Colored Singers To Give Pageant April 28 And 29

"Pearly Gates," a Negro pageant with all colored cast of fifty voices, featuring Negro spirituals and folk songs, will be staged in the City Hall Auditorium, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, April 28th and 29th at 8:30 p. m. under the joint auspices of the associated Colored Churches, and will be under the direction of A. E. Washington, El Centro, California.

The pageant will be one of the most elaborate productions of its kind ever presented by Colored people here. "Pearly Gates" depicts the trials and tribulations besetting a Christian seeking to live a life worthy of Heavenly reward, the many temptations offered by the "Devil" and the spirituals training to combat these temptations. It is an inspirational production offering residents of Slaton and vicinity an opportunity to see and hear a large combine dramatic program. The pageant is simple in theme, universal in appeal. The acting for the most part is pantomime, which is of the oldest type. It is one hour and thirty minutes long, and reveals an unusual and colorful scene of the earlier religious life of Colored people. One of the most pleasing features of "Pearly Gates" will be the Celestial Choir, a unit of fifty superb singers, whose thrilling renditions of Negro spirituals will provide a delightful background for the production.

It will be featured by scenes presenting "Gabriel and his Guardian Angels"; The pilgrim whose eyes are fixed upon the Cross; The Wandering Boy; The pilgrim who believes in prayer; The rich men; The Drunken Soul; The Hypocrite; Old Black Joe and many other scenes.

The production will open to the public, and special reservation will be made for white people who wish to attend.

There is a severe penalty for those who hoard sugar.

NAVY RELIEF SOCIETY MAKES APPEAL FOR AID

The Lubbock County branch of the Navy Relief Society has been asked by Gerald Mann as Chairman of the Society for Texas, to raise \$2,200.00 for this County's quota for the relief of Navy men and their families.

Mr. Marion Sanford, of Lubbock is the Chairman for Lubbock County and is making an appeal to every patriotic citizen to make donations to the Society.

In normal peace times, without casualties and without a war-time emergency, the Navy Relief Society receives and expends about \$200,000 a year. In 1941, the Society cared for some 11,000 cases and distributed in loans and grants more than \$500,000, and disbursed in monthly grants and outright gifts about \$136,000 in 4,000 needy cases.

For the first time in its history, the Society is faced with a problem far beyond its ability to meet from its own resources. The United States Navy now includes not only the U. S. Marine Corps but the entire personnel of the Coast Guard as well. All together, the Navy personnel now represents about a half-million families.

No one can doubt that in a war which has spread over the entire globe, the needs of the Navy Relief Society will be large and urgent in future months. Barring major catastrophe and extraordinary casualties, it is hoped that the sum of \$5,000,000 will prove sufficient to meet the needs of the Navy Relief Society.

REGULATIONS CHANGED FOR VOLUNTEER WHEAT

The following changes in the regulations pertaining to volunteer wheat have been received at the local A.C.A. Office according to an announcement by Walter Y. Wells, County Administrative Officer. Each producer who has volunteer wheat should study this very carefully, and may receive any other information at the A.C.A. Office.

Farmers cooperating with the A.A.A. Program who choose to harvest volunteer wheat may do so and still earn both agricultural conservation and parity payments, if parity payments are made, provided (1) their acreage of seeded wheat is within the 1942 wheat allotments and they comply with other provisions of the AAA Program, (2) they store their volunteer wheat on the farm as long as it is subject to a marketing quota penalty, and (3) they seed within their 1943 wheat acreage allotments. 1942 AAA payments to farmers who harvest volunteer wheat in excess of the wheat acreage allotments will be held until 1943 compliance has been checked.

The farm stored volunteer wheat will be eligible for a 1942 loan at 50 percent of the usual rate.

EXPERT MEN NEEDED IN DEFENSE WORK

Recently announced government restrictions on construction not essential to the nation's war effort has resulted in a considerable increase in applications of skilled men for enlistment in naval construction battalions, Navy recruits at Lubbock announced today.

Men enlisted in construction battalions, recruiting officers said, enjoy the distinction of being in a military organization of practically "all sergeants and no privates" as more than 90 percent are enlisted as petty officers with beginning monthly pay ranging from \$60.00 to \$99.00, plus board, lodging, medical and dental attention when needed. When serving outside continental limits of the U. S., 20 percent is added to pay. Married men in the \$72.00, or above, pay grade receive an additional \$34.50 per month as housing allowance.

Although enlisted primarily for work with tools of their trade, Naval Construction Battalion men are taught to handle defensive weapons before being sent to overseas duty.

Farmers Supply To Install 100 More Frozen Lockers Soon

Mr. E. R. Legg, owner of the Farmer's Supply and Frozen Food Locker Plant reports that he has completed arrangements for installation of one hundred more frozen lockers in the plant.

FARMERS TO VOTE SOON ON WHEAT ALLOTMENT

Put the punch where it counts, Mr. J. P. Steele, chairman, county AAA committee, told Lubbock county wheat producers today.

"Farmers have their sleeves rolled up and they'll stay that way until we've done our part in licking Hitler, his Italians and the Japs," the chairman said.

Citing a big carry-over, the current crop and shrunken markets, the chairman urged all wheat producers to vote in the national wheat referendum, Saturday, May 2.

Total supply of wheat as of July 1, 1942, is 1,423-million bushels of which 630-million bushels represent carry-over and 793-million bushels represent the 1942 crop estimate. With this year's domestic disappearance estimated at 670-million bushels, the carry-over as of July 1, 1943, will be 763-million bushels, or the largest supply on record he explained.

Supplies of wheat in Argentina and Canada, other major wheat producing countries in the Western Hemisphere, are as large or even larger than the United States' supply, the chairman said. He pointed out that it would take Canadians three years to consume their carry-over domestically and that Argentina is in much the same position with supplies far exceeding markets.

Texas high school teachers who resigned between the opening of schools last September and February first of this year, were teachers of mathematics; although fewer than 20 per cent of Texas high school teachers teach in the field of mathematics.
The survey referred to shows that 2621 vacancies had occurred in 32,042 teaching positions heard from in Texas during the first half of this year. Of these vacancies, 47 per cent occurred in high school teaching positions, although less than 35 per cent of the teachers of Texas teach in secondary schools. Our Weekly Sermon

The Four Dimensions of God's Love By the Rev. Elgin S. Moyer, Ph.D., Librarian Moody Bible Institute, Chicago

Text: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."—John 3:16 (cf. Eph. 3:17-19).

These 25 words perhaps say more than any other group of words of equal length. They epitomize the entire gospel of salvation. They state the fourfold essence of God's love.

First, the breadth of God's love: "God so loved the world." His love extends to the whole world, to every creature. It is as broad as the dimension of the world and as the extent of time. It is both limitless and infinite in its breadth. God's love reaches to the uttermost.

Second, the length of His love: "That he gave his only begotten Son." God's love is so comprehensive and far-reaching that He sent His Son into this world, that His love might be made known. And His own deity, His own person, His own heavenly pleasure did not stop the Son from giving Himself for a suffering, sinful, accursed world.

Third, the depth of His love: "That whosoever believeth on Him should not perish." Into the deepest depth of sin, shame and suffering God's love took His beloved Son. No sin is so black, no sinner so desperate, no one so deep in the mire of filth of sin that God's love through Christ cannot reach that sinner in his sin. O the depth of His love!

Fourth, the height of God's love: "But have everlasting life." Yes, this love will carry the simplest child, the foulest sinner, the weakest Christian, any one who fully trusts His Son, into the highest glory of eternity. The redeemed shall be lifted into the very presence of God Himself, there to have life eternal. O what love God has bestowed upon us that we should become His children and be saved unto His glory!

According to tabulations in the state AAA office, Mitchell County farmers led the state with 64 per cent participation. Concho County ranked second with 58 per cent

coverage while one-half of the cotton farmers in McCulloch County signed up. Collin County, with 1,593 applications covering 2,223 insurance units, led all other counties in total policies sold.

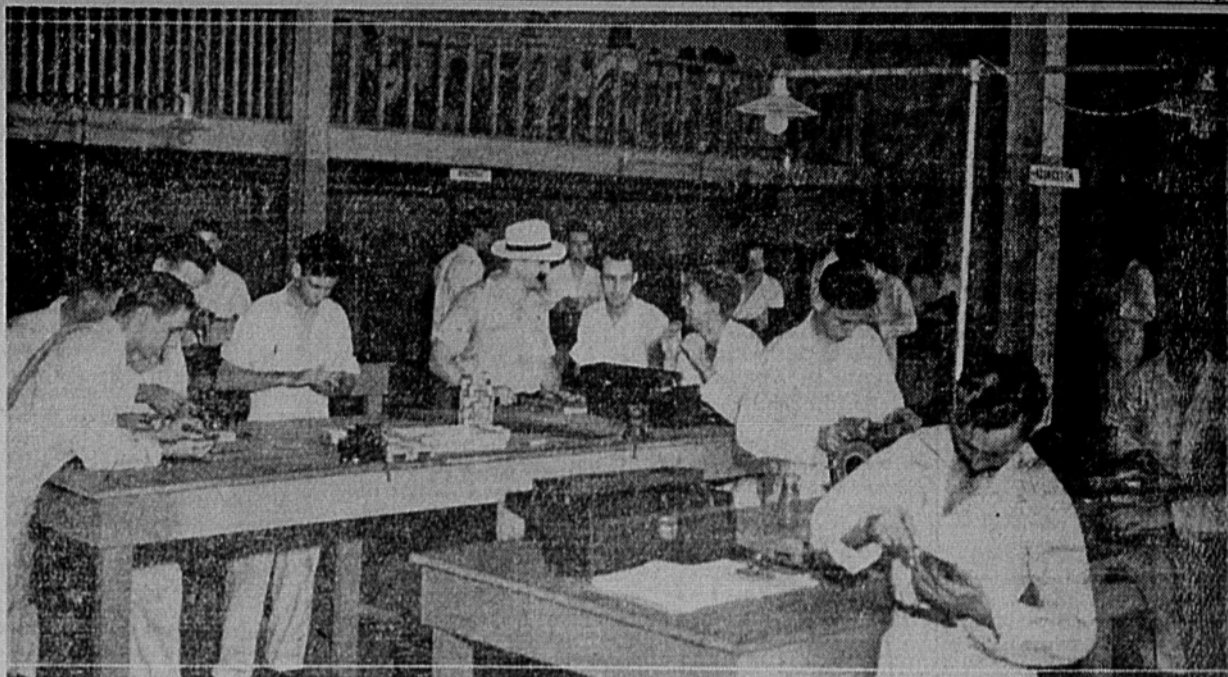

EAST IN RACE FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

"It is my belief that a District Attorney should be fair and just in the consideration of all criminal matters before him and that he should be competent, aggressive and energetic in the prosecution of all criminal cases before the District Courts.

"It appears to me that in considering the official to be elected to a public office, the Citizens will desire to be guided in their choice by the same standards which are usually adopted by any other employer in engaging the services of his prospective employee. When a business man employs a clerk or a farmer engages the services of a workman, the employer is interested in knowing if the employee is qualified to do the work and if he is energetic enough to perform the services satisfactorily.

"Based upon this belief, I am applying for the office of District Attorney to the Citizens of this district and wish to submit with all humility the following facts and circumstances as to my qualifications for this office:

"I was born and reared in Childress County and lived there continuously until I moved to Lubbock five years ago. I have practiced law nine years, four of which were in Childress. During that time I have served as county attorney of Childress County and have always either represented the State in criminal cases or have been engaged in the practice of civil law. I have only represented the defendant in one criminal case.

"As to my honesty and integrity, I refer the voters and citizens of

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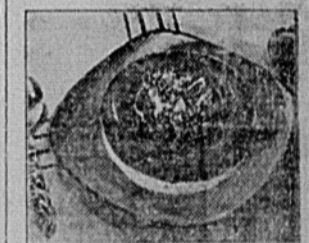

Chicken-Tomato Ring
Red Layer:
1 package lemon flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup condensed tomato soup
Pour one cup of boiling water over the lemon flavored gelatin and stir until dissolved. Then add the soup. Pour into a mold and when congealed, cover with the following:

White Layer:
1 package cream cheese (3 oz.)
1 can condensed chicken soup
2 teaspoons gelatin (softened in 2 tablespoons cold water)
2 tablespoons salad dressing or mayonnaise
Put the cream cheese in a bowl; then mash and mix well with a fork. Heat the chicken soup and pour over the gelatin stirring until dissolved. Add the soup mixture to the cream cheese a little at a time and mix well after each addition until creamy. When cool, add salad dressing or mayonnaise. Cover red layer in mold with chicken mixture. Place in refrigerator until firm. To serve: Turn out on lettuce or fill the center with greens.

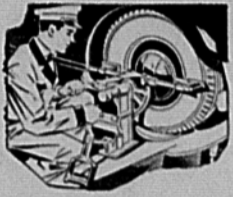

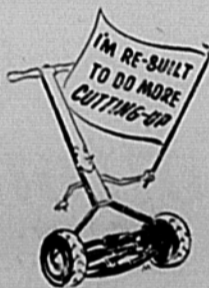
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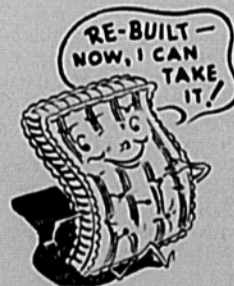

CREEP-FED CALVES HELP PRODUCE VICTORY BEEF MAKE MORE AND FASTER GAIN PER POUND OF FEED BY METHOD

"Livestock men plan to make their cattle heavier by creep-feeding and 'caking' steers on grass," a newspaper report recently said, quoting Jay Taylor, a leading Texas cowman and then president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, at a conference on meeting war needs for beef. In mentioning creep-feeding, Taylor stressed one of the most important ways in which cattle raisers can produce more beef, more rapidly, for "Food for Victory."

Calves that are creep-fed utilize feed efficiently while they are growing; therefore, they can make more gain per pound of feed than at any other time, feeding authorities point out. Getting accustomed early to eating, they can be weaned with less shrink; and, if desired, can soon be full-fed when put directly into the feed lot.

The two BIG features at the State, May 1 and 2, are (1) "KID FROM KANSAS" and (2) "GLAMOUR BOY," short is "Blitz Kiss."

On farms, where grain is available and rapid finish for market is desired, a good mixture for the creep consists of 3 to 6 parts of ground meal, pea- or pebble-size cake, cubes or pellets. As the milk supply decreases, the ration of meal, or cake, should be increased so that the amount of protein the calves receive will continue to be adequate. The amount of meal, or cake, should be increased in the mixing to 1 part for each 2 to 4 parts of grain. Calves may be hand-fed the amount

gradually increasing to 2 to 5 pounds.

Because cottonseed cake furnishes both essential protein and phosphorus that calves must have for maximum growth, cottonseed cake, cubes and pellets are standard feeds for creep-feeding on the range. They may be creep-fed in troughs or self-feeders. In trough-feeding, calves may be started on one-half of a pound daily per head,

they will clean up, daily, or receive the mixture in self-feeders.
