

EVERY EGG COUNTS WHEN FEED IS COSTLY

Your laying flock must produce a lot of eggs these days just to pay for the expensive feed they consume. With feed prices at such a high point and other overhead expenses at parallel levels, each layer will pay her keep only if she utilizes feed efficiently and pro-

duces eggs at a high rate. Now is a good time to take stock of your management program. Perhaps you're forgetting a thing or two-things important enough to have a detrimental effect on your flock's production. Suppose we list a few of the management factors generally considered necessary to encourage high production.

Handle Gently

Handle hens gently. Throwhens off nests or roosts, kicking them out of the way, or any other type of rough handling will disturb production and may even stop it if hens are injured.

When in the hen house move slowly and deliberately, without exciting flock, to avoid causing a slump in egg production.

Work on a regular feeding schedule constantly. Anything that prevents hens from getting feed and water at their accustomed time hinders egg

production.

Give the birds plenty of fresh, clean water. About two 21/2-gallon waterers per 100 birds is right.

There should be about one nest to every 5 hens, and each nest should be well filled with clean nesting material to reduce the number of cracked and dirty eggs.

Check Body Weight

Failure to maintain body weight while laying may mean an untimely molt, so weigh a few of the same birds every week or so to check the condition of the flock and so that the grain feeding can be varied accordingly.
Cull continually. It doesn't

pay to feed birds that produce at a low rate.

Use good laying stock, A hen laying 250 eggs a year uses about half as much feed per dozen eggs as a hen laying 100 eggs a year.

Dirty eggs spoil quicker than clean ones, and are less attractive to buyers. Keep your eggs clean and cool,

Artificial lights in the poultry house lengthens the day during the winter months and make it possible for the birds to eat more feed and lay more

GI'S DEMONSTRATED MAN'S LOVE FOR DOG

Licked Military Red Tape to Bring Pets to Homes in America

Dog's love for man is proverbial, but only now we are beginning to appreciate anew that man's over for the dog is no less great, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

For this lesson we are indebted to the GI's of World War II. Our boys no sooner got "over there" than they made friends with the nomeless dogs they found huddled on the beaches and in the foxholes. They took these dogs everywhere they went—on patrol duty, on flying missions, on furlough or shore leave. No wartime regulations, no military red tape, no hardships or discomforts or threats of punishment could keep these buddies apart for long.

The end of the war found so many enduring attachments that a way simply had to be found for the GI's who wanted to bring their canine pets with them to their American homes. Soldiers and sallors—and officers, too—were resorting to all sorts of measures for "sneaking" their pets into this country. They were hiding them in their own and their friends' luggage and stowing them away on departing ships and planes. Some high-point service men even elected to remain abroad rather than leave their beloved petz behind. Ultimately, a practical plan was worked out whereby



any service man, for a fixed fee, could have his dog shipped home with a reasonable expectation of having him arrive safely.

with a reasonable expectation of having him arrive safely.

The plan involves the use of special War Shipping Administration boats and the facilities of the Railway Express Co. The serviceman delivers his dog to one of the designated pet collection points. The approximate \$75 fee he pays covers the dog's passage, inoculation, food in transit, shipping crate, leash and muzzle, etc. Aboard ship the dog's needs of food, water, exercise, and the like, are looked after by enlisted men who volunteer for this sort of work by way of facilitating their own departure for home. On arrival at the U.S. port, these "dog" ships are met by representatives of the express company, who look after the care and delivery of the animals to their final destination. Already thousands of servicemen's dogs of every known and many unknown breeds have made the journey "to the States." In many cases the shipments are arranged by companions still overseas after the masters of the pets have returned home. The docking of such dog ships usually finds a number of the owners on hand to greet the pets in person, and the atmosphere is not unlike that surrounding the arrival of the muchpublicized "bride ships."

Subject: "DESPISE YE THE CHURCH OF GOD?

The Church of Chaist occupies ditions of salavation to the sina distinctive pisition in the religious world. It is respected, admired, and yet opposed by many. Numbers have been prejudiced against the church without knowing really why they oppose it. Others view us in distaste because they have too readily received biased half-truths and misrepresentations of what we believe and teach.

In what respects do beliefs different from other churches? We believe that there is only one true body, of Christ, or church. (Eph. 4:4; Eph. 1:22 23). We also reject the common belief that the church is a nonessential institution. According to the Bible, the church is the body of Christ (Eph. 1:22-23), it was purchased with the blood of Christ (Acts 20:28), all saved are added to the church (Acts 2:47), members of the church of the Lord have their names written in heaven (Heb. 12:23; Rev. 20:27), and at the end of time Christ shall deliver up the church, or kingdom, to God. (I Cor. 15:24). These points are plainly thught in the Bible. Is it wrong for us to hold these

We believe God's mercy and grace have provided salvation for sinners who will accept Him. (Titus 2:11-14; Eph. 2:8-10; 2 Peter 3:9). We believe the con-

ner are: implicit faith in Christ (John 8:24), genuine repentance of all post sins (Luke 13:3; Acts 3:19), and baptism into Christ the remission of sins" (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 1 Peter 3:21). Is it wrong for us to believe and preach just these Bible commands? Is it right for you to oppose churches of Christ for teaching only what the Bible

commands the sinner? We believe religious divisions are sinful, that there should be "no divisions among" us, but that all should be "perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgement." (1 Cor. 1:10). We teach that all Christian people should be "one" (John 17:20-21), and "Keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (Eph. 4: 3). Is it wrong for us to believe just what the Bible teaches of religious unity?

We believe that the only proper name for a child of God is simply that of "Christian." (Acts 11:26). In that we are 'married" to Christ (Romans 7:4), we feel that we should wear His name only. Are we

wrong in this? We deplore human doctrines in religion as sinful. (Matt. 15: 9). We feel that with God's Word we are made perfect, and "throughly furnished unto all

good works." (2 Tim. 3:16-17). We accept nothing as a matter of faith that is not expressly revealed in the Bible. Any alterations of the Bible are deemed as sinful and rebellious (2 John 9; Rev. 22; 18-19). We believe that when we speak we should "speak as the oracles of God." (1 Peter 4:11). Are we mistaken in accepting only what the Bible teaches as matters of faith?

We assemble each first day of the week to worship the Lord. In worship we follow the simple New Testament pattern. To us this is not an occasion of pomp and display. Each Lord's day we assemble to "break bread" (observe the "Lord's Supper") just as did saints of apostolic time (Acts 20:7). We also sing hymns of praise (Eph. 5:19), pray, and contribute to the Lord's work (1 Cor. 16:2). Are we wrong in following this sample New Tes-

tament formula of worship? The churches of Christ are open in mind and heart, and welcome your investigation of our teachings. We do not believe nor teach many things erroneously attributed to us. Why not attend our services,, and make a sincere, personal and unprejudiced investigation of what we teach? You are always welcome.



America agriculture has in-creased it value practically 90 per cent since 1940, and was worth 101.5 billon dollars at the beginning of 1946.

This collar valuation of U. S. agriculture is shown in a study recently released by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington D. C. Indicating that the figure is rtill on the rise, the Bureau's survey showed a 12 per cent increase since 1945.

Significant point brought out in the study might be that very little of the increase in agriculture's value was the result of improvements of farm and farm property. Very large part of the in crease has come from price increases on farm products and from accumulations of money due to large sales. The report indicated that approximately 800 million dollars that were added to farmers dollars that wer added to framers' have to be re-invested in improve ments of farms and equipment that weren't maintained through the period 1942-45.

Property of farmers' and othe owners of farm businesses accounted for 93.2 billion dollars of the total dollar worth of agriculture. The remaining 8.3 billions were taken up by creditor's claims. 
