Current records of the Railroad Commission of Texas show that a total of 198 oil wells are producing in Garza County.



Levelland Chamber of Commerce's Agricultural committee Friday will study a move toward a concerted program by a major firm to enlist hundreds of acres of Hockley county land in a mammoth truck producing project for this area.

The committee, called to meet in the Chamber of Commerce office at 3 p. m. Friday, will confer at length with J. O. Frizzell, a representative of the Ripley-Ligon Company, Inc., of Santa Rosa.

According to the best information possible at this time arrangements have been made for the paving of certain streets in Lorenzo.

Harrison Avenue, which runs through the main business section of town will be paved through to the end of the incorporation which leads on to the cemetery.

The City of Abernathy has been awarded the Auxiliary Field No. 1, for miles east of town, for use as an airport. The gift, which was obtained through the War Assets Administration, includes 640 acres of land on which the field is located. It is section 17, Block C-2, TTRR survey.

Installation of a brand new Model C4 Intertype was begun this morning at the Post Dispatch by two erectors sent here by the Intertype Company.

The machine, which is equipped with 11 new, modern faces of type, will replace the Linotype machine which has been in use by the Post Dispatch for 22 years.

On Friday evening, March 5, approximately 50 men met with Company Commander Donald M. Olson, Executive Officer Bob Bellah and Medical Examiner, Dr. R. A. Neblett at the Legion Hall to complete organization of Company E, 142 Infantry, Canyon Units of the National Guard.

Holy Week To Be Held Beginning Sunday, March 21

The First Methodist Church will observe Holy Week by having an Easter Revival beginning Palm Sunday, and closing Easter Sunday, March 21 to 23. Rev. Cal Wright will bring the sermons, and Rev. Will Culwell, Abilene, Texas, will lead the congregational singing and direct the young people's work.

MR. AND MRS. McWILLIAMS ATTEND LAST RITES FOR BROTHER IN OKLAHOMA

Last rites were held from the First Methodist Church of Tipton, Oklahoma on Tuesday, March 9, for George Franklin Brunk, brother of Mrs. Oran McWilliams of Slaton, whose sudden death occurred on the previous Wednesday at Tuscon, Arizona. Rev. Gayer of the Tipton Methodist Church, officiated and pallbearers were boyhood pals of the deceased.

Mr. Brunk had lived for the last seven years in Phoenix, Ariz., where he was interested in fine racing dogs.

Mr. and Mrs. McWilliams attended the funeral services at Tipton.

Postmaster K. L. Scudder has received approval of City Delivery extensions as recommended by the Post Office Inspector in January. The formal authorization calls for a one delivery per day service, since all trains arrive during the night or early morning. Since considerable details have to be worked out and the carriers cases re-labeled to include the added patrons, actual service will begin April 1st. In the mean time all patrons affected by the extension should obtain and erect proper mail receptacles and give the postoffice an order requesting delivery.

The extensions will include the 900, 1000, and 1100 blocks on West Lynn St., 600 and 700 blocks on South 15th, the 800 block on S. 14th and the 800 block on S. 13th, the 1100 and 1200 blocks on S. 12th, and the 1100 block on S. 11th St. On the East side will be included the 600 block on East Lubbock, 100 and 200 blocks on S. 2nd, 600 block E. Scurry, the 300 and 400 blocks on S. 3rd, the 500 block on East Panhandle and the 300 and 400 blocks on S. 12th St. If you live on any of these blocks or if your house faces the street tangent to these blocks you are within delivery and should contact the postoffice if you wish delivery.

This is a quotation of provision relative to the extension: "Containing on Street Signs being erected and territory 50 per cent improved within year." Some of the extensions were approved on the statement that plans were made for erection of sufficient new houses to justify service. The extensions will give delivery service to 86 added families.

Rural Schedule Changed

It was recommended by the P. O. Inspector and ordered by the Department that our rural routes be placed on a new schedule time of beginning delivery on their routes. The reason he gave for the change was to try to effect a leaving time that would more nearly assure delivery of mail from train 94 which most usually runs later than its scheduled time, and at the same time make the carriers time on his route more nearly regular should patrons wish to meet the carrier at the boxes.

It is going to make the carrier about an hour later on delivery every day but will better assure delivery of mail from the east and make the time of delivery much more regular at your box. The new time for leaving the postoffice is 9:30 a. m. if train 94 is worked by that time but not later than 10:30 if the added wait would get the mail from the train. With few exceptions this will deliver the mail from the morning train. It is hoped the change will benefit the service as the Inspector believed it would.

He died last Wednesday night at Mercy Hospital after a long illness. He was a farmer and well driller before he became ill and was well known on the South Plains.

He is survived by his wife, one brother, one half brother, eight children, fourteen grandchildren, and three great grandchildren. Mrs. Olen Dickerson and Mrs. C. D. McMillian and Houston and Ben Cavett are residents of Slaton, they are children of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Cavett.

Soft Water Service Is Now Available

Mr. F. D. Bostick has recently brought to Slaton a water softener service which very few towns of this size are privileged to enjoy. Through this service scientifically designed water softeners are now available to supply soft water in Slaton homes.

The average family pays a tribute of from \$80.00 to \$117.00 per year because of the hardness of their water supply. The total of this tremendous cost comes from a series of small savings. The calcium and magnesium which principally cause the water to be hard, builds up a scale in hot water heaters and boilers, corrodes hot water pipes and faucets, increases heating costs, repair expenses and shortens the life of these fixtures. It is estimated that clothing wears out 35 percent faster when laundered in hard water than in soft water. Foods cook quicker in soft water. Smoother skin and soft water go hand in hand.

According to Mr. Bostick, the water in this area is so hard as to make softening both necessary and profitable, and this water softening service is actually less expensive than owning and operating a complete water softener, and certainly less trouble.

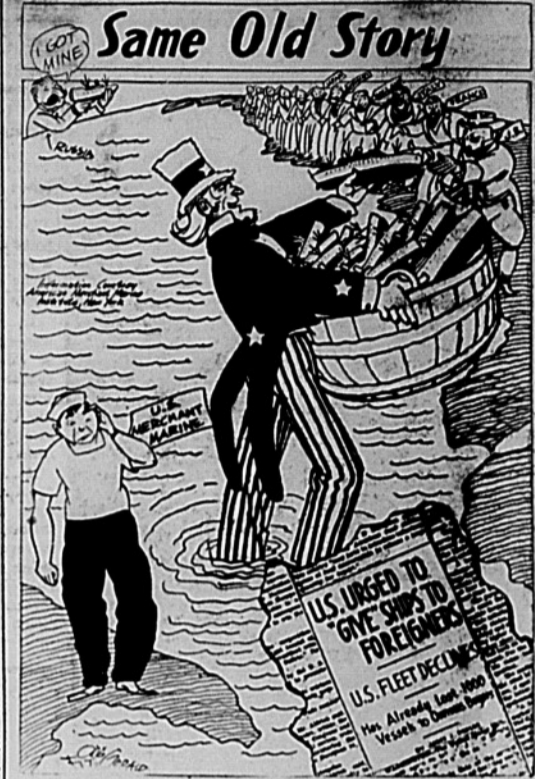

We Salute

This week we salute a man who has been in the very center of Slaton's growth since its infancy.

A tarheel from North Carolina, having been born in Mills Springs, N. C., Mr. J. S. Edwards came to Texas when he was just seventeen years of age. He received his early schooling in North Carolina, in Texas and then attended Greenwood College in Wise County. As a young lad he was very ambitious to be a big contractor, employing many men.

In April of 1901 Mr. Edwards was married to Miss Alice Rhoads at Pilot Grove, and the young couple moved to Norman, Okla., where they lived in the shadow of the University. He was then employed as a gin repairman for the American Cotton Co.

Mr. Edwards came to Slaton in April of 1911. He helped to kill off some of the prairie dogs and snakes, grubbed out streets and surveyed out the South Slaton Addition and put it on the market. Then in the spring of 1911 he opened up the First State Bank of Slaton in a little box building. De-

posits that first year averaged about \$75,000. Average deposits for the Citizens State Bank now are over \$4,000,000.

Mr. Edwards operated the First State Bank until 1919 when he sold to J. H. Brewer and his associates. He then dealt in real estate, hogs, cattle, etc., until 1932 when he organized the Citizens State Bank which is now operating. It tells of the time when Slaton was the biggest market for hogs and cattle in this region. In 1916-1918 five to fifteen cars of hogs and cattle were shipped out each week. Among the buyers whose names Mr. Edwards recalled were the following: W. A. Robertson, Bill Allison, J. P. Posey, Dan Wentz, Bill Estes, the Whitaker Bros., and F. C. Marrs.

The first cotton gin in Slaton was brought here in 1912, in which the bank backed R. H. Tudor. A house in Haskell, Texas was traded for the only cotton gin in Lubbock which was moved here. It was a 2-stand outfit, and improvements were being added continuously. The second gin was brought here by the McDonalds in 1916.

Mr. Edwards says Slaton was a good town then, is a good town now, but could quite easily be a very much better town if the

people will make up their minds to give of their time and thought to the betterment of their town. He says that this is the richest spot in Lubbock County from the standpoint of farm land. There is a large amount of irrigation now and this makes for a better sure-crop proposition. The people in general are prosperous, building new and better homes, and improving the old ones.

According to Mr. Edwards, Slaton needs more paved streets and roads. He believes it will not make a large city, but should make a town of 10,000 to 12,000 and be an ideal place for a permanent home. He says we should try for some small factories, such as a knitting mill, an overall factory, or something of that sort. And a great need is also for a new and modern hotel; but more important than anything else, the people must learn to spend their money at home.

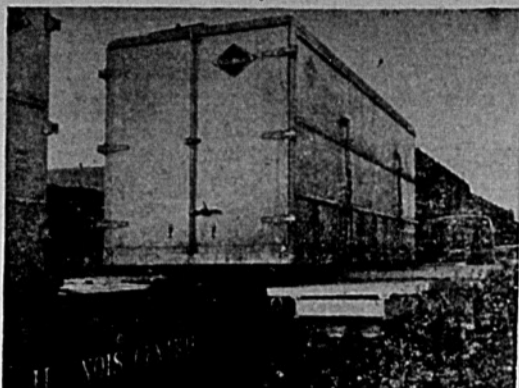

What They Write

BELIEVING IN DEMOCRACY VS. WORKING FOR IT

When my father wanted to express his opinion of the futility of some effort he would say, "It amounts to about as much as a gnat in a whirlwind." I, too, feel that to be probably the exact weight and worth of anything might say but I "rise" to say "I

object" anyway.

The radio announces that a few communists, who after years of palaver, were at last corralled at Ellis Island for deportation have been turned loose. It seems they refused to eat, but in return for their freedom they kindly consented to drink some orange juice. Long after I supposed old Tojo

had been hanged, he popped up alive for trial, at which long drawn out affair, he managed to make monkeys of his prosecutors. Factories in Germany that were built for the production of peace time goods that are so badly needed in Europe are still being torn down—and Marshall is in favor of it.

After nearly three years of what is supposed to be peace the Nazi trials still drag on. There are literally acres of paper covered with acres of words.

It seems that we can never really get through with anything, and be done with it, and go on to the next thing.

The weight of the world is being piled on our shoulders, and it is too heavy. It discourages everybody and also every business.

We know all these cross currents of thought and action are getting us nowhere.

Such confused action makes for confused thinking and certainly we can never get constructive

action with that state of mind. Nothing could please the subversive elements who are working to get their claws on everything any better.

And who are these people?

Don't expect them to stand up and be counted for they never will. Sen. O'Daniel asserts that "the government is infested with reds from top to bottom." It's probably true. Nothing else could account for the stupendous waste, the lack of plain "horse sense," and the muddling attempts to "do something," that, instead of keeping toward certain objectives, "goes in circles." There is one test that should be applied to everyone, in government or out of it, "by their fruits ye shall know them."

Any person, no matter how "high up" he is, who is willing that we be taxed to weakness, who "whoops it up" for our substance and our strength to be poured down every rat hole, should be classed as communistic, and his actions watched.

People do not have to be waving a red flag to be working for the forces of disruption. One "shining" example of this is the asinine ruling of our Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin against the verdict of the court, which did not happen to specify that the victim was "drowned in water."

This would imply that had she been drowned, say, in a hoghead of wine, like the old—who was it—in ancient history, it would have been legal.

Was not the victim just as dead as if she had been drowned, not in water, but in milk or beer?

If the voice of the people had been loud enough these same men would not have dared to reverse and remand for another trial the case of the hoodlum who stamped the old woman to death and took her car. The verdict did not specify that she was "stamped with the feet."

It does not matter if these men are not "reds." They could do no worse if they were. Their decisions caused a waste of money for new trials. They made for frustration, confusion and disgust. They made for contempt of law and a travesty of justice.

That such bologny could be put over, on any free people—and Texans at that—is past belief.

Ed Howe said "we elect certain men to big positions and, thereafter expect them to 'do something' for us. Whereas we should know that the net effect of the transaction is that we have done something for them."

But if they knew that thousands of searching eyes of an informed electorate were focused squarely on their actions they would do something for us. They would cut out a lot of this dawdling—at so much per dawdle. They would try to do their job even though they be "reds," or mercenaries, or those fellow traveling chameleons, who are perfectly willing to change color to suit any group they happen to be in, for each and every one of them have one thing in common—they want to keep their job. They "just love" to bask in the sunlight of its importance and prestige.

Perhaps we have all seen a ruffian beat a horse. We wished that the horse knew its power. It could so easily have pawed its

fermentor in the stomach, or kicked his head off. But the horse, not knowing its strength, trembled and flinched, and "took it."

Neither do the obscure and unknown millions know their power, though all the government experimenters, thousands of windbags containing nothing but hot air and "blah," and other thousands, Federally employed in job that render no useful service, are riding high on their shoulders.

And yet—mark this—no lobby in Washington is so strong as to "amount to a gnat in a whirlwind" if the Voice of America were heard by Congress, in any concerted effort.

But what chance do all these little people have—the small farmers, the diggers of ditches, the shiners of shoes—to make their voice heard? What chance have all the boys to have a voice in the things for which they will probably be called upon to die?

In the communist movement all the big busy beavers are cutting and slashing away—as surreptitiously as possible—and every little termite has his work cut out for him and he is nibbling at it ceaselessly.

Contrast this with the aimless meanderings of the rank and file of straight thinking Americans who believe in Democracy. He hustles around and gets together enough money for his taxes—money which he knows will be largely thrown away. He stands on the street and "beefs" with his friends about the way things are going, and feels very generally discouraged and helpless about the whole thing. He knows vaguely that he can "write his Congressman" if things are going wrong. But perhaps he does not know how to put into words any specific grievance,—and besides, who is his Congressman?

A great many really intelligent people care very little for reading. After their days work they may like to relax with the comics, or go to a movie, or perhaps try to forget the whole mess by losing it in a detective story thriller.

All this potential power should be utilized instead of being allowed to go to waste. There is plenty of common sense among this group, even though there often appears to be very little of it in Washington.

Democracy, like everything else, is only as strong as its weakest link.

Is not this our weakest link—a lack of leadership for the common people?

Well suppose—just suppose—that regular meetings were held in every city and village, in every country church and school house, often enough to keep the people informed on current issues. Perhaps there would be a sort of program, some music and singing or clowning to help "get out the crowd," but the sole purpose of the meeting would be to make articulate the Voice of America. Straight thinking speakers would tell the people what is happening and exactly who is making it happen.

Well, why not? Perhaps it only needs someone who care enough about the sort of a world his children will live in, to say, "Let's go."

We may not get any fruit out here in this country this year but we won't be any worse off than the folks down in South Texas who usually come out here in the summer time and brag about the extra man size peaches, plums and pears that they get down in their part of the country for travelers say that the last freeze ruined all the fruit prospects in South Texas. In fact it may be possible that we can get down in South Texas and tell them down there we have extra nice peaches and things out in West Texas this year.

Of course we'll have to miss a late freeze, a long drouth, a lot of insects, hail storms and the June bugs but what are a few things like that to a person who is optimist enough to live in West Texas, if he were not a person who expects to overcome all of the hard knocks of nature he would not be in West Texas.

When I was a young fellow and my belt buckle and my back bone were as close together as the two slices of bread in a picnic sandwich, I used to long for a figure like Roy Mack's, Ray Ayers and Homer Crews, but now that I have just about reached that goal I can easily understand why such men move with such dignity and aplomb, they are so fat that they have to sit down to tie their shoes, hold onto a chair to put on their pants and their movements are not governed so much by the dignity as it is by undeworked muscles. Well as far as I am concerned it has been a lot of fun eating on that weight and I hope the appearance of dignity. Although I must admit that I'd like to be able to see what is going on under the shadow of my paunch.

Do you follow the same habits every day of do you try out something new every once in a while. It seems to me that I meet the same men, women and dogs every morning when I come to work and they all seem to do the same things every morning at about the same time. O. D. McClintock, Dr. Payne, Ed Blair are usually in my way at the Post Office every morning when I dash in with my frozen fingers to get my mail for their mail boxes all seem to be above, below or to the side of mine and they all bend over and pooch out in such a way that it is impossible for me

to get into my box. Of course I take all of the mail out of my box every morning through force of habit, and spread it all over the floor and sort it so that I can lug it out to my car, and I never quite make it to the door in time to get my foot into it before it closes behind Doctor Payne, I have to turn around and push it open with my best pushing equipment. And I get up every morning and put my shoes on before I put on my pants and then have to strain and push to get my pants on over my No. 10's, and before I put my shoes on I stagger around in the semi-darkness in my bare feet and irritate my wife because she always puts my house shoes at the edge of my bed every night so that if I had any sense at all in the morning, all I would have to do would be to step out into them.

Some day I'm going to try putting on my shirt first, my shoes last, I'm going to get down to the Post Office at 8:30 instead of 8:02, and I'm going to put on my house shoes when I get out of bed and I'm going to give my wife a terrible shock and the folks who have been used to shadow boxing with me at the Post Office trying to get to their mail compartments are going to get to work fifteen minutes earlier and I'm going to wonder what's wrong all that day.

Nearly every town in this area now has a Country Club or is in the process of organizing one. Slaton has the advantage of many towns because we have the Slaton Club House with its surrounding park, but an attractive Country Club would be something worth while too.

The Dean of Journalism of Texas Technological College, Cecil Horne, talked to the Rotary Club last week and his subject was on the advantages of living in a small town.

His main theme was on making the town attractive, trading at home, painting up and keeping up good schools. These are things that most every one in a town, large or small, realizes but like Mark Twain's weather they do nothing about it. The new manager of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, Connie Strickland, in commenting on these subjects some time ago said that he hopes the C. of C. will start a campaign to get the merchants of Slaton to improve the appearances of the buildings over town and I hope he is able to do something about it. There has been considerable work done along this line during the last year but this is something that has to be done continually or any town will soon look as if it had gone to seed.

There are still a number of buildings in Slaton with old antiquated signs painted on their outside walls. A lot of business men

have not changed the arrangements or painted the interior of their buildings in years and years. These things are easy to get used to and one does not realize that a lot of dirt has accumulated on the walls and that furniture and furnishings are shabby and worn. It would pay any executive to get off and look at his place of business and ask himself whether it needs a new coat of paint, a new sign and some rearranging.

There is of course no limit as to the amount of local news that

could be published in a newspaper, but there are many other features that most newspapers carry, some of them that appear in a daily are not suitable for a weekly and I have often wondered whether folks are interested in the kind of comic, or supposed to be comic strips that some weekly newspapers print. Some comic strips amuse me but most of them do not and those that appear in most weekly newspapers seem to be mighty weak milk to me. Occasionally some one asks me why we do not carry comic strips and

I usually tell them that the best ones are not available to weekly papers, which they are not, in other words I tell the truth, which is unusual for a newspaper man.

SUBJECT: BIBLE REPENTANCE

Rom. 1:16 I Cor. 9:16 Gal. 1:18

Bible Repentance is commanded of people, who have the ability thus to repent, as was stated by Paul as he preached to the Athenians who were so "superstitious" (religiously) that in the multiplicity of their devotions they had erected an altar, across which they had inscribed: "TO THE UNKNOWN GOD!" Paul said: And the time of his ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent: Because he hath appointed a day, in which he will judge the world in righteousness, by that man whom he hath ordained." Acts 17:30, 31. JESUS SAID: "except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish," Luke 13:3. John the Baptist preached: "Repent ye," Matt. 3:2. Paul said: "repent and turn to God," Acts 26:38. Thus far we have found that responsible people every where are to REPENT or be lost forever.

WHAT IS THE MEANING OF REPENT? The Greek word for REPENT is "metanoia" and means, "a change of mind"—Mr. Joseph Henry Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon, page

405. The whole object of Peter's preaching in Acts chapter 2 was to get the "devout Jews," "the religious Jews," who were in Jerusalem assembled; to CHANGE THEIR MINDS, then back it up by being BAPTIZED "for their remission of sins," Acts 2:38. The object of Stephens preaching as recorded in Acts chapter 7 was to get those Jews to CHANGE THEIR MINDS; but they refused and instead murdered the preacher. The object of Paul's preaching every where was to get people to CHANGE THEIR MINDS and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance." Hear him as he talks to old king Agrippa: "Whereupon, O King Agrippa, I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision: But shewed first unto them of Damascus, and at Jerusalem, and throughout all the coasts of Judaea, and then to the Gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance." Mahon Reports On Civil Rights

The first test vote of the Session on the so-called civil rights question came in the House of Representatives last week. This question has provoked more hot words than any recent political issue, writes George Mahon, Congressman from this district.

Congressman Keefe of Wisconsin had succeeded in placing a rider on an appropriation bill at a subcommittee meeting which would prevent the segregation of whites and colored in certain vocational schools and hospitals. When the full committee on appropriations met to give final approval to the measure, I joined with other Democrats on the committee in an effort to strike the obnoxious language from the bill. We were able to get enough Republican votes to win the motion and amend the bill.

The next contest came on the floor of the House. Congressman Marcantonio of New York offered a motion to restore the language which we had been successful in striking from the bill in Committee. Democrats voted against the motion almost solidly and we were able to win sufficient Republican support to defeat the Marcantonio amendment.

The so-called civil rights program includes proposals for the passage of Federal anti-poll tax and anti-lynching legislation, plus a so-called FEPC law and legislation which would prohibit the segregation of whites and colored in inter-state travel, and eventually in the schools. In previous years we have been confronted with parts of this program and by voice and vote I have always opposed it and I am continuing my active opposition.

I maintain that a federal anti-poll tax law would be unconstitutional because Art. 1, of the U. S. Constitution, provides that the States, not the federal government, shall fix the qualification of voters. The people of Texas, if they desire, can amend the Texas constitution which provides for the poll tax and substitute a system of registration, but the U. S. Congress has no authority to indirectly amend the Texas consti-

tution. Lynching is a crime which is local in character and should not be handled by Washington authorities but by local and state officials. As to the FEPC and the proposals to prevent the segregation of the whites and colored on railroad trains and in schools, I take the position of those who say that the federal government has no right to interfere with local laws and customs in this regard, and that our system for segregation of the races is necessary and in the best interest of both races.

But many of the northern Democrats and many Republicans are loudly advocating the so-called civil rights program in an effort to get the negro and minority votes in the doubtful states of the North and East.

The Republicans have a majority in both the House and Senate. Therefore, the only chance to stop this program is through a non-partisan fight against it by both Democrats and Republicans such as proved successful in our effort to eliminate the so-called civil rights rider from the appropriation bill.

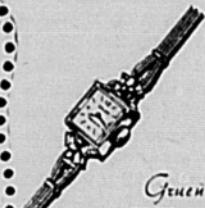
