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WESTERN MARKET NEWS AS OF FEB. 8TH

Many southwest farm products found stronger markets last week, according to the Production & Marketing Administration, USDA. Eggs showed seasonal weakness, however, and some protein feeds were down.

Wheat gained sharply again last week while oats and sorghums took up the upward trail. Cash wheat at Fort Worth and Galveston was quoted \$2.32 to \$2.33 per bushel for No. 1 hard. No. 2 yellow milo brought \$2.52 to \$2.55 per hundred. Corn was little changed, but barley was easier. Rice markets continued firm. Most feed prices held fully steady, but further sharp declines were reported for soybean meal, while gluten feed and meal were also lower. Hay quotations remained unchanged from declines of the previous week.

Hog prices advanced 25 cents to \$1.25 per hundred around the market circle last week. Friday's quotations for top butchers stood at 23 at San Antonio; \$23 to \$24 at Fort Worth; \$25.25 to \$25.50 at Oklahoma City; \$25 to \$25.25 at Wichita; and \$25 to \$26.25 at Denver.

Cattle trading picked up at southwest markets last week and prices climbed higher with advances of \$1 to \$2 per hundred above prices a week ago. Common and medium steers and yearlings realized \$12 to \$17 at Houston while medium and good beef steers and yearlings brought \$16 to \$22 at Ft. Worth. San Antonio moved common steers at \$14 to \$15.50 and medium to low good cows at \$11 to \$13. Medium and good short-fed steers and yearlings ranged from \$17.50 to \$22 at Oklahoma City and from \$18 to \$22 at Wichita. Medium to high good steers turned at \$18 to \$23.75 at Denver.

Live poultry prices held fairly firm, but eggs brought lower prices than a week ago. Current

receipt eggs Friday sold for 36 cents per dozen at Dallas; 35 to 37½ at Ft. Worth; 32 to 34 at Houston, and 35 at Denver.
Cotton prices were up sharply again last week, as demand continued good. The close on middling 15/16 inch Friday was 32.55 cents per pound at Dallas and Houston; 32.67 at Galveston; and 32.75 at New Orleans.

Chief Topics

A new type passenger locomotive the first powered by a gas turbine engine using oil as fuel, will be built this year for the Santa Fe Railway by the Baldwin Locomotive Works, F. G. Gurley, president of the Railroad, announced today.

Designed by research engineers of Santa Fe, Baldwin and the Elliott Company of Jeanette, Pa., gas turbine manufacturers, the locomotive's construction will mark the initial attempt to build for railroad use a gas turbine using oil for fuel. A similar engine using coal as fuel is being developed by the bituminous coal industry.

The appointment of Clinton E. Duncan as Supervisor of Freight Claim Prevention, a newly created position on the Santa Fe Western Lines, with headquarters in Amarillo, was announced today by G. C. Jefferis, general manager.

The position was created in an effort to intensify prevention of losses and Duncan will direct this activity in close association with the General Manager's office and E. P. Dudley, assistant general manager of the Southern District, and W. L. More of the Northern District Cooperation of all departments and employees is desired, General Manager Jefferis said.

Duncan has been with the Santa Fe since 1924. He started with the Railway at Lubbock and at the time of his present appointment was chief clerk to L. F. Bayless, agent at Lubbock. He served in various capacities prior to being made chief clerk in 1936. He was loaned by the Railway to the Pantex Ordnance Plant during the war years.

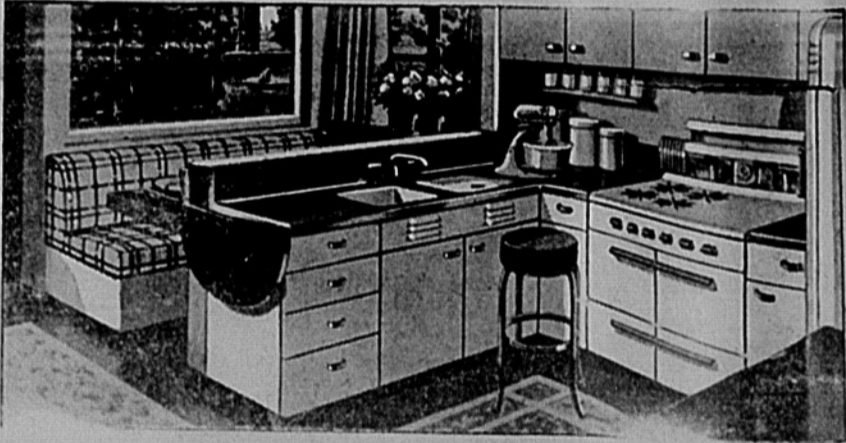
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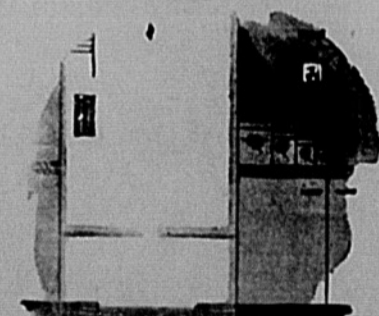

The ones Mrs. Tanner gave me were grown on a seedling while mine were supposed to be from a high toned tree of royal blood and unless they do better next year some body is going to be able to buy some cheap pecan wood for burning.

Mr. and Mrs. Tanner have been experimenting with budding pecan and have several trees that bore some pecans from the budded branches this last season and from what she said they must have been whopping big ones but I'll bet the ones she gave us are every bit as sweet and delicious as the fancy ones.

My recommendation of my roses has P. G. Meading all riled up and he told me that he has devoted a special plot on his premises that he has fixed underground irrigation and that by the middle of summer he will have Judge Smith where the scent of a rose will make him sick and me so disgusted that I'll quit even writing this line of hullybaloo.

Personally I do not think P. G. can do it for I've been pecking away at Judge Smith for two years now and he is tough competition, the kind that don't say much but hits when you are not looking and I'll be glad to get P. 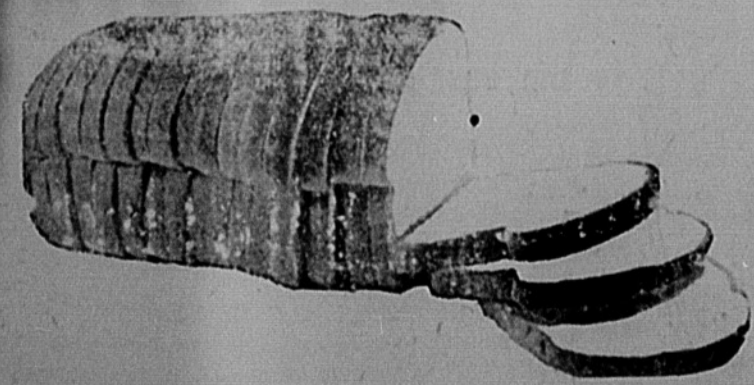

MUMPS INCREASE IN TEXAS DURING JANUARY

During the past few weeks there has been a general increase in the incidence of mumps throughout the State. There have been 1750 cases reported since January 1, compared with only 896 cases during the same period last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Though mumps is one of the common childhood diseases, seri-

ous complications may develop, so children should be protected as much as possible from this disease. The usual control procedures such

as avoidance of crowds, exclusion from school of all cases or suspected cases and quarantine should be followed. The family should always be consulted when a case occurs.

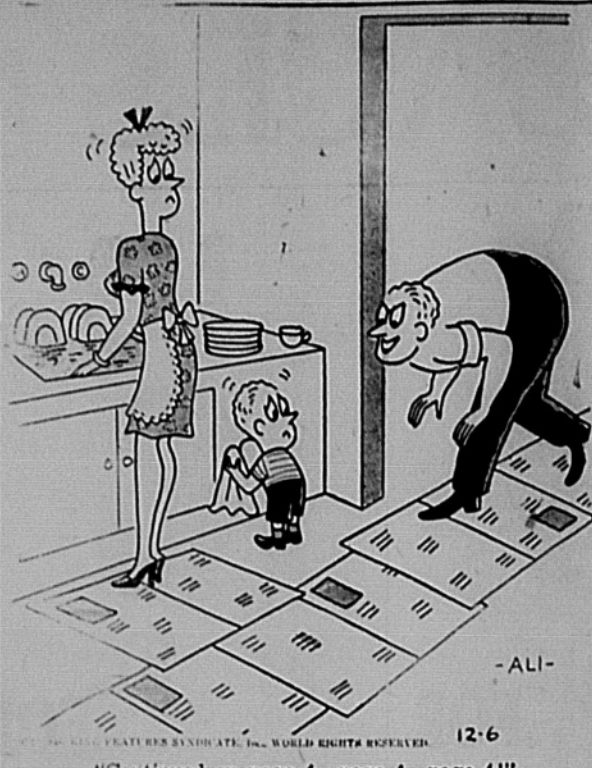

LOCAL STUDENTS ARE SVA MEMBERS AT STSC

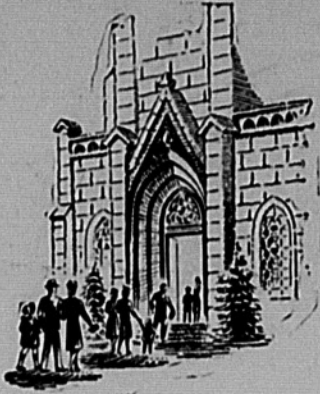
Two students from Slaton are members of the Student Veterans Association at Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos.

Nor is prayer just a one-way street in which we ask something of God. One of its principal values is that through reverent listening, we hear God speak to us.

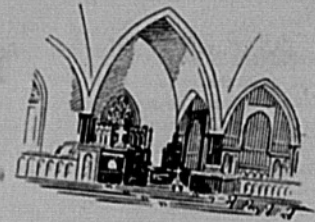

RESOLUTION OF THE LUBBOCK COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION

WHEREAS, under the Statutes and Court decisions of the State of Texas the practice of law is limited to duly registered and licensed attorneys, and all persons not members of the State of Texas are prohibited from practicing law in this State;

WHEREAS, the preparation for others of contracts, deeds, mortgages, leases, mechanic's liens, releases, transfers, wills and other legal instruments, and the giving of opinions on titles to real estate, constitutes the practice of law, whether or not any charge is made therefor; and,

WHEREAS, a number of persons in Lubbock County, who are not licensed attorneys, are now illegally engaged in the preparation for others of legal instruments, and the giving of opinions on titles to real estate; and,

WHEREAS, property rights and contractual obligations are being constantly jeopardized by such illegal acts, and it is a matter of vital public concern that the same be discontinued; and,

WHEREAS, the members of the Lubbock County Bar Association are desirous of protecting the public by curbing these infractions by persons not authorized to practice law;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Lubbock County Bar Association that these acts of unlawful practice of the law be called to the attention of the public and those persons who prepare legal instruments for others, and give opinions on titles to real estate so that they may be advised that such acts are unlawful, and prohibited by the laws of the State of Texas unless done by a licensed attorney.

Unanimously adopted this 25th day of January, 1947.

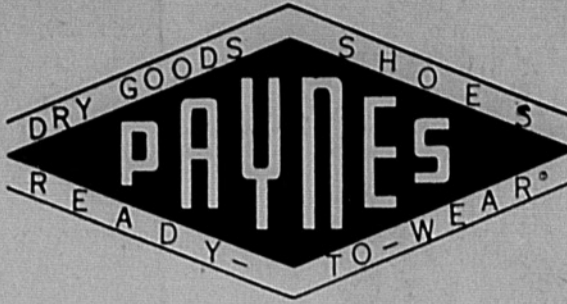

LOCAL DOCTOR ADVISES ABOUT HEART TROUBLES

A local physician in commenting on Heart Week and the work that has been done here and all over the nation said that the following heart afflictions are the most common:

RHEUMATIC FEVER:

This is a disease of children and young people. Though a very common disease up north, it is seen here too. Several cases are now in the hospitals of Lubbock county.

Rheumatic fever usually causes the child's joints to swell and become painful. However, nothing more than so called "growing-pains" may be evidence of the disease. The bad thing about rheumatic fever is that it so often affects the heart, leaving the victim a partial invalid for life; that is unless he gets proper treatment.

A watchful parent will be suspicious of the following symptoms in his child and go to a doctor if they occur:

- (1) Persistent aches and pains in the legs and arms.
- (2) Swelling and pain in the joints.
- (3) Frequent spells of sore throat, particularly if the tonsils are diseased.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE:

One out of every 5-10 adults suffer with high blood pressure. A person has little chance of preventing this disease, but he can prevent it from crippling him or from causing his death.

Every person over 35 years of age or with a relative who suffers from high blood pressure should have yearly physical examinations. One who is known to suffer from the condition, of course, should undergo treatment as his physician advises.

If this treatment is not followed, complications such as stroke, heart failure, blindness and other serious things may follow. How-

ever this statement should not lead to fear on the part of victims of the disease because most of those complications can be avoided.

For further details on high blood pressure ask at your druggist's this week for the free pamphlet which is issued by the American Heart Association.

HEART ATTACKS (Coronary Thrombosis):

If you are a business or professional man, you have a good chance of dying from coronary heart disease. This is because of the constant nervous strain these men work under.

Of course, the first and most important symptom is pain over the heart, especially when that pain is brought on by physical exertion. Don't wait for severe pain before contacting a physician. It may be too late then. Shortness of breath, dizziness, and weak spells are danger signals; don't ignore them.

Physicians are discouraged by the great number of patients who come to them in the final stages of heart disease. There is so much that can be done early and so little that can be done late. It is for that reason that doctors use their time, talent, and money to teach the public about preventive medicine. The contagious diseases, venereal disease, infantile paralysis, and tuberculosis are being conquered by education. Cancer is fast becoming a subject for public discussion. Heart disease causes more deaths than all other diseases combined and therefore must be fought till it is conquered.
