The roof of the administration building of Willys-Overland is finished in brilliant vermillion brick and is 375 feet wide and 63 feet deep. Located as it is in the midst of a large private park and recreation ground, the building is among the first objects discernible from aloft.

Pilots say it is perhaps the best airway sign in the country.

The sign was ordered placed by John N. Willys, president of Willys-Overland, who has long been interested in aviation, being one of the earliest builders of aviation engines. During the war he headed the Ourtis Airplan Company which manufactured the famous "Jenny" planes which have served as instruction ships for most of the pilots now flying, including Lindbergh. He recently showed great interest in airmail by sending in one dispatch 700,000 letters to prospective Whippet buyers, thus establishing a new world's record for airmail.

December Report Shows Month to be Greatest for Births

Vital Statistics in the State of Texas in the year 1928 has been most satisfactory. During the year, 138,988 birth and death certificates were filed with 121,493 in 1927, indicating an increase of 17,495 in 1928, over 1927. The increase during the last quarter of 1928 shows a steady increase from 6,559 births in October to 8,583 in November, and 9,398 in December, with a similar increase in deaths from 3,174 in October and 3,890 in November, to 5,350 in December.

The increase of births during December 1928 indicates a growth in registration. However, the increase in deaths in December 1928, indicates not only an increase in registration influenza which swept the State during that month.




