**CULL CAREFULLY  
FOR BETTER  
PRODUCTION**  
Pullets that show little  
promise of developing into  
sturdy, productive layers  
should be culled before your  
flock goes to the laying house  
this fall. By eliminating them  
you will save feed and space  
and increase your chance of  
avoiding heavy disease losses  
later on.

**Eliminate Poor Producers**  
No matter how carefully you  
may have managed your pul-  
lets during the summer range  
season, there are bound to be  
some birds that are not up to  
par physically. These are the  
chickens that will produce  
poorly. Get rid of them.

Many poultrymen have  
brought their pullets in from  
range by now, but even after  
they're in the laying house  
careful culling should continue  
until all of the poor egg pro-  
ducers are eliminated. And by  
all means be particularly  
thorough in culling if you  
failed to eliminate the non-pro-  
viders at housing time.  
Don't keep the runts, the slug-  
gish or inactive birds. Segre-  
gate birds having poor feather-  
ing. Cull the birds that have  
long shallow heads, dull and  
sunken eyes, or narrow, short  
poorly fleshed backs. Watch  
for narrow pale shanks, a sign  
of weakness.

**Keep Healthy Birds**  
The birds you want to keep  
are the lively ones that have  
vigorous appetites—the pullets  
of good flesh and sturdy build.  
You want birds that lay more  
and better eggs. So look for  
strong, deep yellow shanks, for  
they indicate a bird is rugged  
and has been raised well. You  
want birds having wide, fleshy  
backs, usually a characteris-  
tic of a good layer. Examine  
the combs and wattles—if they  
are healthy in appearance, not  
pale or shrunken, the bird is  
probably a good one.

Hens in a rigidly culled flock  
are usually uniformly high in  
rate of egg production. What  
is more, this kind of flock is  
no feed waster; the mash and  
grain and grit you pour into  
the hoppers give each bird  
maximum nutritive benefits.  
Feed is wasted on weak chick-  
ens because, while they may  
retain good appetites, their  
egg production fails to meas-  
ure up to the cost of the feed  
they consume.

**WESTERN MARKET NEWS**  
Cotton, poultry and eggs con-  
tinue to climb higher, fruits and  
vegetables picked up strength,  
livestock and most grains except  
sorghums were steady to strong at  
southwest markets last week, US-  
DA's production and Marketing  
Administration reported.

Cotton advanced about \$6 a bale  
into new high ground last week.  
Nearly all grades found ready buy-  
ers. Demand continued stronger  
with shippers buying current gin-  
nings mainly to fill back orders.  
Farmers generally sold cotton as  
fast as they ginned it. Sales in the  
10 spot markets jumped to 200,700  
bales last week compared with the  
172,500 bales the preceding week  
and 179,300 a year ago for the  
same period.  
Eggs and poultry continued to  
advance last week as broad demand  
accented by the meat shortage  
quickly cleared light supplies at  
most southwest markets. Turkeys  
were firm too with young toms  
selling mostly at 33 to 35 cents a  
pound at Ft. Worth.

Southwest cattle markets re-  
ported slightly heavier receipts last  
week. Prices held generally steady  
for light runs of slaughter classes,  
but stockers had a weak under-  
tone. Common and medium cows  
brought \$8.25 to \$11.50, Houston;  
\$9 to \$1.50, Wichita and \$9 to \$12,  
Oklahoma City. Common cows  
brought \$10 to \$14, Denver and  
medium and good grades, \$10.50 to  
\$13.50, San Antonio. Common and  
medium steers and yearlings re-  
alized \$11.50 to \$14.50, Houston,  
while medium and good grades  
brought \$14 to \$18, Ft. Worth.  
Southwest hog markets contin-  
ued to sell all weights and classes  
at ceiling prices as meager sup-  
plies failed to satisfy the broad  
demand.

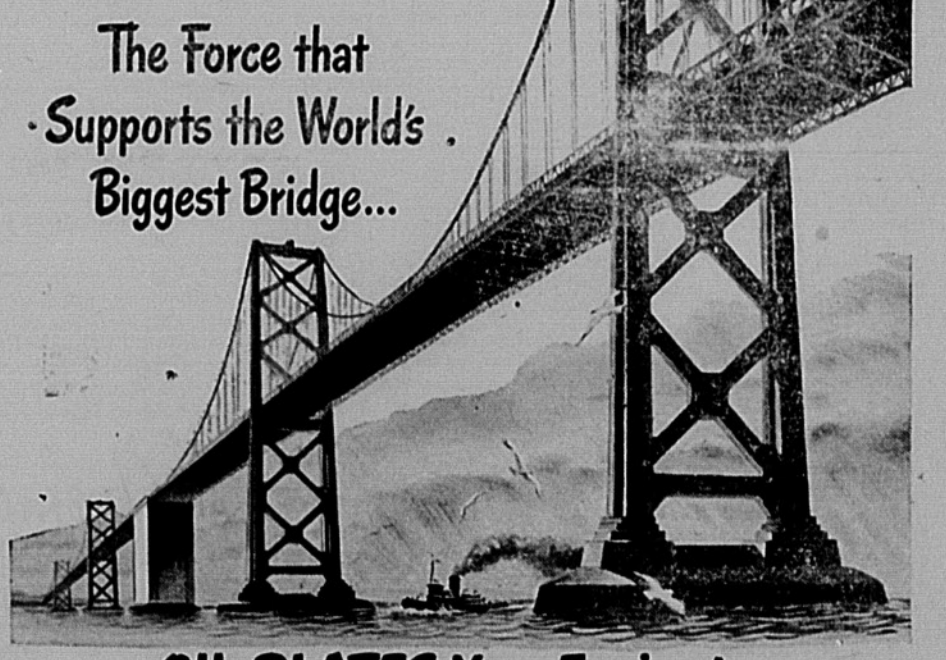

Locomotive engineer Wm. Rust, and family are spending a few days in East Texas, Tennessee and Kentucky visiting friends and relatives.

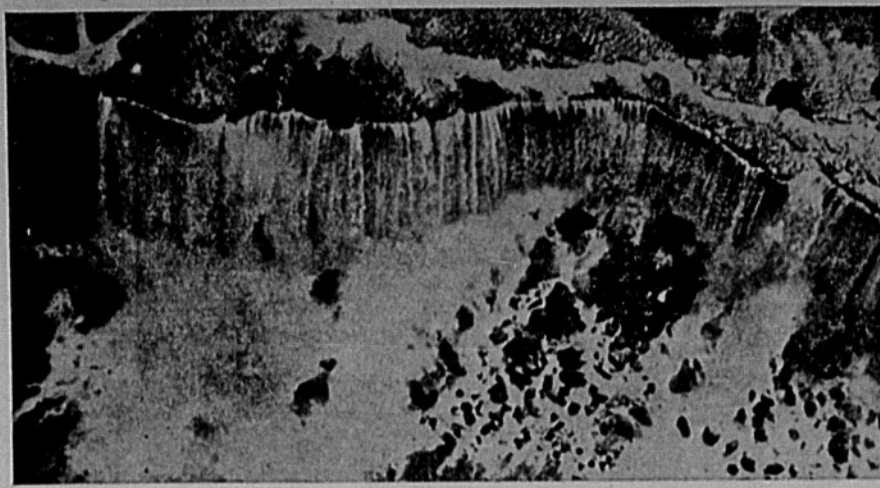
Several of the Locomotive firemen who are due to take the examination for promotion to engineers in November are now writing on their examinations in the Master Mechanic's office.

Mrs. B. A. Hanna, wife of Machinist Hanna has gone to Dallas to visit relatives.

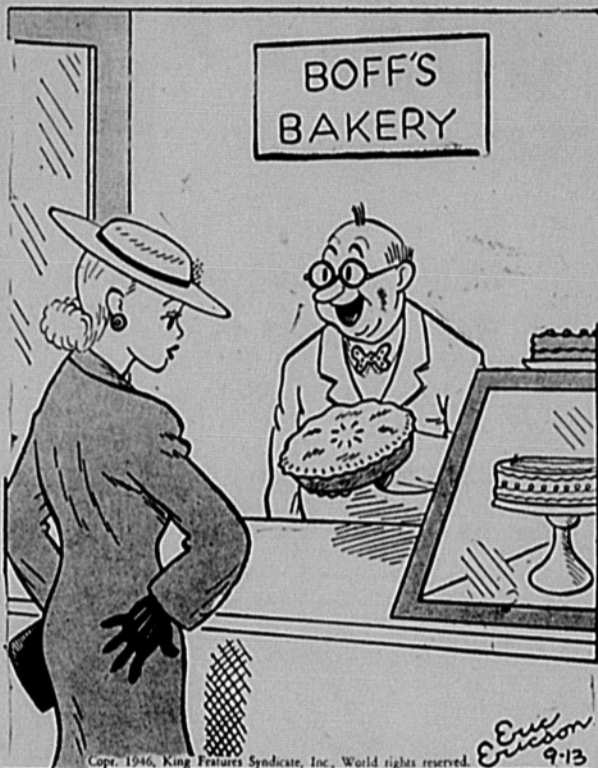

THE VETERAN'S FRIEND

Q. If a disabled veteran completes his on-the-job training and is unemployed can he draw unemployment compensation?  
A. Yes, under Public Law 346, he can draw adjusted unemployment compensation up to a period of 52 weeks provided he is able and available for work at the time and has not drawn compensation previously.  
Q. Do disabled veterans have any preference over other veterans in purchase of war surplus materials?  
A. No. The War Assets Administration has classified all veterans in one group. The WAA gives veterans first choice on a number of items, and veteran priority is topped only by the federal agencies of the U. S. Government.  
Q. Is a veteran disabled in occupation service or during the present emergency period eligible for membership in the Disabled American Veterans?  
A. Yes. Until the President declares World War II and the pres-

**Tells of Training Methods to Overcome Common Dog Faults**

A well-trained dog is a much more agreeable and amusing companion than the harum-scarum, "rough-neck" dog that has never been taught the niceties of canine etiquette, says the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City. Dogs are not born with good manners any more than are children. A badly behaved dog is a reflection on his owner.

One of the most common faults of dogs is jumping up on people. Usually the dog does this in an over-exuberance of friendliness. But no matter how sociable the dog's intentions are, no one wants clean clothing smeared with dirty paw marks. The best time to start training against this habit is when the puppy is three or four months of age. Every time he jumps up, he should be pushed away with a sharp-toned command of "No!"

There are two good methods for training older dogs out of this habit. One system is to grasp the dog's front paws when he jumps up, hold them firmly, and at the same time reach out with one foot and step slightly on the dog's back feet. If this procedure is followed every time the dog jumps up, he soon learns to associate discomfort with jumping on people, and abandons the practice. Another cure for this habit is raising the knee just as the dog jumps so that the dog's chest will be hit, and he is thoroughly jarred and perhaps even toppled over backward. The knee should be raised and lowered as quickly as possible so that when the dog regains his balance and looks up, he sees you standing quietly as though nothing had occurred.

Either of these two methods, followed consistently, should stop the most persistent jumper. It will serve no useful purpose, however, to correct the dog on one occasion, and pet him the next time he flings himself joyously upon you. The procedure must be followed every time the dog jumps up. It is helpful if your friends can be persuaded to follow these same methods, then the dog soon learns he must not jump on any one at all, as he gets the same handling from everybody.

Sometimes a house-dog will decide the floor is not comfortable enough for him and will start using the chairs, sofas and beds for resting places. Once a dog has acquired the habit of sitting on furniture it requires a good deal

of firmness and patience to cure him. The dog should be pushed to the floor whenever he is discovered on the furniture, and scolded in a severe and shocked tone. Occasionally a dog knows better than to get on the furniture in the presence of the family, but will

Immediately avail himself of the best chair in the house when he finds himself alone. Placing a set mousetrap on the chair or bed will discourage this habit. The dog's weight will spring the trap, making a loud snap, which will not harm the dog in the least, but will startle him sufficiently to cause him to lose all interest in any place where he has this unpleasant experience.

Dogs that bark and howl whenever they're left alone often are a problem. The best way to avoid trouble of this sort is to commence training when the dog is young. Start out by leaving him closed in a room by himself for short periods. If he barks, go to him, scold him and give him a light slap or two on the rump with a folded newspaper. Do not go back more than once, though, or the dog will get the idea he can make you come to him by barking. The periods can be gradually lengthened until the dog becomes accustomed to being alone and realizes he is not being permanently deserted by his owner whenever he finds himself without company.
