> Born in Henderson Texas March 31, 1875, Mr. Lacey grew to manhood in that city, and no young man hal a brighter future until ill health intervened. He was serving as cashier of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Henderson when physicians advised him to go West : and he came to Big Spring to make his home. Although he was unable to regain his health he made a brave fight, and was able to look after business interests until just a short time prior to his death. He conducted a successful insurance agency during the sixteen years he made his home in Big Spring. He was a substantial and progressive citizen, every ready to give of his time and money to further the development of Big Spring. He was a good financier and his advice was in demand by individuals as well as business firms. He ably served our city as Mayor for two terms, and under his efficient administration the indebtedness of our city was considerably reduced and a greater efficiency was to be noted in every department. Had not ill health been a handicap his influence and effort would have been even greater for he was one who was every ready to go forward. As a christian gentleman, a good friend and neighbor, a faithful husband and indulgent father he fulfilled every requirement, and no one was held in higher esteem by our entire citizenship.





Safe Farming Bullt Around Surplus of Feed This is the year when plant should he made for the building up f a new reserve feel supply to fill the stack lots and bins which will be exhausted before the summer reaches us. A safe and profitable farming scehme in West Texas is built around a stored shrplus of feed on the farm to tide over any emergency of low production. There are fewer stacks of feed to be found around the farms and also a smaller supply of grain in the bin than has been the case for several years. The normal reserve of both ronghage and grain has been drawn upon both this year and last and before harvest time this fail not only will this reserve have disappeared but in many cases the feed supply will have been exhausted This condition means that not only a

normal acreage of feed should be planted but sufficient to replenish the reserve supply and have a year's needs ahead. This is one problem which most farmers will have in common this year and one which, aside from being





The "Safety First" movement has done much to lessen danger everywhere except on our streets and country roads. There the auto toll still climbs. The Safety First movement has always been to make it safe for the auto rather than the pedestrian. We say "Don't jay-walk," but never "Don't lay-drive."

There are 10,600,000 automobiles in the United States There are hundreds of legislators who are going to introduce in the forty-three legislatures now in session or about to convene laws that will move the Safety First movement out onto the street.

In their own interest the auto manufacturers, dealers and clubs should line up with the legislative advocates of Safety First,-yet in too many instances they stupidly stand the ground to resist any safety-first legislation.

For insance, the Chicago Motor Club puts out combative propaganda which, among other fool leclarations, says, "There were 10.097 deaths in 1920 from influenza, and only 10,168 from auto vehicles." Can you beat that! Mere trifle.

Railroads won't allow a man in the locomotive cab who even drinks, let alone gets drunk.

The drunkard drives the auto. Honest lawyers assert that it is difficult to convict the driver who crushes or kills because "He didn't mean to,"you can't establish the "intent to kill."

Among the many remedies proposed are three that are particularly practical and behind which there are many supporters.

The street car doesn't carry a bumper; it carries a basket for you or me to tall in if the motorman hits us without criminal intent. Unless jay-driving is promptly stopped-unless every jay-driver is promptly jerked out of his seat and not allowed to return to the wheel, we are all going to be compelled to take our bumpers off and put on baskets.

The second practical remedy provides for safety in our cities. Did you ever notice how all autos slow down before a two-inch plank that is laid across the road to protect a hose or pipe? They slow down to spare the springs on th auto. But they don't all slow down to spare the spinal column of the pedestrian. Well .- it is proposed to ridge every walk across street intersections with stones set two inches above the pavement. Then we will have some careful driving.

And lastly it is proposed to make every speedometer town-clock size, compel every car to be equipped with one, and put it on the back. There will be no room for it on the dash board. It will be the diameter of your lire. Then everybody will be able to read your speed.

And all this is no inughing matter. These legislators from Oregon to Florida, from Maine to California are in dead carnest. A people tired of jelly-hourd judges, tired of amateur engineers. tired of drunken drivers, and the hurry-up fellows on the road, are going after safety first on the road.

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OUTLINE OF PLANS FOR TEXAS TECH

Staff Correspondent of Fort Worth Star-Telegram Tells Our Reason for Expecting Location of Tech

1 The following excellent article under a three column heading, written by Byron C. Utecht, staff correspondent of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram appeared in the issue of Friday, April 20th. Our citizens indeed appreciate this fine presentation of facts relative to our brief:

Big Spring, April 19 .- A committee of five Big Spring citizens and former residents have presented to the locating board of the Texas Technological College an elaborate brief, which outlines claim of this city for location of the college.

Those on the committee were W. W. Rix, president of the Chamber of Commerce; J. E. Mundell, campaign manager and formerly superintendent; of the United States experiment sta-] tion here; D. Price, stockman, B. Reagau, formerly local postmaster, George Sparenberg of Austin, formerly postmaster here.

Big Spring's brief consists of about 100 pages, not only detailing the city's advantages, but containing tables, geological hydrological and geographical maps, made up under the direction of J. E. Mundell.

This is one of the largest cities seeking the college, having 5,000 inhabitants, all the facilities of a large city. including sewerage system, is located practically midway between Fort Worth and El Paso on the Texas & Pacific and equally distant from Amarillo and San Antonio, Within a radius of 150 miles, there is a population of about 500,000 and yet the nearest State educational institution is 189 miles away, at Alpine, the Sull Ross Normal. The Canyon City Normal is 198 miles distant, Denton Normal 271 miles, Junior A. & M. at Stephenville 196 miles, while the State University is 265 miles and the A. & M. College at College Station 333 miles.

The population in this radius in The 1900 was but 147,000, but by 1920 it 20 had increased to more than 400,000 and the growth is now more rapid than in previous years. Which is to say that in all this immense district with 500,000 inhabitants there is not one State educational institution. Big Spring is right on the dividing line between the Great Plains Section and the Edwards Plateau to the south, the former an empire of agricultural interests and the latter one of the greatest stock raising areas in the Western Hemisphere. So located, Big Spring serves both sections. The elevation here is 2,400 feet, giving ideal climatic and health conditions. A chart

With these records on file at Dallas, any person who desires to learn the number or ownership of any car in Texas may obtain this information within a very few minutes, Spencer said, as the records are at the disposal of the public at any and all times.

Snencer declared that "things are getting too hot for automobile thieves." He said, although the bureau sleuths are searching for more than stolen cars, the many gangs forn operating in Texas are about by up. Approximately 200 cars have recovered since January 1st.







DRIFTING HOMES

How about your home, Mr. Husband and Mrs. Wife? The average husband is a coward and the average wife a bully. Are you?.

Many have either yielded to the spirit of the day and have permitted their wives to dominate the domestic circles to its disgrace, or they have practically abandoned their homes

Consequently, they occupy one section of the city, namely, the busi-ness and the club sections, the saloon or the pool hall, while the wives take a similar direction in another part of the city : the home stands between these two factors in a neglected condition.

Women have been thrown out into the world and seem to care more for the activities, excitements, gal-eties and outside glares, than they do for the domestic drudgery, seclusion, responsibilities and glories of home.

Women ought to be forced to go home. But their husbands are too cowardly to force them, or they are too indifferent to their responsibility, or they would rather glide or travel the road of least resistance, and let the home drift.

The home is drifting; children are roaming; wives are gadding. Their husbands are practicing fraud and dishonesty on their families. They are cowardly. The time has come to re-establish

the home with the sovereignty of the federal head, the sacredness of domestic seclusion, and the proper adjustment of domestic duties.

The dark spot in the present civllization is the neglected home. Cowardly husbands are responsible for every phase of domestic decline. Let the men awake, reassert themselves, re-establish their homes and build again the domestic-the national fortification-namely, a wellorganized domestic circle.

High Costs of Living Remain

Washington, April 30 -The cost of living in the United States last March was GSS per cont higher than the average of the year 1913, according to a computation appoinced today by the federal bureau of labor statistics, based on retail commodily prices and housing costs in 32 citles.

Food was 42 per cent higher, cloth ing 74.4 per cent, housing 62.4 per cent, fuel and light 86.2 per cent, furniture 17.4 per cent and miscellancous commodity prices 100.3 per cent. Housing costs recorded their highest level in March over the entire period from 1913, food prices showed a decrease from last November of 3.6 per cent and clothing prices increased 3 per cent.






