**GET POULTRY HOUSE**  
**READY FOR WINTER**

As winter approaches it is well to consider some of the cold weather precautions generally believed necessary to assure healthy and comfortable living conditions for a flock of chickens.  
Basically, a house should be staunch enough to protect birds from the cold, the wind, the rain and the snow without shutting off fresh air and sunlight. If your house is large enough for your flock and has been constructed well enough to provide protection against the weather, it will be comparatively easy for you to keep your birds comfortable and healthy.

**Have You Good Ventilation?**  
While the type of construction will probably be determined by the climate zone in which you live, there are some construction features that are common to poultry houses in all parts of the country. One of these is a good system of ventilation. There are several ways to attain adequate ventilation and any one of them is satisfactory so long as it provides fresh air without drafts and helps keep the house dry. There should be plenty of windows in the front of the house to provide a source of light, probably enough of them so there is at least one square foot of window space for every 20 or 30 square feet of floor space.

In cold climates special attention must be given to insulation. By equipping your house with double walls and filling the "dead" space between the walls with insulation material, the birds can be protected from drafts and extreme cold.  
**At Least 12 Feet Wide**  
No poultry house should be so narrow that it is difficult to place the equipment. A small house should be at least 12 feet wide. Long houses should be partitioned into units at 30-foot intervals to prevent drafts and to keep the flocks of these units segregated. Partitions should be flush to the floor, solid, and at least two and one-half feet high.  
The house should be big enough to provide about three square feet of floor space for each bird, if your flock is a light breed; for heavy breeds, about four square feet per bird is required.

**BEXAR COUNTY PIG MAKES HEADLINES**

A pig that places eighth in the great State Fair of Texas junior livestock exposition doesn't usually deserve a story all to itself.

But in the case of the Poland China barrow of 15-year-old Eugene Duke of Bexar County it is that and more, too. For his story is one that doesn't happen often, a rare combination of drama, tragedy—and courage.

Young Duke lives on a farm ten miles southeast of San Antonio. On the night of Thursday, Sept. 26, the worst flood in San Antonio's history overflowed Chipideras Creek near his house. The water swirled against the Duke house, crumpled it. Gene and his sister escaped by clinging to a floating tree. But his mother and brother weren't so lucky. Their bodies were found the next day, unbreathing.

Gene had been grooming three pigs for the State Fair. After the flood one was found dead. Another is still missing. The third was recovered last week at a farm farther down the river, lame, bruised and ill.

Gene had his heart set on exhibiting those pigs. When the water subsided, he worked with his one surviving pig long and hard. He didn't expect to win any prizes. But the pig finished eighth.

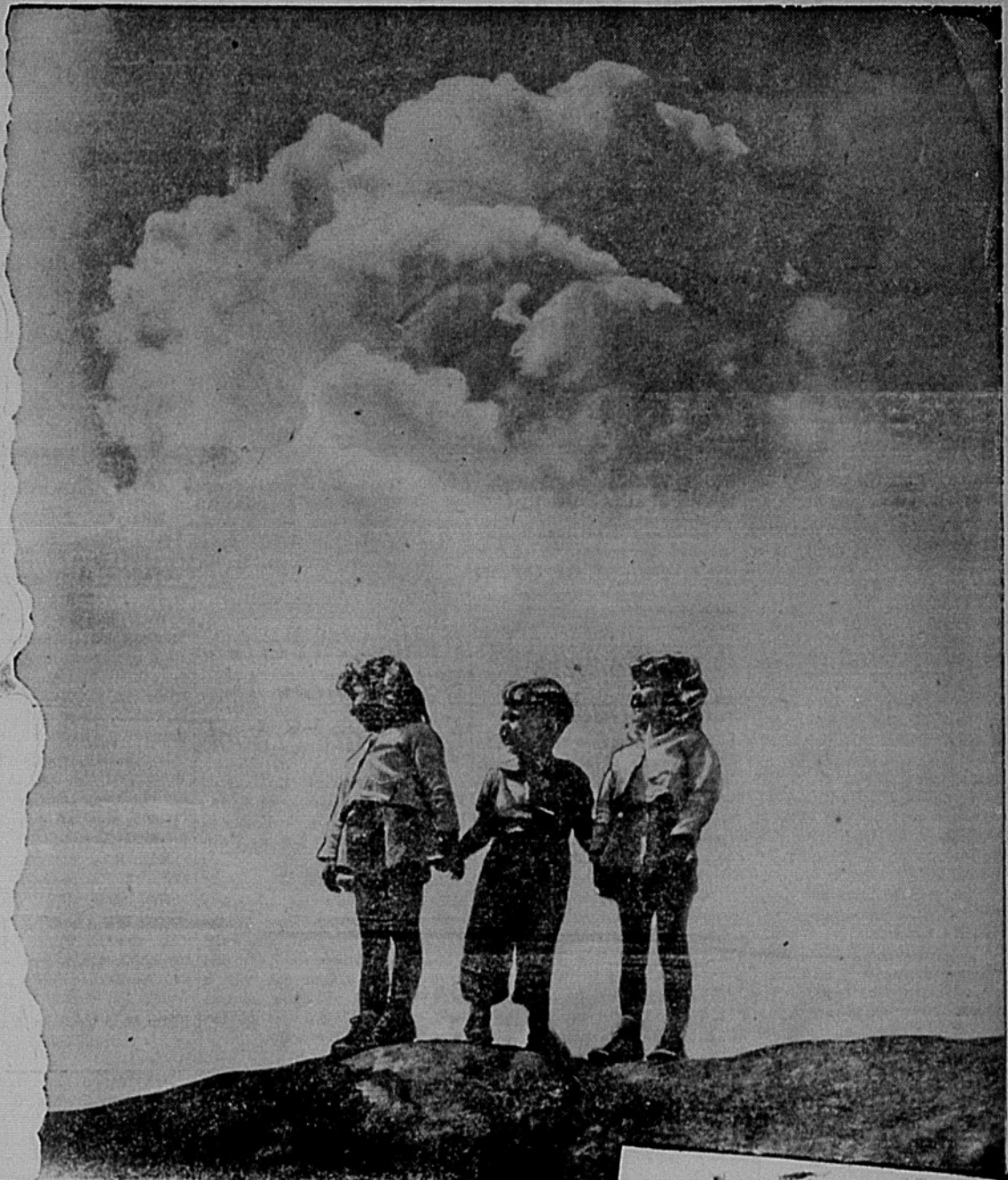
For that it brought him \$3, and a strange light to his eyes. It's not what he can buy with the money, he says. It's the thought.

It's the thought of what went into raising that pig and the great determination that carried him through.

And just wait till next year's State Fair, he says. I'll be back.



**THEIR FUTURE?**

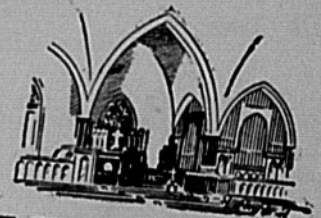
