## Lt. Edgar Reese Wins Bronze Star

HQ. U. S. FORCES, SHANGHAI, CHINA.—The award of the Bronze Star Medal to First Lt. Edgar G. Reese, Slaton, for "meritorious service" has recently been announced by Lt. Gen. A. C. Wedemeyer, commanding general of the United States Forces, China Theater.

The citation issued in conjunction with this award reads as follows:

"First Lt. Edgar G. Reese, Corps of Engineers, Army of the United States, is awarded the Bronze Medal for meritorious service during the period from Nov. 25, 1944, to March 15, 1945. As operations officer for the 1381st Engineer Petroleum Distribution Company, Lt. Reese was charged with the immediate supervision of the construction work of the four-inch gasoline pipeline between Yungping and Hsiakwan, China, a distance of approximately 200 kilometers. Handicapped by the rugged terrain, inadequate supply of materials and equipment, and untrained native labor, it was necessary for him to spend long and arduous hours of work in the detailed planning, careful utilization of supplies and personnel, and personal supervision of the work. This project included not only the construction of the pipeline over rugged, mountainous country, but also necessitated the construction of cable lines across swift rivers and up steep mountain sides, in order to distribute the materials. Through his unusual technical skill, organizing ability and determination, Lt. Reese successfully completed his mission and began operation of the pipeline six days before the target date. His unwavering devotion to duty, professional knowledge and exemplary performance reflect great credit upon himself and upon the Armed Forces of the United States."

Capt. and Mrs. E. G. Reese arrived in Slaton Sunday to visit Capt. Reese's mother, Mrs. W. G. Reese.

Recently returned from the China, Burma Theater, Captain Reese reported to Fort Sam Houston where he received discharges from the Armed Forces.

### In Washington

On April 12 I plan to appear before the House Committee on Education in behalf of legislation to expand the vocational training programs in the high schools of the nation.

Aside from the over-all national requirements, there is a need for the reopening of the 24 Vocational Agriculture Departments that were closed in our own Congressional District by reason of the war. Additional units are also being sought for other high schools in our area.

A number of additional Homemaking Departments are also needed. In fact, in the state of Texas it is estimated that more than 400 additional Homemaking and Vocational Agriculture Departments are required to complete the vocational training set-up in the high schools.

Texas schools have shown tremendous interest in vocational training. In the high schools of our 25-county Congressional District there are 51 Homemaking Departments and 36 Vocational Agriculture Departments now in operation.

Our Congressional District occupies a high place among the 21 Congressional Districts of Texas in the field of vocational training and in the number of vocational training departments. In the number of Homemaking Departments, we share top honors with Congressional District No. 7, represented by Tom Pickett of Palestine, which also has 51 Departments. In the number of Vocational Agriculture Departments, we rank No. 3 among the Congress-

sional Districts. District No. 21, represented by Fisher of San Angelo, occupies first place, and Pickett's District occupies second place.

Vocational training departments in the schools are financed under a system of State and Federal cooperation, the system having been in operation since 1917. Benefits that have accrued to the nation are immeasurable.

The chances are excellent that Congress will approve the bill for additional cooperation with the states in vocational training and that many new departments will be placed in operation in West Texas schools when the new terms open next August and September.

Congressman Adams Powell, the colored member from the Harlem District in New York, created quite a flurry in the House of Representatives a few days ago. He offered an amendment to an appropriation bill for the District of Columbia which would have put an end to the time-honored practice in Washington of maintaining separate schools for the white and colored children. After a half hour of heated debate, the vote was taken. Congressman Joe Martin, the leader of the Republicans in the House, and 48 other members, about evenly divided between the Democrats and Republicans, voted for the Powell amendment. The rest of us who were on the floor at the time, 122 in number, voted against the Powell amendment. We voted to continue separate schools for white and colored children.

There is no likelihood that Congress would tolerate the consolidation of schools for the white and colored children in Washington, and Congressman Powell did a dis-

### CHECK FARM MACHINES FOR ACCIDENT HAZARDS

With the high crop requirements and shortage of new machinery, a higher farm accident toll is apt to result this year unless proper precautions are taken, says R. B. Hickerson, assistant state farm labor supervisor for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

The fundamental step in the safe operation of machinery is to put it in good condition when field work starts, says Mr. Hickerson. Defective hitches, seats, clutches, wheels, brakes, steering mechanism, and unguarded revolving parts are things to check for. The National Safety Council as Chicago reports that many fatal accidents have been caused by failures of makeshift seats and unguarded power take-off shafts.

Clean all dirt, trash and grease from platforms, pedals, foot rests or steps to assure safe footing, Mr. Hickerson says.

Special care should be taken in checking homemade labor-saving equipment for accident hazards. The operator's safety often is overlooked in the development of this type of equipment, and accidents can easily offset all other advantages of such equipment.

Poorly conditioned farm machinery is irritating and fatiguing to the operator. It reduces his alertness and encourages carelessness.

**Fats From Cotton Needed**

"Appeals by the President's famine relief committee for fats and oils conservation indicate the critical need for increased cotton production to supply cottonseed oil and feed products. Larger fat and feed production can be achieved certainly and quickly by producing more cotton in 1946."—Texas Cotton Production Committee.

**Dusting Pays -59.78 Acre**

"In 1945 Jess Radle, Texas cotton farmer, made \$59.78 an acre by dusting his cotton crop. By making five to seven applications of calcium arsenate to control the boll weevil and two applications of DDT-sulphur dust to kill the boll worm, he increased his yield 391.6 pounds of lint cotton per acre."—Progressive Farmer.

**500 Per Cent Increase**

"Terracing, proper fertilization and the use of soil building crops in growing cotton may increase yields as much as 500 per cent."—Louisiana Extension Service.

**Feed Depends on Cotton**

"There can be no appreciable increase in domestic supply of protein meals until the 1946 cotton crop is harvested. If the cotton production goal of 20 million acres produces a good yield, the feed situation will be vastly improved."—J. A. Shanklin, North Carolina Extension Cotton Specialist.

**More Cotton Incentive**

"Because of less acreage and smaller yield, stocks of cotton and its by-products have dwindled greatly—so much that people in every community are suffering today for need of cotton and cottonseed products. There is even more incentive this year for farmers to plant more cotton than in the past."—Magnolia, Mississippi Gazette.

**Cotton Before Corn**

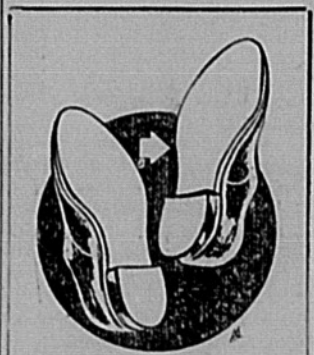
"Alabama farmers who plant cotton ahead of corn are making better yields of both crops. Most farmers plant corn first, but this causes corn to be too early and cotton to be too late to take advantage of most favorable conditions."—Alabama Extension Service.

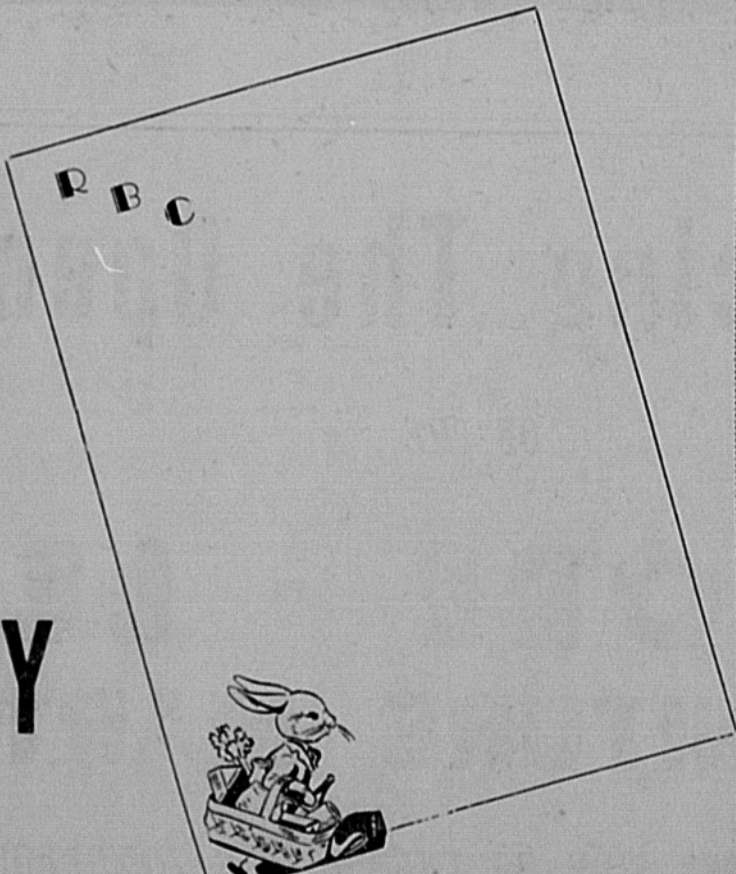

it is impossible to be very smart and if one will furnish me with a hook, a line and a sinker, I'll just give up trying.

Now that I have stuck my neck out as a weather prophet I am going to stick to the job. There will be good rains before long and there will be a big crop of fruit but the wind will blow a lot of it off the limbs, hail will bruise most of what is left and the June bugs will get the few peaches that are still on the trees in late summer. The farmers will howl about it being too wet in June, then they'll gripe to high heaven about the boll worms during June and July and they'll have to poison a few cows, a hog or two and a dog with powder intended for the bugs; a million Mexicans will swarm over the country and the farmers will all say that they lost money because the labor for picking the cotton was more than they got out of it, but next year you'll find Judge Smith, W. T. Davis, Howard Swanner, Charley Austin, E. R. Legg, Sam Gentry and all the rest of the poor fellows who have been losing money year after year for the past 20 years, planting acre after acre of cotton again. My heart bleeds for them.

There is an old saying that "He who tooteth not his own horn, the same shall not be tooted" but it has been my observation that a lot of folks toot but there is no tune to their music and about all they do is make a lot of noise.

About the first observation a stranger in town makes about Slaton is that it is laid out so peculiarly and that there is no way for even the natives to give instructions as to locations of homes or business houses. Try to tell some one else where a certain residence or business house is and you immediately get so balled up that you find yourself pointing in every direction except straight up or straight down.

This reminds me of a man who lived in my home town of Paris,

Texas. He had a paint and wall paper establishment three doors from the Post Office. He stuttered badly and when a stranger asked him early one morning where the Post Office was located he replied, "You go-o-o, you go-o-o-o, y-y-you go, oh hell, you can get there before I can tell you."

Slaton is in as bad a fix as this paint dealer because we have no street markers. The town is so queerly laid out that one one can tell you how to reach any certain point and you can accidentally get where you want to go quicker than you can by trying to follow directions. We need street markers of some kind worse than we need most anything.

While in the old story telling mood I would like to repeat one that used to be told on two people in Paris. One day a belligerent kind of woman met a red-headed lawyer on the street. The lawyer, as was often the case, was under the influence of some of the liquid that makes men brave. The woman said, "If you were my husband I'd give you poison," and the lawyer replied, "If you were my wife I'd take it."

Very few of us realize how fortunate we are out here in the part of the country that most folks in more favored spots, such as California and Florida, consider a desert and a dust bowl. A visitor in our home whose home is in California, went into a grocery store with my wife and the visitor stood around goggle eyed while my wife bought butter, cream and steak. When we got home the visitor said a display of meat in a butcher's show case would cause a riot. They are lucky, she said, if they have a little butter on their bread once a

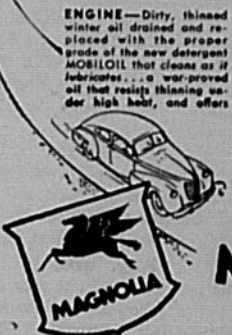

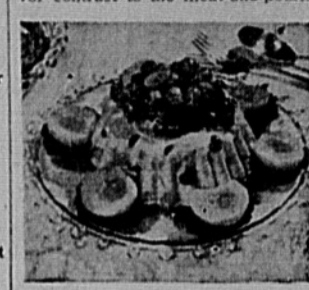

**Crown Fruit Salad**  
1 tbsp. undrained  
2 tbsp. cold water  
1 c. fruit juice  
(peach, cherry, or  
apple or pineapple)  
Lettuce  
1/2 c. light cream  
1/2 c. mayonnaise  
2 canned peaches  
or pears, sliced  
1 orange, sliced  
1/2 c. maraschino  
cherries

Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. This molded fruit salad is lovely to serve at a buffet supper.

**FOOD TO BE PACKED IN NEW CONTAINER**

The expected growth of self-service food markets in the near future will be a strong force for better packaging as well as for prepackaging of fresh fruits, vegetables and meats, according to Miss Myrtle Murray, specialist in home industries for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

The housewife shopper will influence both the appearance and the materials of packaging, says Miss Murray. She will look for packages that are convenient to handle and store, preserve the fresh qualities of the food, and do not add much cost to the purchase.

The prepackaging of meats, frozen and fresh, will increase as soon as packaging materials are available and stores can be equipped with refrigerated display cases. The shopper will then select the desired cut of meat from a cooled cabinet instead of waiting for the butcher to cut the meat and wrap it. Meat probably will be

wrapped in transparent film covering with a cardboard 'boat' underneath to hold it firm for display and convenient handling. A label on each package will give information as to cut, grade, weight and possibly cooking instructions.

The packaging of fresh vegetables in retail stores is increasing steadily. New transparent film wrappings are making it possible to pack the cleaned trimmed vegetable near where it is grown so that it will hold more of its freshness, flavor and nutritive value in shipping and on display. Cost will be saved by avoiding the shipping of waste parts of the vegetable, and time will be saved in preparing it for the table.

Miss Murray advises housewives to be sure the food they buy has not been chopped, shredded, broken, cut or bruised. These conditions cause food to lose some of its freshness, flavor and nutritive value which packaging otherwise will preserve.

John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board in Lubbock, was in Slaton Wednesday for the purpose of assisting persons who had questions regarding Social Security, or who wished to file a claim for Social Security benefits, or who needed Social Security account number cards.

Women workers should notify

the Social Security Board when they marry so their names can be changed on the board's records at Baltimore.

If they do this they will make it easier for themselves and the board when the time comes to file claims for old-age and survivors insurance benefits.

For the women who marries and wants to change her name, the board has provided a special form,

which may be obtained at the local field office of the board. She should fill it out, attach the social security card bearing her maiden name and send the form to the board.

The board does not assign her a new number, but issues a new card bearing her present name and the number that was originally assigned to her. She thus will have only one social security number during her entire lifetime. If she had more than one number, she might stand to lose her benefits.

The board keeps all information it receives from the worker strictly confidential.

The worker may obtain further information from Mr. Palmer, who will be again in Slaton at the Post Office on May 8, 1946.

**SCHOOL BUILDING TO BE STUDIED AT T. U.**

Long range planning of new public school buildings in Texas will be discussed by school and state officials when a plant workshop is held this summer at the University of Texas.

The workshop has been set for June 25-28 inclusive, with representatives of state health and education departments, and official teachers' organizations present to talk over means and methods for building or remodeling school plants.

"There are several common errors we hope to overlook when building or remodeling within the next few years," Dr. Hob Gray, in charge of the workshop, said.

"These include such things as placing schools in areas which are declining in school population; failure to design buildings so that they are adapted to the community's civic and recreational needs; failure to determine locations where new school facilities are and will be needed."

Sponsors of the workshop in addition to the University are the Texas Study of Secondary Education, the state departments of health and education, and Texas Association of School Administrators.

"Officials estimate that between 75 and 100 million dollars will be spent on public school buildings within the next few years," Dr. Gray said.

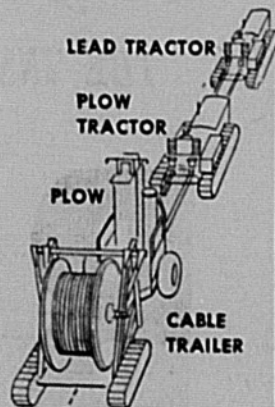

**New circuits are on the way**

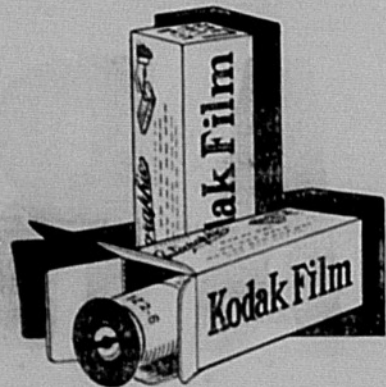
Here's how long distance underground cable is plowed in ..



A new coast-to-coast "coaxial" cable now being laid underground across the Southern route, in addition to providing new paths for radio broadcasts and television, will carry more long distance calls than the four other transcontinental telephone lines put together. It will have a capacity of 1,920 circuits.

## New Flour Is Better For You

Enriched 80 per cent flour, to be on grocery shelves soon, has the same vitamin content as enriched white flour, but is higher in protein value—energy—according to Miss Edith Lawrence, food preparation specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

The story of American flour, Miss Lawrence says, goes something like this: For many years modern white flour has been losing important values in milling. In order to have it white and fine, and of good keeping quality, the outer coat of the grain was removed. With it went around seven-eighths of the thiamine and niacin, three-fourths of the riboflavin, and four-fifths of the iron, as well as some calcium, phosphorus and better quality protein.

Some of these values were returned when bread was enriched with the three lost B-vitamins, thiamine, riboflavin and niacin, also iron.

Only about 65 per cent of the flour and flour products on the market, however, have been enriched. Flours rank in this order in nutritional values: whole wheat, enriched 80 per cent flour, enriched white flour, unenriched 80 per cent flour, and unenriched white flour.

The new 80 per cent flour is much finer and lighter in color than whole wheat flour. Unenriched it has only about 40 per cent as much thiamine as whole wheat flour, only half as much riboflavin and iron and a fourth as much niacin.

On the foods preparation end, tests conducted by the USDA Bureau of Home Economics under commercial baking conditions revealed that the difference in bread made with the old and new flours was not as great as had been expected. The loaves made from the 80 per cent flour did not rise quite as much as those from white flour, and the bread had a slightly off-white or creamy cast. The Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics has had reasonably good success in making biscuits and pastry with the 80 per cent flour.
