Exhaust From Auto Engine Poison

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—To prevent death from carbon-monoxide or CO gas poisoning, James A. Tobey, secretary of the National Health Council, has issued a warning to all motorists.

"During the warm weather," he said "there is not so much danger as in the fall and winter. The carbon-monoxide gas, which comes from a motor in its exhaust, is especially dangerous in a concentrated form. When garage doors are open the injurious gas escapes into the open air and is dissipated. But when the weather gets cold the car-owners are likely to shut the doors of their garages and the CO is concentrated so that it becomes deadly. The number of cases during the past year, when car owners started their motors for repair work and were found dead in their garages points out this danger. It is this that the council wishes to warn against and thus prevent a recurrence of these unfortunate deaths.

Timely Precautions

"Senator Royal S. Copeland, when health commissioner of this city, considered this a very urgent situation. He issued repeated warnings in the following announcement:

"A running motor gives off deadly gasses from its exhaust. Never run a motor in a closed garage or shop—the fumes are deadly poison.

"Never let your motor run unnecessarily in a garage or shop. When it is necessary to test the engine or move the car under its own power, see that the doors are open and the ventilation free.

"The exhaust gasses are heavy and rise from the floor very slowly. It is dangerous to work under a car in a closed shop with the motor running unless ventilation is excellent.

"When it is necessary to make a test of a running motor in a shop or garage, make sure to have the windows and doors open.

"Never enter a pit over which a motor has been running as it may be filled with deadly fumes.

"In addition to these warnings, Dr. Copeland gave the first aid remedies. These were:

"Immediately seek the open air and breathe deeply at the first signs of drowsiness or faintness.

"If a person is overcome, take him immediately into the open air and place in a prostrate position. Unloosen tight garments and perform artificial respiration. Fan the face vigorously. Never let a crowd gather closely about a patient."

Texas Second In Export Trade

Half yearly figures show the State again second only to New York. Texas remains the second most important export state in the Union on the basis of the values of products shipped abroad according to figures covering the first six months of 1924 just released by the Department of Commerce.

Statistics compiled under the supervision of Dr. Julius Klein, Director of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, reveal values of \$232,762,901 for Texas against \$375,772,132 for New York. Other states following Texas in order of values of their half-yearly exports are Pennsylvania, \$148,033,538; New Jersey, \$114,967,442; California, \$103,789,952; Louisiana, \$104,796,452; and Illinois, \$104,967,442.

Cotton shipments made up \$169,204,813 of the total, retaining its position of predominance in Texas foreign trade. Refined petroleum followed with \$32,907,544, showing a growing value, while sulphur and brimstone exports amounted to \$2,002,027.

This is the second time in the history of Government trade statistics, according to Director Klein, that an attempt has been made to show the relative position of the different states in our inevitable struggle for foreign trade. It is planned to issue these figures quarterly.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Presidential shoe sizes are about to be used for commercial purposes.

A government official said he had been requested by a large western boot and shoe concern to furnish the sizes of shoes worn by every president from Washington to Coolidge.

American Legion To Be Entertained By Omaha 1925

ST. PAUL, Sept. 20.—Omaha was selected as the 1925 national convention city of the American Legion at today's session of the sixth annual convention here.

The dates for the 1925 convention will be set before adjournment of the present gathering.

Five minutes each had been allotted to supporters of Omaha and Fort Worth to present their arguments to the convention, the Texans first taking the floor.

"My Old Mare" blared the bands, and Former National Commander Alvin Owsley urged the Legionnaires to name Fort Worth and Mrs. May Peterson Thompson, grand opera singer, sang "The Eyes Of Texas Are Upon You"

The official count on the roll call gave Omaha 512 and Fort Worth 440

With the annual parade out of the way, organization politics came in for some consideration as delegates entered the third day of the national convention of the American Legion.

Scant attention was given politics previous to the parade, as preparations for this pageant—a stirring review of 25,000 men—occupied the delegates time.

Talk of General Pershing as the successor to National Commander Quinn continued today but there appeared a stronger current, in evidence since the convention opened, pointing strongly to others as well.
