AIR PLANES LANDING ON STREETS OF SLATON MOST EVERY DAY NOW

Due to the fact that Slaton does not have an airport, W. L. Goelcke and R. H. Vandever of Clovis, Mexico made an emergency landing of their Lescombe airplane on a Slaton street last Tuesday morning when they ran out of gas.

The two men who operate the commercial airport in Clovis, had gone to Dallas to receive delivery of the new plane and were enroute back home when the tank went dry over Slaton. "Never thought a town as large as Slaton would not have an airport," said the pilot who put the plane down on Dickens street as easily as if it had been on the best airport in the nation.

They taxied the plane, with a tank capacity of 14 gallons, to the Cecil Self Service Station on the corner of 9th and Lubbock street where they filled her up, taxied back to the same location where they landed and took off for Clovis. This is the second plane that made an emergency landing near Slaton in the past week as one piloted by Joe Turner made an emergency landing near the cemetery when the plane he was piloting back to his home at Carlsbad, New Mexico ran out of oil.

West Texas Today

The Crosbyton Review reports that approximately 500 signers had been secured on the petition being circulated asking the establishment of a National Guard Unit in Crosbyton.

The City Commission vote to buy three units at the Hereford POW to be used to build 12 homes for veterans in Crosbyton. The down payment will be \$600, which is 20 percent of the estimated building cost.

A charter will be granted soon for a Hereford Chapter of the U. S. Army Reserve Officers Association, according to the Hereford Brand. All reserve officers in Deaf Smith and adjoining counties are invited to membership; reserve officers of both World War I and World War II as well as ROTC officers are eligible for membership in the Association.

Razing of the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp got under way in Hereford recently, according to the Brand. The salvaged lumber will be used to construct veterans housing all over the country.

Two excellent rains recently ended the drought and gave assurance of a good grain crop if dry weather prevails and frost occurs at the average time, according to the Post Dispatch.

Garza County is planning a veterans vocational school for Garza County ex-servicemen and women, if sufficient interest is manifested in such a school.

An REA loan for \$395,000 has been approved, which will serve Garza County as well as six adjacent counties.

Construction of part of the 170-mile program of all-weather roads in Hockley County is in progress, according to the Hockley County Herald. Much credit is due to those who worked so faithfully to get this road program under way.

Completion of a 250,000-gallon underground storage reservoir for Levelland is scheduled to be completed soon. This will provide adequate water for the town for next summer.

Santa Fe Service To Be Improved

Departure of Santa Fe's Super Chief and El Capitan from both Chicago and Los Angeles every other day instead of twice weekly, as at present, will become effective September 29, Fred G. Gurley, the Road's President, announced today. Both trains will continue to maintain their present schedule of 39 1/2 hours between the two cities.

The streamlined Super Chief, which is an all-Pullman car train, will go into every other day service September 30, departing from both Chicago and Los Angeles on even number days of the month. El Capitan, the Railroad's deluxe all-chair car train, will operate on the odd numbers of the month, beginning October 1, except El Capitan will not operate from Chicago or Los Angeles on the 31st of any month.

In addition to originating daily 39 1/2 hours streamliner service between Chicago and Los Angeles, the new schedules will benefit the traveling public by substantially increasing the Santa Fe's passenger carrying capacity, Mr. Gurley said.

Slaton Schools In Good Condition

At the invitation of the Slaton School trustees the editor of the Slatonite went with them on an inspection tour last Monday of all the Slaton school buildings, every one of which has been repaired and redecorated during the summer months.

The work was done under the supervision of the committee from the School Board consisting of Doc Castleberry and W. T. Davis, who have done what could be considered almost miracles in getting the work and material under present conditions.

Particularly creditable is the school for colored children in the East part of town. The building has been enlarged to fully accommodate the 150 pupils who attend the school, a removable partition has been constructed between the rooms that enables the instructors to make a large size auditorium, the sanitary equipment is excellent and the building has been painted both in the interior and exterior.

The East Ward School received a thorough overhauling, a new drinking fountain has been installed and a concrete sidewalk constructed, the grounds have also been ditched for draining. The West Ward school which was in the worse condition of all the schools of the town, before repairs were made, has received much interior decoration and renovating and is now in better condition than it has been since its construction.

At the high school several hundred feet of cement sidewalks have been constructed both on the front of the building and on the side, the Vocational and Agricultural building has been painted and all of the interior of the High school has been painted including the floors, the many window lights that were broken have been repaired and the sanitary equipment

Slaton Man In Bikini Test

Sgt. Henry B. Thorn, son of Mrs. L. J. Thorn of Slaton, has just returned to the United States after having taken part in Operations Crossroads at Bikini Atoll.

Sgt. Thorn was with the group, Task Group 153, which landed at Bikini on April 29 and remained until August 7. He says it was with a great deal of apprehension that they waited for the atomic bomb test. "We were told that no one would live to tell the story," says Thorn. "All of the group wondered what was going to happen when we started for the target that morning. Our plane was 21 minutes away, with a speed of 190 miles an hour—when the bomb exploded, and we saw a big white mushroom-shaped cloud of smoke billow up to about 4,000 feet when the explosion occurred. The men in our task force listened over radio-receiving sets for the sound of the explosion, but what we heard sounded like a shot-gun blast. We had expected a tremendous, deafening explosive sound."

"The drone plane," continued Sgt. Thorn, "was flown from 17 miles away through the cloud of

FLOWER GARDEN HINTS

Mulch material will protect roots of flowers and other landscape plants, and enriches the soil when it decays.

According to Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, the best mulch for flowers is the decayed material found around oat, wheat and hay stacks or near feed grinders and trench silos. Leaves in ditches and under trees also make good mulch.

In applying the mulch, it should be spread six to eight inches deep, Miss Hatfield says. When that has settled to as low as a two inch thickness, more should be added.

Many flowers that were killed by heat in August may be re-planted in September. In the colder parts of the state, only hardy plants like hollyhock and gayfeather can be safely planted now. However, in most all sections, these are some of the flowers that may be re-planted this month; arbutus, baby's breath, balsam, calendula, candytuft, Chinese forget-me-not, cockscomb, coreopsis, cornflower, delphinium, laceflower, larkspur, mignonette, pansy, petunia, phlox, pinks, queens lace, salvia, scabiosa, snapdragon, stock, strawflower and sweet-william.

Texas In Dire Need Of Nurses

Citing a decline of 75 per cent in student nurse enrollment from last year, the Texas League of Nursing Education, in cooperation with five other state organizations, have launched an intensive recruiting drive designed to add 2,000 Texas girls to nursing school ranks.

"Twenty-three per cent of the nation's hospital beds already are shut down because of the scarcity of trained nurses." "Texas' condition is worse and will become increasingly so unless the nurse situation is remedied by a flood of fall class enrollments."

Despite university tie-ins on credits, college classroom and dormitory conditions, and other improvements in nursing school education, student nurse enrollment declined to 1,137 in the last year of the war and so far this year has dropped to the alarming figure of 300.

The 37 accredited schools of nursing in Texas are:

- Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene; Northwest Texas and St. Anthony's hospitals, Amarillo; Brackenridge and Seton hospitals, Austin; Hotel Dieu hospital, Beaumont. Baylor, Dallas Methodist, Parkland, and St. Paul's hospitals, Dallas. Hotel Dieu hospital, El Paso; City-County, Harris Memorial Methodist and St. Joseph's hospitals, Fort Worth. John Sealy hospital and St. Mary's Infirmary, Galveston; Herndon, Jefferson Davis, Memorial, and Methodist hospitals and St. Joseph's Infirmary, Houston; Lubbock General and West Texas hospitals, Lubbock; McKinney City hospital, McKinney; The Sanitarium of Paris, Paris; St. Mary's hospital, Port Arthur; Prairie View hospital, Prairie View; Shannon West Texas Memorial hospital, San Angelo; Medical and Surgical, Robert B. Green Memorial, and Santa Rosa hospitals, San Antonio; William N. Jones hospital, Sherman; King's Daughters and Scott and White hospitals, Temple; Hillcrest Memorial and Providence hospitals, Waco; and Wichita General hospital, Wichita Falls.

CHICK CHATS

GOOD PRODUCERS ARE ECONOMICAL FEEDERS

Are the appetites of your laying hens up to par?

That question is tantamount to asking how well your birds are laying and how much money they are making for you. Other things being equal there is a closely drawn line between feed consumption and egg production. Poor Feeding and good production just don't go together.

Birds with healthy appetites almost invariably produce more eggs than those that don't get their share at the feed trough. And yet the cost of feeding a flock of poor eaters, when judged against the comparative amount of eggs produced, is greater than the expense of providing for a similar number of healthy birds.

Feeding Economy

For instance, statistics have shown that 100 four-pound hens which are in 40 per cent production will require nine days to produce a case of eggs and that during this time they will consume 216 pounds of feed. A similar number of four-pound hens having healthy appetites and producing at the rate of 70 per cent will lay a case of eggs in 5.1 days while consuming 153 pounds of feed. In other words, while the bird with a vigorous appetite eats more each day, her production of eggs is so rapid that she is a far more economical boarder than her weaker sister. She is paying her way.

The 40 per cent flock consumes 24 pounds of feed daily compared to 30 for the better producers, but their owner has to supply more feed to get a case of eggs out of them.

Help Birds With Good Feed
Good feeding and good laying can be regulated by you. How you feed and what you feed can determine how much profit or loss your flock will show.

Ask your feed dealer what your birds are going to need to keep in production. See that your flock has plenty of the right kind of nourishment. Make sure there's enough room at the feeders so that each bird can have an adequate diet. Don't skimp on grit and oyster shell. Above all, look after the health of your chickens—a well managed flock will usually be in good condition and their appetites will be on a scale that guarantees good production.


John Denzer has been released from the hospital after remaining for several weeks. Mr. Denzer, a painter, had suffered a back injury when he fell from a ladder.

FREEDOM of the press has been talked about more in the last few months than in the previous few years. Comment began when the Supreme Court ruled in favor of an editor who had been hailed into court by a notable, who felt (perhaps justifiably) injured by something the editor had published. Not everybody thought the case would turn out as it did. Many were surprised.

I would not wish to review the case here, even if there were room for it, but I am glad the Supreme Court surprised a lot of good people and set them studying and talking about this purely American liberty, freedom of the press. Let me say this: You don't publish stories in the old country that hurt the feelings of potentates and get away with it!

Safety IN THIS country, it is assumed that a man is not fit for public office unless he can take all the razzing and criticism that goes with it and still hold his temper and do a good job. Think how long a crooked official might stay in office if he could protect himself from criticism all the time, and yet encourage newspapers to magnify the faults of other men who ran for his office.

It is recognized by law in the United States that the people are entitled to know what goes on. Public information is for the public good. In line with this very principle, the Post Office Depart-

ment will move 60 times more news tonnage for the money than letters which are private, not public. Our government considers spreading news an important public service.

Bridle THE LAW protects a publisher who makes known truths that are in the people's interest. It is for the public good. When the keem lash of publicity strikes the corrupt deeds of public payrollers, let the hit dog yelp. The press is a vocation of "checks and balances." Publishers have power they don't have to use, but if they use it they must use it for the public good.

Some day, I believe, these same checks and balances will control the powers of labor unions. Unions have done more to improve the living standards of the American people than any other organized movement. They have enhanced American freedom. The right of collective bargaining is as sacred as the right to vote; but some labor leaders have been known to abuse their power.

The famous Case Bill, with all its miscellaneous regulations for labor unions, almost passed but it is dead now. Many conservative thinkers will concede that it will be better if the unions regulate themselves for the public good, rather than having it done by law. Industrial peace must be achieved. Reform is inevitable. The workers can do it better than some bureau.





TEXAS TECH NOTES

Appropriation of \$4,930,880 for the next biennium to finance the most ambitious program in the history of Texas Tech College is being asked of the 50th Legislature, Pres. W. M. Whyburn has announced.

The request, presented to Gov. Coke Stevenson and the Board of Control, asks \$2,200,000 for new buildings and for 97 new positions on the College staff. Money is sought for completion of the Administration building quadrangle, a new economics building, gymnasium, completion of the Textile Engineering building, general maintenance shops and beef cattle barns.

Plans are being drawn for construction of 100 efficiency apartments on the campus to provide housing for married war veterans who are students and also for faculty members. The three buildings to contain the apartments may be completed in time for use during the spring semester.

Thirty-seven years after Sudan grass was introduced into the United States from Sudan, Africa, Texas Tech has shipped back to Africa 500 pounds of Texas State Certified Sweet Sudan grass seed.

Advanced ROTC courses offering instruction built on experiences of World War II will be given by the corps of engineering, signal corps and aviation branch of the War Department at Tech this fall.

Tech's first faculty baby was awarded a degree at summer commencement exercises of the college. Ava Ruth Stangel, daughter of W. L. Stangel, dean of Agriculture, and Mrs. Stangel, received a bachelor of arts degree, with a major in Spanish and a minor in English. She was born Sept. 16, 1925, the day the first Tech faculty meeting was held, a few days prior to opening of the college.




