PROTECT FLOCK FROM WORMINESS

To keep your chickens free of severe damage caused by intestinal worms, follow a systematic control program for the rest of the growing season and after fall housing.

Remove Filth

The frequent removal of filth will prevent worm infection in your flock by reducing the number of worm eggs present.

For such familiar worm species as large roundworms and cecal worms there are dependable commercial medicines which may be given to the flock with good results.

Uniform Growth

Poultry raisers who follow a good worm-control program find that it helps prevent damage from intestinal worms, thereby promoting uniform growth of the birds and encouraging higher egg production.

In effect, worms cause slow starvation. Great numbers of them in a fowl's intestinal tract make it impossible for the bird's body to assimilate food as it should.

What They Write:

The following letter was written by Major L. M. Garrigues of Nanking, China, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Garrigues. It is one of several which the Slatonite has printed and which tell of the quaint and interesting customs of China.

Nanking, China
21 June, 1948

Dear Mom and Pop,
"Well, June 'teenth has come and gone and we didn't even have any watermelon. So now I guess we will just have to struggle along until they start coming into the local market. It seems that in the U.S. we always managed to have watermelon on June 'teenth."
"We surely had a wonderful day yesterday. Helen fixed up a big picnic lunch of sandwiches and lemonade and pickles and boiled eggs. We left the house about 12:30 and started riding around. We went way out in to the country and made a circular tour back into the city at a different gate. It sure seemed nice to get away from all the noise and dirt that is so prominent around Nanking. I believe we were able to get lots of good pictures, both movies and stills. We saw the farmers harvesting their rice, or on second thought, I suppose it must have been wheat. I can't tell them apart over here. They were busy every where we went."
"In one field the farmers would be just planting the rice or wheat and in the adjoining field they would be busy threshing it. Everything is done by hand with the help of either an ox or water

buffalo to help with the plowing. We have seen some men being used as a horse in pulling a plow sometimes. The oxen and buffalo are hugh beasts and seem just as gentle as a kitten. The plows they use are big wooden things and are very crude. Even the disc plow is usually made of wood. They cut the wheat all by hand and after it is cut they spread it all out over either the road or a smooth level piece of clean ground. Then they have a long paddle affair made of bamboo that they beat the stalks of wheat with to knock out the grain from the chaff. Then after that part of the job is done they clean the chaff from the grain by winnowing just like they used to do during the Biblical times. They will get a large scoop of grain and toss this up into the air and then the wind blows all the chaff away. It seems like it takes them a long time to do all this but then they have all the time in the world it seems. So no one ever seems to be in a hurry over here. When they plant the rice they flood a small tract of land and then plant the rice by hand in straight rows. But first the rice had been sown to grow the shoots that are later put in the rows. They pull it up from one plot and then set it out in the other in the rows. All these are called paddies and from the air it makes all of China look like a big crazy patch quilt. The different colors come from the crops being at different stages of growth all the time. To flood the paddies and to irrigate the rest of the crops they use crude wooden paddle wheels like I described to you once before. The kind where from

one to four men stand on little peddles like a tricycle peddle and pump water from a canal into the field by means of rotating an endless chain with little wooden cups or paddles on it. The entire country side is covered with a network of little canals. They use these canals for the water and also as a means of going places since they have no highways or roads to speak of. I suppose you could get in a little boat that they pole along in the canals here and you could go any place in China that way. Since all the canals seem to run into other canals just like our highways do back home.

"We were sad to hear that granddad was pretty low, but then we have been expecting that for a long time now. We expect to hear at any time that he has passed on."
"Yesterday was Father's day. We would have liked to call Pop then, but didn't know where we would be able to locate him in McCamey or if he would be home. So instead we sent him a cable. Certainly hope he got the wire okay."
