





sugar price schedule, raising by 20 cents per hundred pounds the maximum prices that refiners and othr primary distributors may charge for cane and beet sugar sold for direct consumption, has been announced by Leon Henderon. Administrator of the U.S. Office of Price Administration.

This upward revision reflects the recent increase in the wholesale price of raw cane sugar.

"This action should have no immediate effect upon the price of refined sugar at retail," Mr. Henderson said, "since retailers are now selling supplies which they acquired ut lower prices. I am con-fident that retailers can be depended upon to delay any price increase until their present stocks on hand are exhausted and they must pay higher wholesale prices for replacement supplies."
