



In It were incidents of our ups and downs, trying to pay for our first home, during drouths, sand-storms, and low priced cotton; of "water-hauling" once, when we drove in a big pond to "load up" our spring-seat slipped suddenly off the water tank, and we were catapulted heels over head into the water; of the era when the first cars began to "come down the pike." Horses were scared to death of them, and when we saw one coming, we felt that we were facing calamity, for we never knew whether, by the time we got by it, that we would still be on top of our vehicle-or it on top of us; it told of our first vac-ation, which took us to Galveston just in time to be there through its second big storm, etc.

I have the utmost sympathy for old people, but I consider the young people a lot more important and also that hey. Some understanding person has said, "there are no bad boys," then they should not be allowed to grow bad for lack of a chance. Petty theivery, and juvenile de-linquency in general, is caused mostly by the emptiness of life.
