## West Texas Roundup

A record in construction in Levelland is claimed by the carpenters working fast and furiously on the two additional temporary school buildings located on 4th street between Avenues C and D.

Newby Pratt, former Coach and High school principal of Colorado City high school, before entering the navy during World War II, was elected Mayor of Colorado City in Wednesday's special election.

The vote, strictly a write-in proposition, as there were no announced candidates, resulted in Pratt receiving 229 of the 302 votes cast. J. A. Sadler, a former mayor, received 68 votes.

## High School Students Elect Council And Officers For 48-49

The following was the feature story in the Bi-weekly Tigers Cage this week:

Glyndon Dawson was elected Student Council president of Slaton High school for the 1948-49 school year. This is the first time Slaton High has had a Student Council since 1944.

Representatives from each class are: Sue Ann Williams and Laurence Morgan, Senior; Phillip Morgan and Carlton Scroggins, Junior; Paula Maxey and JoAnn Kahlick, Sophomore; Sally Buchanan and Joan Reissig, Freshman.

Dawson has lived in Slaton 17 years. He plays center and guard on the football team. Glyndon has attended Slaton High four years.

Student council is to be composed of two representatives elected from each class. Qualifications for membership in the council are: a department grade average of 90 and an average scholastic grade of 85 during the students last semester in school preceding election.

Officers of the council shall be a President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer.

President shall be elected by a majority vote of the student body, and each of the other officers by a majority vote of the council.

President of Student Council shall preside at all meetings. The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President and aid him in settling council problems and appoint all committees recommended by the Student Council.

Student Council shall meet regularly once a month and shall have such called meetings as are considered necessary by the council officers and the President.

J. L. Preston, who covers a lot of farming territory, says that there will be a lot more cotton ginned in this area than most folks are predicting. While some of the land has already been turned over to grazing because the cotton was so poor that it was not worth gathering, there are some spots even in the dry land farming, that will produce as high as half a bale per acre. It is not going to be even as good a crop as last year but neither is it a complete failure, said Mr. Preston.

## Irrigation Being Expanded Here

The well is 178 feet deep, has 110 feet of water in it and is estimated to be producing 1000 gallons per minute. The land will be used for grain, cotton and alfalfa.

## Draft Registration Office Open Here

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal of Sunday, Oct. 3rd carried the following under a Slaton date line:

A draft registration office, for convenience of late registrants and those to become 18 years of age, in this vicinity, has been opened at the chamber of commerce office in the City Hall here. It was announced Tuesday by P. G. Meading, C. of C. manager who yesterday qualified as a registrar and will have charge of the work here.

The office here will work in co-operation with central registration headquarters in Lubbock, and will service applicants the same as at the central office, the announcement said.

At the area central registration office here, which was designated to serve Lubbock, Crosby, Garza, and Lynn counties, Mrs. Viola Younger, office supervisor, said that approval was given the Slaton office as a convenience to those in that area to serve local residents and transients alike.

Mrs. Younger said similar registrars have been named, and authorized to act, at Lorenzo, Ralls, Crosbyton, Post, Tahoka, and O'Donnell.

She said the law provides that youths becoming 18 years of age are to register within five days of their birthday, and that they may register at any of the offices, or at the central office here.

The Slaton Tigers got back in stride last Friday night in their first conference game of the season, defeating Tahoka's Bulldogs by a score of 25 to 7. The largest crowd to attend a football game in Slaton for several years was on hand, including a large number of Tahoka fans. The game was filled with thrills for the fans, although several fumbles hurt each team.

Early in the first quarter, on Slaton's first possession of the ball, right halfback Laurence Morgan broke free and raced 44 yards for the first touchdown. Slaton failed to convert the extra point.

In the second quarter, honors went to Tahoka. The Bulldogs, with halfbacks Farr and Small making end sweeps, drove from the Tiger's 49 to the 2 yard line, where quarterback Boyd plunged over for the touchdown. Carter kicked the extra point and the half ended with Tahoka in the lead 7 to 6.

The Tigers came back strong in the third quarter, with Captain Tommie Smith showing his powerful driving ability. Aided by plunges by halfbacks Bobbie Taylor and Morgan, he carried the ball to the Bulldog 2 yard line, where quarterback Cecil Bybee plunged over for the second touchdown. Again the try for extra point failed.

In the fourth quarter, with excellent blocking by the line, composed of Alton Perry, Alvis Collins, Carl Williams, Johnnie Melcher, Leon Moore, Glyndon Dawson, and Jerry Huckabee, Smith led a drive from his own 46 yard line and in seven plays, carried the ball over for the third tally. Pass for extra point was incomplete. With about three minutes left to play, Smith intercepted a Tahoka pass on their 40 yard line and in two plunges brought it back to the 10 yard line. Halfback Ed Willis then went around right end and crossed the goal line standing up. Smith kicked the extra point, making the final score 25 to 7.

In the last half of the game Coach Tillery sent in a number of substitutes, giving them a chance to gain some valuable experience.

The Tic Band, directed by Mr. Vic Williams, played all during the game, and at the half time, drum major Freddie England led them through some intricate maneuvers on the field. The pep squad also turned out in full force.

The Lubbock Cowhands are scheduled to play here tonight. They are said to be a strong and experienced team, composed of men who just missed making the Westerner squad. They defeated the Plainview B team 33 to 0 last Friday night. Game time, 8 p. m.

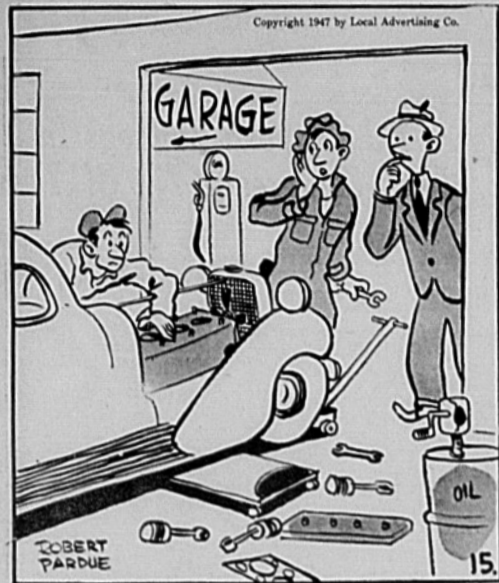

### HOW ARE YOUR BIRDS FEEDING?

Are the appetites of your laying hens up to par? This is an important question because the way your layers feed has a direct relationship to the rate at which they produce eggs. Here is a significant bit of research from an Ohio State University poultry specialist that should tell you how important a good appetite is in a laying hen. A 5-pound hen will eat 65 pounds of feed each year just to maintain her body weight. For each 7 eggs she lays, she consumes only one additional pound of feed. In other words, a bird which produces 210 eggs a year eats only 20 pounds of feed more than a 70-egg-a-year producer.

### Eats More, Lays More

While the bird with the vigorous appetite may eat slightly more during the day than sluggish feeders, she is really a far more economical bird because she lays more eggs in ratio to the amount of feed she consumes.

A flock in 40 per cent production consumes about 24 pounds of feed daily. A flock in 70 per cent production eats about 30 pounds of feed in the same time. But it takes less feed to get a case of eggs out of the 70 percenters.

Good feeding and good laying can be regulated by the flock owner. How he feeds and what he feeds can determine the profit or loss the flock will show.

Make a special effort to keep every part of your laying house sanitary. You yourself may be guilty of spreading disease when you enter the house with dirty boots or bring in contaminated feed sacks or crates. There are countless other ways for infection to enter the house so it's up to you to be on the watch every day.

Make sure there are no cold drafts in the building for they may weaken the birds' resistance to respiratory infections or possibly other diseases. At the same time, the ventilation should be good enough to assure a supply of fresh air.

**U. S. Eats Fruit**

**What They Write**

**WHAT THEY WRITE:**

The following is a portion of a letter from Major L. M. Garrigues, stationed in China, written to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Garrigues of Slaton, in which he describes a trip to Peiping, China:

"Nanking, China  
15 Sept., 1948

"The main highlight of the trip was that I got to go to the Great Wall of China. It is about 45 or 50 miles north of Peiping and is over some very rough and mountainous country. Some people have said that the wall would be the only man made thing on earth that would be visible from the moon. I believe that I have some good pictures that I can show you when I get home. We were lucky enough to get with a party of navy people who were going up. We left by rail from Peiping about 7:30 Sunday morning and arrived at the little station where the railroad goes through the wall into Mongolia, about 11:30. We had to go up a very steep grade for the last ten miles and had to have two engines to pull us up. From this station we had to walk about one mile to the wall. There were soldiers all around and they were ready for business too. We had had arrangements already made so we just showed them the passes we had and then went on up the wall.

"It is amazing how they could possibly have made this wall, considering that it was constructed about two thousand years ago when there was no modern machinery or anything else like that. The wall is supposed to be ten thousand Chinese miles long, or about three thousand of our miles. It isn't one long continuous wall though, but is made into several walls, some of which join. It is very well preserved and in fact

would put some of the recent construction here in the shade. There are spots where it is about to fall into ruin, but all in all, the part that we saw is remarkably sound. The wall was built to keep the invaders from Mongolia from entering into China and it took about twenty years to construct. But I don't see how they could have finished it in twenty years. There are places where the wall goes nearly straight up over some of the mountains. I suppose we walked for about one mile on top of it up and down some mountains. One side was China and on the other side was Inner Mongolia. The wall was made of hand hewn stones about one foot square. It was about thirty feet high and maybe ten to fourteen feet wide at the top. About every quarter of a mile there are some lookout stations. The gate where we stopped is one of about three that lead into the north and the railroad goes through this one. Of course, in order to make way for the railroad they had to tear down part of the wall to make an entrance.

"The frontier is well guarded and they search everything that goes through it. This is the gate through which the great Camel Caravans from the Gobi Desert come. While we were up on top of the wall a great distance from the gate, there was one to go through. I believe there were about twenty-eight camels in it. I took both some movie pictures and still pictures of it, but since I was so far away, I doubt whether they will be any good. The caravan goes on to Peiping after coming through the gate. I think it takes them two or three days to complete the trip on to Peiping from here. They usually bring, furs, charcoal, etc., from Siberia.

"After we had eaten our lunch

on top of the wall (we brought the lunches from Peiping) we went on down to the gate and went through into Mongolia. I suppose we went about a quarter of a mile. There is a great valley at this place and we could see for many miles on toward the Great Gobi Desert. We finally arrived back in Peiping about 6:30 Sunday evening, and I don't believe I have ever been so tired. It must have been a tremendous task to have constructed the wall, since it was a hard just to walk practically straight up it over some of the mountains.

"Another interesting evening there was when we went to a Peking Duck dinner. There were about ten of us on this evening. And everything was strictly Chinese. They bring the ducks into us to pick the ones we want. They are dead and plucked, but I don't believe that they have been dressed yet. After we pick the ones we want they take them away and bring them back completely cooked in about twenty minutes. The Peking duck dinner is really named because of the type of duck they serve. The ducks are either nailed down or tied down and are fed until they are nearly round. If they are unable to eat by themselves, they are fed by hand. After the ducks have been cooked they bring it to the table and just slice off the skin with a thin layer of fat and white meat and this is put along with a delicious sauce and some thin onion stems and rolled up into a thin patty of dough, similar to the Mexican enchilada. After eating most of the meat from the duck (incidentally, the meat is all white,) they took the carcass away and made a delicious soup of it and bring this back to the table for us to eat."

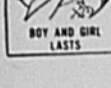

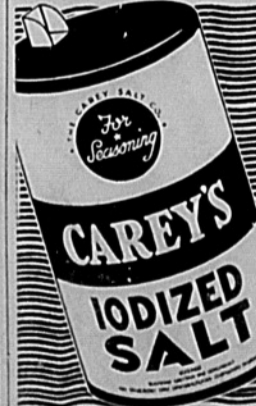
Invisible Soap Tray
