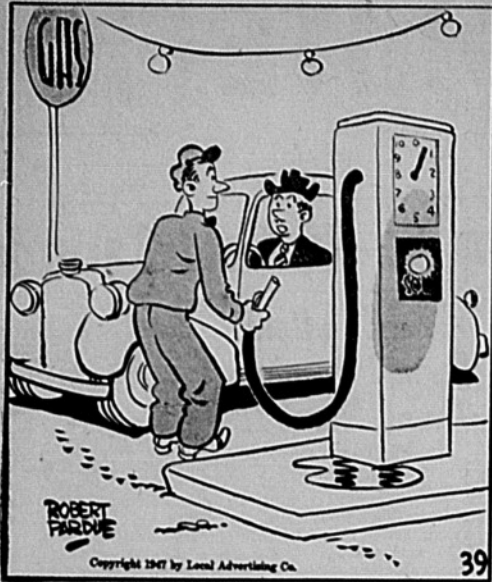

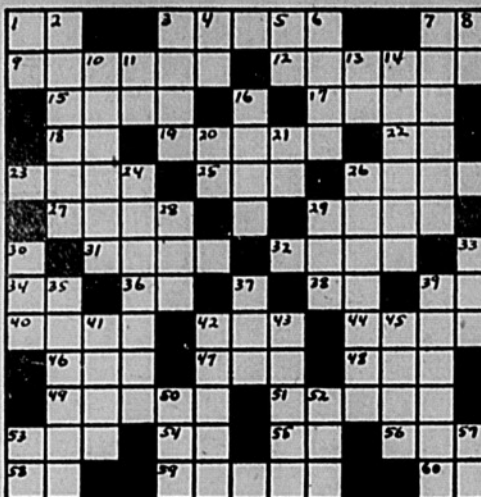
## Leaking Roofs Should Be Mended

**West Indian Mahogany**  
A major cabinet wood in England and America until approximately 1775, West Indian mahogany, declined in use as supplies from Jamaica then Santo Domingo and finally Cuba, became scarce. Until World War II, minor supplies were available from Cuba. War restrictions stopped its importation and since the war, an export embargo has kept supplies from coming to this country. It is the heaviest and hardest of the mahoganies and is the favorite of the old-time cabinetmaker for his hand made furniture.

**Undulant Fever**  
Undulant fever is transmitted to human beings from infected livestock. In cattle the infection is known as "Bang's disease." Medical history shows various forms of undulant fever—one which scarcely makes patients ill and another which causes extreme illness for weeks. Most patients are moderately sick over a long period of time; two years of treatment may be required. Nearly all persons who have undulant fever recover.

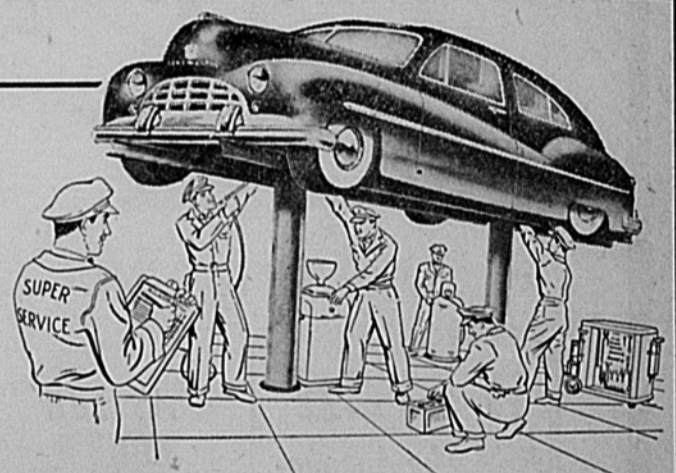

**JUST TALK**

What is happening to the dogs in Slaton? In our neighborhood our own little dog was let out of our back yard and has disappeared, another dog in the next block apparently was in good health and in a playful mood, must have eaten poisoned food for it died a violent death in just a few minutes, three dogs that were well behaved animals and never ventured from the block on Division street disappeared about two weeks ago and another dog that had a home in East Slaton died in a similar manner to the one mentioned above.

While it is possible that some of these dogs ran away, as this is the time of year when they take to wandering, it does not seem likely that all of them, that did not die, would completely disappear.

It has been suggested that some one might be stealing them and selling them for vivisection as such practices have been done in other places but there is no proof that such is the case. There have been many cases of dog poisoning in Slaton in the past and while dog fanciers may believe it a terrible crime there is some justification in getting rid of dogs that are a nuisance and dogs that are not kept up, but it does not seem right, to me, for any one to throw poison food to a dog that is properly kept up and is not troubling anyone particularly. All dogs bark but that is not too hard to bear. The city officers should get rid of stray dogs that have no home, are half starved and possible carriers of diseases, but it seems to me that any one who has an objection to any particular dog should report it to the city officials and not try to take the law into their own hands. Every town and community has the same problems about stray dogs and cats and the problem has never been solved to please every one and probably never will, but just the same I feel that if we want to have a dog and do our best not to let it annoy other people that we should not be interfered with regardless of how silly it may seem to some other folks. In case you see a part fox terrier with a black muzzle and a brindle black and gray spot on his back, please let me know. I'd like to have him back even though he is kinder dumb and a big nuisance.

Having hit the thumb on the nail pretty well so far as the weather is concerned I am going to make some further predictions. First I do not believe the winter

is over and that we will have one or two more hard freezes and I'm hoping that the fruit trees and roses do not get going too strong. We will also have a lot more moisture and probably at planting time so that you'll be hearing the farmers howling their heads off. The vegetation does not seem to pay much attention to the temperature but comes right out and starts blooming regardless of whether it is near zero or mid-summer weather and even if it gets down to zero the fruit trees are going to bloom and I'm predicting that all the peaches, apricots and most of the cherries are going to get it in the neck this spring. Don't blame me.

Eddie Hoffman who does plain and fancy painting, says that he has one of the hardest jobs in Slaton, and possibly the world. His particular gripe is that he has to try to please women who decide to decorate their homes. Many women who are otherwise sweet

and lovely suddenly turn into ferocious animals and all but claw him while those that are not ferocious are as temperamental as a chameleon on a new style neck tie.

Not long ago, says Eddie, he was called to a home where an amateur decorator had a bottle of nail polish, a sofa pillow and a pair of stockings laid out on a chair. She wanted three rooms painted and the color schemes were to be the colors of these three objects. Eddie mixed up a perfect match for one of the items and she told him to paint the woodwork that color. He started, after a half of one wall was covered she decided the color was too light so he darkened the paint, this did not suit so he changed again and before the evening was gone the wall had three different shades. He painted the room over once with the color she decided upon. The next day she changed her mind again, he had six gallons of paint in six different shades so he mixed them all together and it pleased the lady and saved Eddie from jumping off the top of the building.

Another woman wanted her room painted the color of her husband's hair, another the color of a canary bird and a third the color of a corn stalk. Matching the colors is not so bad but the danger of getting physically damaged keeps Eddie's nerves on edge and he is looking for a nervous break down any day.

We are going to have five or six ears of sweet corn, perhaps a dozen tomatoes and enough okra to feed an army if my usual luck holds out this year. I've already set out fifteen cents worth of fancy tomato seed and I'm expecting a whale of a litter of plants that will grow vines six feet tall and produce the dozen tomatoes. I also have three pounds of double guaranteed registered golden bantam cross bred

sweet corn that is supposed to produce large, sweet, juicy corn that will be the envy of the neighborhood. If I have my usual luck, I'll get the six ears mentioned above. All of the okra I expect to raise will come off of one stalk that will come up when I plant a whole packet of seed.

My wife complains that she could buy bigger and better vegetables for one tenth of the price the water will cost to raise these fine vegetables, but I claim, and so far have gotten by with the argument, that either weeds, grass or trees will grow in the space and that it is no harder to raise a few anemic vegetables than it is to cut grass or chop down weeds. She wants to plant flowers, but she helps me eat the corn and nibbles at the okra, but she won't give me any credit for having such fine stuff and complains about the mud I track into the house. Life gets more complicated as time goes on.

**Corbin Puts Bill Before The House**

AUSTIN — Senator Kilmer Corbin of Lamesa strongly supported the second of a series of Gilmer-Aikin educational bills last week after the highly controversial measure was amended several times.

Corbin and other West Texas senators added amendments to the bill that will provide the greater transportation aid to the sparsely settled areas that they represent, also guaranteeing at least as many teachers as the small schools now have.

Senator Corbin this week also introduced a bill that will set up a Commodity Distribution Agency for the purpose of aiding the school lunch program, dependent children, the aged, needy and blind. He voiced the opinion that this measure will meet with little opposition.

A bill that will benefit the rural

areas of the state with more farm-to-market roads quickly passed the senate this week. It would provide \$1,250,000 a month for the next two years for rural roads.

"I want to do my part to help

set up some kind of definite policy on rural roads," Senator Corbin said in urging passage of the bill.

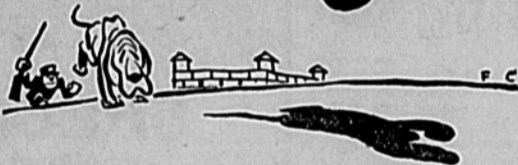

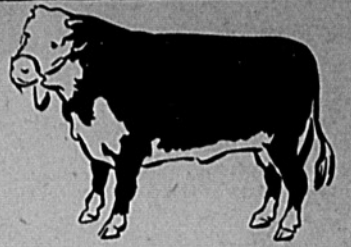
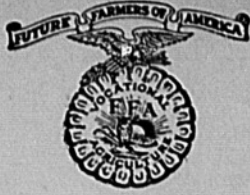

**Time To Buy Seed Says Tech Expert**

LUBBOCK, March 7 — Now is the best time for farmers to buy or engage seed for planting next year's crops, Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department at Texas Technological college, advises.

By making arrangements now for next year's crops, farmers can be assured of a bigger selection and a chance at the best seed available, Dr. Young said.

Seed selection should be based

on high quality, high germination rate and free from undesirable weed seed. There is time yet to be "choosy," he suggested.

Those farmers planning to sow their own seed should have germination tests made immediately so if their seed is not the most desirable, they will have time to make other arrangements.

Germination tests are made at the State Seed laboratory in Austin, and at many of the grain exchanges in larger towns, Dr. Young said.

Another precaution concerning early seed purchase mentioned by Dr. Young is "buy enough to re-plant in case reseeding should become necessary."

**CAMERA TOPICS**

by T. T. Holden\*

**KNOW YOUR CAMERA WELL FOR GOOD PICTURES**

Many readers who received new cameras for Christmas have had time to experience twinges of disappointment by now. Perhaps they can't remember to pull the slide before shooting. Or maybe the results just don't live up to their expectations.

Chances are very good that there is nothing wrong with the camera. The trouble lies with the photographer who just won't take time to learn how to use his new equipment properly. And it is about ten times as hard to take good pictures when you don't know what you are doing.

Did you read the instruction book carefully that came with your camera? And did you take the time to familiarize yourself with all the controls and practice the routine of making a picture with no film in the camera? If not, you'd better sit right down and do it now. You just won't make consistently good pictures until you have learned to operate your camera almost automatically, any more than you could paint a masterpiece before learning

how to draw a straight or curved line without concentrating on it.

As a group, press photographers have a remarkable ability to turn out fine pictures under conditions that would completely baffle most people. Their secret is such complete familiarity with their equipment that they can concentrate their full attention on the subject, lighting, background, camera angles, without giving the mechanics of operating the camera a second thought.

That is the only road to prize pictures. You won't get any more out of any camera than you put into it. And knowing how to operate it automatically and effectively is the first step. Then you must learn the depth of field obtainable at various apertures, the action-stopping capabilities of the shutter and the use of all the refinements that differentiate between a fine piece of photographic equipment and a box camera. Until you have mastered control of the camera, you can't hope for the pictures or pleasure you should get from it.
