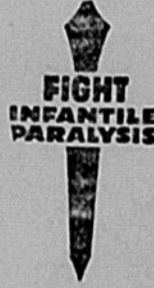

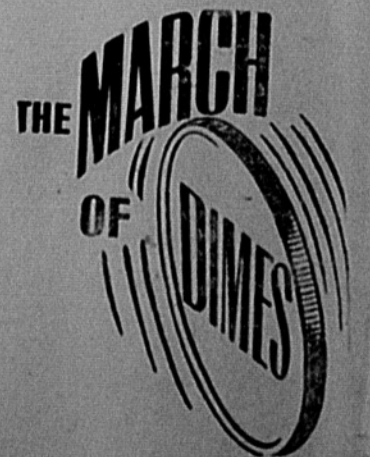

**TEXAS BLESS TRENDS**

A late-start fruit and vegetable season into full bloom in December, a rail shipments numbering 8,000 railroads for a 24 per cent gain in November shipments, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

A drop of 27 per cent for October was noted in imports of merchandise reported by Texas customs districts.

Electric power consumption in Texas fell nearly 2 per cent in December according to reports from 10 major electric power companies to the bureau. Consumption has been in the decline since September.

Livestock shipments in Texas took a downward turn in December, falling off 19 per cent from November, according to figures released. December shipments exceeded shipments in December 1945 by 5 per cent, however.

Increased buying power for Texas workers is the order of the day as hourly and weekly earnings continue to advance in Texas industries while weekly hours on the job are on the down grade, according to reports by The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research in cooperation with the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

December carload shipments of revenue freight loaded in the Southwestern District were up 2 per cent from November and 10 per cent from November and 10 per cent higher than in December 1945.

**HAM AND BACON STACKS**

8 strips bacon 1/2 lb. ground ham 4 slices of pineapple 1 c. mashed sweet potato

Cross two strips of bacon. Lay on one slice of pineapple. Shape the mashed sweet potato into 4 patties and the ground ham into 4 patties. Top each pineapple slice with a sweet potato patty and a ham patty. Fold over ends of bacon on top of each stack and fasten ends together with a toothpick. Place in baking dish. Bake in 350° F. oven for one hour. Serve while hot.

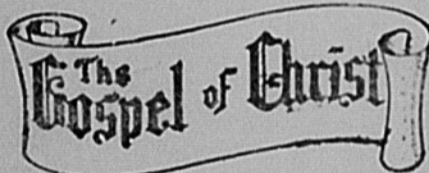

**Subject: "BIBLE AND SCIENCE"**

Bible believers appreciate science, knowing Jehovah is author of every wonderful thing in nature. However, many scientists, refusing "to have Jehovah in their knowledge," have erred greatly, both in religion and in science. But when scientists, after much changing, do get to the truth on any subject, THAT TRUTH invariably agrees with the Bible. Jehovah's Bible and Jehovah's Nature cannot collide.

**ORIGIN OF THE WORD.**

## CHICK CHATS

by Robert Huser

**BUY CHICKS THAT  
ARE WELL BRED**  
While a poultryman may  
save a little money at the be-  
ginning by purchasing chicks  
at the lowest possible price, he  
generally will find that it is  
more costly in the long run.  
One of the most important  
rules of poultry management  
is to start with good stock.  
When this rule is violated, the  
producer loses the many ad-  
vantages offered by chicks  
with a good breeding back-  
ground.

**Better Chicks - Better Pullets**  
Chicks should be selected  
with care from a source known  
to be reliable. Well-bred  
chicks, while not as cheap as  
the "bargain-rate" birds, will  
reward the producer later in  
the season either through su-  
perior egg production or bet-  
ter meat quality, or both. Other  
things being equal, the more  
expensive chicks will be more  
economical pellets or cockerels.

Order those chicks early.  
The best breeders and hatch-  
eries usually have a certain  
amount of top grade chicks,  
and those who place their or-  
ders first for these chicks of  
superior quality are placed  
highest on the delivery prefer-  
ence list. It also assures  
one of getting the breed de-  
sired and getting them off to  
an early start so they reach  
the favorable early broiler  
market quickly. Hatcherymen  
must make their plans far in  
advance, and many of them  
offer special discounts to ear-  
ly purchasers so their plans  
can be completed. Early book-  
ing pays off so don't neglect  
to contact the hatcheryman at  
once.

**Plan the Way**  
After the chicks are order-  
ed, start planning the year's  
management program. Even  
birds with the best breeding  
won't do well without help  
from the poultry raiser. See  
that the brooder house and  
equipment are in good con-  
dition before the chicks ar-  
rive. Then determine to give  
the birds the best care all  
through the growing season.  
Good management may mean  
the difference between high  
and low mortality, between  
productive and unproductive  
layers, between profit and loss  
on the flock. Think it over  
carefully.  
Remember — it's a big job  
to produce profits when birds  
are given the finest care.  
Without good care, it's nearly  
impossible.

## HOW TO GET BETTER COTTON PRODUCTION

Secret to getting higher cotton  
yields in West Texas is "not so  
much acreage, and more attention  
to production per acre" is the be-  
lief of Hudspeth County Agricul-  
tural Agent C. M. Knight, of  
Sierra Blanca.

"It's not the big farmers that  
always make the largest yields per  
acre on cotton," Knight reports.  
He points to the case of Marge  
Guigliardi, Fort Hancock farmer,  
who owns a "dandy good small  
farm." Guigliardi produced 145  
bales of cotton on 50 acres last  
year.

Knight says the high yield was  
a result of "rotation of cotton and  
alfalfa, and the use of barnyard  
manure." Guigliardi hauls to his  
farm all the manure his neighbors  
will let him have.

Another point in favor of high  
cotton production per acre in West  
Texas is the level land, Knight  
believes. Level land make irriga-  
tion much cheaper and very easily  
done.

Guigliardi's high yields "prove  
that it is better to have fewer  
acres of land and increase the  
production per acre," says Knight. "It  
means less trouble, more pleasure  
and better profits."

## Pruning Advice

January and February, to Tex-  
as gardeners, are pruning months.

In nearly all parts of the state,  
this month and next are suitable  
for pruning most plants, says  
Miss Sadie Hatfield, landscape  
specialist of The Texas A. and M.  
College Extension Service.

The only plants which should  
not be cut back at this time, the  
specialist says, are those which  
bloom very early, such as spirea,  
flowering quince, redbud and pyra-  
cantha. These should be pruned  
immediately after they bloom. In  
the Panhandle, where plants do  
not bud until March, pruning  
should wait until the weather is  
warmer. But especially in Central  
and South Texas, shade trees, fruit  
trees, late blooming shrubs and  
evergreens are ready for pruning  
now.

In the case of flowers, cutting  
back moderately will give the gar-  
dener more and larger flowers and  
improve the shape of the plant by  
getting rid of awkward limbs.  
Pruning also relieves plants of  
cross branches that rub each other  
and form places for diseases to  
enter, and taking off dead limbs  
is also insurance against plant  
disease. From a landscaping stand-

point, says Miss Hatfield, prob-  
ably the best reason for pruning  
is that it keeps plants near the  
size needed to fit into the land-  
scape picture. Overgrown plants  
spoil the yard.

For pruning instructions, Miss  
Hatfield advises gardeners to  
check at their county Extension  
office for a copy of U. S. D. A. Bulle-  
tin, 1826, "Care of Ornamental  
Trees and Shrubs."

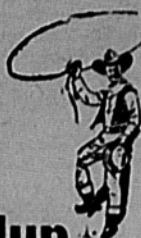

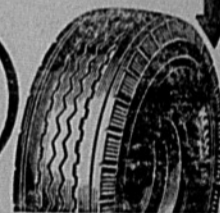
