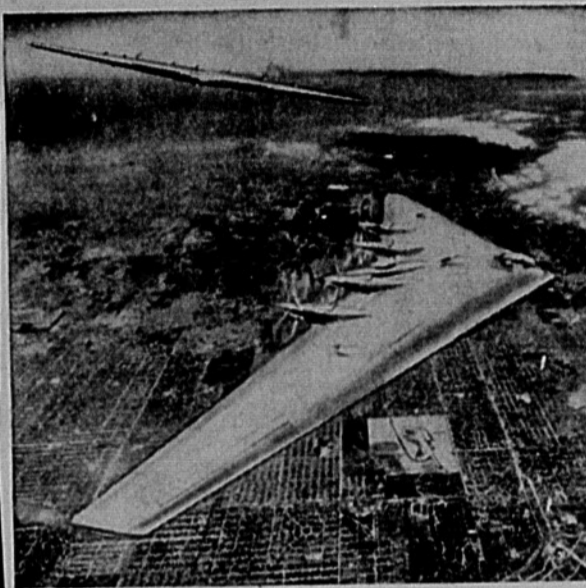

### Mayor And City Physician Urge City Wide Clean-up

Survey of Slaton business houses selling insecticides and disinfectants bring about the opinion that here is no consciousness of living in a community where polio could grow into an epidemic. As last year three children of Slaton or near Slaton were victims of the disease is evidence that such a thing could take place here.

Mayor Wootten said Tuesday, after conferring with Lubbock city officials, that the city plans to spray the entire city dump with DDT to kill the swarms of flies there. He plans further to discourage dumping in places other than the city dumping place.

Dr. W. E. Payne said, "Up to present there is no case of Polio reported in Slaton but we insist that we go ahead with a clean-up campaign to avoid the possibility of having cases of it here."

Some suggestions for further cleanliness in the City proper or business district were made as follows:

Mr. Holt of Slaton Pharmacy, "We use dry, sterilized glasses as everyone must drink from them."

Mr. Charlie Walton, "There seems no increase in the sale of disinfectants and insecticides over last year at this season. Perhaps we will not be clean-up conscious until an actual case of polio comes to Slaton."

Johnny Berkley of Berkley & Haddock's, "We have sold more insecticides than last year, but I feel that we are not as careful as we should be."

"Hack" Lasater, manager of Piggly-Wiggly said, "I feel that we can do much more in making a clean, wholesome environment in which to live." Many people have that attitude that implies, "I am going to do my part; I hope that all others do theirs."

According to Dr. Payne's investigation a number of concerns, handling food and drinks in Slaton, have become lax in requiring their employees to have a health certificate and permits to serve these items to the public. This is strictly against the law and both employees and employers are subject to arrest. The State Inspection officer is scheduled to make investigations in this area soon.

### Side Lights From Washington

By George Mahon This is Saturday noon. The President is scheduled to address a joint session of Congress at four p. m. today.

The intolerable industrial strife and strikes of recent months are retarding production, producing inflation and wrecking the economy of the Nation.

A straightforward labor-management policy, which some of us have long advocated, would have avoided this tragic situation. Before Pearl Harbor, during the war, and since the war, the House of Representatives has passed legislation designed to protect the public from disastrous strikes and labor-management trouble, and at the same time give labor and management a fair deal.

But the efforts of the House have been ineffective. Why? Because the U. S. Senate has willfully failed and refused to take favorable action on what the House has done. In fairness it must be said that the Texas Senators have not been parties to this inexcusable delay.

To be more specific: On June 7, 1940, the House passed a bill to revise the National Labor Relations Act by a roll call vote of 258 to 129. It went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and died there. On December 3, 1941—four days before Pearl Harbor—the House again passed a bill for this purpose by a vote of 253 to 136. This bill also went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and died there. On February 7, 1946, the House again passed a bill which is commonly referred to as the Case Bill. The bill passed the House by a vote of 258 to 155. It also went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and remained there until a few days ago. I am among those in the House who voted for each of these bills.

It is fervently hoped that those in the Senate who have blocked appropriate legislation in the past will now, at long last, join in a program of action for the common good of our Nation.

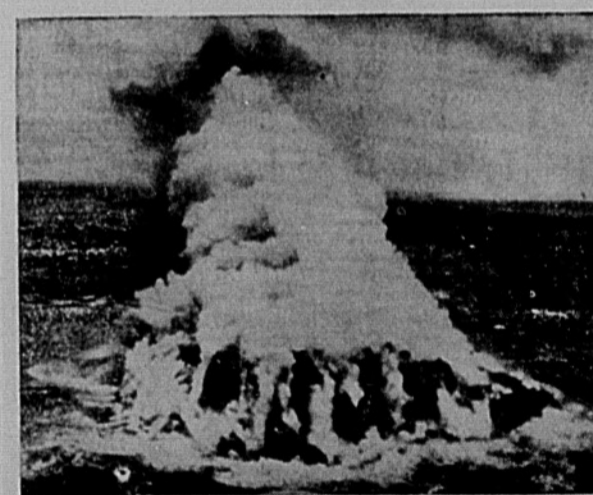

# A message to VETS

## FACTS ON YOUR RESERVE SURPLUS PROPERTY

To improve veterans' priorities in the purchase of war surpluses, Congress has amended the Surplus Property Act. So that you as a veteran may have the facts direct, the War Assets Administration is taking this means to address you.

**WAR ASSETS ADMINISTRATION**  
WASHINGTON 25, D. C.

May 3, 1946

**TO ALL VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II:**

As a veteran you are anxious to get all the benefits you can from war surplus. It is our desire to give you every possible preference, under the law, in purchasing the items you want.

By amendment to the Surplus Property Act of 1944, the War Assets Administrator has been authorized to reserve certain items for exclusive sale to you. They are listed below, but in fairness, we must tell you that quantities are not large, the demand is tremendous and you may not always be able to buy exactly what you want. Every veteran, however, will have the satisfaction of knowing that all items placed on the reserve or "set-aside" list are going to veterans like himself.

Subject to availability, you may purchase these items for your personal use, as well as for your business, professional, or agricultural enterprise. You may be sure that only World War II veterans will be entitled to purchase them.

The amended Act contains a second provision that further improves your buying position for your business, professional or agricultural enterprise. For items not included in this list, only Federal agencies buying for their own use may purchase ahead of you. This gives you, for business use, an advantage over State and local governments, tax-supported institutions, certified non-veteran small business enterprises and all other potential buyers except Federal agencies. For a specified period after the Federal agencies have had an opportunity to purchase surplus, all available items which do not appear on the reserve list will be available to you to purchase for your own business.

Under the amended Act you still must be certified to purchase war surplus, as thousands have done since the original Act was passed. The certification procedure has now been simplified, as explained at the right.

The War Assets Administration will make every effort to see to it that you receive the benefits Congress intends you to have. Your patience and cooperation will aid in the difficult task we face in trying to satisfy the needs of every veteran who wants to buy surplus property.

**What is set aside for you**

The property listed at right is reserved for exclusive sale to veterans of World War II. These are the items in greatest demand by veterans. Large quantities are not available. You may have to wait some time before purchases can be made. So many veterans may already be ahead of you that you may not be able to make your purchase. But you may be sure that only veterans will have the opportunity to buy "set-aside" items.

## HOW YOU CAN QUALIFY FOR YOUR PRIORITY

**If You Are Already Certified:**

Thousands of veterans of World War II have already been certified to purchase surplus items. Such certifications remain valid and may be used to purchase items for which you are certified whether the item is on your reserve or "set-aside" list or on other surplus lists. You will be notified either by mail or by public local announcement where and when to make purchases.

**If you are not certified, or if you wish to change your certification to items on the "set-aside" list:**

**STEP 1.** Take your honorable discharge from the armed services of World War II and apply at any of the offices listed below for a veteran's certificate for the item you desire.

**STEP 2.** Wait for mail or local public notice that the item for which you are certified is available and may be purchased. You may be sure that you will be notified and that you do not need to call in person to check the availability of the items you wish. You will be told where and when to buy.

**STEP 3.** Make sure that you follow up promptly the notice of availability when it reaches you by either mail or public notice.

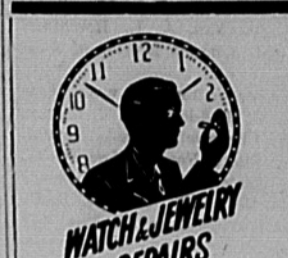

### How To Make A Fluffy Souffle

The hot souffle is always a favorite dessert and may be made with a variety of flavorings.

Especially good is the Coffee Souffle, based on a delicate coffee-and-cocoa flavored custard. It is made fluffy with beaten egg whites.

The inexperienced cook need not be afraid of this recipe. The lightness of the souffle depends on the beating of the egg whites. They should be beaten until they are stiff (but not dry) and then folded into the custard sauce carefully so that the air that has been introduced does not escape. The coffee will carry fullest flavor if it is brewed just before using, from a vacuum-packed jar where freshness is held intact under the resealable cap. And the souffle, of course, should be served as soon as it is baked.

**Coffee Souffle**  
(6 servings)

1/2 cup flour  
3 tablespoons cocoa  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup brewed coffee

4 eggs, separated  
1/2 cup sugar  
Mix flour, cocoa, and salt. Stir in coffee slowly. When well blended, cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is very thick. Beat egg yolks until light and add coffee mixture slowly, stirring constantly. Stir in sugar. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into coffee-cocoa mixture. Pour into well-greased casserole and bake in slow oven (325 deg. F.) for one hour until set. Serve at once plain or with custard or hard sauce.

SUBJECT: "THE SIN OF DIVISION AND ITS CURE — No. 1

Rom. 1:16 1 Cor. 9:16 Gal. 1:8

That the word is divided religiously cannot be successfully denied by anyone. There is, on record, over two hundred and fifty religious organizations in our great nation, and these are divided into factions until there is over seven hundred conflicting systems and cults in existence. Many are happy over this condition, contending that it is wonderful that we have so many churches to choose from, that we may join the church of our choice. How any one could possibly be happy and thank God for division is beyond comprehension, in the light of the teaching of God's word.

The Bible plainly condemns division as carnal, devilish and sinful. But aside from all the teaching of the Bible division is wrong. Look at the pain and anguish it causes, many otherwise happy homes, are ruined because of religious division, the progress of many communities are at a standstill because of religious prejudice. The evil results of religious division is evident on every hand.

Some Arguments Refuted Jno. 15:1-6; Where Jesus said, "I am the vine and ye are the branches," has been used to justify the many churches. It is said that when Jesus said "Branches," he meant churches. However, I think with just a little reflection

we may see the error of this conclusion. Jesus was talking to Peter, James, John and other individual disciples. He was not speaking to, or about organizations. Would it not seem strange if all the churches were the product of the one vine? It would be quite a vine that could produce over seven hundred different kinds of fruit with different names and flavors.

Jesus meant exactly what he said. Individuals are the branches and righteous deeds would be the fruit. He did not mean to teach that from Him would spring hundreds of fusing, fighting factions known as churches.

SECOND: It is contended that all the churches make up the one true church of Christ. If this be true, then all churches would have to teach and practice the same thing. Because Paul says, "Now I beseech you, brethren, through the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, THAT YE ALL SPEAK THE SAME THING, and THAT THERE BE NO DIVISION AMONG YOU; but that YE BE PERFECTED TOGETHER IN THE SAME MIND AND IN THE SAME JUDGMENT." (1Cor. 1:10).

The religious condition today violates this passage in every way possible. First: It commands that "There Be No Division." But we are

divided, therefore, in open rebellion to a direct command of God. Second: "That ye all speak the same thing." Where do we find two churches teaching or speaking the SAME thing. If they spoke the same thing, they would not be divided. Then thirdly: The command is that "YE BE PERFECTLY JOINED TOGETHER IN THE SAME MIND AND IN THE SAME JUDGMENT." If the churches were perfectly joined together, they would not be divided into warring sects. Yes, the divided condition, in the world of religion today, violates this scripture in every respect. In fact it is contrary to every passage of the Bible which deals with the subject of UNITY.

God wants his people to "dwell together in unity"; to "all speak the same thing." He desires that "there be NO division among us." Hence we understand that division is sinful. We should exert every effort possible to do away with division and bring about that unity which God demands.

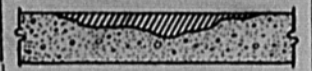

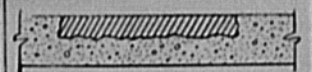


**Better Concrete Patches**  
YOU can do a permanent job of patching a concrete floor if you follow a few simple rules. It isn't simply a matter of cleaning out the old material and filling the hole with new concrete. It is necessary to insure a bond between the new and the old.

Remove enough of the old concrete so the bottom of the hole is as wide as the top and uniformly deep. This will hold the patch in place. Dampen the old concrete to prevent water in the new mix from being absorbed, but be sure no surplus water is left in the hole.

RIGHT WAY

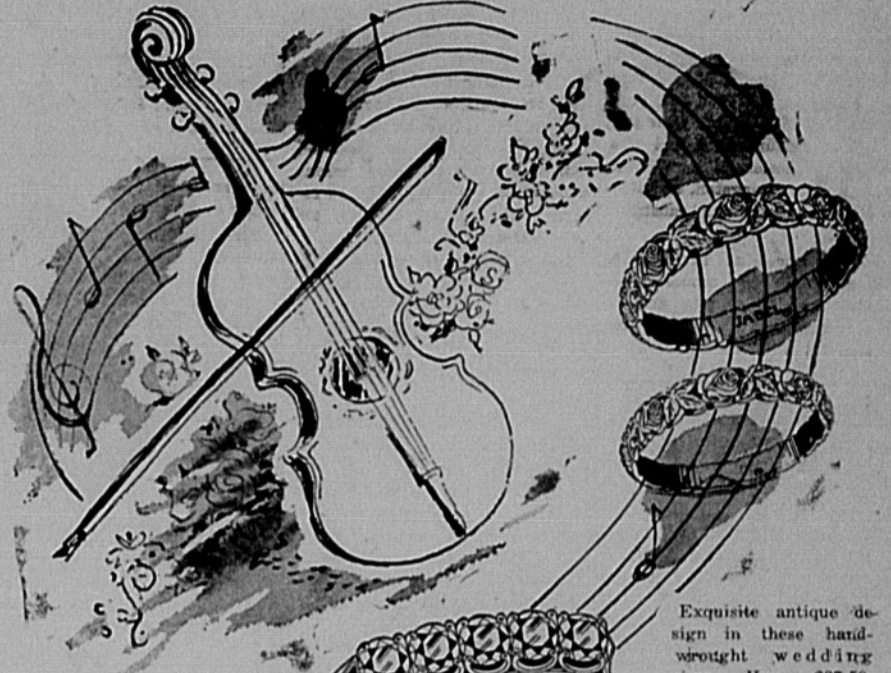
Mix one part cement and three parts sand. Portland cement ready mixed with sand is available. Add only enough water to make a stiff mix which will require light tamping to get it into place. Smooth the mix with a wood float as soon as it is poured. When the concrete begins to harden, finish the surface lightly with a steel trowel.

There is some shrinkage in drying. If a patch is not more than two inches deep no allowance need be made for shrinkage. On deeper patches smooth the surface so that it is slightly above the level of the floor.

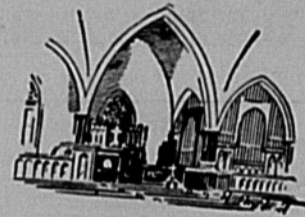

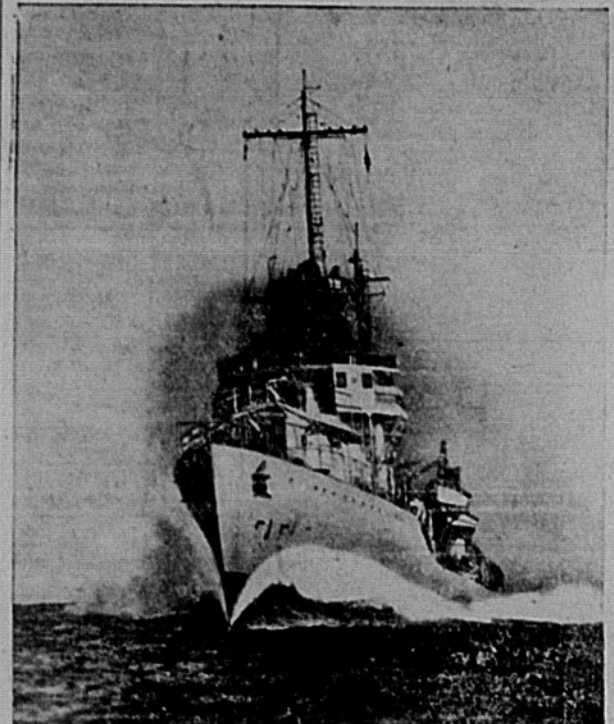
