Bill Is Pending To Open State Board Meets To Public

AUSTIN, Texas, May 23 — The citizens of Texas have the right to know what happens at meetings of state boards and bureaus which spend state money and establish state policy.

That is the contention of Representative Preston E. Smith of Lubbock, who pointed out today that the people now do not enjoy such a privilege.

Smith is author of a bill which would open the meetings to the press and public.

The bill passed the House of Representatives in March by a vote of 118 to 4. It has since awaited action in the Senate. Last week the Senate voted down a proposal to suspend the rules and take up the bill out of regular order.

"Time is getting away from us," Smith said, "and there are going to be a lot of bills which will die for want of action." He continued: "I hope that this bill, which opens the doors of board meetings to the public will not die."

"The people of this state put up the money for its operation, and when any group of officials gets together to talk about spending that money, the people are entitled to know what the officials say."

Smith suggested that civic-minded Texans might wish to tell their Senators of their interest in the measure, which is House Bill 428.

"I do not see how secrecy can be justified," Smith declared, "when these boards are discussing public policy and public funds. Too many times, controversial issues have been decided behind closed doors. That's not the way democracy ought to work."

There are teeth in the bill, Smith asserted: It makes it mandatory upon the attorney general to inaugurate quo warranto proceedings against offenders.

The bill provides that the 140 state boards which it governs must give to the newspapers written notice in advance of meetings.

"The House of Representatives has shown by its favorable vote of 118 to 4 what it thinks of this bill. Also, there has been widespread newspaper editorial comment for the legislation," Smith said.

"This is a bill that ought to be passed," he added.

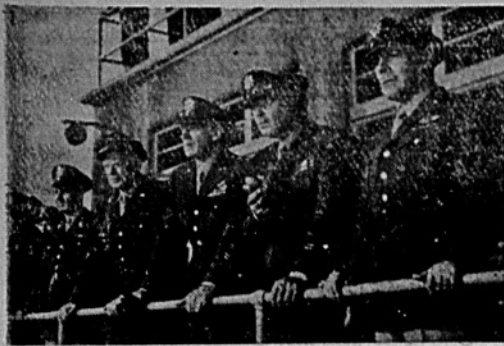
