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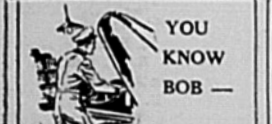

WATCH OUT FOR FLOCK COLDS

Infectious coryza (common called colds) is a common respiratory disease of chickens which occurs most frequently during the cold weather months. While it does not cause heavy mortality in most instances, it is feared by most poultry raisers because of its marked effect on egg production and because it creates many culls.

Avoid Drafts, Dampness
Coryza is a common problem among birds which are exposed to cold drafts and dampness. It causes the severest harm in young adult flocks, although it affects birds of all ages.

A characteristic symptom of infectious coryza is the discharge from the affected bird's nostrils. In the early stages this material is thin and watery, but later it becomes thick and sticky. The face, wattles and skin of the neck often become swollen, the swellings being filled with fluid. Sometimes the bird's eyes are completely puffed shut due to the swelling. Difficult breathing and coughing may also be symptoms.

Warm, Comfortable House
The danger of a coryza outbreak is lessened considerably when the birds are quartered in tight, well-ventilated houses which are warm and free of drafts.

Within recent years sulfathiazole has been used extensively to control coryza outbreaks. This drug, when used as soon as the early cold symptoms appear, hastens recovery of affected birds—the diseased fowl usually appear normal within 48 hours after treatment has been started. Sulfathiazole is now available in commercial form as a drinking water medicine for easy use.

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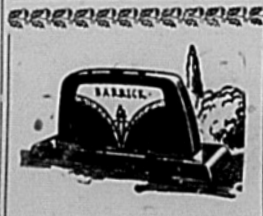

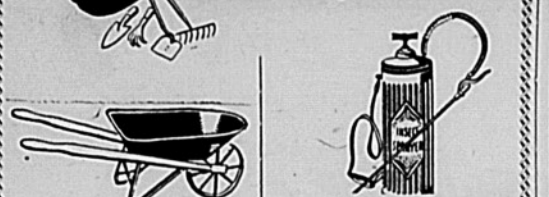

ORDINANCE NO. 109
AN ORDINANCE PRESCRIBING THE PROCEDURE FOR CANDIDATES TO FILE FOR THE OFFICE OF MAYOR, COMMISSIONER AND OTHER OFFICES FOR THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR ELECTION OFFICERS; PLACE AND MANNER OF HOLDING CITY ELECTIONS; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

Sec. 1. All elections pertaining to municipal affairs shall be governed by the election laws of the State of Texas. In all city elections the mayor, City Secretary, or the City Commission shall do and perform each act in other elections required to be done performed respectively by the County Judge, the County Clerk, or the Commissioner's Court. In all city elections the Mayor, or if he fails to do so, the City Commission, shall order the election, give notice and appoint election officers to hold the election. In general elections for officers the notice or proclamation shall be issued and posted at the polling places not later than thirty (30) days before the first Tuesday in April of the year in which the election is to be held.

Sec. 2. Any eligible and qualified person may have his name printed upon the official ballot as an independent candidate for the office of Mayor or Commissioner or other city office by filing his sworn application with the Mayor at least thirty (30) days prior to the election day. The application shall state the specific office or place being sought by the applicant and that the applicant is eligible and qualified under the laws of the State of Texas to become a candidate for and hold the office being sought, if elected.

Sec. 3. (a) The form of the sworn application shall be substantially as follows:

"To the Mayor of the City of Slaton, Texas, Greetings:

I, _____, hereby make application to have my name printed on the official ballot as an independent candidate for the office of _____ to be voted upon at the city election to be held on the _____ day of April, 19____; and I hereby certify that I am qualified to make this application and that I am legally qualified to hold such office, if elected.

being duly sworn, deposes and says that the statements contained in the foregoing application are true.

(b) Such sworn application may be accompanied by a petition signed by qualified electors, although such petition is not required.

(c) Such sworn application shall be accompanied by an executed copy of the "Loyalty Affidavit" as required by Article 2978a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, in substantially the following form:

"I, _____ of the City of Slaton, County of Lubbock, State of Texas, being a candidate for the office of _____

do solemnly swear that I believe in and approve of our present representative form of government and if elected, I will support and defend our present representative form of government and will resist any effort or movement from any source which seeks to subvert or destroy the same or any part thereof, and I will support and defend the constitution and Laws of the United States and of the State of Texas.

Sec. 4. The names of all those who have filed their sworn applications to have their names printed on the official ballot as candidates shall be posted by the City Secretary in a conspicuous place at his office for the inspection of the public for at least ten days before he orders the ballots to be printed. All objections to the regularity or validity of the application of any person shall be made within five days after such posting, by written notice filed

with the City Secretary, setting forth the grounds of objections. In case no such objection is filed within the time prescribed, the regularity or validity of the application of no person whose name is so posted shall be thereafter contested. The City Secretary shall preserve in his office for a period of two years all applications, notice of objections and other related papers.

Sec. 5. Any person eligible to the office of Mayor or Commissioner or other office who has filed his sworn application in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance shall have his name printed on the official ballots. Any such person may cause his name to be withdrawn at any time before the official ballots are actually printed, by filing in writing with the City Secretary a request to that effect over his own signature, duly attested to by a Notary Public. No name so withdrawn shall be printed on the ballots. Not later than twenty (20) days before the city general election the City Secretary shall have the official ballots printed.

Sec. 6. Each qualified voter who desires to cast an absentee ballot and who expects to be absent on the day of the city general election shall be entitled to an official ballot and the right to cast such ballot in accordance with the provisions of Article 2956, Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

Sec. 7. Hereafter the Chief of Police shall post a properly executed copy of election proclamations of all municipal elections and notice thereof at the place where such election is to be held. Such notice shall be posted thirty (30) days before the date of such election. Such elections shall be held at the City Hall of the City of Slaton, Texas, between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 7:00 P. M. Election officials shall be appointed by the Mayor and shall serve in the manner provided by law and receive the compensation provided by law for their services.

Sec. 8. The fact that the election laws of the State of Texas were revised by the 50th Legislature of the State of Texas and that this ordinance is enacted to comply with such laws as revised, and the further fact that the next municipal election is due to be held on the 6th day of April, 1948, creates an emergency and an imperative necessity that the provisions of Sec. 19, Article VI of the Charter of the City of Slaton requiring ordinances to be voted upon at two regular meetings be

suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended under the provisions of Sec. 20, Article VI of said charter, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

Passed and Approved this the 23rd day of February, A. D. 1948.

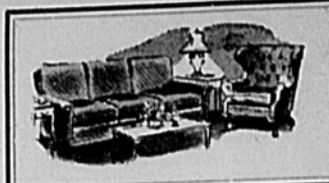

JUST TALK

On June 26, 1941 I had the following comments to make about Slaton and I still feel the same way about the town. Here is what I wrote:

It is said that the first impression is the lasting impression, which may or may not be true, but no one will deny that the first impression of place or person is very impressive.

This is particularly true of a town, and Slaton is more or less like the girl that the tooth paste advertisements tell about, who had a power house full of allure until she smiled and her teeth made all the men climb a tree.

Slaton is overflowing with natural beauty, our trees and flowers are prolific and unusually well cared for, our streets, while laid out on the bias are to say the least, different from those of the average town. Our homes and business buildings are better constructed and better looking than those in towns of much larger size, but like the girl who did not use Glamourgleam tooth-paste or the man who does not use Skunko Soap for B.O., we have our weak points and those are rusty trash cans overflowing with discarded boots, tin buckets and what the cat won't even drag off. Home owners will find it an inspiration to get off a half block and take a look at their homes. There are very few that would not look much better if a little cleaning up were done. It's clean up week and time to do something about it.

Roy Mack says that as usual the big problem in this country is rain. Roy refused to make any prediction as to what the cotton crop is going to do nor whether we will have more inflation, a depression, or remain about where we are.

There is one thing about Roy, he makes no rash statements to regret afterwards and when he tells you something you can depend on it. Doctor W. E. Payne and I may break loose most anywhere and while we may go off the wrong tangent once in a while we get our blood pressure up to the boiling point, you can usually depend upon it that we do not agree with anything being as it is. While I am not in position to judge my own actions, I can stand off and look and listen to Doctor Payne, and while the Doctor and I do not always see eye to eye we do agree on one thing and that is to blast away when we do not agree with the

things as they are.
 As the President of the Belly-achers Club I must say that Doctor Payne is getting back in good form and I say good luck to him, we may have some fun yet.

As the unofficial weather forecaster of the South end of Lubbock County I have been neglecting my duties to some extent because Charlie Austin has not been in to see me lately, so I do not know whether he has taken off his long handles yet or not, and I have been handicapped. However I made another check up last Sunday on the rose bushes, peach trees and some of the optimistic growth around the place and it is just ready to bloom out, a sure sign of a hard freeze.

Better get set for a heavy snow, some more gas shortage, bad colds, flu and your wife's cold feet.

This is a very discouraging time of the year if one stops to consider the fact that all the checks one has written in January are going to throw the old bank roll for a loss. That is why so many folks start screaming about expenses and do not get even the slightest sign of a smile until the first of March. I'm tired of being grouchy and seeing every body else the same way and I'd like to make a move that all taxes should be collected in December when every one has the Merry Christmas spirit, a big business and the money to spend.

Mayor Wootton says that Slaton has grown faster in the last

three years than it has grown in any three years since he has lived here. He reports that new homes are going up all over the town and that they are good substantial buildings too. There are folks coming into the Mayor's office every day and into the Chamber of Commerce office, looking for places to live. Many of these people want to buy homes and go into some kind of business in Slaton and if the town could care for one half of them the Mayor believes Slaton would soon be a town of 10,000 people. The Postal Inspector estimates that Slaton now has over 5000 population and his estimate is very accurately based. There are many new businesses being established here and more young men taking over the civic affairs of the town which is adding new blood and enthusiasm to the activities of Slaton.

Perhaps you have heard this one, if you have you need not read it, I am using it as an example of what I am trying to illustrate. Do you know the difference between an optimist and a pessimist? The optimist sees the doughnut and the pessimist sees the hole.

It has taken a lot of time for the folks around here to even smell the doughnuts cooking and some of them still see only the hole, but the blind ones are missing a lot of good eating and may get undernourished if they don't wake up. Better not sell Slaton short.

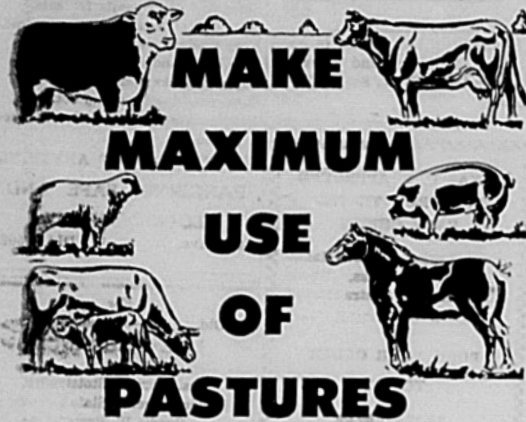

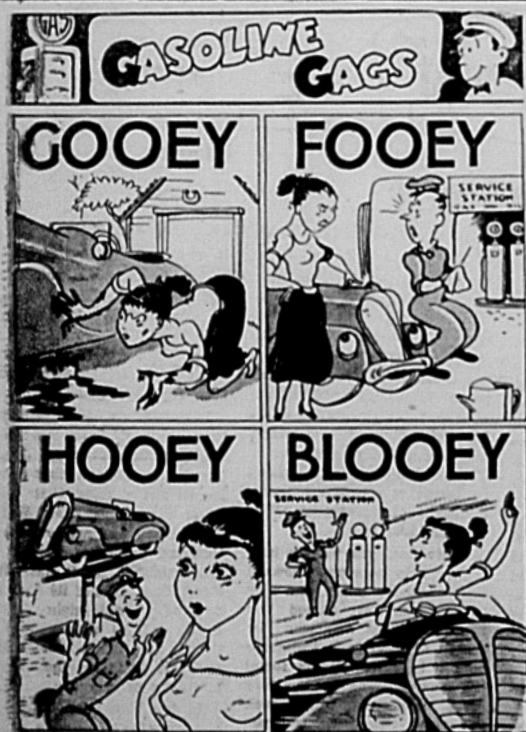

Stamp collectors who desire special cachet covers commemorating the inauguration of the Santa Fe Railway's daily Super Chief and El Captain service on February 29, are urged to forward stamped, addressed letters to the Santa Fe passenger traffic department at either Los Angeles or Chicago not later than February 25.

Reproductions of the official train signs of the Super Chief and El Captain will be impressed on the covers received.

Special cachet mail destined for the first eastbound run of each train should be addressed to "Cachet Mail, Passenger Traffic Manager, Santa Fe System Lines, Los Angeles." For the first westbound run, mail should be addressed to "Cachet Mail, Passenger Traffic Manager, Santa Fe System Lines, Chicago."

All commemorative mail will be postmarked by the local post office at Chicago or Los Angeles, placed in emergency closed pouches and carried the entire distance of the train's first run for redistribution and delivery to the addressee.

Collectors are requested to address the covers to the right hand side and reasonably low, to place folded paper on a card in each envelope so that the string

used in tying letter together will not cut the edges of the cover, and make certain that mail is sent in ample time to arrive at Los Angeles or Chicago not later than February 25.

Santa Fe officials have revealed that thousands of pieces of cachet mail from all corners of the United States and Canada already have been received, as result of notices which have appeared in various philatelic magazines in recent weeks.

Social Security Man To Be Here

Elliott W. Adams, Social Security Administration Representative, will be in Slaton at the U. S. Post Office at 4:00 p. m. on Wednesday, March 3 1948, for the purpose of answering any questions you may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who seem to be entitled to benefits; and taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Every day last year an average of 700 people qualified for retirement benefits under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance program, but the records show that one out of every six could have qualified sooner and saved some monthly payments that were lost because of the delay. If you are one of the two and a half million people over 65 who have social security cards, it's a good idea to check with the nearest social security office about benefits, even if you expect to keep on working. 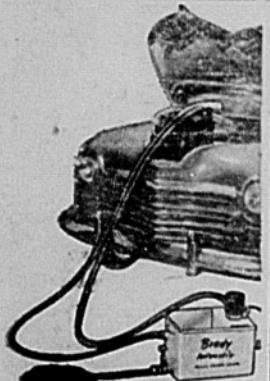
