### ELECTION OF C OF C OFFICERS AND SECRETARY HELD TUESDAY

The election of officers, the installation of five new directors and the election of the Secretary were the highlights of the regular meeting of the Slaton B. C. D. and Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday night.

Roy Mack was chosen as President, Ray Hickman as Vice President and S. A. Peavy as Treasurer. Briggs Robertson was re-elected as Secretary-Manager for the ensuing year and Dr. W. E. Howard, Dr. Elbert Loveless, Webber Williams, Max Arrants and Howard Hoffman were installed as new directors to take the places of Ben Mansker, C. C. Hoffman, Kirby Scudder, L. A. Harral and W. E. Smart, whose terms have expired.

The committee that was appointed at the last meeting to inspect the Auditorium at the City Hall, with the view of repairing it so that meetings could be held in it at all times of the year, reported that such action should be taken and the directors voted to have the Chamber of Commerce stand half the expense of \$150.00, with the city to have the work done.

In the election of President a lively contest was held between Roy Mack, Ray Hickman, Webber Williams, Paul Stevens and W. T. Cherry, all of whom made rousing speeches, not for themselves, but in favor of one of the other men who had been nominated. Six tie votes were balloted before Roy was made President.

C. C. Hoffman, who retired as a director and as President of the Board, has been a very active member of the Chamber of Commerce for the past three years and was President of the organization for two of the three years that he has served. Many worth while civic improvements by this body have been accomplished during the two years Mr. Hoffman was President and he has given much of his time to Chamber of Commerce work.

### SUGAR HOARDERS NOT TO GET ADVANTAGE

One rule that will be incorporated into the sugar rationing plan when it goes into effect within a few weeks will provide that persons who have built up hoards of sugar will have stamps torn out of their ration books to cover the hoards. Thus, they will be deprived of the right to buy more sugar until their hoards are gone.

Teachers in public schools will register sugar consumers. Then ration books will be issued, as soon as the enormous job of printing and distributing the books can be completed. Local rationing boards will have general supervision over the registration of consumers and issuance of the books.

One book will be issued for each person in the country, regardless of age; and each book will contain 28 stamps, which will be numbered. They can be used to purchase sugar during only one designated week.

When a sugar purchase is made, the proper stamp will be torn from the book. Each stamp will entitle the holder to purchase a definite amount of sugar—probably three-quarters of a pound or 12 ounces per person each week. The exact amount will be determined when the War Production Board decides how much is to be made available each week for the thousands of retail stores throughout the country.

When consumers apply for War Ration Book No. One, they will be required to make a sworn statement as to the amount of sugar per person in the possession of their family unit. If there is more than two pounds of sugar per person in possession of the family, the balance will be considered as hoarded sugar and an appropriate number of stamps will be removed from the book at the time of registration. This will make it impossible for the book holder to buy any sugar until his or her supply is used up.

The thirty hour course is given free and is open to every woman in the community and there are hopes for a larger enrollment as there will be room for a great number of women.

The object of the course is that trained nurses become a scarcity in an emergency and in case of an epidemic, every woman must be prepared to care for her own family.

No obligations accompany the course and there is nothing to sign. It is strictly for personal use and no one will be called out.

The present plan offers two, two hour classes each week, to be given in the morning. These classes are to be held in the dining room of the Masonic Building.

## DEFENSE BONDS SALE SET AT \$240,000 FOR SLATON AREA

A quota of \$240,000.00 in Defense Bonds and Stamps has been set for Slaton and this immediate territory, which means that \$20,000.00 in purchases of Stamps and Bonds must be made each month.

Purchases of Bonds and Stamps through local channels were good during January, but have been gradually falling off. Reports show that school children and those in the lower bracket incomes have been the best customers and it is pointed out that unless those in position to do so, purchase their share, the quota will not be made.

The revenue to carry on the war will have to be raised, either through taxation or through the sale of Bonds, and financial experts point out that the individual stands to feel the expense far less by buying Bonds now than to wait and pay greatly increased taxation later.

### ANOTHER COURSE IN FIRST AID TO BEGIN

More and more interest has developed in First Aid Courses all over the nation and nearly one hundred people have taken courses here in Slaton, with many more expressing a desire to get this valuable training.

Another course is being planned to start as soon as possible, within a week if possible. Anyone who is interested in taking up the training can do so without cost by phoning either L. B. Hagerman, number 180, or Elbert Wilson, number 220. Those who have completed the standard First Aid Course and are interested in the advanced course may get the training.

The training is being offered as a part of the Defense Work and those taking part and giving their time are doing so as a patriotic duty. Dr. W. E. Payne has been particularly generous with his knowledge in directing the courses.

### LOCAL TRAINMEN BUYING BOMBERS

The local membership of The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen expect to have between \$600.00 and \$1,000.00 to place with the National Contributions from other towns to help build Bombers for the Air Corps. This is being done to carry the sincere thoughts of the trainmen to the Japs.

### ALL TIME RECORD SET BY SLATON POST OFFICE.

The final records at the Slaton Post Office show that this office had a twenty-two percent gain in the last quarter of the year over the corresponding time in 1940 and that the year of 1941 was the heaviest year on record in this office, being ten per cent greater than the year of 1937, which was the record year before 1941.

The month of December, 1941, exceeded December, 1940, by thirty-three per cent. January, 1942, has exceeded all other January records by thirty-one per cent.

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## Important Income Tax Information

Some of the items that are deductible from gross income to determine net income are listed in this article. Lack of space prevents a full explanation of the various deductions. If in doubt on any item consult the nearest collector of internal revenue, deputy collector or internal revenue agent.

Typical business expenses of a mercantile establishment are amounts paid for advertising, hire of clerks and other employees, rent, light, heat, water, stationery, stamps, telephone, property insurance and delivery expenses.

A professional man may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the pursuit of his profession.

A loss arising from "fires, storms, shipwrecks, or other casualty" need not be connected with the taxpayer's trade or business. If his home or his automobile is destroyed by fire he may claim a deduction for the loss sustained unless compensated for by insurance or otherwise. Loss of property by theft is an allowable deduction.

In general, taxes are deductible only by the person upon whom they are imposed. Certain taxes are not deductible, such as those assessed against local benefits, and the Federal income tax. The Federal tax of 10% on the retail sale of jewelry, furs, and toilet preparations is not deductible by the purchaser. Other taxes not deductible are those imposed on employees by the Social Security Act, Federal estate and gift taxes and State inheritance, estate, legacy, or succession taxes. The Federal taxes on automobiles, gasoline, cigarettes, and liquor are imposed upon the manufacturer, producer, or importer, and are not deductible by the purchaser or consumer.

Charitable contributions and gifts made by an individual are deductible within certain limitations, if actually paid within the year. The organization to which the gift is made, for example a corporation, trust, community chest, fund or foundation must be created in or organized under the law of the United States or any possession of the United States or under the law of any State or Territory, or of the District of Columbia and must be organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals. Gifts to an individual are not deductible.

### NEW FACES AT THE POST OFFICE WINDOWS

Postmaster K. L. Scudder announced that several changes in the personnel at the Post Office have become effective recently. T. Everett McClanahan has been promoted from city carrier to clerk to fill the vacancy left when B. G. Thompson retired, Jim Bates has taken over the duties of City Carrier, the position formerly held by McClanahan, and David T. Sanders replaced Bates as sub carrier. Cecil H. Scott is now substitute Clerk, filling the place left vacant when Odie Hood resigned last October.

### MEN WITH DEPENDENTS MAY BE CALLED IN ARMY

Selective Service Director Hershey asked local draft boards to aid deferment of apprentices in essential war production trades because there is a mounting demand for skilled workers. Gen. Hershey said a plan has been proposed for allowances and allotments to release for induction many registrants now deferred on grounds of dependency. In World War I, he said, payments up to \$50 a month were made. He said no figures will be issued on the number of men who register February 16.

## INCREASE IN POULTRY PRODUCTION REQUESTED

The United States Department of Agriculture has asked for increases in poultry production, that will require a "Billion" baby chicks to fill. The Department has increased the egg production goal another five percent, which means 13 percent over the 1941 total, now the largest on record today.

Adequate farm production is vital to the nation's existence, and the task of achieving it will command the energy and devotion of every farm family. Eggs and poultry meat are important food items, especially eggs, because of their nutritional values, and the fact that they can be processed and shipped efficiently. Thus we must produce the extra chicks that will be required for the big increase in egg production. We must concentrate all efforts on the maintenance of our breeding stock, because our national requirements will insist on food supplies.

Therefore, it is essential to keep your present flock in the best condition, and anyone and everyone who has the time and space should raise some poultry or garden. This

waiting. It is soft, creamily smooth, tartly spiked with lemon and the perfect complement for our cake. Together, cake and icing, are a delight to all lovers of fine, rich cake:

**Surprise Cake**  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1 can condensed tomato soup  
1 1/2 cups flour (sifted)  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 cup nut meats (chopped)

Sift the flour, then measure, add baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, and nutmeg, and sift again.

Cream the shortening thoroughly, add the sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture, alternately with the tomato soup, a small amount at a time. Add nutmeats and stir until smooth. Bake in a greased pan (9 x 9 x 2 inches) in a 350° oven for 45 minutes.

**Lemon Cream Cheese Icing**  
1 package cream cheese  
1/4 cup sugar (XXXX)  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream the cheese thoroughly. Then stir in the sugar, gradually. Add the lemon juice and salt. Spread on the cake.

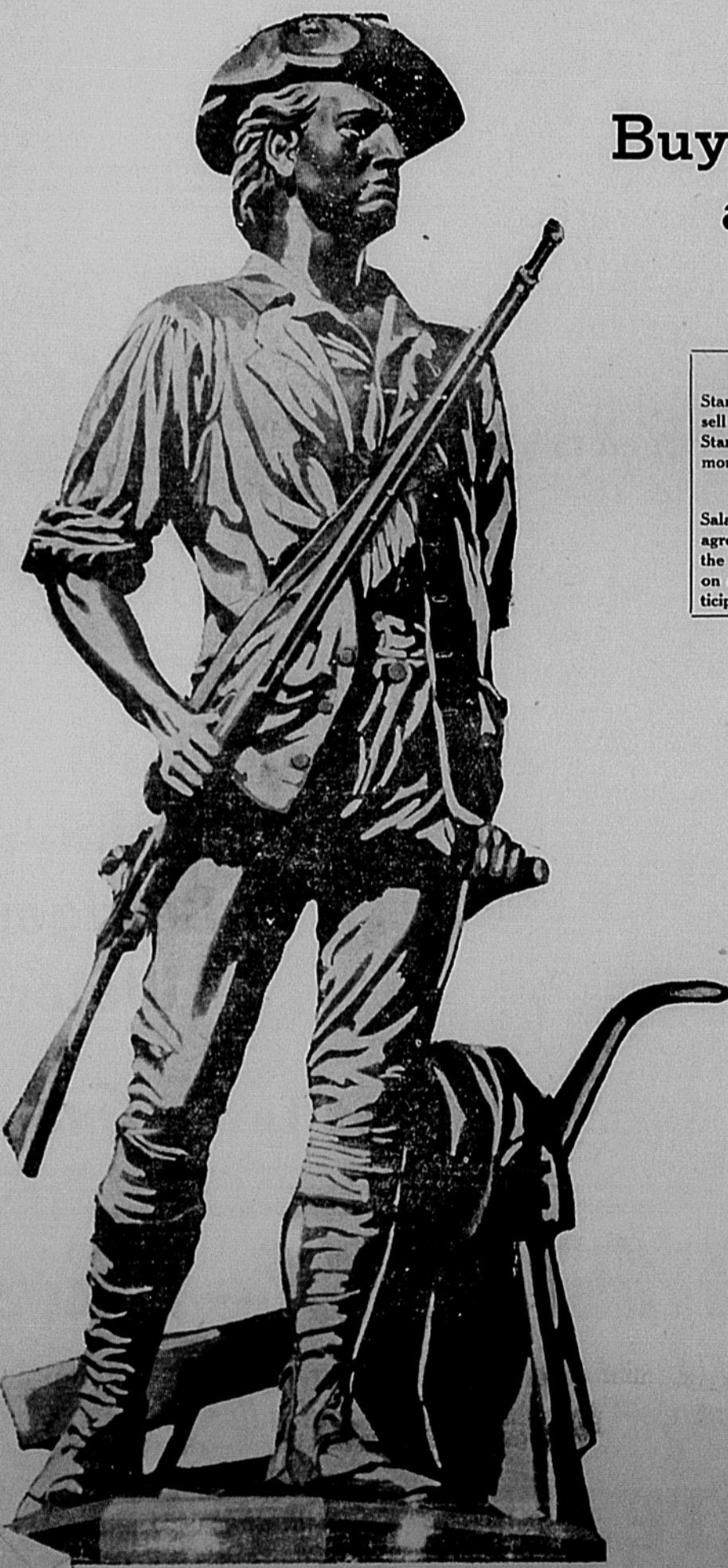

# CANADIAN NAVY SEIZES JAPANESE FISHING BOATS TO BE MANNED BY WHITE FISHERMEN FOR DURATION



A FEW HOURS AFTER CANADA WENT TO WAR with Japan the Canadian Navy was rounding up all Pacific Coast fishing craft operated by persons of Japanese origin. It has now been announced that these craft, shown above tied up at Steveston, on Vancouver Island, will be leased or bought from their owners and operated by white fishermen. Japs will not be allowed to sail in Canadian waters during the war. They will be permitted to serve in a special war work organization if they desire. The seizure of boats was done on a friendly basis.

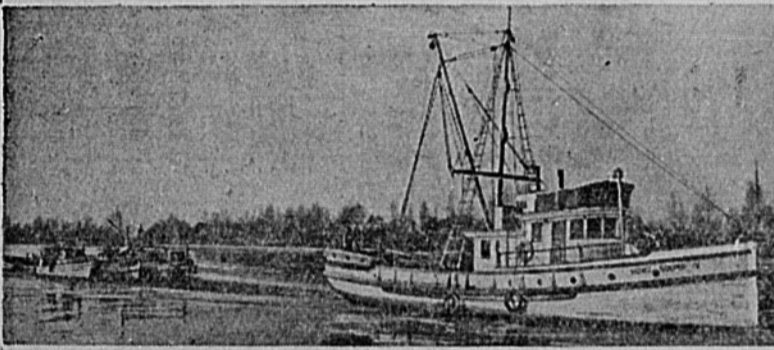
The Union Jack goes up on one of the Japanese fishing vessels immobilized by the Canadian Navy. Jap fishermen will not be allowed to operate during the war.

**ORDINANCE.**

**AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DISCHARGE OR SHOOTING OF FIREARMS WITHIN THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS; REGULATING THE SHOOTING OF AIR GUNS, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:**

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to fire off or discharge any gun, pistol, rifle or other firearm of any description within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton, Texas.

Section 2. The preceding section shall not apply when such firing is done in the necessary and lawful protection of one's person, premises or property, unless such firing be recklessly or wantonly done.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot or discharge any air gun or air rifle of any description in any public place, or near to any building, street, or other public place within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton, Texas.

Section 4. Any person, firm, corporation, company or association who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 6. In view of the fact that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate protection and preservation of the public safety and general welfare, it becomes necessary that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage and it is accordingly so ordained.

Section 4. Any person, firm, corporation, company or association who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or suffer or allow the same to be violated, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

signed to obtain a ration book will carry on its face the warning that false reports to any government agency subject the person making such reports to severe penalties, ranging as high as a \$10,000 fine or 10 years of imprisonment. It is expected that there will be relatively few cases of falsification.

It is planned to require one person to register for each family unit, the unit to include mother, father, children and wards. Other persons living in a household must register separately for their books, except in such unusual cases as those of invalids, etc.

When a consumer buys sugar and the storekeeper tears stamps out of the ration book, these stamps must be pasted on a card by the storekeeper. He then must turn these cards in to a supplier of sugar in order to replenish the store's supply of sugar.

Thomas, Jr., of New Orleans, wife of the Commandant of the Eighth Naval District, it was announced today by Eighth Naval District Headquarters.

Launching date of the destroyer, now under construction by the Consolidated Steel Co. at Orange, Tex., has been set for March 2. The second vessel of that name, the USS AULICK was named in honor of the late Commander John H. Aulick, U. S. Navy.

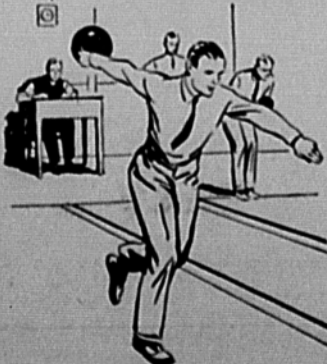

**CATTLE FEEDING TEST BEING MADE AT COLLEGE**

Lubbock, Feb. 12—A demonstration of fattening beef cattle, now in progress at Texas Tech, indicates that calves of good quality, which naturally command good prices, will make money provided they are stocked the first year and placed on a self-feeder as early as possible the second fall. Prof. W. L. Stangel, head of the animal husbandry department, says.

The department now has on feed two lots of yearling steers, one consisting of 10 Herefords, the other of 10 Aberdeen-Angus. The former, purchased November 23, 1940, at 10 cents a pound, averaged 471 pounds per head. The latter, bought December 9, 1940, at

\$40 per head, averaged 303 pounds. Both groups were handled as stocker steers until November 26, 1941, and during that period had access to field stubble, volunteer barley pasture, native and sudan grass pasture, and for a short time were fed sorghum silage supplemented with one pound of cottonseed meal per calf per day. During the stocking period the Herefords gained 375 pounds and the Angus 397 pounds per steer.

When placed in dry lot on self-feeder last November, the 10 Herefords averaged 846 pounds and the Angus 700 pounds. For a 56-day period beginning November 26, 1941, they were fed in self-feeder a concentrated mixture of 70 per cent milo head chop, 15 per cent cottonseed meal, and 15 per cent alfalfa hay. In addition they received sorghum silage daily in accordance with appetite.

At the end of the 56-day period the 10 Herefords weighed 1,034 pounds average and the Angus 886 pounds, a total gain per Here-

ford steer of 188 pounds and per Angus of 186 pounds. Daily average gains were 3.38 pounds for the former group and 3.32 pounds for the latter group.

"Charging all costs of feed to the steers from date of purchase until the day they went to the feed lot," Stangel said, "the cost of the 10 Herefords was \$7.45 per hundredweight and of the Angus \$8 per hundredweight. This compares with \$10.50 for some yearling steers that were purchased at the time these steers went on feed."

Proof that the feeding plan demonstrated is best on the plains, Stangel said, comes from the fact that average weights of 60 Hereford yearlings from the same herd as the original 10 calves, but kept on ranch pasture the first year, averaged 633 pounds at the same time the stocker steers weighed 846 pounds.

"Calves stocked during the first year and placed on self-feeder as early as possible during the second fall should attain market weights

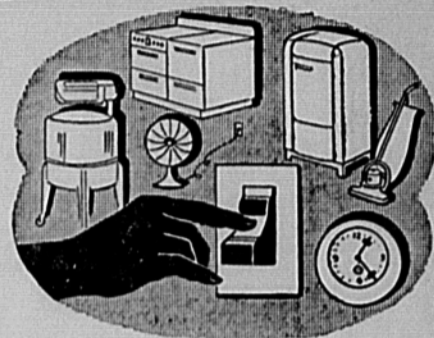
at an earlier age and at lower costs than by any other method of feeding one might follow under our plains conditions," he concluded.

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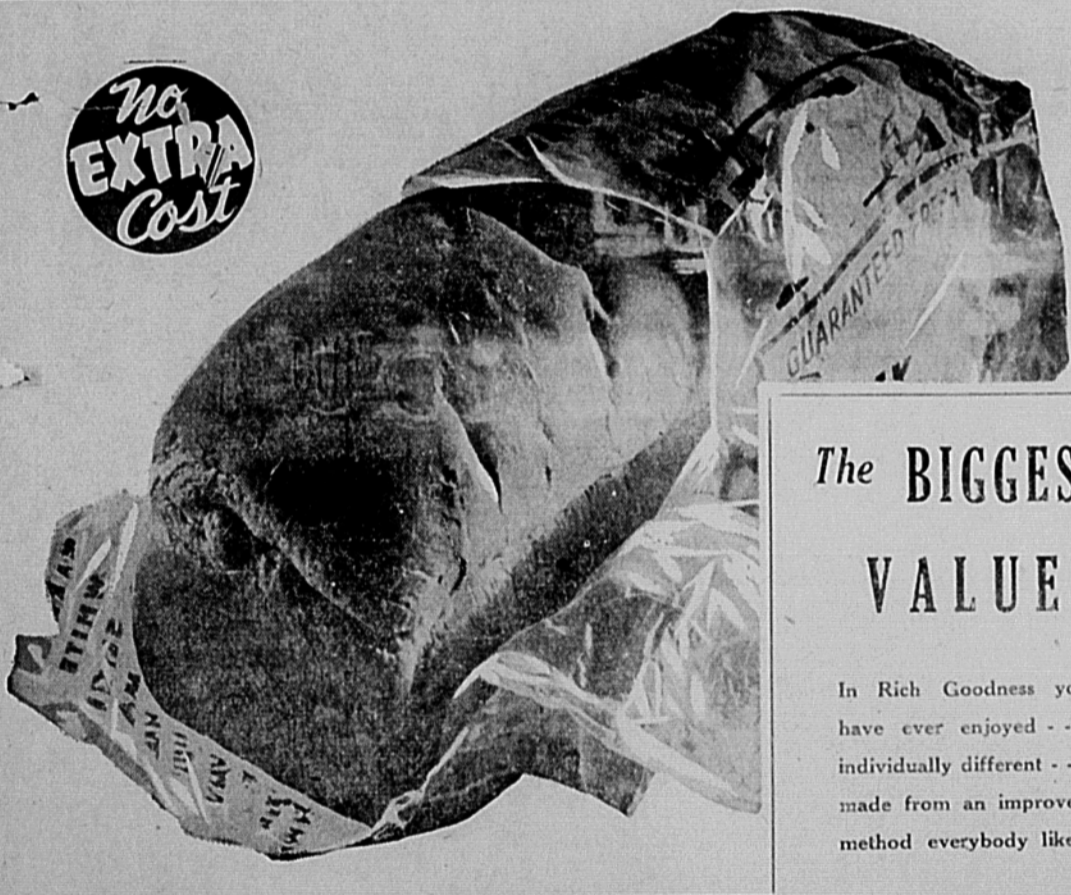
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
