## Texas Roundup

Tabulation of bids at Austin on 225,000 acres of public school land will be completed tonight, and bidders will be informed of results tomorrow, Land Commissioner Bascom Giles reported today.

There were approximately 4,000 individual bids.

The highest bid received was one of \$101 per acre on a tract in Lubbock county, Giles said.

Receipts of the sale go to the public schools' permanent fund, which now exceeds \$130,000,000.

The revenue bond issues for waterworks improvements and extension and sewer improvement and extension carried by a vote of more than 2 to 1 in a city election held here Saturday.

A total of 361 legal votes — estimated to represent approximately 60 per cent of the city's voting power — were cast, with the following results:

FOR the issuance of waterworks improvement and extension revenue bonds, 252 votes; AGAINST, 109 votes.

FOR the issuance of sewer improvement and extension revenue bonds, 262 votes; AGAINST, 99 votes.

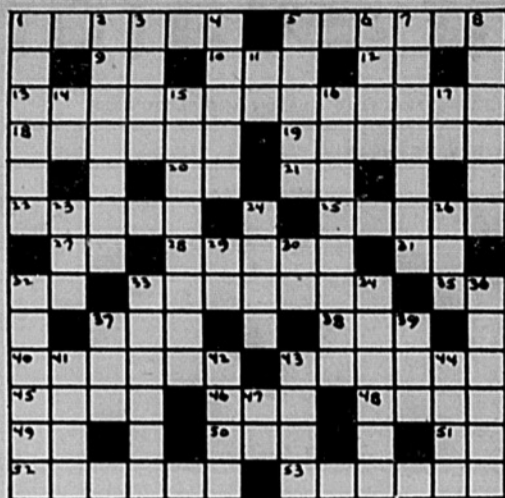

**Casual Comment**

Skirts are longer, but petticoats are still short—as any one can see, without half trying.

The Atlantic occasionally offers awards for the best autobiographical narratives. Certainly there has been little of the dramatic in my own uneventful life's history, but, being in a venturesome mood I wove from my memories, a "Short and Simple Annal." In it were incidents of our ups and downs, trying to pay for our first home, during droughts, sandstorms, and low priced cotton; of "water-hauling" once, when we drove in a big pond to "load up" our spring-seat slipped suddenly off the water tank, and we were catapulted heels over head into the water; of the era when the first cars began to "come down the pike." Horses were scared to death of them, and when we saw one coming, we felt that we were facing calamity, for we never knew whether, by the time we got by it, that we would still be on top of our vehicle—or it on top of us; it told of our first vacation, which took us to Galveston just in time to be there through its second big storm, etc.

However, I found that the misgivings I had in submitting my Mss. to the Atlantic in the first place, were fully justified, for, after a period of hopeful waiting, it landed back in my mailbox, accompanied by a line containing the surely wholly unnecessary information, that it "did not qualify." So that was that.

This magazine has had "90 years of continuous publication." I concede "the Atlantic knows best." I have copies of it that are many years old, as well as many received on my last three year subscription. As I am one of those thrifty souls, who cannot bear to discard any magazine that might contain an article that I may later wish to re-read along with my Reader's Digests, I have Atlantics "all over the place." I have just read a long poem in the July issue. Its message perhaps eludes only myself. It begins, "The boy's mind that too much machinery Dazzled as blank as death, hangs hawking high— Slow-roll and climb — across the Sunday sky Of beaches uncomputed by artil-

ery," etc, etc. Since reading it, any chance that I might ever be a contributor to the Atlantic, seems even more remote. I could never write anything even faintly comparable in a thousand years.

Candidates who grow either lyrical or tearful, as they picture our old people sitting in a hovel gnawing a bone, on their present pensions, leave me utterly unimpressed. It sounds like political, vote-seeking "hokey" to me.

What, I should like to know, is the matter with \$30 a month? It's supposable that, if one has been doing anything at all during the years, and has saved even an occasional penny, that, by the time they have reached the "old age pension" time of life, that they are at least partially self-supporting; that in that time they have accumulated enough, say, to keep themselves in bread, and that if they receive each month, \$30 worth of free gravy to spoon over it—well, that should be a very real help.

I resent these blaring promises of bonuses and pensions, which are really nothing but bribes, and which, even if carried out, would make of us a nation of mendicants waiting for government hand-outs.

I have the utmost sympathy for old people, but I consider the young people a lot more important and also that they are much more in need of help.

Some understanding person has said, "there are no bad boys," then they should not be allowed to grow bad for lack of a chance. Petty delivry, and juvenile delinquency in general, is caused mostly by the emptiness of life.

Of more interest than the "loot" is the adventure, the excitement, and the amusement they get out of "puzzling the cops."

If they could have sufficient clubs, camps, amateur theatricals, understanding and interested sponsors, to whom they could bring their problems, places equipped where they could work and develop any natural talent, their help would be incalculable.

Why do not candidates talk of our bright high-school graduates, who are unable to go on with their education.

No, these kids do not have a vote, but the future of America is in their hands.



**Better Control of Farm Dogs Sought**

The answer to sheep and poultry killings by roaming dogs lies largely with the farmers themselves, in the opinion of Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City. "There is little hope for relief from such depredations until owners of farm dogs are willing to assume greater responsibility for them," he states. "This means knowing at all times the whereabouts and doings of their dogs. Sheep and fowl losses cannot be

reduced as long as farmers themselves allow their dogs to roam at large nights and get into bad company and habits. No farmer would think of allowing such liberties to his son or daughter, and he should not permit it to his dog or dogs. "The farmer should think of his dog in the same light as he does of his automobile. Both, properly controlled, are wonderful helps on the farm. But without brakes the automobile becomes a dangerous weapon. Similarly, the dog who runs at large day or night—the uncontrolled dog—is a constant invitation to trouble. No dog is under control whose owner does not know at any given time where he is or what he is up to."

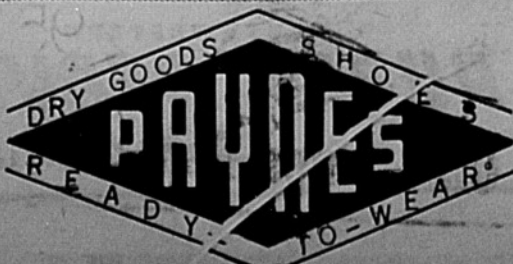

## CHICK CHATS

### ARE YOUR EGGS HANDLED RIGHT?

Too many people feel that egg-handling is just another job that must be done as a matter of course in the management of a laying flock. There is plenty of evidence that the gathering and handling of eggs is one of the poultryman's really important tasks—and not merely from the standpoint that it is his way of collecting the fruits of his and his hens' labors, either.

### Higher Grades

Proper handling of eggs can increase a poultry raiser's income by a sizeable amount over the period of a few months. On the other hand, slipshod methods in caring for eggs before they are marketed can result in quite a big loss in profits. The reason is, of course, that well-handled eggs are usually graded higher; and that means a higher price per case.

What are some of the things a poultry raiser should do to produce the top market grades of eggs? Here are a few of the important points he should remember:

### Pointers on Egg Care

1. Produce clean eggs. Have plenty of nests, keep the nesting material clean, don't allow birds to roost in nests, and watch your flock for signs of diarrhea that may soil eggs.
2. Gather eggs at least 3 times a day, using ventilated baskets.
3. Cool eggs promptly and keep them cool. A temperature below 60 degrees is preferred. Keep the egg room fairly moist and free of odors.
4. Pack the eggs carefully, small end down. If possible candle them before packing and don't send cracked, thin-shelled, or badly stained eggs to market.
5. Market eggs at least twice a week. Avoid rough handling of cases and protect eggs against extreme temperatures on the way to the market.

### Outwitting the Fox

A means used by turkey and poultry growers to outwit foxes is a single-strand electric fence completely surrounding the pen, according to Turkey World. This has the advantage of being readily movable when the turkeys are moved. Such a wire should be placed about 15 or 20 inches from the ground. Another idea is to spray a strip around the pen about 30 inches wide with used machine oil or a mixture of machine oil and kerosene with a little turpentine added for odor.

### Hens Need Minerals

Except for calcium, phosphorus, sodium and manganese, adequate amounts of the minerals required by laying hens are furnished by the grain, mill by-products, protein and vitamin supplements. To secure best production, laying hens should be supplied about 2.2 per cent calcium and 0.8 per cent phosphorus in the total ration.
