

## HOUSE OF DAVID AND SLATON OIL BELT TEAM TO PLAY HERE

### First Game In New Lions Club Park To Be Played May 10

According to latest reports the fence around the new baseball park, which will be officially known in the future as the Slaton Lions Club Park, has been completed. All but the roof has been built on the grand stand and work on layout of the ball field will be started at an early date. The plans for the diamond have been made and the ground marked off so that the prevailing winds will have the least effect on ball games.

The first baseball game of the season is scheduled to be played on May 10th between the House of David and the Slaton Oil Belt League team. If the flood lights can be erected in time it will be a night game. The House of David is one of the top teams playing semi-professional ball and it is expected that the local team will have a tough time especially as they have had little opportunity to practice. The local boys are scouting for a top pitcher and have felt out Bobby Layne, former Hubber pitcher, to do the chore. Layne has been playing professional football all season and is not expected to enter the baseball competition during his off time.

## Colored Children Tell Of Slaton

Not to be outdone by the Slaton High School students in essays about Slaton the children in the English class of Mrs. I. W. Greer, at the colored school in East Slaton, have written compositions on our town.

The three best were chosen by the judges at the school. Here is one written by Elroy Hall, a colored child who attends the second grade at Evans School:

"Slaton is a small city in the panhandle part of Texas. It has a population of 5,260, most of whom are nice people. It has an average school system.

Slaton's largest payroll is that of the Santa Fe Railway Co. It supplies about one-third of the city with work through the entire year. It also takes care of a large part of our transportation. It offers four passenger trains per day and just last month two of them were changed to Streamliners, which makes our transportation.

Slaton also has several minor payrolls, such as Oil Mill, Compress and grain, which makes it easy to make a living.

Our chief occupation is farming of cotton. Slaton's vicinity grows a large portion of West Texas cotton, and we have a large harvest in the fall of the year, which brings many people to our city and since Slaton is made up of friendly people, we are always glad to see visitors.

Slaton also has a large group of religious people. I know of several churches whom are all friendly, and always extends a welcome invitation.

Slaton has many sport fans, we have football, basketball, track, softball and baseball and we get a good turn out to all of them.

There is one thing I must not forget to tell about and that is the weather. The weather is very strange, it is extremely hot in the summer. We have plenty of snow and ice, and as a general rule enough rain. Another strange thing about the weather is that you wake up some mornings and find it cold, like wise vice-versa.

Brother! We have something folks don't have—sandstorms. At that time comes the sand every thing, so you come home, car and every thing, just when you finish cleaning, the sand starts blowing again. This sometimes goes on for hours. The sand sometimes gets so thick that you can hardly see about 20 feet. So every thing about Slaton isn't exactly nice. But never the less we love our city therefore we can stand a few hardships."

**NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION**  
THE STATE OF TEXAS,  
COUNTY OF LUBBOCK,  
CITY OF SLATON.

TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED TAXPAYING VOTERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY THEREIN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Slaton, Texas, on the 5th day of April, 1949, the same being the first Tuesday in April, 1949, on the proposition and at the places more particularly set forth in the election ordinance adopted by the City Commission on the 14th day of March, 1949, which election ordinance is substantially as follows:

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, in Lubbock County, Texas, has determined that it is to the best interest of said City and for the protection of the well being of the citizens thereof that certain improvements, extensions and alterations be made to the Streets, Alleys, Avenues, and Highways of said City, and that negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of said City should be issued for the purpose of paying the cost of such extensions and improvements, and that an immediate necessity exists for the extensions and improvements above mentioned for the convenience of the Citizens of Slaton, Texas and for the preservation of the safety of the Citizens of said City, which requires the suspension of the rule requiring that ordinances be read at more than one meeting of the City Commission; and it therefore having been affirmatively determined by the City Commission that the matter of determining whether or not bonds of said City should be issued for the purposes above mentioned should be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpayers voters of said City:

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:**

Section 1: That an election be held within and throughout the boundaries of the City of Slaton, Texas, on the 5th day of April, A. D. 1949, the same being the first Tuesday in April, 1949, such date being not less than fifteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of this ordinance, at which time there shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpayers voters of Slaton, Texas, who own property therein subject to taxation and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

**PROPOSITION**

Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, be authorized to issue the negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of the City of Slaton, Texas, in the amount of \$40,000.00, bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding four per centum (4%) per annum from date and maturing at such time or times and in such amounts as may be deemed most expedient by the City Commission, serially not to exceed thirty years from their date, for the purpose of improving, extending and altering public streets, avenues, alleys, highways and boulevards by paving, widening, raising, grading, filling, repaving or resurfacing the same, or otherwise improving such streets and highways, and for the purpose of acquiring the necessary rights of way incidental thereto; and shall there be annually assessed, levied and collected upon all taxable property within the City of Slaton, Texas, while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on such bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Section 2: Said election shall be held under the provisions of and in strict conformity with the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

All persons who are legally qualified resident property taxpayers of the City of Slaton, Texas, who own property in said City subject to taxation and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Section 3: The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following, to-wit:

**OFFICIAL BALLOT PROPOSITION**

FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

As to the foregoing proposition, each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

Section 4: That said election shall be held at the following places within the City of Slaton, Texas:

(a) In Ward Number One in the room in the Northwest corner of the City Hall Building, with W. A. Robertson as Presiding Judge.

(b) In Ward Number Two in the room in the Southwest corner of the City Hall Building with M. J. Nelson as presiding judge.

(c) In Ward Number Three in the room in the Northeast corner of the City Hall Building with C. H. Whalen as presiding Judge.

(d) In Ward Number Four in the room in the Southeast corner of the City Hall Building with A. M. Fry as presiding Judge.

Section 5: Each presiding judge is authorized to appoint sufficient clerks to assist in holding said election; and notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of said election ordinance in each of the election precincts in the City of Slaton, Texas, and at the City Hall Building, and such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks, in the Slaton Slatonite, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Slaton, Texas, and the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election; and, in deference to the provisions of Article 5, of Section 1, of the Charter of the City of Slaton, Texas, such notice shall be published one additional week prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor and City Secretary shall cause such notices to be prepared and published and posted as provided for herein and shall make due returns of the publishing and posting of same to the City Commission.

Section 6: Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the City Secretary of the City of Slaton, Texas, for canvassing by the City Commission and shall return the ballot boxes to the City Secretary for safekeeping.

The manner of holding such election and making and canvassing the returns thereto shall be governed by the general election laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the provisions of the herein above mentioned statutes, and the City Commission will furnish the necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite for said election.

Section 7: The fact that it is affirmatively found by the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas that there is an urgent need to proceed immediately with the construction, extension and improvement of the Streets, alleys and highways of said City in order to make the same more convenient for the public at large and to protect and preserve the health and welfare of the Citizens of Slaton, Texas, creates an emergency and public necessity demanding that the rule requiring the reading of this ordinance on more than one day before final passage be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended; and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this the 14th day of March, 1949.

**CAMERA TOPICS**

by T. T. Holden\*



Winter pictures like this prizewinner from the 1948 Graflex Photo Contest by Niels Lauritzen of Milwaukee are often improved by the use of flash to create the effect of sunlight on a gray day.

**USE FLASH FOR SUNLIGHT ON CLOUDY DAYS**

Gray, sunless winter days are not very conducive to pictures with sparkle and snap. While there is plenty of light to make an exposure, the absence of highlights and shadows often results in drab, muddy pictures.

The answer is a simple one. Let a flash lamp be your sunlight. This is common practice with press photographers who use flash outdoors in daylight just as frequently as they do indoors or at night.

The great advantage of flash over sunlight is that you can control the amount of light very exactly by your choice of flash lamp and its distance from the subject. Also you can control the angle of light without regard to where the sun would actually be at a certain time of day. Obviously, for realism you will aim your light down on the subject as the sun would fall and not try any low angle illumination.

To compute proper exposure you should first estimate the necessary shutter speed and diaphragm setting for a picture taken without

flash. Then use your flash guide table in reverse to figure how far away the lamp should be for that exposure. But the flash is your dominant key light so you want it a bit brighter than the natural daylight. So you move the flash lamp toward the subject one-quarter to one-half the distance indicated by the table, depending upon the amount of contrast you desire in the picture.

Here is a specific example. The natural light calls for an exposure of 1/50 sec. at f/4.5. The guide number for a Press 25 with a slow film like Verichrome would be about 205. Dividing this by the aperture, we would normally place the lamp about fifty feet away. But to increase the contrast, we set the light twenty-five feet from the subject.

That's all there is to it. With a little experience you can work out the contrast ratio that you like best and a lighting angle that is right for various subjects. And you will find you never have to miss a good picture because the day is too gray.

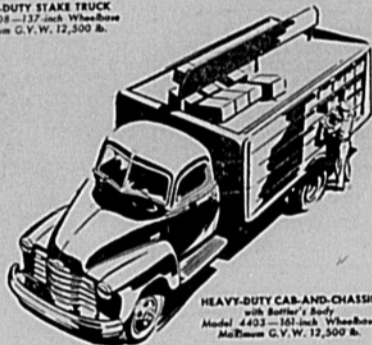
