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**POLITICAL DRIFTS THAT  
BALANCE**

There is an interesting side to the Literary Digest's presidential poll that we have not seen brought out. The cross currents in the poll, the drift from Republicans to Smith, and from Democrats to Hoover, have been emphasized. But the relation of these drifts to the election vote of 1924 has been generally ignored.

This week's report in the Digest poll includes about three-quarter of a million votes. In round numbers there are 140,000 Democrats voting, 55,000 for Hoover and 85,000 for Smith. About 40 per cent of the Democratic vote is for Hoover. There are 480,000 Republicans voting, 380,000 for Hoover and 100,000 for Smith. About 21 per cent of the Republican vote is for Smith.

Now take the election figures of four years ago, 15,725,000 for Coolidge and 8,400,000 for Davis. If 10 per cent of those who voted for Davis are now for Hoover, the Democrats who have left the party would number 3,400,000, leaving five million Democrats for Smith. If 21 per cent of those who voted for Coolidge are now for Smith, the Republicans who have left the party would number 3,300,000, leaving 12,400,000 Republicans for Hoover.

On this basis Smith might expect five million Democratic votes plus 3,300,000 Republican votes, a total of

8,200,000. Hoover might expect 12,400,000 Republican votes plus 3,400,000 Democratic votes, a total of 15,800,000.

In other words, according to the present showing of the Digest poll the drifts between the two sides nearly balance each other, leaving the results about what they were four years ago.

We hasten to add that this is merely some uninteresting figuring, and is not intended as an election forecast. The heavily Democratic centers have not yet been heard from in the Digest poll, the new voters are not included, and no account is taken of the large number now voting in the poll who do not indicate how they voted in 1924.

The significance of these figures lies merely in the attention they invite to the fact that the drift from one party to the other cannot be properly valued without considering the comparative size of the party vote in 1924—Kansas City Star.

**OUR TAX PROBLEM SERIOUS**

Local governments should have one maxim uppermost in their minds—that the power to tax is the power to destroy.

Taxation, obviously, is necessary if we are to have government. So long as taxation is used for maintaining the proper functions of government economically and with foresight, it is justified and necessary.

But when taxes come to be used for other functions, and the money is spent prodigally and unwisely, government declines; taxation becomes a sort of robbery, that takes and does not give in return.

During the war we carried a tremendous burden of federal taxes. Conditions made this unavoidable. Where our national debt was \$1,000,000,000 at the start of the war it was more than \$25,000,000,000 at the end.

Since then the federal government has been carrying on a successful campaign for economy. It has carefully reduced taxes without neglecting any of its proper functions.

But from the standpoint of the taxpayer, this economy has been dissipated. His burden is as great, and sometimes greater, than ever, for the reason that the cost of local governments, state, county and municipal, has been steadily increasing over the same period of time.

The savings effected by the federal government have been offset by extravagances of small units of government.

If we are to have tax reduction, we must place local governments on a higher business plane. We must not spend money for improvements for which we are not financially ready; we must place the power to tax in the hands of those fitted to execute their duties wisely and with economic soundness.

We have no more serious problem today than that of taxation. Good taxation means prosperity and progress. Poor taxation is a menace to progress.

**MONEY TALKS**

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**CANNING POULTRY CULLS**

"The pantry shelf is a good place to put the loafer hen culled out of the poultry flock this Fall, provided she is well encased in tin," so home demonstration authorities of Texas A. and M. College Extension Service declare. Years ago it was nearly out of the question for the housewife to can meat but since the invention of the steam pressure canner all has changed. The barnyard sheik and the boarder hen are now turned to profit by this means on thousands of Texas farms. Those unfamiliar with the steam pressure canner, however, will find it necessary to learn its operation from a neighbor or home demonstration agent.

In canning chickens care must be taken that the meat is not overcooked and that as little liquid as possible is used in order that the delicate poultry flavor may be retained. Older birds may be boned by splitting the flesh down the back and removing it from the skeleton with a sharp knife. A more common method is to steam in pressure cooker for a short time and then pack the meat in tin cans to be sealed and processed.

Younger birds may be fried as usual until thoroughly browned and then packed in cans for sealing and processing. The liver should never be packed with the rest of the chicken because its flavor will penetrate every piece in the can. When carefully packed number three cans will hold a frying-sized chicken.

Canned chicken is best served, according to these home demonstration authorities, in combination dishes, such as creamed chicken, croquettes, chicken a la king, salads, sandwiches. A circular, C-55, "Home Canning of Meats," including recipes, is available by writing the Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

**RAIL RATES LOWERED FOR LIVE STOCK SHOW**

KANSAS CITY.—Greatly reduced railway rates from all parts of the United States to Kansas City for the annual American Royal Live Stock and Horse Show, November 17-24, are announced by F. H. Servatius, secretary of the show.

A rate of a fare and one-third for the round trip to Kansas City will apply from the states of Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Wyoming, Utah, Iowa, Ne-

braska, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and from points in Idaho. To take advantage of this rate visitors to Kansas City will buy a round-trip ticket at one and one-third fares. This rate was granted a short time ago.

Fare and one-half for the round-trip to Kansas City on the certificate plan from all other parts of the United States has just been granted on account of the Third Annual National Congress of Vocational Agricultural High Schools, and the Sixth Annual Royal 4-H Boys and Girls Club Conference, both of which will be held in Kansas City this year in connection with the American Royal. Visitors from states using this plan will buy a regular one-way ticket to Kansas City and take a certificate receipt issued by the railway agent. This certificate will be validated at the place in Kansas City, where these conferences are held and when the visitor purchases his return ticket he presents this certificate and gets his return ticket at half fare. Last year, more than 2,000 young people attended the National Congress of Vocational Agricultural High Schools and the 4-H Boys and Girls Club Conference. Increased activity this year in these de-

partments of the Royal and the larger territory covered by the reduced railroad rates should insure a much larger attendance from a wider territory.

Railroads entering Kansas City have also granted special low priced popular coach excursion rates of approximately one cent per mile from Kansas points for Kansas Day at the American Royal, which, this year, will be Tuesday, November 20, and from Missouri points for Missouri Day, which will be Wednesday, November 21. Special attractive programs will be put on for these two days.

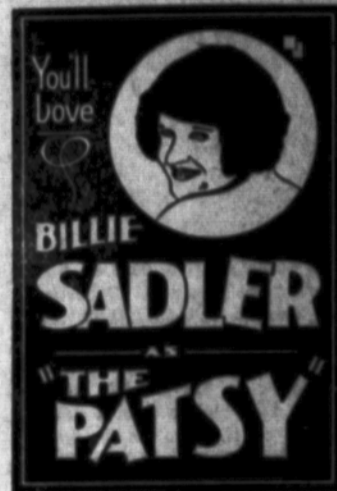

### Santa Fe Is Sued By Fireman's Widow

A suit for \$50,000 against the Parhandle & Santa Fe Railway was filed yesterday in the Seventy-second District Court by Mrs. James E. Sanders, administratrix of the James E. Sanders estate, and Leona Mae Sanders, minor, for damages alleged because of the death of James E. Sanders, father and husband of the plaintiffs. The case is a jury case, and San-

ders' death is alleged to have occurred as the result of injuries which are said to have been received while he was in the employ of the railway company as fireman. He is said to have fallen from an engine while performing his duties, at or near Canyon, Randall County, Texas, his fall being caused by the sudden stopping of the engine, charged as carelessness on the part of the railroad company. Sanders was said to have been 29 years of age at the time of his death and to have been earning an income of \$3,000 a year for his family. Winbourn Pearce and Walker Saulsbury are named as attorneys for the plaintiffs.

### Man Held After Fatal Shooting of Hale County Man

A. L. Ticer, 47, was shot and killed Sunday afternoon shortly before six o'clock by J. L. Shannon following an alleged altercation between the two relatives to certain accusations said to have been made by Shannon against Mrs. Ticer. The shooting occurred at the old Qualls Ranch northeast of Runningwater.

Ticer lived six miles northwest of Plainview. He is survived by his wife and four children. Funeral services were held at Tulia Wednesday morning and the body was brought to Plainview for interment.

Shannon was released on bail of \$2,500 to appear at the December

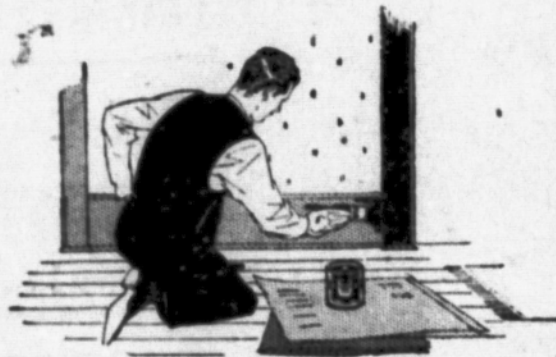

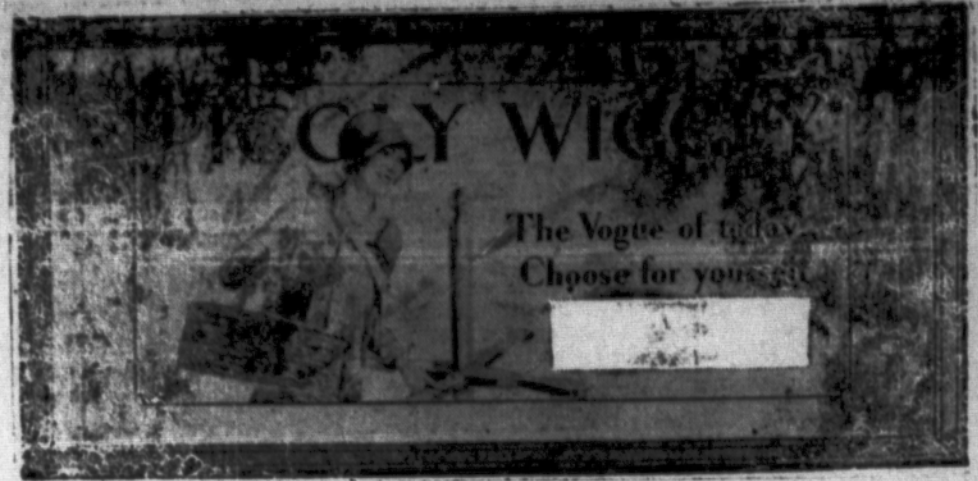

COLUMBUS

The most heroic story of history—the story of the voyage of Christopher Columbus and the discovery of America—is to be celebrated on October 12. On that day in 1492 when Columbus discovered a new continent, who could have guessed what an important part of the globe that continent would become, containing, as it does, several of the greatest nations in the world.

The story of Columbus in itself is inspiring and magnificent—the story of a brave pioneer who feared no disaster, spared no effort, to prove to his own satisfaction and to the satisfaction of Europe that the world was indeed round. Little honor was paid to Columbus during his lifetime; he was jeered and thought crazy; his path was beset with difficulties and dismay, his accomplishments disbelieved, his theories discounted. Yet today his name is held in reverence the world over.

Since the days of Columbus the Eastern and Western worlds are close neighbors; Lindbergh, by spanning the Atlantic in an airplane, showed us how close they really are. In the days of Columbus the way from Europe to America was beset with perils, both real and imaginary, and sailors on comparatively short trips always feared, tremblingly, that they would come to the "edge of the world" and fall off.

Now we do not fear the "edge of the world;" science and improved methods of transportation have destroyed the bugaboos of the past; now a man may talk in one continent, and by radio, be heard across the seas; distance has been demolished—travel has become a pleasure instead of a hazardous undertaking. Yet we still cannot even glimpse the mystery of life, the Divine Purpose of it all—and probably never shall. We know more and more about ourselves—but have no more knowledge than in the past of the workings of Providence. But just as Columbus praised God for his accomplishment, so must we too praise God for the things that have come to pass since the days of Columbus.

Think of brave Columbus! Whittman has sung of him, "old, poor and paralyzed," nevertheless thanking God for His Divine help. We who have not to face the martyrdom of a Columbus, nor encounter the difficulties that he encountered, should surely not be swayed from the spiritual by the mechanical and scientific discoveries of this age. The Soul of Man is more important than man's accomplishments, important though they be.

WINDMILL HELPS MAKE HIGH SCORE CREAM

Keeping his barn, his equipment and his milk clean and immediate cooling of his cream won for John Moser of Clayton County, Iowa, the honor of producing the highest scoring cream in the state during 1927. Moser won the gold medal in a contest conducted by 33 creameries with a product scoring 95.6 for the year. According to the research department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers, the production of this quality product which commands a premium among high class butter makes required no more expense than for ordinary cream.

Mr. Moser depends on his windmill, a cooling tank and a cistern to keep his cream at a temperature of about 52 degrees. The windmill is allowed to run long enough morning, noon and night to keep the water in the cooling tank at the desired temperature, and in that way cooling costs very little. An overflow pipe carries surplus water from the tank down into a cistern which in turn supplies livestock watering tanks. In case there is too much water it can be eliminated through a waste pipe, and if there is too little wind to run the mill, Mr. Moser cools his cream by hanging it in the cistern.

In addition to immediate cooling, Mr. Moser considers a clean barn, clean milking and sanitary equipment essential in the production of a high scoring cream.

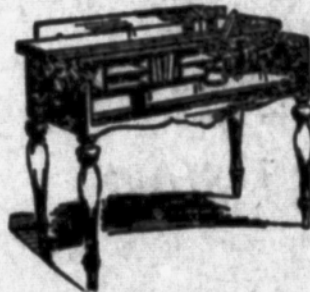

**LEAVES FROM NANCY'S KITCHEN CLUB NOTEBOOK**

Mrs. Adams asked us for a "swanky" color scheme and, believe me, she got it! We decided on a floor of midnight blue and white tiled linoleum; washable oil cloth walls, dark blue on a cream background, up to shoulder height; above that, deep cream washable paint walls. Table, cabinet, cupboard, refrigerator, white, stenciled in dark blue. Oil range, white porcelain enamel. Window seat covered with dark blue, white and orange cretonne. Cushions covered in solid orange. White curtains stenciled in orange. Midnight blue and orange braided rugs on the floor. Mrs. Adams got four rubberized cloth aprons in blue, white and orange for her daughter's friends to use.

**Midnight Dishes—Deviled Sardines**

Cover any amount of sardines desired with canned tomato soup. Cook for five or ten minutes. Serve on toast.



**Midnight Dishes—Sandwich Loaf**

Take a loaf of day-old bread. Slice off all crusts, making as square a loaf as possible. Slice lengthwise of loaf, full length of loaf, from bottom to top, leaving the bread in layers. Spread on bottom layer a filling of stuffed olives chopped and mixed with mayonnaise. Put on second layer. Spread with cream cheese-and-nut mixture. Put on other layers, alternating the fillings. When loaf is complete, "ice" with cream cheese and garnish with slices of olive. To serve, slice as you would ordinary loaf of bread. This makes a delicious and most decorative dish for luncheons and midnight parties.



**Cocoa**

Mrs. Adams says her family refused to drink cocoa until she found this recipe for it, which makes a richer drink:

- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 3 cups milk
- 2/3 cup water
- Pinch of salt
- Pinch of soda

Boil together all ingredients except milk. Then add milk and bring to boiling point, but do not boil. Serve at once.

**TURNING FEED INTO DOLLARS**

A profitable Winter may be spent by thousands of farmers in converting their beef calves of the last crop into baby heaves to sell next Spring, points out G. W. Barnes, beef cattle specialist in the A. and M. College Extension Service. "While it is true that good feeder calves are hard to buy, it is also true that many farmers have a few head on hand and these animals will provide an excellent market for the farm feed crop.

"Weaned calves weighing around 350 pounds may well be fed for 30 days on a ration composed of four pounds ground maize heads or corn and cob meal, seven pounds of hay and three-fourth pound of cotton-

seed meal daily. At the end of that time the feed should be increased to give six pounds daily of ground maize heads or corn and cob meal, eight pounds of hay and one pound of cottonseed meal. As the Winter advances the daily ration should be increased so that calves will receive all they can clean up. A finished baby beef should command highest prices in the Spring and feeders may make a profit both on the animal and on the feed consumed."

As high as 15c is being paid in Ballinger for pecans. The pecan crop in Kunnels County is the best in several years because of the numerous floods in the creek and river bottoms this year.

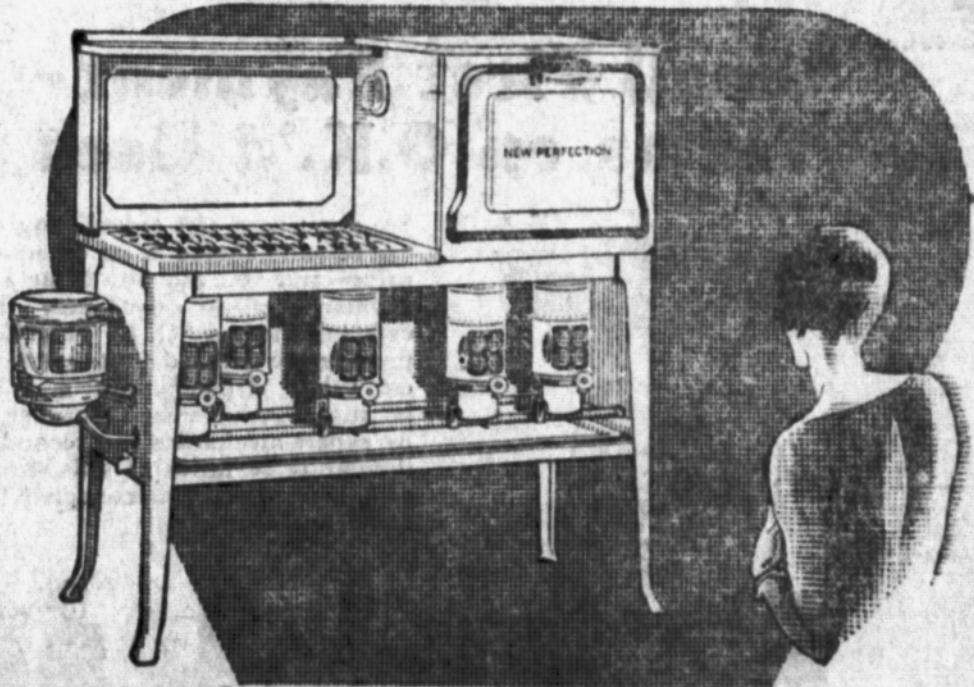

**Petition on Bond Issue For County Sent to Austin**

The petition for a special bond issue election, which is proposed for the purpose of voting bonds to construct hard-surfaced and paved highways throughout Lubbock County, which has been in process of preparation for several days, was yesterday announced as about ready to be sent to the state attorney general at Austin for approval. When the petition receives the ok of the attorney general it will then be filed with the

Lubbock county commissioners. A total of \$2,000,000 is to be included in the bond issue proposition, of this amount \$1,982,000 being for construction of paving or hard-surfacing and \$22,000 to absorb bonds already voted in road district number one, of the Slaton district, in order to make the proposition a county-wide one. Highways to be paved include Highways Number 7, Number 9, and Number 53, throughout their course in Lubbock County. County roads to be hard-surfaced include the road north from the Lynn County line, through Slaton and Idalou to the Hale

County line; the road east from Lubbock through Canyon and Acuff to the Crosby County line; the road west from Lubbock to the Hockley County line. A provision of the petition, that is to be incorporated in all proceedings of the resultant calling of an election and the election on the bond issue, is that the amount of money necessary to build the various roads as named, in accordance to engineers' figures, will be set down and absolutely adhered to on each unit of these. The money when voted will be set aside for the particular road and can not be used for construction purposes on

any other section. For instance, if the election calls for the issuance of bonds for hard-surfacing the road west from Lubbock to the Hockley County line, names the specific figures estimated by competent engineers to build that section of the county-wide project, that money can not be used for any other but that particular stretch of road. It was learned yesterday that the petition will perhaps be sent to Austin for the attorney general's inspection as to legal details some time today.—Lubbock Avalanche.

Grading work on Highway No. 91 through Hale County, is progressing steadily, according to accounts from Plainview. It is expected that the road will be ready for paving on schedule time.

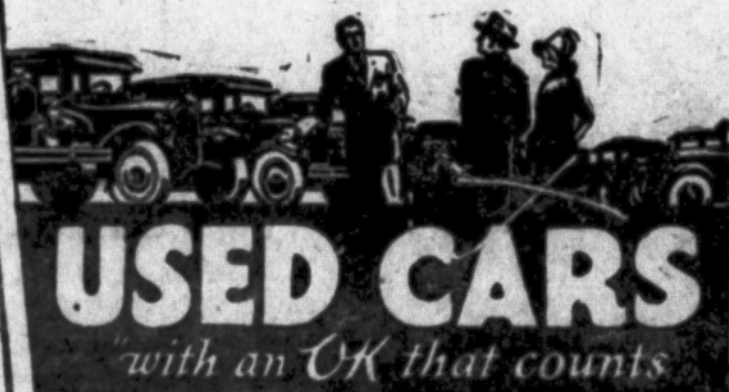
