## Post Office Receipts Down But Ahead Of Pre War Showing

Although the Slaton Postal receipts fell 30 per cent the first quarter of 1946 compared to the same quarter in 1945 the records show that the Slaton Post office did considerable more in the first quarter of 1946 than was done here in the first quarter of 1941, the year war started.

Comparative figures show that the peak of \$7536.00 was done in 1946 until the last of March the total was \$5245.00 while the same quarter in 1941 was \$3533.00.

The reason for the decline this year was due, according to the Post Master's analysis, to the decline in air mail letters and parcels to men overseas and to distant points in the United States.

This is not an unusual state of affairs as nearly all communities in the country have been affected the same way.

No activity has been manifested recently in the building of new Post Offices over the country and Slaton's claim to the third place in receipts for this area still stands.

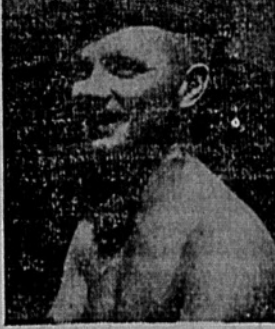

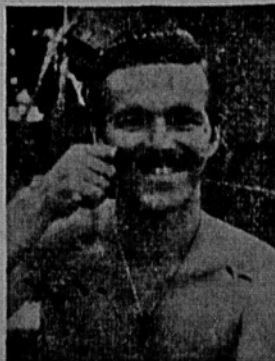

Regular mowing, rotation grazing and applications of superphosphate fertilizer has made pastures a year 'round proposition for Mr. Montgomery. Altogether, 24 different kinds of grasses and clovers can be found on the place. Some silage crops are produced, together with Johnson grass and alfalfa for hay. Giant bermuda is a specialty of the ranch and is proving its worth not only as a pasture grass, but as a soil binder.

### FERTILIZER THAT MAKES VEGETABLES GROW FAST

COLLEGE STATION. — Since the problem of what commercial fertilizer to use on which vegetables often arises, J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the Texas

ed area in the center. The stock grazed almost exclusively on the mowed portion.

Small live oak shrubs have been effectively controlled on the Koontz Ranch, Victoria, by using a heavily weighted cylinder cutter of the Caldwell Stalk Cutter type.

A. and M. College Extension Service, offers the following suggestions on the subject.

Commercial fertilizers that are available from most seed stores are 4-12-4, 5-10-5, and 6-8-4. For leafy vegetables such as lettuce, mustard, kale and spinach, Mr. Rosborough advises 6-8-4 because the higher percentage of nitrogen will stimulate rapid growth of the foliage. For root crops such as lettuce, carrots, radishes, and turnips, a 4-12-4 mixture is probably best. For tomatoes and peppers, as well as eggplant, a 5-10-5 mixture is recommended. If only one fertilizer is to be used for all vegetables, a 5-10-5 would be the best choice.

In applying fertilizer, the proper rate is five pounds per 100 feet of row space. The fertilizer should be thoroughly mixed with the soil before the seed are planted. Where vegetables already have been planted, fertilizer may be used as a side dressing. In side dressing, take the corner of the hoe and open the furrow three to four inches deep on either side of the young growing vegetables. Sprinkle the fertilizer in the furrow, then mix it with the soil and refill the furrow. To make cucumbers "grow like magic", a side dressing of 5-10-5 will do the job.

After the plants have begun to grow and have reached the height of 12 to 28 inches, a second furrow toward the ends of the runners with an application of three to four pounds additional fertilizer will keep them coming.

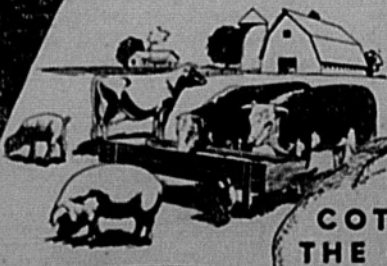

**Silver Stars To Shine At A & M**

COLLEGE STATION — Silver stars will shine in a brilliant constellation at Texas A. & M. College during the Victory Homecoming and Memorial Muster ceremonies April 19-21.

The inspirational climax of the Homecoming will be the Easter Morning services in Kyle Field. This traditional San Jacinto Day Aggie Muster has been opened to the public for the first time, and is expected to draw an audience of more than 10,000 persons. It is on this program that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Army Chief of Staff, will speak. The Muster will be a memorial service for the 694 Texas A. & M. men who died in World War I and II.

The college in awarding honorary degrees to all of its former students who attained the rank of general does so in the name of all the Texas A. & M. men who served in the armed forces, an estimated 20,000—one-half of its living alumni. It has been definitely determined that 14 former generals will be on hand to receive their degrees. The brigadier generals who have assured college officials they will be on hand include Oscar B. 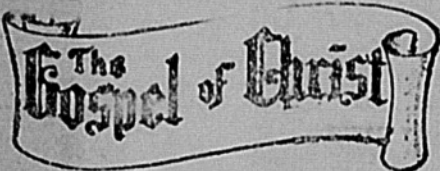

WHEN just about everybody has spending money in their pockets because they can't find enough of the things they want to buy, that is where inflation begins. The results are quite natural. Automatically people start bidding against each other for such items as they do find, and prices advance far beyond real values. Then, no matter what we buy, we are squandering money.

In order to cure inflation we need more things to buy. That's all it takes. If I need a hat and can find only one that fits my head and suits my taste, the dealer can (unless restrained by law) charge me whatever he wishes. I may rebel at the price but somebody else will pay it and the merchant will not need to worry about me. What will set the matter straight? More hats!

Flexing WHEN suitable hats Prices are offered by every haberdasher in town, some competitor is certain to lower his prices to increase sales. Another will try to outdo him, and this competition continues until falling prices get too near cost to go lower. It is that simple. Goods are the scare-crows that frighten away inflation. Whatever interferes with the production of merchandise only makes inflation worse.

Inflation is like hunger. It is a want that has the full force of a need. Hunger includes a craving that throws a person's sense of values completely out of plumb. Food is the only satisfactory answer to the hunger question

and, just so, goods are the only sound solution to inflation. There are trick ways to hold prices down, when goods have to be scarce, but they are only temporary help.

Healthy ONCE in a while some Demand body has a strange ailment that makes eating impossible, or very dangerous. Physicians deny such a patient food while they try to adjust the malady. Sometimes they use drugs to make the patient sleep and forget his craving; sometimes they flow energizing liquids into the blood-stream, but it's no diet. Every regulation that retards production now should be removed or relaxed in the public interest.

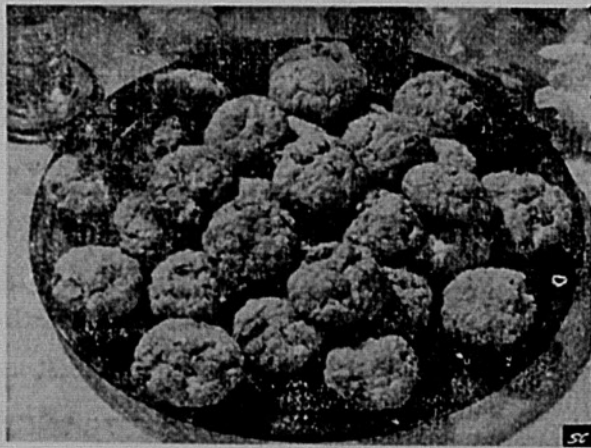

**Vets Can Get Farm Assistance**

**COLLEGE STATION.**—Veterans who wish to catch up on wartime farming developments or to obtain assistance on their first entry into some farming activity will find local representatives of the U.S.D.A. and cooperating state agencies ready to help them, according to J. L. Matthews, assistant in agricultural planning for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

First stop for the farm-bound veteran should be the county agricultural agent. His job is to help all farmers and he has been designated to work with returning servicemen. The county agent, whose office is generally at the court house, can answer almost any question relating to agriculture or will refer the veteran to farm agencies working in special fields.

In most agricultural counties, veterans can obtain the practical and valuable counsel of working farmers, serving on the county veterans advisory committee. This committee may be approached through the county agent.

County AAA committees are ready to give assistance available under the AAA conservation program, either in the form of cash payments or in conservation of materials and services.

Farm Security Administration long term loans can be arranged through county FSA personnel. The National Farm Loan Association

**Tex. Employment Shows Decline**  
AUSTIN.—A survey of manufacturing and non-manufacturing industries in Texas for February show decline in employment in Texas industry, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.  
In a survey of 1,689 industrial and commercial establishments, the number of wage earners decreased 4.9 per cent in February, in comparison with January. The February, 1946 figure was a 2.9 per cent drop under February, 1945.  
Payroll statistics show that there was a decline of 5.7 per cent in February over January, and a 4.4 per cent decline over February, 1945.

What is your **GUESS?** on our profits...?



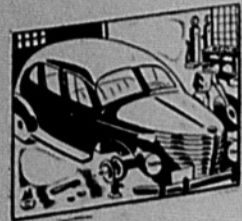

**TO ALL INTERNATIONAL HARVESTER DEALERS:**

I am glad to be able to tell you that the long strike in our farm equipment factories is settled, subject to ratification of the agreement by the local unions involved and the actual signing of contracts between the various plants and the local unions. We know how much the strike has meant to you in lost sales and how much it has meant to your customers in lack of needed equipment. We will do all we can to make up for the lost time.

The necessary preliminaries should be out of the way and most, if not all, of the local union contracts signed in the early part of next week. Thereafter we will call employees back to work as rapidly as possible. Naturally, after the long shutdown, there is much maintenance work which must be done, and certain operations involving furnaces which operate at high temperatures will require several days of preparation. I believe it is reasonable to expect that most of the plants will be operating at or near capacity within about two weeks of the time they reopen, barring unforeseen contingencies.

Thereafter we will get machines and service parts to you as rapidly as possible. We recognize the importance of providing service parts for machines already in use. Some time, of course, will be required to "fill the pipelines" from the factories to the branches and to you. For a while, therefore, machines, will come in a trickle rather than in a flood, even though production is going ahead at full speed.

For example, consider our situation on combines. Our maximum capacity for combines of all types is about 400 machines a week. Several thousands of dealers want combines. So, even though we are producing at capacity, it will not be possible to fill all orders at once. In this situation we must naturally ship the early production to the areas where the need is most immediate. The same general considerations will apply to other machines.

During the strike, there was some indication of a feeling by farmers that the Company was holding back machines which were finished and on hand, in anticipation of higher prices. That was totally untrue. We provided you and, through you, the farmers with every salable machine in our possession. We held nothing back.

Now, because we will be back in production, it may be expected that such rumors will circulate during the period when we will be "filling the pipelines." We believe it is to your interest as well as ours to make sure that your customers understand the true situation and we hope you will carefully explain the situation to your customers. I can assure you that the Company will not hold back any machines in the expectation of price relief. We are too conscious of the farmers' need for machines in this food crisis, and of your need for goods to sell. We will ship machines as rapidly as we can produce them.

On behalf of the Company I want to thank you for your patience, your understanding and your encouragement during the troubled times we have been passing through. We truly appreciate your support. We will try to show our appreciation by rapid production and the best service possible. We believe better times are ahead for both of us.
