Most business firms report much better business than they expected for the month of Oct. with sales still above the average. Some expect considerable change now that the election is over but few will make predictions as to whether they expect it to be better or worse.

No one in West Texas seems to be worried about a siege of smog like the death laden fog that prevailed the town in Pennsylvania. The winds out here may not be pleasant but they most surely would not allow a heavy fog to stay long.

A number of dry holes and some very poor water wells have been dug lately in the Slaton area, and a number of those who were planning on irrigated farms have about given up the idea. Others who operate irrigated farms say that when the crops require as much water as they did this year that the profit from an irrigated farm is not much better than from a dry land farm.

O'Donnell Gains Victory Over Tigers Friday

In a hard fought game at O'Donnell last Friday night, the Slaton Tigers lost their chance to get back into the running for the championship of the south half of District 4-A, losing to O'Donnell's Eagles by a score of 26 to 19.

The Tigers got off to a slow start, allowing O'Donnell to pile up a lead of 19 to 6 in the first half. Lewis, playing right half for Slaton, went through the line for the first touchdown, in the second quarter. Slaton came back in the last half and showed some real fight, but were unable to overcome O'Donnell's lead. Ed Willis, at left half for Slaton, played a mighty fine game. Tom Smith, the Tigers' lighting fullback, has played consistently fine football all season. He scored Slaton's second touchdown through the line, while Alvis (Shug) Collins, left end, playing his best game of the year, received a 23 yard pass from Smith, and crossed the goal line for the third tally. Pete Williams and Johnny Melcher were doing some excellent blocking in the line, while Glyndon Dawson, at center, showed plenty of fighting spirit.

A number of Slaton fans received a Fe Special to O'Donnell. Many others made the trip by auto. The stands were packed and the sidelines were crowded. The Eagles crowned their queen during the half time with an impressive ceremony. Although disappointed at losing the game, the trip was enjoyed by the Slaton people and O'Donnell's hospitality was appreciated.

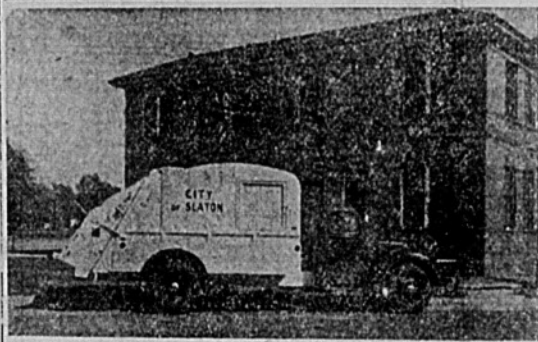

Tigers To Meet Post Here To Close Season

Slaton's battered and crippled Tigers meet the undefeated Post Antelopes Thursday in the Tigers first home game in four weeks. The game is at 2:30 p. m.

After four consecutive losses away from home the Tigers will play their last game of the season at Tiger field. The Antelopes are picked to win the south half of the 4-A conference and are favored over Slaton, their last conference game of the south half. Coach Frances Bingham of Post has only shown the T and single wing formation.

In the Antelopes' first game of the season, they took a 40-6 win over the Ralls Jackrabbits.

Post's second victory was over Spur's eleven in a 13-7 win. The first score was made by Quarterback R. E. Josey on a pass. Junior Malouf was injured, but came back in the fourth quarter to go through the line for a touchdown.

In their third game the Post team beat Seagraves, 24-0. The outstanding players for Post in this game were Pennington, who ran 20 yards for their first score, and Kirkpatrick who made two of the four touchdowns. The final score came when Ronnie Boucher took an Eagle aerial and ran the ball 67 yards for the score.

Post beat O'Donnell 31-0 in their second conference game. Malouf and Boucher were outstanding players, although Kirkpatrick and Pennington scored.

In the Antelopes' third conference game of the season, they downed the Tahoka Bulldogs 27-7.

In the fifth game of the season Post took a 32-0 win over the Snyder eleven. The first score was made by Malouf who ran the ball 70 yards. The second came on a pass from McGuire to Malouf. The play covered a total of 75 yards. Other backs to score were Kirkpatrick and Josey. The final touchdown was a 63 yard run by Malouf.

In the next game the Antelopes beat the Levelland eleven by a score of 14-6. The first score was made when Malouf took a Levelland pass and ran it 50 yards for their first score. The other was made on a 56 yard drive.

Coach Bingham of Post and Coach Tillery of Slaton played college football together at Tech and were room mates there.

The last game Post played was with the Cowhorns of Lubbock.

The starting lineup for Post will be Roy Davis and Jerry Adams at ends, George Pierce and Marv Stelzer at tackles, Borrey Ford and Calvin Starnil at guards, and Smith at center. The backs are Charlie McGuire, Kay Kirkpatrick, Ronnie Boucher, and Junior Malouf. Malouf is the outstanding player at the halfback slot. All boys have played a very good game each time they went on the field.

The lineup of the Slaton Tigers will be Voigt and Perry at ends, Williams and Moore at tackles, Melcher and Rhodes at guards, and Dawson at center. In the backfield Bybee, Morgan, Smith and Strickland will start.

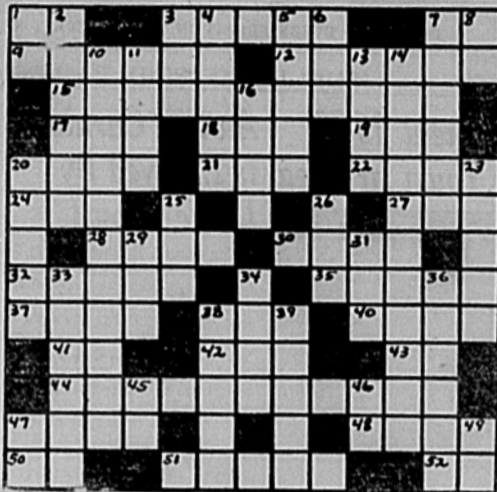

Brooder Light For Chicks

One electric light placed either in the brooder house or under the chick brooder hover will cut out a lot of the crowding that kills many small chicks each year. The light tends to keep the chickens from piling up when they get too hot or too cold, or are frightened. A 15- to 25-watt bulb is all that is needed. If the chickens do not pick at each other too much one ordinary bulb is enough. If there is cannibalism, use a red bulb of a slightly larger size instead of the clear bulb.

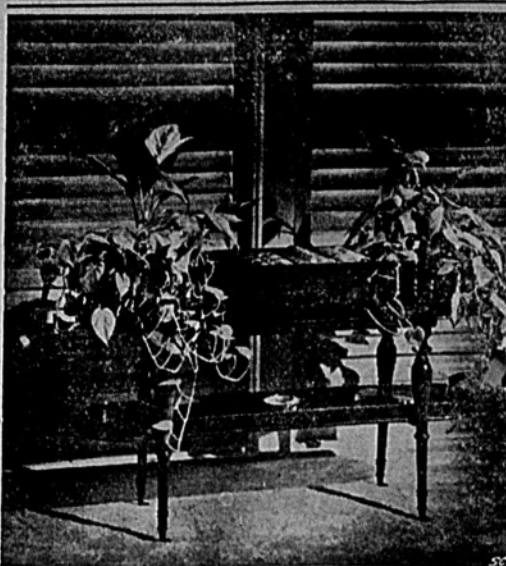

Drying Curtains

When hanging curtains out to dry, simply fold them double and hang them over the line. Do not use clothespins for they will ruin the shape of the curtains.

Walls and rafters of barns, unfinished attics and storerooms may be sprayed with a water-dispersible DDT spray, made by mixing 12 tablespoons of 40 per cent DDT wettable powder in one gallon of water. This spray leaves a whitish deposit of DDT, which will be effective for several months in killing insects which crawl over it. The water spray is effective on unfinished surfaces such as rough wood, porous plaster and cement. For finished attics closets and other rooms of the house a five per cent DDT solution is preferred, because the deposit it leaves is invisible and nothing is marked or stained by it. It should be used with caution because it is inflammable.

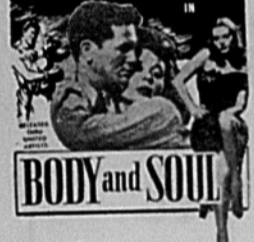

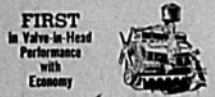
