**EVERY EGG COUNTS
WHEN FEED IS COSTLY**

Your laying flock must produce a lot of eggs these days just to pay for the expensive feed they consume. With feed prices at such a high point and other overhead expenses at parallel levels, each layer will pay her keep only if she utilizes feed efficiently and produces eggs at a high rate.
Now is a good time to take stock of your management program. Perhaps you're forgetting a thing or two—things important enough to have a detrimental effect on your flock's production. Suppose we list a few of the management factors generally considered necessary to encourage high production.

Handle Gently
Handle hens gently. Throw-hens off nests or roosts, kicking them out of the way, or any other type of rough handling will disturb production and may even stop it if hens are injured.
When in the hen house move slowly and deliberately, without exciting flock, to avoid causing a slump in egg production.

Work on a regular feeding schedule constantly. Anything that prevents hens from getting feed and water at their accustomed time hinders egg production.

Give the birds plenty of fresh, clean water. About two 2½-gallon waterers per 100 birds is right.

There should be about one nest to every 5 hens, and each nest should be well filled with clean nesting material to reduce the number of cracked and dirty eggs.

Check Body Weight
Failure to maintain body weight while laying may mean an untimely molt, so weigh a few of the same birds every week or so to check the condition of the flock and so that the grain feeding can be varied accordingly.

Cull continually. It doesn't pay to feed birds that produce at a low rate.
Use good laying stock. A hen laying 250 eggs a year uses about half as much feed per dozen eggs as a hen laying 100 eggs a year.

Dirty eggs spoil quicker than clean ones, and are less attractive to buyers. Keep your eggs clean and cool.

Artificial lights in the poultry house lengthens the day during the winter months and make it possible for the birds to eat more feed and lay more eggs.

**GI'S DEMONSTRATED
MAN'S LOVE FOR DOG**
Licked Military Red Tape to Bring Pets to Homes in America

Dog's love for man is proverbial, but only now we are beginning to appreciate anew that man's love for the dog is no less great, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.
For this lesson we are indebted to the GI's of World War II. Our boys no sooner got "over there" than they made friends with the homeless dogs they found huddled on the beaches and in the fox-holes. They took these dogs everywhere they went—on patrol duty, on flying missions, on furlough or shore leave. No wartime regulations, no military red tape, no hardships or discomforts or threats of punishment could keep these buddies apart for long.
The end of the war found so many enduring attachments that a way simply had to be found for the GI's who wanted to bring their canine pets with them to their American homes. Soldiers and sailors—and officers, too—were resorting to all sorts of measures for "sneaking" their pets into this country. They were hiding them in their own and their friends' luggage and stowing them away on departing ships and planes. any service man, for a fixed fee, could have his dog shipped home with a reasonable expectation of having him arrive safely.
The plan involves the use of special War Shipping Administration boats and the facilities of the Railway Express Co. The serviceman delivers his dog to one of the designated pet collection points. The approximate \$75 fee he pays covers the dog's passage, inoculation, food in transit, shipping crate, leash and muzzle, etc. Aboard ship the dog's needs of food, water, exercise, and the like, are looked after by enlisted men who volunteer for this sort of work by way of facilitating their own departure for home. On arrival at the U. S. port, these "dog" ships are met by representatives of the express company, who look after the care and delivery of the animals to their final destination. Already thousands of servicemen's dogs of every known and many unknown breeds have made the journey "to the States." In many cases the shipments are arranged by companions still overseas after the masters of the pets have returned home. The docking of such dog ships usually finds a number of the owners on hand to greet the pets in person, and the atmosphere is not unlike that surrounding the arrival of the much-publicized "bride ships."

This letter, I think, is of sufficient importance to rate a large type first page print but if you will print it in your "Letters to the Editor" column I think it will get results.

For the past few weeks I have been working at a grocery store on 9th st. just off Jean st. Every day at noon I have the opportunity to watch High School students' activities during the lunch hour and I can't understand why there isn't several deaths per week in Slaton. I am referring, of course, to traffic.

For instance some high school students and also some grown adults delight in seeing just how many children can "hang on" their car. You've seen cartoons of buses loaded to such an extent that people hang out windows and ride on top, well these students could show those bus drivers how to really load a bus. And reckless,

fast driving seems to be a fad now-a-days. If a corner can be turned on two wheels, the rubber on the other two can be saved. Occasionally of course we will just have to take a chance that no one is in our way or that no other car is approaching the intersection.

The above illustrations aren't just tongue wagging, I've seen them happen over and over and everytime I hear a tire squeal my heart skips a beat.

I suppose a complaint without a suggested remedy is unfair so I suggest here a remedy. A little drastic perhaps but sometimes drastic measures are necessary. It seems to me that parent's and teacher's warnings have utterly failed so why not use law enforcement officials. Officers stationed at various points around the High School on various days checking drivers license and issuing tickets when necessary would soon stop traffic violations. After Dad had to pay two or three traffic fines for Junior, Dad would see that Junior was more careful. I stayed there till this morning and flew in. I'm authorized air travel service anywhere I go in Italy and I sure use it. We made it from Rome (195 miles) in 45

minutes. We have real good weather and I sure like it. I'll probably fly to Joggia week after next.

Bye for now—I gotta go to practice.

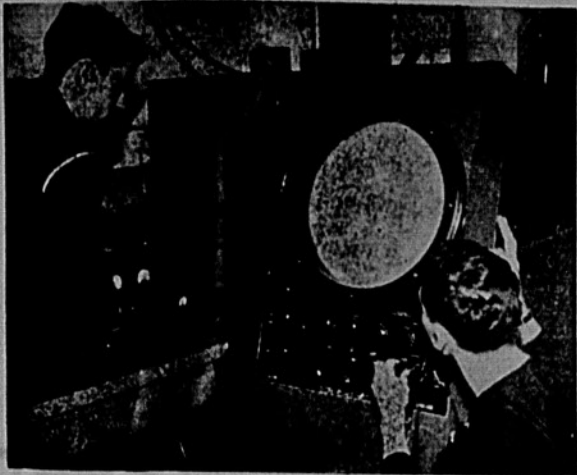

The Church of Christ occupies a distinctive position in the religious world. It is respected, admired, and yet opposed by many. Numbers have been prejudiced against the church without knowing really why they oppose it. Others view us in distaste because they have too readily received biased half-truths and misrepresentations of what we believe and teach. Is it wrong for us to believe and preach just these Bible commands? Is it right for you to oppose churches of Christ for teaching only what the Bible commands the sinner? We believe religious divisions are sinful, that there should be "no divisions among" us, but that all should be "perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgement." (1 Cor. 1:10). We teach that all Christian people should be "one" (John 17:20-21), and "Keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (Eph. 4:3). Is it wrong for us to believe just what the Bible teaches of religious unity? We believe that the only proper name for a child of God is simply that of "Christian." (Acts 11:26). In that we are "married" to Christ (Romans 7:3), we feel that we should wear His name only. Are we wrong in this? We deplore human doctrines in religion as sinful. (Matt. 15:9). We feel that with God's Word we are made perfect, and "thoroughly furnished unto all good works." (2 Tim. 3:16-17). We accept nothing as a matter of faith that is not expressly revealed in the Bible. Any alterations of the Bible are deemed as sinful and rebellious (2 John 9; Rev. 22:18-19). We believe that when we speak we should "speak as the oracles of God." (1 Peter 4:11). Are we mistaken in accepting only what the Bible teaches as matters of faith? We assemble each first day of the week to worship the Lord. In worship we follow the simple New Testament pattern. To us this is not an occasion of pomp and display. Each Lord's day we assemble to "break bread" (observe the "Lord's Supper") just as did saints of apostolic time (Acts 20:7). We also sing hymns of praise (Eph. 5:19), pray, and contribute to the Lord's work (1 Cor. 16:2). Are we wrong in following this simple New Testament formula of worship? The churches of Christ are open in mind and heart, and welcome your investigation of our teachings. We do not believe nor teach many things erroneously attributed to us. Why not attend our services, and make a sincere, personal and unprejudiced investigation of what we teach? You are always welcome.

THIS WEEK'S LESSON

AMERICAN AGRICULTURE VALUES ON INCREASE

American agriculture has increased in value practically 90 per cent since 1940, and was worth 101.5 billion dollars at the beginning of 1946.

This dollar valuation of U. S. agriculture is shown in a study recently released by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington D. C. Indicating that the figure is still on the rise, the Bureau's survey showed a 12 per cent increase since 1945.

Significant point brought out in the study might be that very little of the increase in agriculture's value was the result of improvements of farm and farm property. Very large part of the increase has come from price increases on farm products and from accumulations of money due to large sales. The report indicated that approximately 800 million dollars that were added to farmers' dollars that were added to framers' have to be re-invested in improvements of farms and equipment that weren't maintained through the period 1942-45.

Property of farmers' and other owners of farm businesses accounted for 93.2 billion dollars of the total dollar worth of agriculture. The remaining 8.3 billions were taken up by creditor's claims. Although farmers' mortgage debts declined during 1943, they did not decline as much as in previous years, and actually increased in 20 states.



WESTERN MARKET NEWS

Livestock and feed went up as cotton, grain, eggs and poultry went down last week while most vegetables, rice, peanuts, butter and milk held steady at southwest markets USDA's Production and Marketing Administration reported today.

Cotton tumbled about \$25 a bale last week. The trade associated this drop with speculation regarding decontrol of cotton textile prices and uncertainty as to outlook for sales of cotton textiles. Also, seasonal heavy movement of the crop into trade channels may partly explain the break.

Hog prices took one of the biggest jumps on record last week when ceilings came off and soared \$8 to \$10, but later declined \$2 to \$4 a cwt. as receipts increased. Friday quotations for good and choice butchers stood at \$22 a cwt., San Antonio; \$22.50, Oklahoma City; \$22.50 to \$23, Ft. Worth; \$23 to \$23.50, Denver; and \$23 Wichita. Higher prices brought at 16,050 hogs at six southwest markets compared to 7,545 for the corresponding week last year and 4,850 for the previous week.

Decontrol of meat brought a rush of cattle to market last week. Receipts at six southwest terminals totaled 90,400 compared to 82,000 for the corresponding week last year and 55,875 for the previous week. Cattle advanced \$2 to \$4 a cwt. at southwest markets in contrast to gains of \$5 to \$10 at mid-west markets. Friday's prices quoted here were down from the week's peak. Houston sold common and medium steers and yearlings at \$13 to \$15 a cwt. and good beef cows \$12 to \$13.50. Medium and good cows brought \$12 to \$16, San Antonio and Ft. Worth; good cows \$15 to \$16.50, Wichita and \$16.50, Denver. Oklahoma City quoted medium and good steers and yearlings \$12 to \$23 and top beef cows at \$20.

Most grain prices started down grade last week. Sorghums and corn lost the most ground. However, feed markets were unsettled as a result of the end of price con-

trol and restrictions on the use of by-products and mixed feeds. No prices were quoted, but the trade expected urgent demand for tight supplies would push prices well above former OPA ceilings.

**Salmon-Tomato Pie
Has Taste Appeal**

There's true flavor teamwork when salmon and tomatoes are combined in a pie shell, writes Marjorie Griffin, Rural Home editor of nationally-circulated *Capper's Farmer*.

"If you are short on time, dispense with the crust," she advises homemakers in the magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "Just have a fish and vegetable casserole. Grated cheese is a delightful topping."



TOMATO-SALMON PIE
2 tbsp. chopped onion
1/4 c. chopped green pepper
1/4 c. margarine
2/3 c. canned tomatoes
2 tbsp. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 tsp. sugar
1 1/2 lb. can salmon
grated cheese
1 unbaked pie crust

Saute onion and green pepper in margarine. Add the tomatoes, flour, seasonings and sugar. Cook about 15 minutes. Fit pie crust into baking dish; spread salmon over top of it. Cover with the tomato sauce. Bake at 400° F. for 20 to 25 minutes.

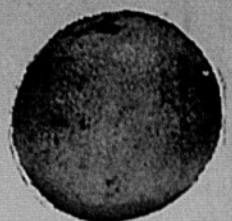
