The yard was originally founded 30 years ago by his father, S. Lamar Forrest, and operated by him for several years. During this time it was known as Plains Lumber Company.

Mr. Don Britt, present manager has been with the Forrest Lumber Company for over two and a half years. He took over the Slaton yard in January of this year when the company's operation changed hands.

Methodist Church Construction To Commence Soon

Week's Question

Slaton Citizens Give Suggestions For Actual Betterment Of City

The subject of "What Improvements do you think should be made in Slaton" has been discussed in the question of the week column before; however, this question could be continued every week and a different answer would be found with every individual. For this reason, we are repeating it this week.

Don Britt, manager of Forrest Lumber Company, evidently has given the matter a great deal of thought, because without hesitating, he said, "The first thing I can think of that we need is storm sewers to carry off the rain that stays in the streets after a rain; and the only way you can get rid of it is to let it stagnate and evaporate."

"A modern hotel and coffee shop" is the suggestion of LeRoy Holt. "I have heard many traveling men and railroad men express the desire to stay here overnight in order to avoid both a crowd and parking congestion in Lubbock," he continued.

Miss Gertrude King laughed when she said, "Well, this may sound funny to you, but one thing I can think of is local-view posters. Not only would this be a publicity for Slaton, but it would be a help for them. Especially during the summer months, there are many tourists passing through Slaton who have

never seen this country before and would like to have these postcards."

Ernest Kercheval seems to think that the most important thing we need in Slaton is "More cooperation among the townspeople in the things we already have."

For example, people should show more interest in the Youth Center now that we have it, and should encourage their children to attend it. Of course, we're all guilty of this indifferent attitude," he said. "Another thing which we need badly," he added, "is a municipal swimming pool large enough to take care of the people who would patronize it."

Upon asking Reverend O. B. Herring what, in his opinion, Slaton needs most, he gave a Methodist preacher's guess. "Two more serious lines, he said that he believes Slaton should take more pride in the appearance of the town. "Our town should be cleaner, neater—weeds should be cut down, and the alleys should be kept as clean as the front streets," he explained.

C. E. (Dreamy) Smith gave as his answer, "The school grounds should be cleaned up; and a playground should be provided, one large enough and equipped well enough to entertain the youngsters here in town."

C. Of C. Nominates Top Citizen For Second Quarter

Slaton's top citizen for the second quarter of 1950 was announced Tuesday afternoon by Chamber of Commerce officers and directors, following a called meeting of that organization in City Hall.

Receiving the award for outstanding community service was Robert Hall Davis, Slaton resident since early 1947. A nominating committee of the chamber recommended Davis for his service rendered in promotion of the city's Frontier Birthday celebration and for his previous outstanding work in this year's Lubbock County Livestock Show.

The Certificate of Distinguished Service was presented Davis in a brief ceremony Wednesday morning by Lewis Hollingsworth, president of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

Davis is a graduate of Post high school and Texas Technological college, Lubbock. A veteran of World War II, he served three and one-half years in the medical corps. At present he is Secretary-Treasurer of Ray C. Ayers and Son.

New Trade Days Promotion To Have Second Trial Fri., Sat. And Mon.

Thrill Show And Fireworks To Be At Buffalo Lakes

W. H. Rodgers, manager of Buffalo Lakes, reported that everything is in readiness at the big resort, for the biggest Fourth of July Celebration that has ever been held.

There will be fun and entertainment from early in the morning until late that night. The major events will be the Jimmy Martin daredevil Thrill Show in the evening and the big Free Fireworks display at night.

The Thrill Show of 20 acts is under the direction of Jimmy Martin, who for ten years was a stunt man in Hollywood. One of his last "standins" was for Clark Gable in one of his latest releases "To Please A Lady." He has done many of the most thrilling acts in the movies.

The thrill show will be all kinds of smashing, crashing stunts in automobiles and will demonstrate the kind of driving that should not be done on the highways.

The feature stunt will be Jimmy driving a car off the highest cliff overlooking the boat house.

The fireworks display at night will be exciting, colorful and beautiful. There will be no extra charge to see the fireworks.

Telephone Co. Makes Change

Slaton's continued rapid growth has made necessary several additions and changes in the telephone system here, including separate handling of long distance and local calls, continued expansion of the outside wire network, and added equipment at the central office, according to C. H. Cale, manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company here.

"With both local and long distance calling at an all-time high, we have recently established separate local and long distance positions at the switchboard. Formerly, any operator could handle both types of calls.

"With the present system, one group of operators are free to devote all their time to handling local calls. Similarly, another group works only on the completion of calls to other cities. The only change in the customer's service is that, when they place a long distance call, the operator who answers now refers them to the long distance operator.

"This is the practice at virtually all telephone exchanges which, like Slaton, have grown to a point where such a division of work is necessary."

Slaton now has more than 1,300 telephones, over which telephone users here make an average of 8,600 calls a day. This represents an increase of about 200 telephones added here since the first of the year, when there were only 1,100 in service, and Slaton customers made, on the average, only 6,800 calls a day, Cale pointed out.

To meet the increased demand for service here, the telephone company has installed, since last July, three new positions of switchboard—two for local service and one for long distance—making a total of eight switchboard positions now installed here.

The switchboard in service is the most modern type made by the telephone company, Cale said. It is capable of being expanded to meet the increased demands for service, and is of an advanced design which permits the fastest and most efficient handling of calls possible with a manual "flashlight" system.

In reviewing financial results of the telephone company here, Cale reported that last year the company lost approximately \$4,000 units operations in Slaton. "However, had the increased rates, granted last August, been in effect all year, our losses would have amounted to \$186," he said.

"We must realize a fair return on the money invested here, if we are to attract the added dollars which are needed to continue to meet the demand for telephone service," the manager said. "Adequate earnings are essential in carrying out the telephone construction program in Slaton commensurate with the city's needs."

Marinell Studio To Conduct Child "Photo Contest"

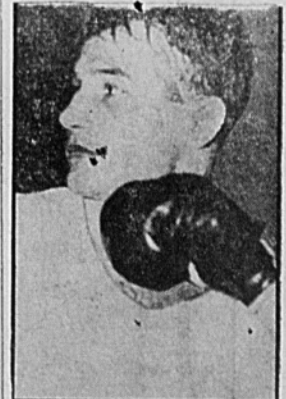
A child photograph contest will be conducted by the Marinell Portraits Studio in Slaton, with contest dates falling between June 30 and August 6.

**Reed Wants To Be
Lieut. Governor**

A state government, like a family, should live within its income, W. O. Reed, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, declared this week as he vigorously pushed his campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

Reed, who is now serving his ninth consecutive term in the Legislature from Dallas County, is well qualified to speak with authority on economy in government, for he has actually done something about it.

He was the author of the pay-as-you-go law which put Texas on a cash basis and prevents the Legislature from spending money it does not have. While Reed was Speaker in 1947-48, he directed legislation which resulted in a surplus of over \$90,000,000 in the general revenue fund at the end of his term.

"Additional taxes are not the answer to the rising cost of state government," he declared. "I am definitely opposed to any kind of a general sales tax, income tax or gross receipts tax."

Colostrum-Fed Calves

Repeated scientific studies prove the value of feeding colostrum to calves, the American Veterinary Medical association says. The colostrum, or first milk the cow gives after calving, contains substances that start calves growing right and protect them against infections. Farmers who have deep-freeze units are urged to save leftover colostrum and gradually feed it out to calves during their first few weeks of life.

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

It's always a treat to find some new way to prepare that ever-popular basic vegetable, "potatoes." And this recipe, which comes to us from Mrs. Vern Johnson, has the reputation the town over—especially among the younger set—as being simply de-lish-ous. Asked what we could call her concoction, Rogene laughed and said, "Well really I hadn't given it a formal name, but I suppose you could call it 'Potatoes Au Gratin'."

The ingredients are very few and all can be found right in your kitchen supplies, but the secret is in the proper preparation.

All you need for the recipe is the following list:

- 2 small, new potatoes for each serving.
- Salt
- Pepper
- Cheese
- Garlic Salt
- 1/2 cup light cream
- Butter

Boil the potatoes with jackets on, but do not over-cook allowing to become mealy. Remove skins and

cut into 1/2 inch round slices. Cover bottom of casserole with layer of potatoes. Salt and pepper potatoes and place generous amount (or to taste) of unmelted butter and cheese on top. Continue this until last layer of potatoes is used up.

Over last layer, sprinkle lightly with grated cheese, covering top. And over grated cheese, sprinkle lightly with garlic salt, and slowly pour 1/2 cup cream over layer, allowing garlic flavoring to wash through the potato layers.

Brown in oven for 20 to 25 minutes, and serve.

Rogene, one of the best and most promising young cooks in town, explained, (and very nonchalantly when asked), that she "just made the recipe up by experimenting and deciding this was the best."

She also suggested that this particular potato dish is especially good with meat loaf and broiled steak.

Rogene's happy and pleasant disposition must be important factors to her originality and creative ability. "I have learned why they charge those 'beautiful fees' for home decoration," she explained; "but it's worth every minute of the time and effort."

Slaton's chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star met in a regular business session Tuesday night in the Masonic Lodge. Mrs. Fannie Patterson, Worthy Matron, and E. E. Culver, Worthy Patron, presiding.

Things Have Changed A Lot In Slaton In Past 10 Years.

The September 6th, 1940, issue of the Slatonite was the first one to be published by the present owner of the paper. That was almost ten years ago. Within that time many things have transpired and many changes have taken place. Some of the differences are outstanding, such as the advertised prices of foods.

In the issue of Sept. 6, 1940, first grade sliced bacon was advertised at 20c; in last week's issue, first grade bacon was special at 59c; a 24 pound sack of flour, in 1940 was 73c; the same brand, in last week's issue, was special at \$1.59, and carrots were 2 large bunches for 5c in 1940 and in last week's paper, they were 2 bunches for 15c.

In that issue in 1940 the front page told of the United States trading warships to England for naval bases, the total enrollment of the Slaton school was 913, Joe E. Webb was superintendent, Curtis Hamilton was athletic coach and Mrs. J. G. White was guidance committee chairman for the instructors at the schools.

In Sept., 1940, the Daughters of Pioneer were to hold a flower show and a lawn contest was to be judged, and two golf players from Slaton won prizes in a golf tournament in Clovis, New Mexico. They were Gunter Garland and Greely Sanders.

There were eight pages to the Sept. 6 edition of the Slatonite and the Teague Drug Store, the

Slaton Bakery, the Palace Theatre and Berkley & Haddock were the only business firms that advertised in the 1940 paper which are still active in business today.

There were a number of firms at that time that are still aggressively doing business in Slaton, but those mentioned above happened to be the only ones that were represented in that particular issue.

The Slatonite was housed in just half the floor space now occupied by the business, no office supplies were carried in stock and the business office occupied about ten square feet.

At that time the population of Slaton was just short of 3,500, as compared to something over 5,000 today. The South side of the square had only three buildings in the block and an old building that was vacant was where C. P. Anthony's store is today.

A good part of the building on the West side of the square were vacant and buildings that could not be bought for \$20,000 today, were drag on the market at \$4,000.00.

Hundreds of small homes were taken out on trucks from Slaton during 1940 and the years previous to that time, the depression still had a tight hold on the area.

Few economists predict any conditions again and the people of this area are looking forward to many years of prosperity in the future.

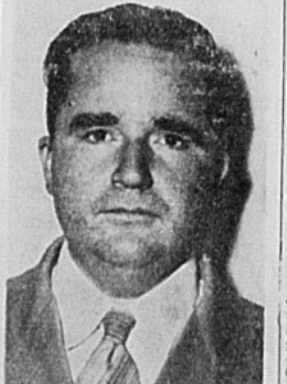

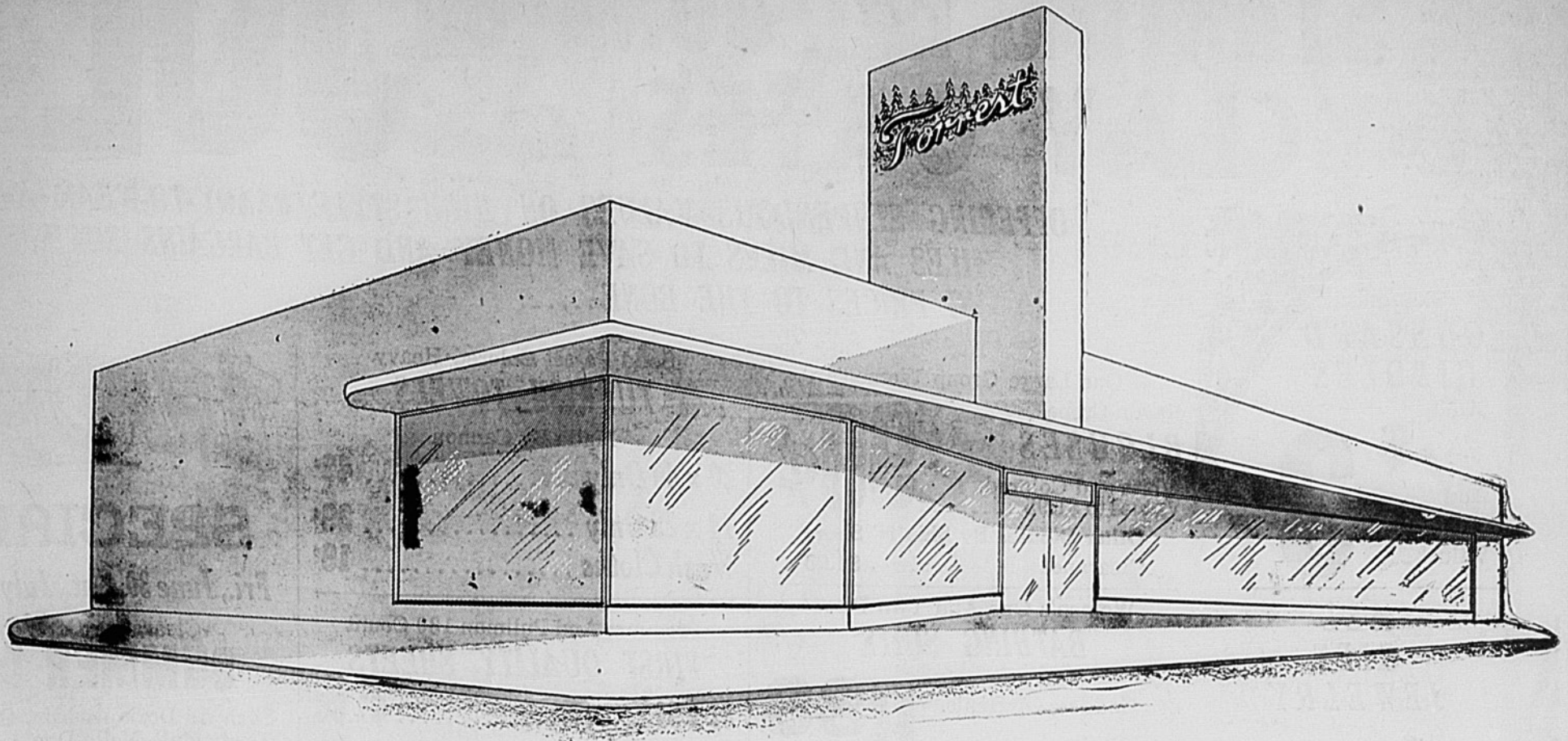

**Mahon Announces
For Re-Election**

Announcement of his candidacy for re-election to the House of Representatives from the 19th District of Texas is being made by Congressman George Mahon. Mahon has met filing requirements in all the counties of the District. "It now appears," said Mahon, "that Congress will be in session up to and beyond July 22, the date of the Primary, and I will have very little opportunity to visit and campaign over

the District. I thus am taking this method of again presenting my candidacy to the voters of the 19th District." By virtue of his congressional tenure at the will of the voters, only 47 of the 435 members of the House are now senior to Mahon. By reason of congressional seniority procedure, this gives the 19th District a position of prestige possessed by relatively few areas in the country. Mahon ranks No. 3 on the powerful House Appropriations Committee and is Chairman of the subcommittee handling appropriations for the Armed Services. Said Mahon in his announcement: "As your representative in

Washington, I have been confronted with many difficult problems, as has been the case with you folks at home. You have cooperated with me and placed your trust in me in matters of greatest importance. "We are now in a very dangerous and difficult time in the history of the nation, and as the District, I am seeking as best I can to measure up to the terrific responsibilities confronting our government." Mahon said that he wanted to thank the people for the wonderful support they had given him through the years and that he would continue to do everything in his power to do a good job in

Washington for the people of the 19th District. At this time, in addition to his regular assignments, Mahon is seeking to prevent passage of a pending proposal which would shift a large portion of the West Texas cotton acreage allotment to Central and South Texas in 1951. Earlier in the session Mahon secured approval by the House of the bill he handles which provides for the operation of the Army, Navy and Air Force. The Senate has not yet passed the measure and final agreement between the House and Senate cannot be secured until this is done.

**Dysentery Is One
Of Most Serious
Summer Diseases**

Commenting on the unusually high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucous. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth," Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their harmful effects."

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally, however, he said, it may occur at any age. It is usually more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported are unusual for spring.

"Food protection and adequate sanitary measures are more urgently needed now than ever before if we control the potential possibilities of epidemic dysentery in this State."

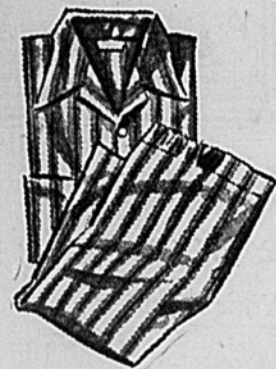
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West Texas Roundup

It only requires 90 signatures to request an election and the election must be held not sooner than 20 days or later than 30 days after the Commissioners Courts have ordered the election.

Property Still Not High Here

Real estate men will tell you that each year for the past four or five years they had considered Slaton property, and farm lands in this area, as being at their peak but that each time prices have gone higher and most of them will refuse to make predictions now.

During the depression and even after definite changes in values over the nation had been effected Slaton values lagged and it took our town longer than most towns to recover from the set back of hard times and even today living costs and property values are not as high as in other parts of West Texas. A lot of folks are now complaining because they did not take advantage of getting homes, business houses and farms at the prices that were available in the early forties. It is probable that our prices are still low and that farm land at \$125.00 and \$150.00 per acre is cheap but a lot of people remember what happened in 1930 and especially those who had bought property on credit. Most of them were wiped out and some of them see conditions mounting to something like the boom of 1928 and 1929. They will advise you to buy nothing for which you do not have the money to pay. It is perhaps sound advice for you most certainly to hold onto the things you own if there are no debts against them. As long as you do not have property for sale and have hopes of making profits, the actual value of it does not count. If it is yours the rise or fall in price means nothing and the man or woman who is not in debt can always feel secure if they have property of value, especially in Slaton.

Slaton Folks Are Good Neighbors

A good many people seem to be somewhat disappointed because Slaton does not have as much population as some of the optimistic estimators predicted.

Five thousand people make a nice size town and a town that is growing is a much better place than one that is at a stand still or is losing population. In comparison to other towns in West Texas and all over the state, Slaton has much for which to be complimented. The growth of the town has not been caused by any sudden activity that might stop at any time, it is said that most of the oil towns have slowed down considerably and that there are more vacant homes in Levelland than in most towns in West Texas. While there is still a lot of activity in Snyder the rush and clamor has died down and Snyder may not turn out to be the boom town that it seemed that it would several months ago.

The kind of people and the kind of progress that Slaton has, is more of an asset than many seemingly benefits could be. Many of the visitors who came to Slaton during the Birthday Celebration who had lived in Slaton before said that they would prefer to live here over any place in which they had ever lived. Many of the people who are employed by the Santa Fe will tell you that they enjoy living in Slaton and do not wish to be transferred. A number of railroad men who are on retirement have gone to other parts of the country to what they thought would be ideal places to live out the remainder of their lives but a great many of them have come back to Slaton because Slaton is a mighty nice town in which to live.

A place like Slaton will grow and keep on growing because it is the kind of town where folks like to live, its a town where folks respect each other and where there are few reasons for the folks not to be good neighbors.

Don't Let A Wheel Come Off

If you are an average John or Jane Doe you will take one or more vacation trips within the next two months and a lot of you are going to have serious accidents that will cripple or leave scars on you that will be with you the remainder of your lives.

You have read, been warned by signs and told over the radio that the danger of automobile accidents is greater than ever in the history of the United States, you have been warned about swimming in waters you are not familiar with and told not to get familiar with such things as poison ivy, going into lots where a bull might make you climb a tree that is not there, and of getting your sun tan gradually, but still all of these things and hundreds of other dangers lurk in waiting for you. Some of them you might guard against, others would happen to you regardless of what you do, but if you are planning a trip there is one thing certain, you at least should take all the precautions possible. One thing that could save you a lot of expense and probably keep you from getting into an accident is to have your automobile thoroughly inspected and repaired, especially the steering apparatus and the wheels. Thousands of people would be alive today if so many steering gears had not suddenly gone haywire and there are a lot of graves filled with folks who were in cars when a wheel came loose.

Many people in middle life, and past, who take little exercise in their regular daily routine, will go on vacations and take vigorous entertainment that quite often brings on heart attacks and young folks who think they are expert swimmers or divers over-estimate their abilities and get into serious trouble.

Election Time Vote!

One of the foremost rights and privileges of free American people—the right to vote—is too often ignored to the point of disgrace.

Statistics show that in the last presidential election, less than half of the eligible voters went to the polls. The candidates of the parties will be chosen and will start their campaigns for election in November. If you want your party to nominate the candidate you believe best fitted, go to the polls.

July 22, less than a month away now, the Democratic Primary Election will be held in this locale for some very important positions such as county attorney, district attorney, state representative, county judge, county superintendent of schools and many others.

Far too many people take the attitude that our local elections are comparatively unimportant, so they let the other man do the voting. This is, of course, a defeatist attitude because government begins at home—even within the family circle. People never stop to think what could happen if a

candidate with corrupt political ideas and plans should get into our county or district offices. A shrewd politician can always find a way to get around the law if he can benefit his own personal welfare by doing so.

It is for such reasons as these mentioned that we should go to the polls next month and vote—vote even if there are only two candidates for each position. The really intelligent voter will look into the character, qualifications, and past reputation of the candidates before making his decision. And this information is available.

Protect Flock From Worminess

To keep your chickens free of severe damage caused by intestinal worms, follow a systematic control program for the rest of the growing season and after fall housing. Such a program should include regular cleaning of the poultry house or shelters, runs and equipment, plus the use of medicines which will remove the worm species from the infected birds.

Remove Filth

The frequent removal of filth will prevent worm infection in your flock by reducing the number of worm eggs present. Give your flock the benefits of a clean, sanitary home.

For such familiar worm species as large roundworms and cecal worms there are dependable commercial medicines which may be given to the flock with good results. Many poultrymen follow the practice of administering a worm-remover every month, mixing it in the flock's feed. This is done during the range period and also after fall housing.

Uniform Growth

Poultry-raisers who follow a good worm-control program find that it helps prevent damage from intestinal worms, thereby promoting uniform growth of the birds and encouraging higher egg production. Although they rarely cause mortality, intestinal worms are actually extremely costly. They cause decreased egg production, lower birds' resistance to infectious disease, and create cull chickens which are not fit for market.

In effect, worms cause slow starvation. Great numbers of them in a fowl's intestinal tract make it impossible for the bird's body to assimilate food as it should. The effect is most noticeable in young birds whose growing bodies demand full use of the feed they consume.
