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

gave us more or less trouble, as ocally some of the cow ponies would fall in with the mustangs, and we had to run them down to get them back to the "Remuda." Hence we decided to rid the pasture of the troublesome mustang.

In the spring of 1889, some six or eight stray men as we called them, had drifted into the ranch and were staying at the ranch headquarters waiting for the spring round-up. One day the foreman of the ranch, havtime to get rid of the mustangs, told the boys that he would mount each of them on a good horse for the purpose of hunting down and killing the mustangs on the ranch.

Two of the men, George Brown, who now lives in Arizona, and Cal Merchant, who now lives in Hansford county, Texas, were noted as reckless riders, and I did not want to give them good horses for fear that they would kill them by hard riding in the chase. I gave to each of these two men an ortlaw horse, and told them that it would not make any difference if they did kill these in the hunt. To the other men I gave good mounts. Two Mustang Bunches.

There were two bunches of mus-tangs in our pasture. One bunch southwest, and the other red east of where the town of Lubbock now is located. The town section was then a part of the leased ranch Holdings. The men were di-videde into two groups of about ten men each, one group being put in the charge of G. M. Boles and the other group being put in the charge of R. C. Burns. One group went to the southwest to the mustang range and the other group went to the east, where the second bunch of mustangs

Each group of men soon found its bunch of mustangs and the chase began at about 10 o'clock a. m. About an hour later a singular thing happened. The outlaw horse being ridden by Cal Merchant. fell and broke its neck, and about the same time, the other outlaw horse being ridden by George Brown fell and broke its neck. The two groups of men were some twelve miles apart when this thing occurred. It was a coincidence that the two horses should be killed about the same time and in the same manner. Another singular thing about it was that while the two men were riding their horses at full speed, and while each of the horses were killed, and in the same manner, neither Brown nor Merchant was seriously hurt. The drive resulted in the killing of about twenty of the mustangs, and during that year we killed the balance of the wild horses that roamed the I O A pastures.







Canada Puts Stop On Liquor Sale

TORONTO.-Ontario is putting the akes on the free sale of liquor.

In a serious effort to halt abuse of legal buying privileges of unlimited quantities of hard "hootch," the liquor control board has just issued instructions to all permit clerks and liquor venders that their business is to ontrol liquor, not to increase sales. They are cautioned not to sell relatively large quantities to poor peo ple; they are warned to halt sales to those they have every reason to believe are drinking too much.

No new rules are laid down, but the official bartenders of Ontario are warned to use their judgment. In a statement just issued Sir Henry Drayton, new chairman of the liquor board, British press recently when it was re-"Venders and clerks must realfold. 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
