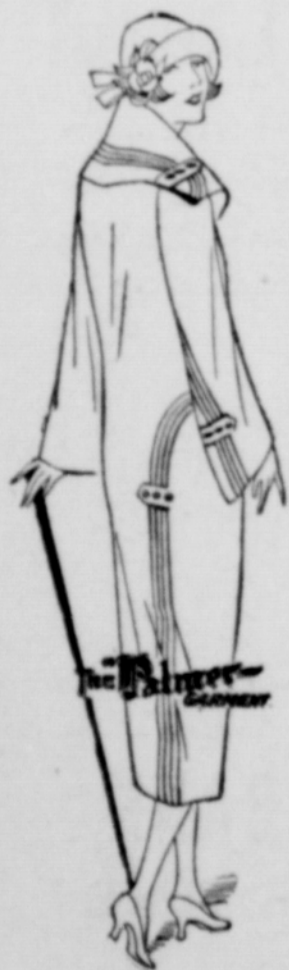

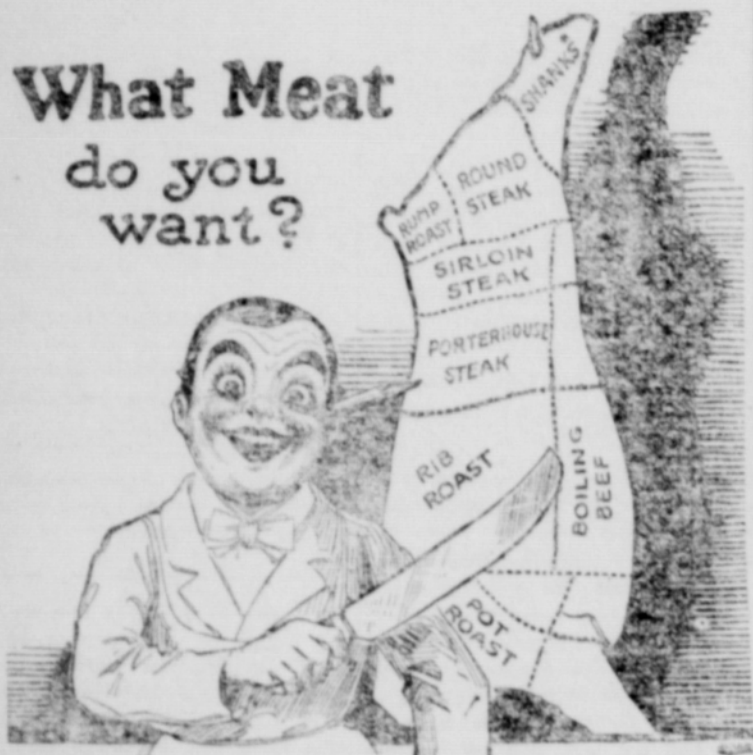

**Nearby Gypsum Plant Aid to Home Builders**

SWEETWATER, Tex., Mar. 31st—For the second time since it went into full operation last May, the plaster and Sheetrock plant of the United States Gypsum Company here will be enlarged this spring. In February new equipment was installed which increased Sweetwater's daily out-put of fireproof wall board by 50 per cent. The new improvements will raise it 100 per cent more, and will double the output of plaster.

Including the purchase in January of 275 acres of mineral-bearing land from the Rowe ranch, adjoining the company's other property here, these expansions will increase its investment in Texas by several hundred thousand dollars and will make this one of the major gypsum-producing centers of the United States.

Two things have made these additions necessary. First, the state-wide building boom which is accompanying prosperity in Texas has increased the demand for Texas-made fireproof building materials so that additional production is required. Secondly, in making this one of its principal producing units, the United States Gypsum Company is increasing the number of materials manufactured here.

One new product is Oriental stucco, a combination of Portland cement base coats with a finish-coat into which mineral colors are ground, being available in nine colors and white. Another is Textone, an interior plastic paint that gives texture and tone in one coat. A third is Gyp-Lap, a new invention. It is a fireproof exterior sheathing that takes the place of building paper and of ship-lap or wood sheathing; it is fireproof and a heat-and-cold insulator.

All these and other building materials made here are shipped in mixed cars, insuring rapid service to builders, at minimum freight-charges. This plant also will supply gypsum rock to the Portland cement factories of Texas, about 2 per cent of all this material being gypsum.

**BIRTH REGISTRATION HAS 10 PERCENT INCREASE**

There was an increase the last year of 10 per cent in birth registration of children, according to records on file in the Vital Statistics Department of the Texas State Board of Health.

It is estimated that approximately 74 per cent of all children born in the state is now being registered, whereas only 64 per cent was registered the previous year. This seems to indicate a general awakening of parents, doctors and midwives to the importance of the registration of all children born in the state.

Birth registration proves the child's age, an essential point in admission to school and leaving school; in marriage, voting, jury or military service. It is also an essential point in the admission to and practice of many professions and in the holding of some public offices.

Birth registration proves the child's identity, an essential point in the administration of property, settlement of inheritances, settlement of insurance and pensions, and the right to enter into contract; various matters in the criminal code; passports to and residence in foreign countries, and re-admission to the United States.
