GOOD FEED BRINGS
HIGH EGG OUTPUT

Good egg production reflects
a high rate of feed consump-
tion in your laying flock. Other
factors being equal, chick-
ens which are strong eaters and
get a balanced diet will
output others that consume
less feed or are on a diet lack-
ing one or more of the essen-
tial elements.

A good poultryman will
make certain that his flock
gets a balanced ration contain-
ing the right kinds as well as
the right amounts, of food
nutrients. Proteins, carbohy-
drates, fats, minerals and vit-
amins all are essential to good
poultry health and high pro-
duction, and when there is a
deficiency of any one of them
a slump in egg output must
be anticipated.

DAILY CONSUMPTION

A flock in high production
will consume feed daily at the
rate of 25 pounds per bird for
light breeds and 30 pounds per
100 for heavy breeds. At the
peak of production the daily
consumption may ascend to 30
pounds for the 'lights' and 40
pounds for the 'heavies.'

The amount and kind of pro-
tein in the feed is of particu-
lar importance because of the
high protein content of an egg.
Without sufficient protein the
laying hen is hampered in
'manufacturing' her eggs be-
cause one of the essential 'raw
materials' is deficient in quan-
tity. Protein should constitute
15 or 16 per cent of a laying
bird's ration. It is desirable
for part of the protein to be
of animal origin (such as milk
products, meat scraps, tankage
and fishmeal) and the remain-
der to be of plant origin.

CALCIUM A REQUIREMENT

Calcium must have a place
in your flock's feed to provide
the layers with the material
needed in egg shell formation.
Chicks require it, too, to build
sturdy bones. Starting and
growing mashers should con-
tain an adequate amount of
ground oyster shell or lime-
stone to aid bone formation.
When birds are in production
an extra amount of clean
oyster shell should be provided
in hoppers because all laying
birds do not require the same
amount of calcium for egg-
shell production, and even a
good mash may not provide
the calcium needed by some
birds.

Grit may be fed in a section
of the oyster shell hopper or
in separate container.

Water comprises the great-
est part of any egg, so it
should be available at all
times. There should be ample
room around the fountains to
avoid crowding and to help
keep water consumption at the
desired level for all birds.

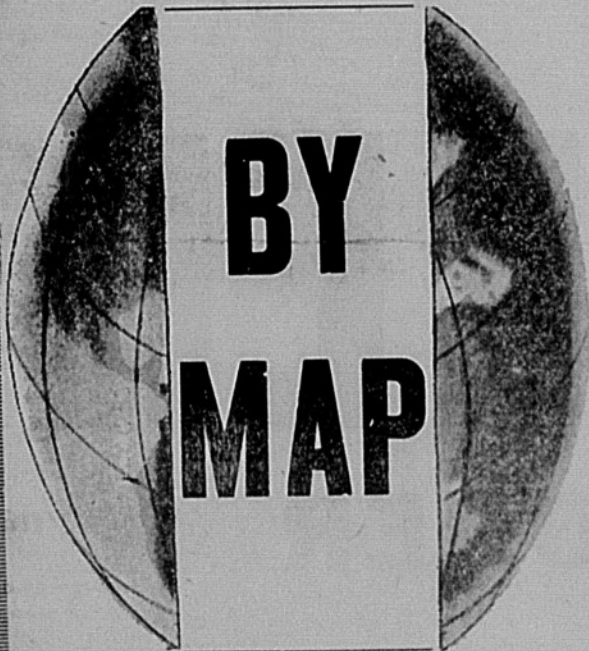

Mrs. G. A. Brown, who used to live in Slaton, is now in a place which is drier and hotter than West Texas, if possible. It is Wellington, Kansas. Mrs. Brown sent the following clipping from the Wichita Beacon and if we do not have moisture in Slaton soon I am going to take it up with all of the recently elected office holders, have some resolutions passed, have some dynamite shot off, continue to fill all of the cooking utensils full of water every time there is enough water in the mains to do so.

Here is the contribution from the Beacon:

Vic Phillips, Wichita's popular weatherman (he'd be MORE popular if he'd predict—and produce—some rain and cooler weather), has just returned from an extended air trip to several eastern cities, including Washington, D. C. While in the nation's capital, Phillips decided he'd see what he could do toward getting some rain for Kansas. In his own words, here's what happened: "I appeared before Congress and told both the Senate and the House that I thought Wichita was entitled to a little moisture. Both bodies, by a voice vote, recommended that I see the Kansas congressmen privately after the session. So I went to see them and was told to take my troubles to the secretary of the interior. He thought I should tell the OPA about it, but the OPA said they couldn't do anything about it without a recommendation from the department of agriculture. Well, I

went over there and they said we weren't raising enough farm products in Kansas. I pledged that Kansas would raise more grain and produce if they'd just let us have some rain, so they sent me to the FBI to "investigate" why we hadn't had more rain in the past. The FBI thought I should see the department of justice, which found that—sure enough—we hadn't been getting justice. They sent me to the NRA and they said they had no jurisdiction because that bureau had ceased to exist. The NRA suggested I see the attorney general who, in turn, had me carry case to the supreme court. I argued the case myself before that august and distinguished assembly, but the court had me appear before the postmaster general in order to ascertain if there IS such a place as Kansas. The postmaster general sent me to the secretary of navy who said he couldn't help me because Kansas is an inland state. He suggested the war department

so I went to see that secretary and he said I should hire myself a good attorney. Well, I hired an attorney. After two days of conference with him, he looked up the laws governing Kansas, said he'd found Kansas was a "dry" state, and therefore not entitled to any rain because rain would make it a "wet" state and that would be illegal under the Kansas state law. However, he suggested I go before Congress and tell the congressmen my troubles; so, finding myself right back where I started, I returned to Kansas to see what I could do here. I'M STILL TRYING! And just like the steer, that's all ANYONE can do!"

The popularity of sausage tight slacks must be waning and I am sorry to see that play suits and shorts are taking their place. The slacks left just a little bit to ones imagination but the shorts give very little reign for ones fancy. There is not that temptation to

get a wide board and slip up on some tight fitting slack and to me most of the play suits give the wearers a rather raw appearance and I want to get them a sheet or something to cover up with.

I'm in favor of having a Public meeting for the purpose of discussing what can be done to make Slaton a better place in which to live. There are probably a good many people who have suggestions to make, others who would like to help do the work . . . A paint up campaign for stores and business houses would not be a bad idea, it would most certainly help the looks of the town and as I have said before Slaton needs some new signs and repairing done. It is ridiculous to look and see grocery store signs over plumbing shops and drug store signs over jewelry stores etc . . . The new places of business that have gone into operation here have made considerable improvement in the looks of our business district and those who have done nothing to improve their building could do well to look at their establishments with a critical eye. A little paint can make a lot of difference. There are men who would likely be interested in promoting additions to Slaton and perhaps some one might have enough faith in the future to promote small acreage farms and perhaps some big manufacturing concerns could be persuaded to construct plants here.

Canning factories are being constructed in many parts of Texas. Hereford has one that has just been completed and they are advertising for thousands of pounds of peas, this is a better black eyed pea section than Hereford and if some outside capitalists are not interested perhaps some local man or men would like to undertake such ventures.

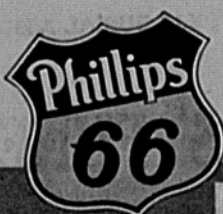

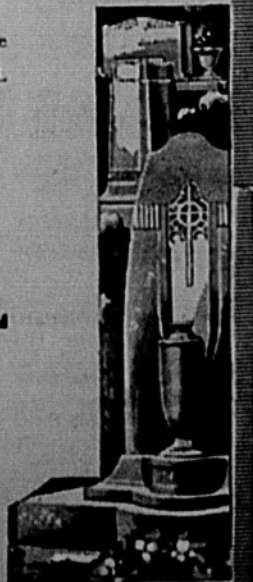

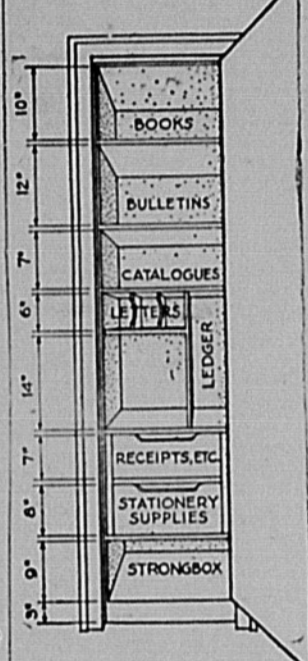

Many Married Men Attending Tech

One hundred nineteen students will be graduated from Texas Technological College in commencement exercises August 28, W. P. Clement, registrar, has announced. O. B. Ratliff of Lubbock, formerly of Haskell and Spur, member of the Tech board of directors, will deliver the address. He is the only former Tech student ever to serve on the board and is the first ex-student invited to be commencement speaker.

More than one-fourth of students enrolled for the present summer term at Tech are married veterans of World War II. Total enrollment is 2,010, surpassing the 1934 total of 1934. There are 520 married veterans, 191 of them freshmen, 134 sophomores, 103

juniors, 72 seniors, and 20 graduate students.

Students of Texas Technological College working their way through school partially or entirely may be employed an unlimited number of hours beginning in the fall provided they have a 2.1 point, or 86, average, the Council of Academic Deans has announced. The provision has been set up as an experiment. Students with a lower grade average will be permitted to work a limited number of hours as stated in the catalogue, it was announced.

S. J. R. No. 5 A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have been printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or Counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Funds, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One

Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or Counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Funds, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof *) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND AUTHORIZING COUNTIES TO PROVIDE SUCH SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE COUNTIES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND AUTHORIZING COUNTIES TO PROVIDE SUCH SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE COUNTIES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

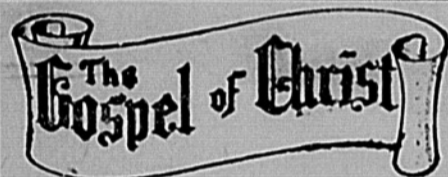

Cedar Needles A Source Of Oil

Research in the extraction of oil from cedarwood needles and cedarwood, is now underway in the chemical engineering department of the University of Texas.

Aided by a \$750 scholarship from Trubek Laboratories of East Rutherford, N. J., the study will be started on a wide scale, with the cedarbrake area of Central Texas as the basis of study. An area estimated at 3,000,000 acres is covered by the cedar of two types: eastern cedar, and Mexican juniper.

MORE CHICKEN AND LESS CATTLE GO FROM TEXAS

Thirty-eight carloads of chickens were shipped from Texas in June, 1946, compared with 16 carloads in June, 1945, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

A study of rail shipments of poultry and eggs was made by the Bureau in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Egg shipments in June totaled 589 carloads, compared with 715 for June, 1945, and 1,036 in May, 1946.

Turkeys shipped during June totaled 15 carloads, compared with 17 carloads shipped in June, 1945. One carload of turkey eggs was shipped in June, 1946.

The Big Secret



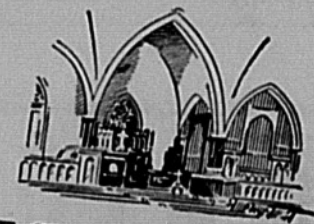

Much of the simplicity and innocence of childhood can be preserved in a favorable environment. The dross that so often appears in later life is due to wrong impressions gained during these early years, when the little minds are plastic.

It is the task of the home to inculcate ideals of right thinking and right living in the minds of children; for the homes of our children build the characters of the people and shape the destinies of the nation.

We must build again our family life in America, and re-establish its foundations on the solid virtues which make lives beautiful and strong. We must create conditions in which the simplicity and innocence of childhood

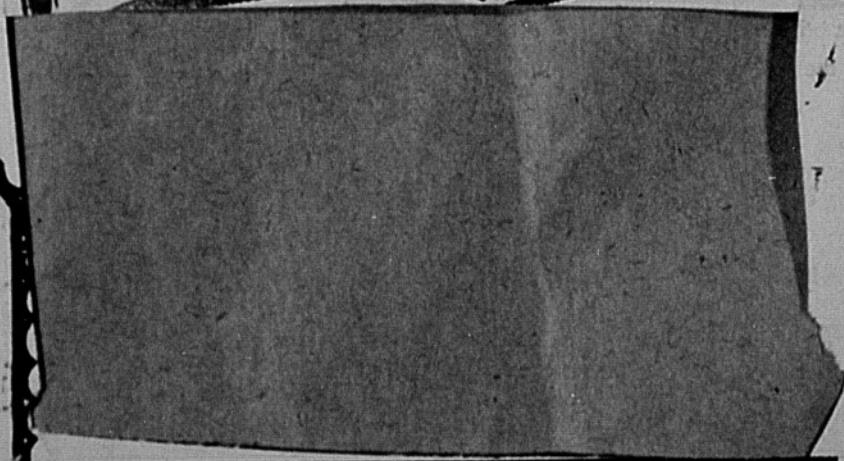
