A couple of weeks ago Judge Smith, Joe Walker and Howard Swanner were holding a mourners meeting on the square and big crocodile tears were splashed all over the sidewalk on account of the terrible condition of the cotton crop. I stopped and splashed a few myself, although I do not have a single farm to my name.

All of them claimed that the hot weather had damaged the crop by at least 50 per cent and my tears came because I got to considering what would happen if my business got nicked 50 per cent. It was a sad state of affairs and it is a good thing that other farmers and business men did not come along for we would probably have had a big mass suicide problem on our hands.

Since the three inch rain that we had last week, and any that might have fallen since, the farmers are still complaining about prospects, but they do not have their hearts in the way they are doing it. The sob has gone out of their voices and when they mention the cotton crop and start complaining they look like a cat that had just swallowed the canary. And I've decided to postpone jumping off the city hall building, too.

O. D. Kenney and I had a "do you remember" meeting the other day and O. D. admitted that he was raised near New Boston, Texas, where he visited not long ago. He estimated that about half the folks around New Boston are related to him and he admits that some of them are mighty fine folks. Others he says he had rather not mention.

Some of his relatives have ever gotten so low that they left New Boston and moved to Arkansas where O. D. admits that he visited them. In fact O. D. says that folks in Arkansas are from ten to twelve years younger looking than they really are and that high blood pressure, heart trouble and nightmare are almost unknown in that part of the country.

O. D. and I considered life from every angle and came to the decision that a lot of folks may have died from scarlet fever, small pox and from plain laziness way back yonder when we were boys, but the roads were not strewn with wrecked automobiles, crushed bodies and odd legs and arms like they are now, nor were the insane asylums the most popular places for keeping a major part of the population.

"Turn backward, turn backward, oh, time in your flight, make me a child again just for tonight."

A year ago I got the heebiejeebies and decided I was working too hard, in fact a doctor told me I should rest more and quit worrying. So I have turned over a new leaf and now I rest more, do not worry as much and I have gained ten pounds, have insomnia even worse than I did before and the grass is six inches high in the front yard, two feet high in the backyard, I squeak when I bend over and I have to tie my shoe strings by instrument as I cannot see them at all after I put them on.

Moral: never follow a doctor's advice.

Met a man last week who used to live in the East, somewhere in Massachusetts, and he was comparing his life in Texas with that part of his experience he had lived in the other part of the country. He said he liked the people in Texas so much better than he did those in the state he used to live in; he likes the climate better and he especially was glad to get away from the continual labor agitation that boils and stews in that part of the nation; he said that this part of the country is still in its youth while the East is past its growth and is going to seed.

One never hears of a new business opening up in the old Eastern states, and most all of the wealth is in a few hands. Most all of the homes and business buildings are old and many of them in bad repair, and he said there are a good many of the people up there who come right out and admit that they are communist sympathizers.

The only thing that makes him uneasy in this part of the country is that most of the folks living in Texas do not realize what a mess a good part of the nation is in. He has a spot picked out down by Presidio where he plans to go when the atom bombs start fall-

ing. He said there is not a filling station within fifty miles of his spot and he figures it will take many years for the war to get that far. There is no doubt in his mind that this nation is going to get bombed and he says the folks in Detroit, Pittsburgh and other places are pretty much stirred up about it.

To see the ministers in Slaton on the streets one would hardly suspect that they are in keen competition with each other, and I had never suspected them of being on the still hunt for more customers.

If you really want to see how they work you should watch them when a new person comes to work in the town. Recently, due to changes in personnel, we have had ample opportunity to see how these things work. When a minister comes in the office and there is a strange face at a desk, the preacher circles around like a bird dog, he sniffs the air, squints at the new comer, but never makes a direct attack. He goes into the back office and asks a few questions about the new comer and while doing so makes a pass at the person he is questioning just as a matter of routine, although he has little hope of doing much good. He then comes into the front office and pretends like he is going to buy something so that the new employee will have to wait upon him and that is his opportunity. "What church do you attend?" he asks.

If the new citizen mentions the church of which the inquisitor is the minister he goes away with a smile of triumph, if the answer is some other church, then the day is ruined.

Why We Fight In Korea

Below, in part is what Scott W. Lucas said before the Senate of the United States on Thursday, July 20, 1950:

Let no one ever mistake it. These United States are the fruit of a bitter revolution and that revolution marches on in the world. And once more it is engaged in battle against the forces of reaction and tyranny. This time it is in Korea.

It is the revolution that began in England with the Magna Carta, and which, in Anglo-Saxon tradition, has spread across the seas via America to the whole world.

It is the same old battle for democratic rights of man: Free government by representatives chosen by free people. Trial by a jury of free citizens. Freedom of religion, of speech, of press. A government of laws, not men, its military power at all times subject to the civil power. No cruel or unusual punishments. The secret ballot and free elections. Faith in God and truth. The right of all citizens to hold public office. The right to education of our own choosing. The right to own property. A man's home is his castle. Government, a servant, not master of the people. Constitutional government. The right to believe in the fatherhood of God and all men equal in the brotherhood of man.

We are engaged once more, even in little Korea, in the everlasting fight that government of the people, by the people, and for the people under God shall not perish from the earth.

Make no mistake about it, ours are the revolutionary principles. In Korea, once again, men are fighting, men of two races, and dying, for those principles.

Remember:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident.

"That all men are created equal.

"That they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights.

"That among these are: Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

"That whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it and to institute new government laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form as to them should seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness."

These flaming ideals of revolution, expressed by Thomas Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence, inspired the men who marched with Washington, from Valley Forge to victory. They still march on, a great revolutionary idea, all over the world.

It is a revolution in which all classes did and can take part, be they bankers or laborers. "God is just," wrote Jefferson in his later years, and justice as the right of their fellow men was as dead in 1776 to wealthy George Washington and Tom Jefferson, and to bankers like Robert Morris and Haym Salomon, as it is to any man today.

Unlike the Bolshevik revolution, which sets class against class regardless of injustice, the essence of the American Revolution is that its objective is a classless society, in which all men enjoy equal rights. In fact, the essentially revolutionary character of the Jeffersonian idea is that it aims at a classless world, in the finest Christian tradition of the brotherhood of man.

How much, therefore, the unhappy dictatorship that rules Russia must fear the march of the idea that united the United States and wrote the Constitution to bind them together in peace in a Republic governed by representatives elected by all the people.

How tyrants everywhere must fear the world march of that idea, manifested now in the United Nations dedicated to the rights of man everywhere, a constitutional assembly, deriving its just powers from the consent of its members.

Slaton's Best Feature

One of the outstanding and unique privileges that people in Slaton enjoy is the use of the Slaton Club House and the Slaton Club House Park.

Most all visitors who come to Slaton who have the privilege of attending entertainments or meetings at the Club House say that they have never seen a town that had a place such as the Club House.

While the Slaton Club House is not an outstanding building when compared to some of the municipal buildings in big cities it is a most appreciated and attractive one in a town like Slaton.

There is seldom a night that some organization or group of people do not use the Slaton Club House and there are few towns that have a place to compare with it, where so many people congregate, and most organizations in other towns have to use churches, school buildings and County Court Houses for meetings, where accommodations are nearly as attractive and well arranged as they are at the Slaton Club House.

There are few towns the size of Slaton where a public park, where outing facilities are available like they are at the Slaton Club House park and the people of this community should do show their appreciation by using the Club House and the park.

A Problem We Should All Keep In Mind

Never have the people of Slaton been more conscious of traffic conditions and since the streets are now alive with school children many people have been asking the Slatonite to please make appeals for careful driving.

That the parents of the children are the worst traffic offenders seems tragic, but the evidence of their guilt is demonstrated daily at the school buildings when many parents drive their cars to the schools to deliver or pick up the children. If allowed to do so the drivers of cars will block streets, drive on the wrong sides of the streets and ignore every safety rule and all sense of courtesy.

Individually any one of these drivers will admit that such actions are most dangerous to themselves, to their own children, to the children of other people and to the public at large, but in the excitement of endeavoring to get a convenient way to curb, risk young lives, themselves and expensive automobiles, and if some authority is not exerted a heart breaking accident will surely occur.

If you are a driver of an automobile in Slaton, make a point to slow down to a speed that can be easily controlled when you are near a school building, and if you are a parent, take care to turn at the curbing when picking up or delivering your children at the school grounds. You have more time than you think, and orderly traffic at the school grounds will speed traffic.

Those In This Area Are Fortunate

Most people in Texas, and particularly this part of it, do not realize the privileges that they are enjoying in the lower tension in propaganda and from the strain of having to live under the conditions that the contests between labor and the strain of highly mechanized living conditions

The monotony of the lives of many people in big cities where the sunset is dimmed by tall buildings, where the sight of a cow, a chicken or a rabbit is unknown, where the continual hub-bub of screeching horns, subways and the like never stops, and where one is never out of close contact with other human beings and yet not close enough to feel the least tinge of interest in the welfare of most of them, can hardly be imagined by we who live on the South Plains.

To know your fellow townsman, whether you admire him to any great extent or not, is a privilege few of us appreciate, to be able to get in touch with, and see your acquaintances within a few minutes notice is something that makes life worth living in a town like Slaton, and to feel that everyone you know has the interest of the community at heart is a feeling that cannot be overestimated.

You can trust the folks you meet on the streets in Slaton, you can breathe the fresh air where soot and smoke and foul odors do not mar it, you are enjoying the life that few people even in America can enjoy. You are a privileged citizen of Slaton, Texas.

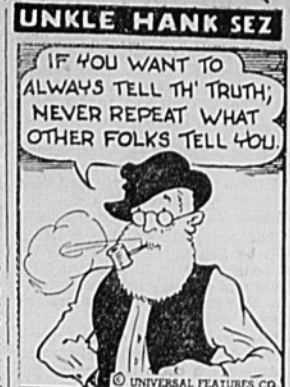

4. Nothing to eat. —The Amarillo News

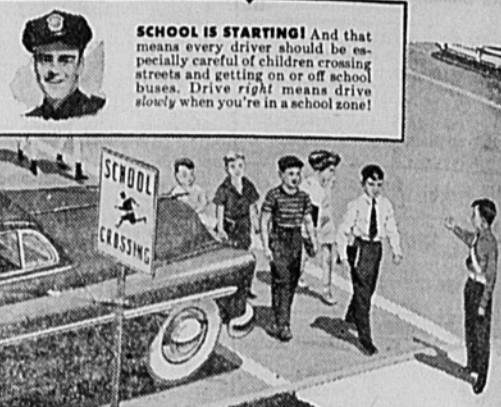
Easy Fish Sauce

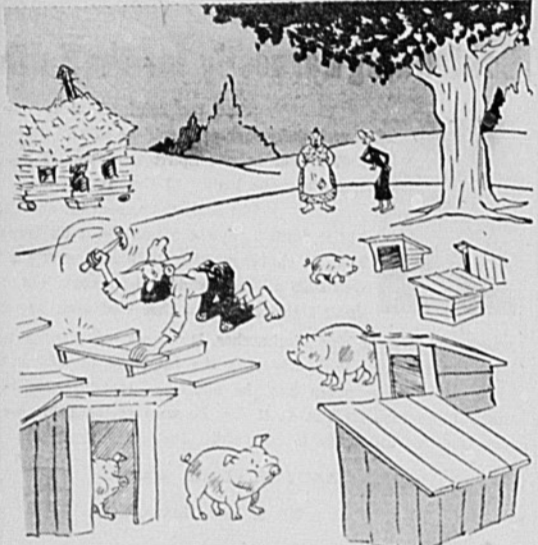

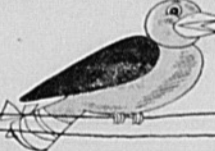

Tigers Open 1950 Football Season; Defeat Floydada's Eleven, 19-7

Slaton's Tigers opened their 1950 grid season last Friday night by handing a 19-7 defeat to Floydada's Whirlwinds in a non-conference clash played before some 3000 fans at Wester Field in Floydada.

A pair of second quarter touchdowns and another added in the final stanza gave the Tigers the victory. The Whirlwinds averted a whitewashing in the final period when the entire center of the Floydada line buckled up and blocked a Slaton punt, with End John Hinsley recovering in the end zone for the touchdown.

Making its debut under a new head coach, Slaton carried the fight most of the way, Floydada, with supposedly a green crew, made a better showing in the second half, and ended up with 108 yards rushing. They also picked up a little yardage through the air, trying eight aerials and connecting on two of them.

Slaton tried only one pass, and that attempt was not successful. End Jerry Huckabay intercepted one of the Whirlwind's passing attempts to set up the initial score for the Tigers in the second period.

Floydada took the opening kickoff and moved the ball down field to about the 50-yard line before a Whirlwind fumble was recovered by alert Tiger defensive players. Slaton then moved the ball down field on power runs of Bob Lambert, Bob Taylor, and Bill Butler, but the drive fizzled out on about the five-yard line in Whirlwind territory. On fourth down the ball went over to the home team.

The two teams exchanged punts a couple of times more before the first period ended in a scoreless tie.

Floydada attempted a jump pass from its own 17 to open play in the second quarter, with Slaton's Huckabay pulling the ball down to give the visitors a first and ten on the Whirlwind 19. Butler hit right tackle for seven, Thompson picked up one, and then Butler picked up a first down on the five yard stripe. On third down, Taylor scored from one yard out. His first of three conversion efforts was blocked by a hard-charging Floydada line.

Minutes later, Butler took a handoff on his own 43, twisted and powered his way for the second Tiger touchdown in the second frame. The young back was checked no less than three times by Whirlwind defenders before breaking into the clear and outrunning safety men. Taylor's second attempt at conversion was blocked.

Floydada was in scoring position when the half ended.

The third period was played on about even terms by both teams, with neither one threatening seriously. In the fourth period the Tigers went ahead 19-0 when Bob Lambert went 27 yards around

SANITIZE YOUR POULTRY HOUSE

A common source of flock troubles and mainly, flock disease, is the poultry house. It is here that birds eat together. With such close contact, it is little wonder that poultry diseases develop from the slightest irregularity.

A workable poultry raising plan takes all of this into consideration. Consequently, most poultrymen make the poultry house the primary object of one of the top management duties in poultry raising — SANITATION. And it is well they should.

Under the crowded conditions in which poultry usually live, it is not difficult to find one of their first needs, adequate space. The general rule of 3 square feet per bird for light breeds and 4 square feet for heavy breeds, is one that should never be neglected.

Dispose of Droppings
Proper attention also should be given to the disposal of bird's droppings. Droppings and other matter do accumulate quickly in a laying house, particularly during fall and winter confinement. You can use either a droppings pit, lined by a wire netting, or by slatted boards under roosts, as raisers prefer. Regardless of method you use, clean-out droppings regularly.

Another important factor in poultry house sanitation is the litter. To prevent dampness and spots in litter, stir it each day. It is a common practice to start with about 3 inches of clean litter and build up as the laying season progresses. Adding to the litter as it becomes worked down, you should have 5 or 6 inches of good litter in the house by the time weather arrives.

Keep Equipment Clean
Regular sanitizing of feeders and waterers is one of the essential better poultry health. Make a point to keep your poultry equipment clean and sanitized each day, if necessary. Disease does occur in your poultry house and sanitation will help prevent spread of infection. Cull and immediately isolate diseased birds. If they are badly beyond recovery, burn them. You can hold losses to a minimum in many disease outbreaks by following strict sanitation.

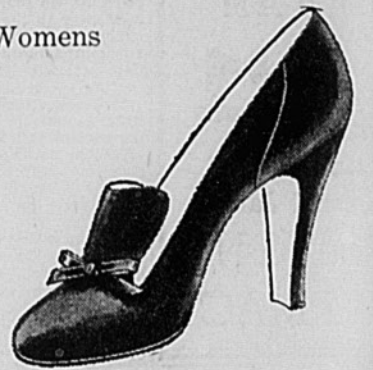

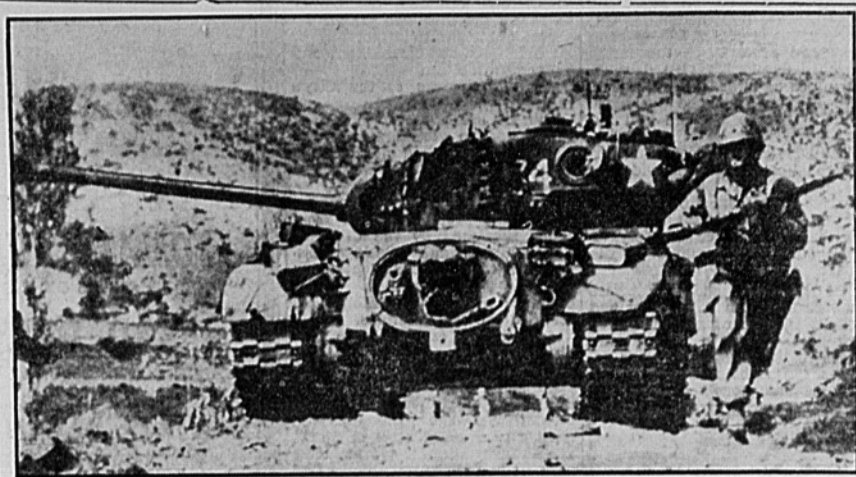

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

For those who like a good salad, but can't find a good ready-made dressing to go with it, here is Mrs. Arthur Dennis' favorite recipe for salad dressing. She especially likes it with Waldorf salad. The ingredients are: 2 eggs, ½ cup sugar, ½ cup lemon juice, ½ cup pineapple juice. Whip eggs; mix all ingredients together and put in double boiler. Cook until thick. Take off stove and beat. Let cool, then add 1 cup of cream. Chill and use. Plain cakes, gingerbread, or ice cream can be pepped up by top-

ping them with a good sauce, such as the lemon sauce given to us by Mrs. L. W. Smith. The ingredients are: ½ cup sugar, 2 level tbsps. flour, 1 egg, 1 lemon, pinch of salt, 1 cup of boiling water. To sugar and flour, add one cup boiling water and stir until a smooth paste is formed. Add the yellow of an egg and a pinch of salt. Stir and let boil. Add the juice of one lemon. Put in refrigerator until ready to use.
