

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

A combination of August's sun and "the narrowing bank account" that comes with the end of every month prompted us to choose a favorite recipe of Mrs. J. M. Anthony, 830 South 10th as our favorite also for this week.

If you have a sweet tooth and need a quick and economical desert you will agree with Mrs. Anthony that this recipe is made to order. To make this delicious peach ice cream, Mrs. Anthony tells us that all you need is the following ingredients:

1 cup fresh peaches, sliced
1 package Kool Aid vanilla mix ½ cup sugar
1½ cups cold milk
1 cup whipping cream
½ cup toasted, chopped Almonds
The beauty of this particular icecream is that it can be made either in the old-fashioned freezer or in the freezing unit of your refrigerator; however, Mrs. Anthony, insists that if you have time, the ream frozen in the older method is far superior to that in the ice box.

The first thing you do to pre-

cream frozen in the older method is far superior to that in the ice box.

The first thing you do to prepare this desert is to place the Kool Aid mix and sugar in a bowl and mix dry. Next, add milk and whip until well dissolved. In separate bowl place chilled cream and whip until stiff. Pour Kool Aid into cream and mix.

Now, the ingredients, well-mixed are ready to freeze. Pour mixture into freezing tray and freeze at coldest temperature. When almost frozen, stir in the peaches and add almonds.

Mrs. Anthony cautioned against adding the nuts too soon. The less time the almonds remain in the cream the less apt they are to become soggy, thus spoiling the whole effect of the desert.

Asked if the recipe was her own creation, Mrs. Anthony told us that she added to and experimented with a recipe found on the Kool Aid package. No doubt you will agree that it is a decided improvement. The original recipe calls for no fruit or nuts; just plain vanillaice cream was the final result.

Mrs. Anthony's enthusiasm for her recipe seems to rest not only in the tastiness of the desert, but also in the short time required to prepare it and the economy of its ingredients.





BEST LIGHTING FOR PL. TOS LOCKS MATURAL

Too many amateurs, confused by complicated lighting diagrams, are afraid to take pictures by artificial light. Hidden in a fireplace, it is the complicated lighting diagrams, are afraid to take pictures by artificial light. Hidden in a fireplace, it is diversed to take an incomplication of the subject and foodlights and follow the charts exactly, they feel there is not chance of making good pictures.

Almost all the pictures you want to take can be made nicely with two lights, both the same power. Instead of complicated charts, just remember one rule: One light should always be at the camera. The other should be almost twice as close to the subject, aimed at the subject from the most natural angle.

The light at the camera is known as a fill-light. It is supposed to be weaker, so we keep it further from the subject.

The key light makes the picture. If it is thrown up from a low angle at the ambject, the result is theatrical, like footlights. If it shines down from high over head it can limitate sunlight. Hidden in a fireplace, it
