THE FIRST STATE BANK WILL MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

These improvements are made necessary by the heavy volume of business the bank is now enjoying.

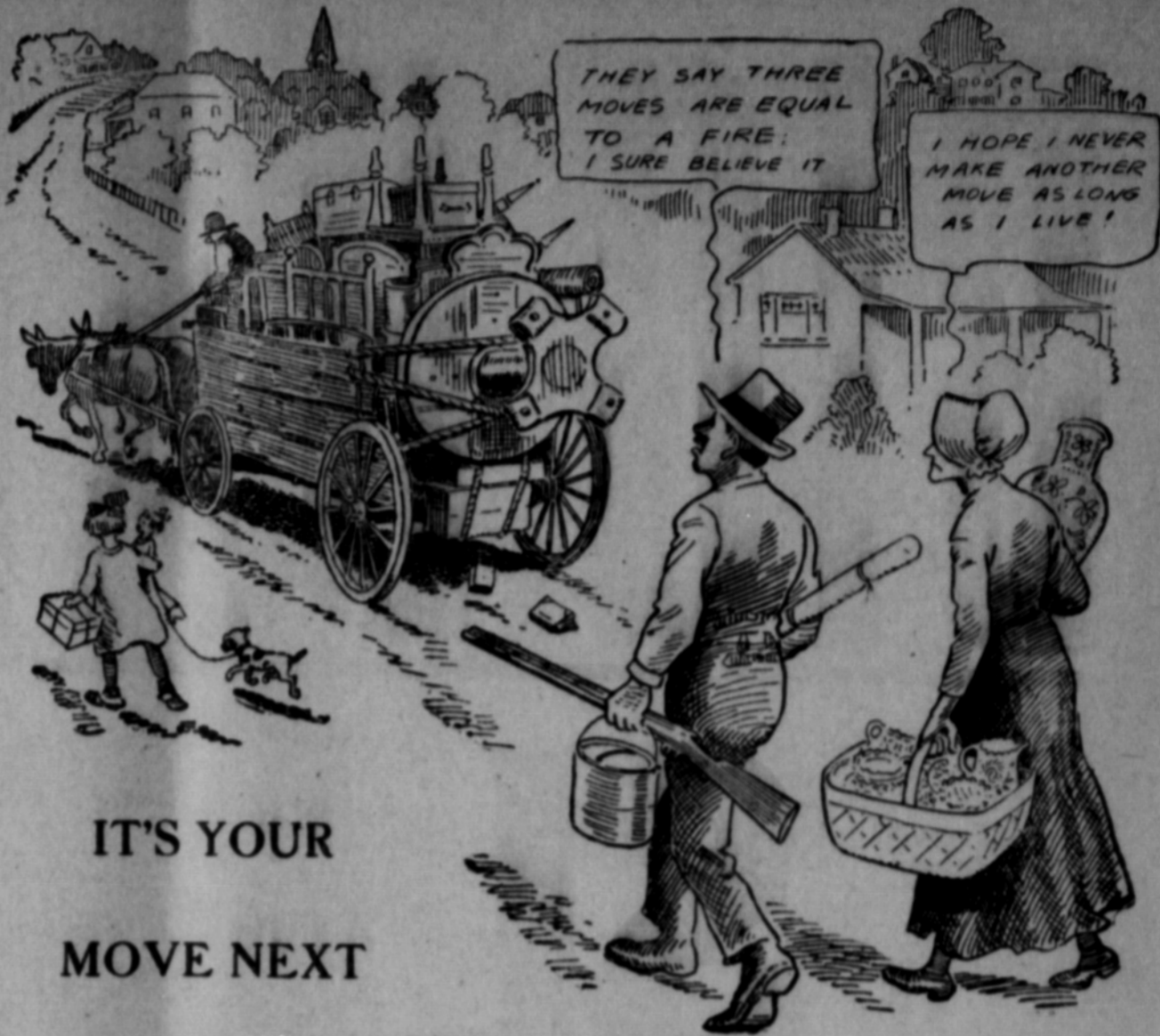

El Paso Morning Times On the Governor's Race

The following excerpt in regard to the Governor's race in Texas is taken from an editorial which appeared in the El Paso Morning Times of April 28, 1920:

"The campaign for the governorship will really begin in earnest after the precinct conventions of Saturday. There are five candidates in the field, but up to date only two of them, Pat Neff of Waco, and former Senator Bailey of Gainesville, have made any considerable progress with the voters. Mr. Neff, if opinions of trained political observers are worth anything, is reasonably certain to receive the support of the so-called progressive element which is backing the Wilson administration, while Senator Bailey is everywhere recognized as the champion of the old-fashioned Democrats who believe in the maintenance of the traditional doctrines of the party and who would call a halt on the latter-day mania for the centralization of authority in Washington.

"Messrs. Looney, Thomason and Lewelling, the remaining three candidates, have climbed upon the administration band wagon, but there is reason to believe they are generally regarded as excess baggage and may be invited to step down and out and make way for the one man who will have a chance to defeat Senator Bailey.

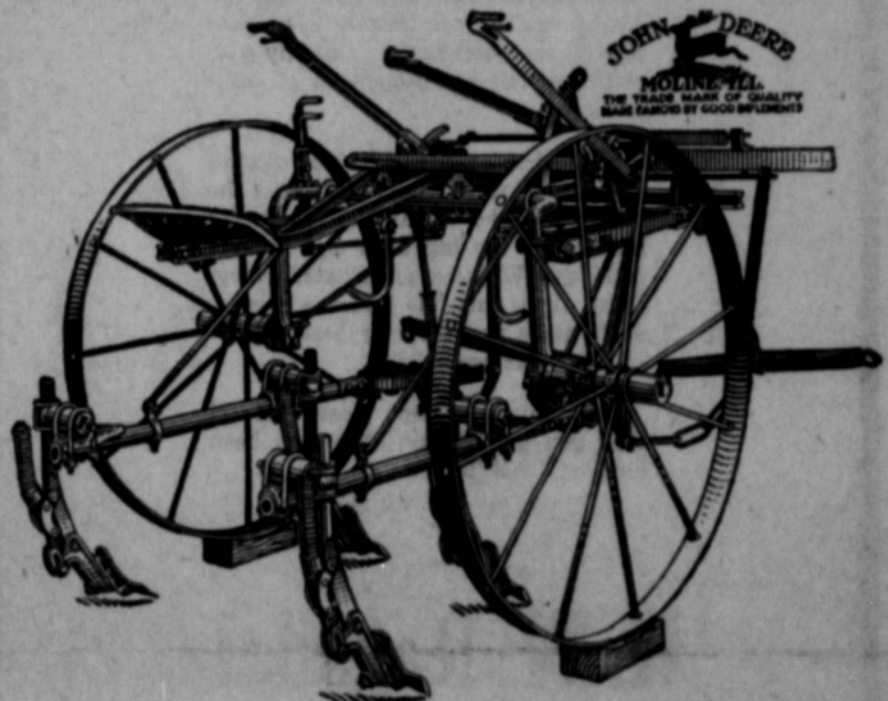

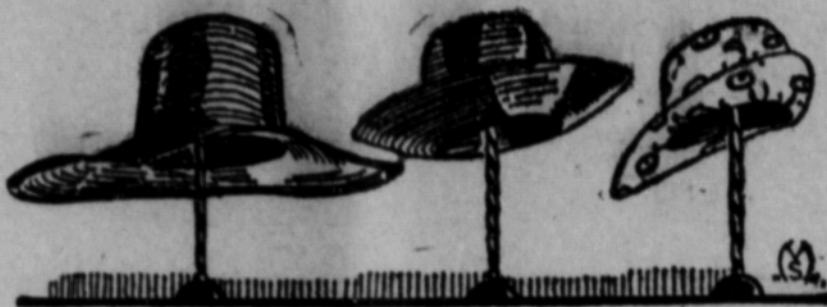
