## Slaton Schools Get Much Additional Surplus War Goods

The Slaton Independent School District has been given approximately \$1500.00 additional Surplus Property by the Surplus Property Administration. This material consists of mechanical tools and machines that can be used in the Agricultural department of the schools under the direction of A. C. Strickland.

Superintendent Kavanaugh and Mr. Strickland report that the building in which the agricultural and mechanical instructions are given is so full of equipment now that there is not room to do the work and the School Board has authorized Mr. Strickland to use up to \$75.00 on experiments in making concrete blocks with some of the equipment that has been received.

If Mr. Strickland, and the High School students who are interested in the work, are successful in making the blocks, Mr. Strickland believes that a large and substantial building for the Agricultural and Mechanical Departments of the school can be constructed by the students.

Such undertakings have been done at other schools and colleges and have proven very satisfactory. One instance is that at the West Texas State Teachers College at Canyon, where a football stadium and several buildings were built by the students.

## Slaton Delegates At Labor Meeting

W. F. Martin, V. P. Williams, Mrs. Eva Ecker and Mrs. W. F. Martin returned last Saturday from Fort Worth, where they attended the State Legislative Convention of the Four Railroad Brotherhoods. Mr. Martin went as a delegate of the B. of L. F. and E., and Mr. Williams as a delegate of the B. of L. E. Mrs. Ecker went as a delegate to the Auxiliary of the B. of L. F. and E.

Mr. Martin reported that the Big Four Brotherhoods—men who operate the trains—took an aggressive step for political action in Texas at the closing session of a biennial convention in Hotel Texas Thursday when they adopted a resolution, calling for the endorsement of state candidates favorable to labor in the Democratic Primaries this summer.

Resolutions were passed urging the convention delegates to organize campaigns in their home districts for the election of officials favorable to labor; urging re-submission in the Texas Legislature next January of House Bill 243, pertaining to safety measures in the operation of trains; request that the State Highway Department install safety reflectors at grade crossings, and urging a law to provide electric lights to replace oil lanterns on cabooses.

The B. of L. E. re-elected W. M. Conway, Ft. Worth, as chairman; H. L. Reynolds, Amarillo, first vice chairman; J. G. Carr, Cleburne, second vice chairman; Leen Krus, Houston, executive committee man, and W. E. Kinsey, Temple, secretary-treasurer.

The Order of Railway Conductors re-elected J. R. Erwin, Austin, chairman; I. M. Judd, Amarillo, vice chairman; J. A. Shields, Slaton, legislative representative; C. H. Bingham, Wichita Falls, alternate legislative representative, and J. W. Kennedy, Mineola, secretary-treasurer.

Elections were not held this year by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

## Over Three Miles Of Paving Completed Here Since Jan. 1

J. A. Fanning, asphalt contractor, of Lubbock and Midland, who has completed 50 blocks of paving inside the city limits of Slaton since the first of the year, reports that he has moved his equipment to other parts of the South Plains, but may come back here at a later date to work on several paving projects on which the property owners are considering having the work done.

The 50 blocks makes a total of over 3 miles of paving that has been done since the first of the year, however, this is a minor part of the paving that is in Slaton, and while no comparative figures are available, it is the opinion of many people who are familiar with most of the towns over the South Plains, that Slaton has more paved streets and alleys than any town of similar size in West Texas.

**ANALYSIS SHOWS SOUTH PLAINS SOIL EXCELLENT**

Analysis of West Texas soils conducted at Texas Technological College shows that the average soil in this area is low in phosphorus and nitrogen, moderately well supplied with potassium while most soils are low in organic matter, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department at Tech.

Fertilizers and irrigation are both highly desired and recommended in the production of most crops in West Texas, Young says.

Irrigation is profitable before planting in the case of both cotton and grain sorghums. For sorghums the general recommendation is one irrigation two or three weeks before planting and irrigation about the time sorghums are booting. Cotton fields should be irrigated in late March or early April and about two weeks prior to planting. The general practice for alfalfa is irrigation a week before each cutting of hay followed by another irrigation as each cutting is removed.

The recommended fertilizer for alfalfa meadows in this section is 3350 pounds 20 per cent superphosphate applied early in the spring before plant growth starts or otherwise immediately following removal of hay cutting. The fertilizer should be spread uniformly over the field and irrigated into the land.

No fertilizer recommendations are available for cotton on either irrigation or dry farming since experimental results to date indicate

**Grain Planting Urged in Texas**

Texas farmers are being urged to increase their planting of grains, especially corn and sorghums, in order to help alleviate the critical feed shortage. Prospective acreage reports, based on intentions to plant as of March 1, indicate that Texas farmers are falling far short of reaching the acreage goals set for corn and grain sorghums, according to B. F. Vance, state PMA director.

The corn planting goal for 1946 is 4,950,000, while prospective acreage is only 3,921,000 acres, 79 per cent of the goal. For sorghums the goal is 7,800,000, and indicated acreage is 7,045,000 acres, 90 per cent of the goal.

The Texas record for wheat and oats planting is much better, Vance declared, with 5,994,000 acres of wheat planted, 115 per cent of the 5,200,000 acre goal.

With feed supplies short and with great amounts of wheat being exported to starvation areas, the demand for all grains will continue, Vance said. He called upon Texas farmers to go over their plans and to increase production of grain this year if at all possible.

West Texas soils are sufficiently fertile to provide cotton plants with the necessary food elements, Young says.

Under irrigation it is believed that an application of one to two hundred pounds superphosphate would be helpful in the production of grain sorghums on soils which are low in phosphorus.

In all cases under irrigation additions of barnyard manure up to eight tons per acre per year will be beneficial.

# Cotton Burs Now Worth Big Money

LUBBOCK.—Between ten and fifteen million dollars worth of cotton burs which could be processed into commercial products are being thrown away or burned each year in Texas, according to C. G. Rook, associate director of the chemical and textile phases of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas located at Texas Technological College.

Commercial material economically procurable from cotton burs, research has shown, are a boiler water treating compound which acts as a scale inhibitor in hard water; furfural, an important chemical compound; a building board substance plastic filler; and fertilizer.

Furfural, one of the most important products obtainable from the cotton bur, has many various uses, including use in the synthesis of plastics, in fixing motor oils, in making aniline dyes, as a fungicide, and in the synthetic rubber industry in the recovery of butadiene. One Texas rubber plant alone uses approximately \$2500 worth of furfural daily.

For the past two years Rook has been working on cotton bur research at Texas Tech under sponsorship of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas. He has developed a pilot plant for experimental work to determine substances which could be obtained from the cotton bur, and if such products could be produced economically in industry.

### THIS WEEK'S LESSON

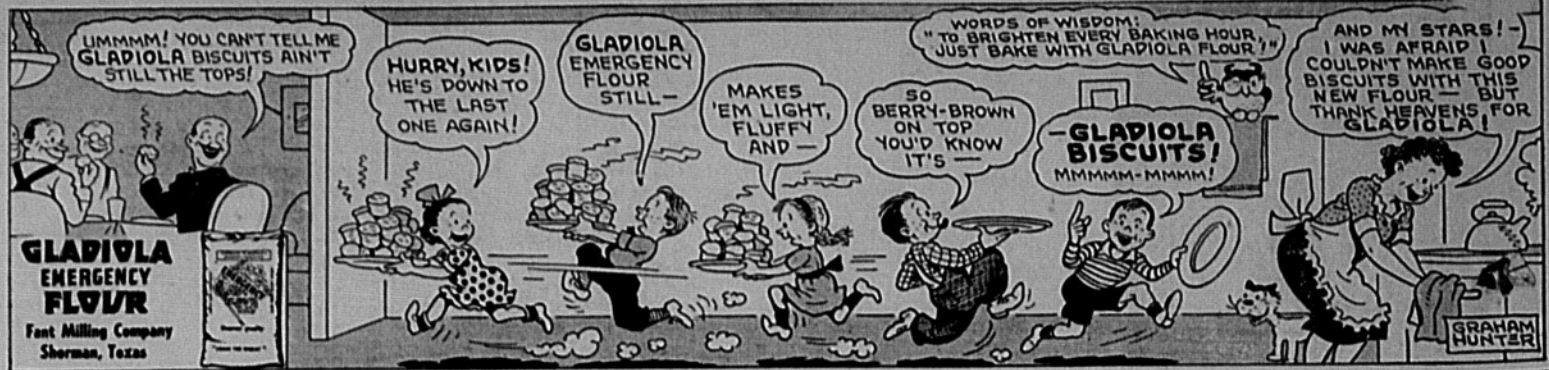

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# In Washington

By GEORGE MAHON

Legislation is in the making which will provide so-called terminal leave pay to enlisted men of the Army and Navy. The policy of providing terminal leave pay for officers and denying it to enlisted men cannot be justified. The Military Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives is giving consideration to the proposed legislation, and I expect to vote for the bill when it is considered in the House.

During the war, commissioned officers, particularly those overseas, had little chance to take this "leave", and it was permitted to accumulate and the officer was paid for this "leave" at the termination of his active service.

Enlisted men were allowed certain furlough privileges, but by reason of their service overseas or duties otherwise, they, too, had inadequate opportunity to take the furloughs to which they would ordinarily be entitled.

Under the proposed legislation, the "leave" of the enlisted man would accumulate and he would be paid for it in like manner as officers are paid for terminal leave, officers and enlisted men being thereby accorded the same treatment. The proposed legislation involves the checking by the War and Navy Departments of millions of servicemen's records and the expenditure of a large amount of money, but simple justice demands that such action be taken.

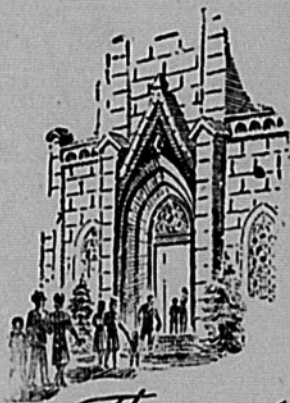
The final draft of the bill providing federal aid to communities which are interested in airport construction is scheduled to pass the Senate this week and go to the President for his signature. The House took final action on the bill several days ago, having passed the bill originally on October 18, 1945.

The bill commits the United States Government to a broad national airport development program and the expenditure over a seven-year period of a total of \$500,000,000. The work will be done on a basis of cooperation with the States and local committees.

The bill provides that the Federal Government may contribute not exceeding 25% of the cost of the land for an airport; the Federal Government would contribute 50% of the cost of construction incident to the development of the airport.

Air transportation will become increasingly important throughout the Nation as our Country takes steps to retain our leadership in the field of aviation.

The Appropriations Subcommittee on Government Corporations, of which I became chairman a few weeks ago, began consideration on April 11 of the bill which we expect to present to the House late in May, following many days of hearings. Among the Government Corporations involved are the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, a group of corporations which operate under the Farm Credit Administration, Government corporations which operate in South America in connection with the good neighbor policy, and many others, large or small and of various types. We are investigating the programs and spending policies of a total of 40 Government Corporations. A law enacted last December provides for the first time that Congress undertake to delve into the working of the corporations and seek thereby to keep a rein on their operations. The indications are that we will recommend the liquidation of many of the Government Corporations.

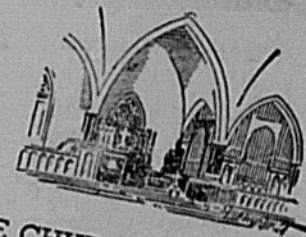
