



Turkey poults on a highly purified diet containing all necessary nutrients except nicotinic acid grew poorly in tests at University of Maryland. They developed certain deficiency symptoms such as inflammation of the mouth, diarrhea, poor feathering and perosis. 

Let us turn back to the Old Testament for some examples of this very principle. Paul says concerning the Old Testament scriptures; "For whatsoever things were written aforetime, were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope." (Rom. 15:4). I think we will all agree that Noah was saved by grace. But how was he saved by grace. But how was he saved by grace. First — we seed God is his salvation, God revealed unto Noah, the impending danger, the flood. Then God told him what he would have to do in order to escape the danger.

Now without the goodness or grace of God Noah would have perished in the flood, o, the grace of God appeared to him telling him what was to happen, and teaching him what he should do, that he might be saved therefrom. But suppose. Noah had not believed what God told him? Surely he would

have drowned. And even if he had believed, and yet refused to do as God directed, he still would have perished. I think we all can see this great truth. Thus Noah was saved by grace, through faith. Made perfect by obedience.

Another example will help us to better understand this eternal principle of Jehovah. That of Naaman, the leper, This man had a disease which could not be cured by mortal man, only by the grace of God, it had to be revealed to him what to do. Thus we see him going down to the prophet of God, to inquire what he must do in order that he might be cured. He was told to go and dip himself seven times in the river Jordon. This was a very foolish thing indeed. Why anyone would know that there was no efficacy in the waters of the river Jordon. How could dipping himself in Jordon, possibly cure the leprosy? Thus Naaman reasoned, and became

very angry, and started home in a rage. Now here we have an example of the grace of God appearing to a man, yet the man was not saved. And had he continued the course he started he would have died with the leprosy. However, he was finally induced to believe what the prophet of God told him. But still he was not saved. He had to complete his obedience before he was saved by grace. Hence, this man was saved by grace through faith. This faith had to be a working faith. Paul says that is the kind of faith which avails, (Gal. 5:6) and James says faith without works is dead being alone. (James 2:17) Hence when Paul said, "By grace are ye saved, through faith." He had in mind the faith which would avail, and that is a working faith. A faith that leads one to do that which God commands.
