NEW SULFA DRUG VS. COCCIDIOSIS

A new sulfonamide that is effective in preventing and controlling outbreaks of cecal ("bloody") coccidiosis in chickens has been announced. This drug is sulfaquinoxaline, which belongs to a large family of drugs, each with a slightly different make-up, and therefore somewhat different results.

Sulfaquinoxaline has been widely tested at poultry experimental farms and its effects on disease conditions such as coccidiosis and fowl cholera have been noted. It is reported to be highly effective on both the cecal and intestinal forms of coccidiosis, as well as on fowl cholera. There may be other disease conditions which will yield to this drug in the future.

Prevents Coccidiosis

An outstanding feature of sulfaquinoxaline is its preventive ability against coccidiosis. When given constantly in the feed or water of chicks during the first few weeks, this drug succeeded in preventing most *Elmeria tenella* infections. *Elmeria tenella* is the organism that causes cecal coccidiosis.

When used to prevent coccidiosis, sulfaquinoxaline is administered at very low dosage—0.0125 per cent in the feed or water. As mentioned above, this dosage was constant every day through the first few weeks.

Also Controls Outbreaks

Sulfaquinoxaline is also used at a higher concentration on an intermittent schedule of medication to control outbreaks of cecal coccidiosis in chickens. For this purpose, it is given at a 0.1 per cent concentration in the feed or water for 2 days, followed by 3 days off medication, 2 days on, etc. This treatment usually controls outbreaks promptly, and is not unduly expensive.

All in all, sulfaquinoxaline appears to be one of the most potent drug-aids in the war on poultry disease.

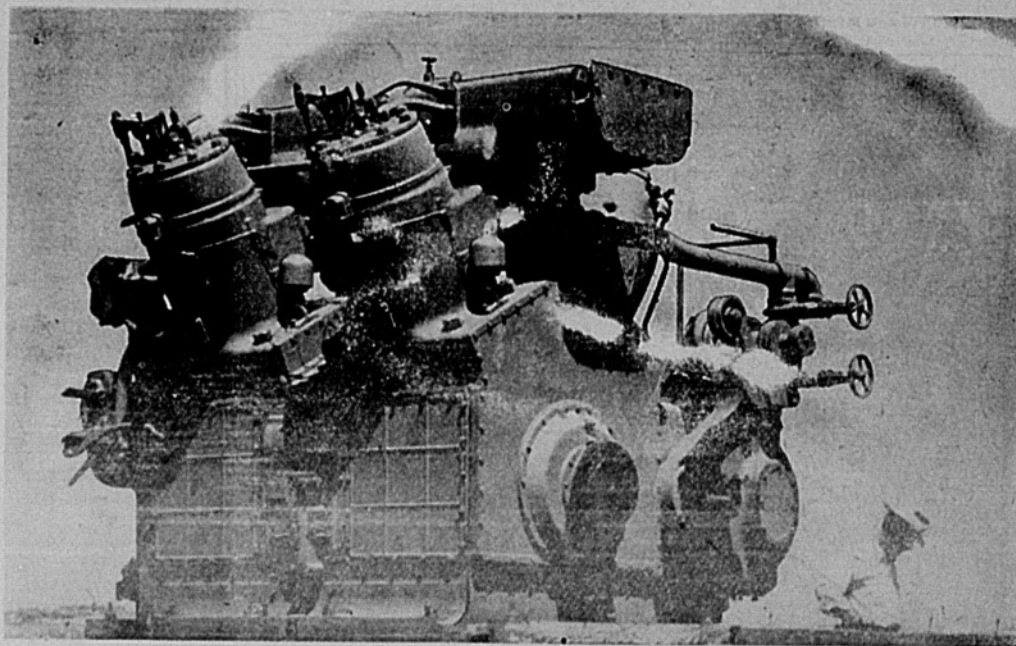

Most all daily newspapers and many magazines are filled with comments about price reductions, lay-offs and unemployment, salesmen are working their territories closer and many are offering unlimited quantities on merchandise that has been scarce since 1942. Last week two salesmen offered to sell me as much as 5000 pounds of newspaper and if I had wanted to I could have bought enough paper to last for many months. So far as the paper, office supplies, office machines and printing machinery there have been no reductions announced. Most business prophets report considerable increase in wholesale stocks and slow downs in the manufacture of goods but so far as I can tell there has been no over supply of efficient help in any lines of business in Slaton. There is still stiff competition among the business firms for good and just fair, help and women are still looking for a cozy job with high pay. The railroad is reported to have cut off many of their extra jobs, but in most lines of work business is still good. It is still almost impossible to get a plumber, electrician, painter or paper hanger without waiting from two days to two weeks and most of them do small jobs very unwillingly. Personally I believe prices have gone too high in most every line and that the country will be better off if things would stay about as they are and go neither higher or lower for a time, but that is probably too much to ask for, we in this country must live under tension and go all hog one way or the other, gimme an aspirin.

Do you plan on having a garden this spring and summer? If so now is the time to start tomatoes, peppers and stuff like that. I bought some tomato seed that are supposed to produce anti-acid tomatoes and I've been trying to make up my mind for over a week to go out and find a box and some dry dirt to put in the seed but the thought of shoveling dirt always makes me sleepy and I take a nap and wake up too late to find the box or the dirt so I put it off from day to day and I probably won't have any tomato plants until July. Why I want the tomato plants is a mystery to me, for my wife is on a diet and cannot eat tomatoes, I like to eat one about once a week and I will spend three times as much to raise tomatoes as I could buy the same number at a grocery store but I've got my head set on planting tomatoes and I just cannot be stopped.

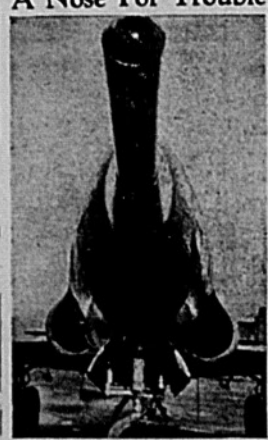

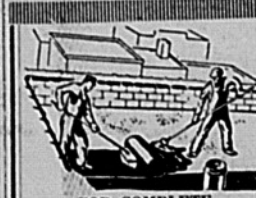
