agressive and progressive men of this entire section as well as of Slaton. He pioneered to Greer county, Oklahoma, in 1837 when that land was opened to settlement. He moved to Texico in 1906 where he entered the lumber business for the first time. He erected the first lumber yard in Clovis, N. M. Entered Hardware Business He moved to Slaton in 1911 where he entered the hardware business, erecting the first school here and the first residence not placed by the railroad. Forrest established the Plains Lumber company here in 1920, later acquiring lumber interests in Post and Lamesa. He purchased the Slaton ranch north of Slaton in 1938. Four children were born to For-rest and his first wife, all of whom have since died. S. Lamar Porrest, Lubbock lumber man and widely known civic and church leader was the last to die, on Feb. 28, 1948. The first Mrs. Forrest passed away in January, 1942. Active In Church Work He married Miss Florence Rob-inson of Athena in January, 1943, and he is one of his survivors. Forrest was active in church work during his lifetime, having become a member of the Presby-terian church at the age of 18 in Midway. He was a charter mem-ber of the Slaton Methodist church.

How To Grow Big **Better Tomatoes**

Better Lomatoes Tomatoes grown on stakes have many advantages. The yield is much greater per square yard of ground than when grown any oth-er and the state of the square yard of ground than when grown any oth-it rots from lying on the ground. When frost danger is past, set the plants 18 inches apart in the row I plant mine in double rows about 24 feet apart, leaving a wid-er space, say about 3 feet, between the double rows. These are branches that grow out lust above the leaf stem. While hey are sometimes called suck-sers, they are really branches which 11 produce blooms and fruit if eft alone. A quick sidewise pull 11 usually snap these suckers off clean. When the chosen branch is about

eft alone. A quick sidewise pull ill usually snap these suckers off clean. When the chosen branch is about a foot high, it is time to stake the plant. Any kind of a slender pole will do. It should be at least 6 feet long, but 7 or 8 feet long is better. I used 10-foot stakes last year and had to pinch back to keep the vines from growing a great deal taller. Push the stakes into the ground leep enough to give them good "esistapce to wind and the weight of the fruit. Set them straight up and down, not slanting. To further brace them, wire a series of poles along the top, fastening each stake to them so that the whole line of stakes are tiled together. The with a soft string. I use strips of old cloth, tying a single branch loosely to its stake, being sure to allow room for growth of the stem. Keep all suckers pinched. That is all there is to it except the cultiva-tion, which is no different from that used for tomatoes grown the usual way. My tomato plants grew more

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
