Social Security Man To Be In Slaton

Gerald L. Schantz, Social Security Administration Representative from Lubbock, will be in Slaton at the Post Office at 11:00 a. m., Wednesday, Sept. 7. Mr. Schantz will explain the Social Security program to all interested.

Anyone needing a social security card or wishing to discuss possible benefits due him under the Social Security Program should contact Schantz when he visits here.

To an average American, the Federal old-age and survivors insurance under the Social Security Program will pay \$2,500 to \$10,000 in retirement income; or in case of young death, it will pay to the family of the deceased \$5,000 to \$20,000 on survivors' benefits.

The Lubbock office of social security offers, free of charge, a pamphlet which explains what Federal insurance is worth. Also it tells when, where, how and by whom it should be collected.

Late for Dinner

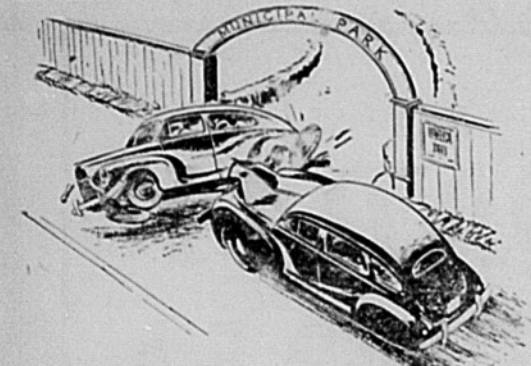
He'd been in a hurry all his life. He talked fast, he thought fast, he drove fast, and he died as he had lived — speeding.

**National School Commission Picks

"As a businessman who realizes the vital importance of the public schools to each community as well as to the nation, Mr. Toy has been largely responsible for the dramatic success of the Council for Delaware Education in helping citizens to improve the public schools in communities throughout Delaware," Mr. Larsen said.

"In his capacity as Executive Director of our Commission he will be able to give all his time and the full benefit of his experience to implementing the program outlined by our members. According to part of this program the Commission will act as a clearing house of information to enable one group of citizens endeavoring to improve their local public schools to profit from the experience of others. Mr. Toy will also assist us in carrying out many other projects which we are planning to help encourage the broad public interest in the public schools which we believe is necessary to solve the many extremely serious problems which confront the schools today."

The National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools is composed exclusively of laymen, many of them outstanding in business, labor, law and publishing. It was formed last May to work for concerted action by citizens in their own communities. The group has received initial financial support from the Carnegie Corporation and the General Education Board. Its officers are, besides Mr. Larsen: James F. Brownlee, former deputy director of the OPA, vice-chairman; John A. Stevenson, president

of Penn Mutual Life Insurance Co., treasurer, and Leo Perlis, director of the National CIO Community Services Committee, secretary.

The Council for Delaware Education, which Mr. Toy headed for two and a half years after founding it in November of 1946, is a dramatic illustration of what a group of determined citizens can do for their schools. It has been instrumental in achieving many far-reaching school improvements in Delaware. These include increases in teachers salaries, appropriations for the construction of new school buildings, wide-spread legislative changes for the benefit of the schools, and an upsurge in public interest in the schools which has been reflected in a greatly increased number of voters turning out for elections affecting the schools.

CAMERA TOPICS

BEST LIGHTING FOR POTATOS LOOKS NATURAL

Too many amateurs, confused by complicated lighting diagrams, are afraid to take pictures by artificial light. Unless they have four or five spots and floodlights and follow the charts exactly, they feel there is no chance of making good pictures.

Almost all the pictures you want to take can be made nicely with two lights, both the same power. Instead of complicated charts, just remember one rule: One light should always be at the camera. The other should be almost twice as close to the subject, aimed at the subject from the most natural angle.

The light at the camera is known as a fill-light. Its only purpose is to throw light in the shadows cast by the key light. It is supposed to be weaker, so we keep it further from the subject.

The key light makes the picture. If it is thrown up from a low angle at the subject, the result is theatrical, like footlights. If it shines down from high over head it can imitate sunlight. Hidden in a fireplace, it

can give the same effect as if the subject were illuminated by fire-light.

By natural lighting, we mean the way the subject would look to a person in the same room. If your model is reading by a table lamp, the photographic light should be placed so it comes from the same direction as the reading lamp. If the model is sitting in front of the fire, then you would use the fireplace position. If he is sitting by a window, the light should add to the illumination from outdoors.

Exactly where the lights should be put in relation to the subject is best learned through experience. Each time you make a picture, put the key light where you feel it belongs, then try moving it a bit higher and lower, a few feet to each side. Watch the subject carefully and you will find just where the best lighting results come. Even the best professional photographers must make these minor experiments on each picture to find just the effect that is most natural.

It is, in our opinion, helping the game of baseball—aside from being a great thing for the fans.

We have already increased our interest twice-fold in the respective league races, simply because we have had a chance to hear the important—and exciting—games daily.

(And without our listening and giving Eddie Dyer first class assistance, we doubt if St. Louis would have been able to maintain their pennant chances.)

One week from tonight the Tigers play Floydada—which "ain't fur away."

Floydada will be favored, naturally, having such a big, experienced squad to throw at the medium-sized and inexperienced local crew.

But, it might be an interesting affair. Slaton always gives a good account of itself in any endeavor, and maybe the Tigers will keep it interesting. We hope so.

We wonder how many read closely the writeup last Sunday about the Abernathy Antelopes. We know that Clarence Tillery did, and he hasn't been in very good health since.

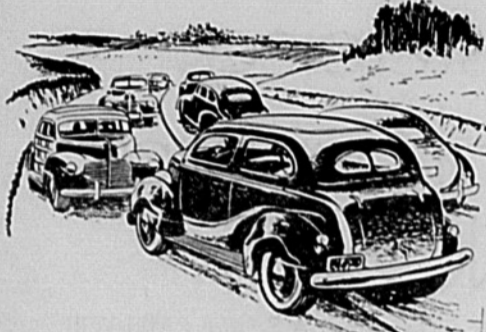

West Texas Roundup

In an effort to complete the consolidation of two common school districts with the Colorado Independent district an election will be held Wednesday, August 31 when voters of the Buford district and Seven Wells district will vote on the issue with voters of the Colorado City district. Voters in Colorado City will vote at the city hall with C. S. Martin, Judge; at Buford schoolhouse, Don Blasingame will be in charge and at the Seven Wells schoolhouse E. R. Venus will be the judge. — Colorado Record.

Summer repairs and redecorations have been completed on the Morton schools in preparation for the fall semester beginning September 5.

Buildings have been repainted and new toilets were installed in the 4th and 5th grade building. Grass was sodded at the High School building and the football field has also been resodded. — Morton Tribune.

Hockley county school districts will draw an estimated \$95,000 from county taxes during 1950, according to La Vern I. McCann, county judge who explained Wednesday that a county tax of 20 cents on the hundred dollar valuation would be distributed among the county school districts on a per scholastic basis. — Hockley County Herald.

Possibilities of a Post Office building in Levelland were very bright this week. The Chamber of Commerce received a letter from Congressman George Mahon which stated "the appropriation for the site has not yet cleared Congress and becomes the law. There is no doubt but that the funds will be provided however." — Hockley County Herald.

"With any kind of luck, I can see no reason why Hockley county should not produce more than 200,000 bales of cotton this year," said Artie B. Forehand, Hockley county agent.

Barring a killing freeze in October, Forehand looks for this year's crop to more than double any previous efforts. Only once has Hockley produced over 100,000 bales. That was in 1947 when 104,377 bales were reported to be produced in the county. — Hockley County Herald.

The warm weather the past week has put encouragement in all Crook county farmers as their crops are all growing nicely and prospects for the largest cotton yield ever known in this section is in the making. The irrigation wells are running day and night and the cotton is loaded with bolls and blooms.

There is no appearance of boll worms or other insects and it looks like there will be none if the dry hot weather prevails. The dry land cotton is also looking good and the yield should be a bale to the acre. — Lorenzo Tribune.

The first bale of cotton grown and harvested in Lynn county this year was ginned on Tuesday of this week by the Farmer's Cooperative Gin of Tahoka.

The cotton was picked on a field planted to Hibred seed on April 8th. It was grown by G. W. Langford living three miles east of Draw and was gathered from 23 acres of land. Draw has possibly had the smallest amount of rainfall this summer of any community in the county and some fields of cotton are maturing early. — The Lynn County News.

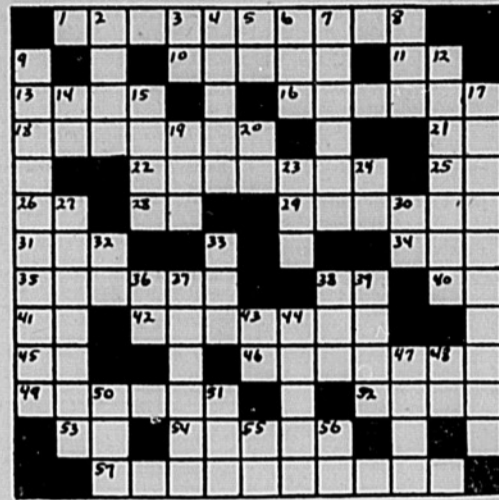

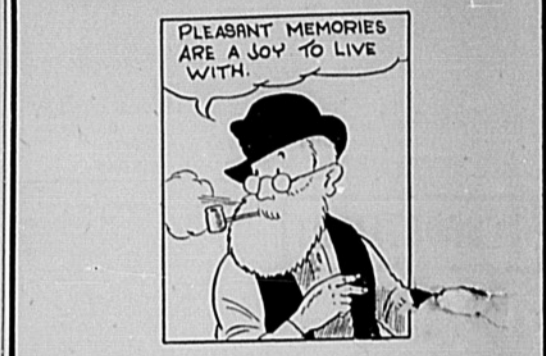

of the Slatonite as Travis is out of ten minute hair cuts on men like me, P. G. Meading, C. L. Garrigues and Carl Evans, I'd buy me a summer home in Florida. Of course there are folks like O. D. Kenney, Bill Barnett, and Dick Ragsdale who slow up the trade a little but with the new improved electric sheep shears a job like that can be done in fifteen minutes and have time left to tell a shady story.

Several people have told me that if two thirds of the bores that look like they will come on the cotton around Slaton, mature, that the land around here will produce at least two bales of cotton to the acre. Of course all of these folks put in a few of "ifs" and I'm sure that very few of the farmers around here will ever admit to two bales to the acre, if they should produce it, but, folks, it looks like it's gonna be a mighty nice crop and even though I do not have an acre of land to my name I'm holding my fingers crossed and hoping for the best for I might sell a couple of ads and some adding machine paper to some of the business firms in Slaton should such a crop develop.

There is no doubt that Slaton is expanding just as most all towns over the nation are doing and I hope the growth is a healthy one. There is such a thing as too much competition in certain lines of business but I do not think such a condition has arisen in Slaton, for far too much business has gone to Lubbock from Slaton in the past.

There are certain things that are not available in Slaton and some traffic must be had between us as a small town and Lubbock as a larger one. The same condition holds true of Lubbock in comparison with Dallas, Ft. Worth and other centers for there are many things that are not available in Lubbock that can be secured in the towns larger than Lubbock.

Some organization that is interested in the growth of this community should make a study of the number of lines of business that are not represented in Slaton and have the information available for young men who are looking for opportunities to open businesses in the town.

Future planning often means the growth or stagnation of a town,

or community, and from what little I know there are no definite plans for Slaton's future.

It seems to me that the women of Slaton have more fun than the men do. If you will snoop around a little you'll find that a lot of the ladies get up each morning about ten, put on their crispy morning clothes and flit to each others houses drinking coffee and picking up a sweet roll here and there, they get home in time to open a can of china berries or some snap beans and phone hubby to bring home a steak, they take a bakery cake out of the cake box and everything is ready for lunch. If they do not eat supper at a restaurant they have cold cuts, drug store ice cream and some times one of them will make some potato salad.

This is not a criticism of the women. They are smart and getting smarter all the time. A big percent of the men and even a larger percent of the manufacturing concerns of the nation are putting in their time making life easier for the women and it won't be long until all a woman will have to do to get her home work done will be to turn over in bed and switch on a button or throw a switch.

What is happening to the men in the meantime? Nobody is worrying about how he is to get his work done and the only thing that I know of that has been invented since I have been a grown man is the use of adding machines and they are getting so complicated that it is easier to get out a pencil and go back to doing the job like it used to be done before some guy named Burros got to fiddling with a lot of wires, cranks and electric wires, us guys should go to thinking about ourselves.

In central Texas there has been a long fight between Fort Worth and Dallas as to which is the biggest and best town. The Star-Telegram claims to have the widest circulation of any paper in Texas. In West Texas the two towns that seem to be fighting for leadership are Amarillo and Lubbock, with Amarillo claiming a slight lead in population.

In one of Charley Guy's columns last week he made the statement that Lubbock has a population of 80,000. Perhaps he is right but I doubt that Lubbock has that many people living in its boundaries.

ed in Amarillo for over fourteen years and while a lot of changes have been made in Amarillo since we have lived in Slaton, I believe Amarillo is a larger town at the present time than Lubbock, but I do believe that in the long run Lubbock may become a larger city than Amarillo unless the Panhandle turns from wheat raising and ranching to farming of some products that will bring more people into the area around Amarillo. If you have ever gone out into the country surrounding a good part of Amarillo you wonder why in the world any one ever stopped there at all.

This part of the state is the richest, the climate the most invigorating and the folks the best in the world, and I'm looking for Slaton to slip by both Amarillo and Lubbock and some day be the center of the business world in West Texas.

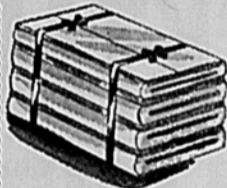
