With approximately three-fourths of the cotton crop in this section harvested as the year of 1928 came to an end, Slaton's six gins had received 4,185 bales of 1928 cotton up to last Satur-mobile, Mr. Jackson stated. day afternoon, and McClung, Posey and Union gins had a total of 1,875, giving this immediate territory a total of 6,060 bales so far.

Big Mass Meeting For Jan. 11.

A large creamery, to be financed and operated by a co-operative association of dairymen and farmers living in the territory around Slaton, became a distinctly probable thing for Slaton when the second meeting of the milk appointed by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce to frame and execute a plan for a milk plant here, was held last Friday night at the Chamber of Commerce office. Thirteen were in attendance. J. H. Brewer, Slaton banker, is

chairman of the group. Plans were endorsed for forming a co-operative dairy association, to include farmers and dairymen from over ning as early as practicable. The association, it is expected, will erect a begins functioning.

Mass Meeting Called.

A big general mass meeting was city hall in Slaton, to which all farmers and dairymen of the territory are invited. It is intended that the cooperative association will be started at that meeting, while additional members will be sought in the weeks following. If the association is formed at that time, the adoption of a constitution and by-laws, and also of a marketing agreement, will probably be attended to. Officers may be chosen and the members will then have opportunity to proceed at once in marketing cream through co-operative channels, it is said. This would come. of course, after selection of a co-operative cream station representative.

It is hoped that every community around Slaton will be well represented by large numbers of farmers and dairymen who may be interested in the creamery proposal, committee to Jean on the south. Not all places members said. All who are interested are strongly urged to attend the mass meeting on Jan. 11, at 7:30 p. m.

Report on Cows.

It developed at the committee's meeting Friday night that there are now enough cows in this territory to provide sufficient milk or cream for profitable operation of a creamery or milk plant of some kind. Reports were received from a survey conducted during the past two weeks, these reports showing that there are nearly 1,200 dairy cows in this territory.

It is conceded that when the cr ery is completed and placed in operation there will be a large increase in the number of cows kept through the territory, thus boosting the milk or cream supply.





The association in that county was started with only 25 members, but has met with such success that virtually every farmer who can afford to buy and keep any cows has joined the association. Dividends are paid to the farmers at regular intervals, on the basis of the volume of cream sold, the regular market price being paid when the cream is delivered at time of sale. The creamery is financed by each farmer investing \$10 for each cow he wns. The marketing contract covers

Mr. Conley said a creamery is better for the farmers than a cheese plant would be, because whole milk is re quired for the cheese plant and milk must be delivered at least once or twice daily, whereas a creamery uses principally only the cream, and farm ers thus have skimmed milk left for porltry and hogs on the farms Cream may be delivered only twice or three times per week, representing a ing in transportation.

Estimate Cost.

The exact cost of a creamery to neet present needs here would reach about \$15,000, it is estimated, but a number of dairymen and farmers have said they favor building a larger plant, one that will meet the needs of sever al years, instead of having to enlarge the plant within a year or so at considerable loss due to wasted equipment
