

NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF LUBBOCK CITY OF SLATON SLATON, TEXAS

TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED TAXPAYING VOTERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY THEREIN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE That an election will be held in the City of Slaton, Texas on the 9th day of December, 1950, the same being the second Saturday in December, 1950, on the Propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the Election Ordinance adopted by the City Commission on the 13th day of November, 1950, which Election Ordinance is substantially as follows:

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE WATER SYSTEM AND THE SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, AND FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, AND THE ADVISABILITY OF ISSUING THE INTEREST BEARING COUPON BONDS OF SAID CITY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING THE COST THEREOF; CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING WHETHER OR NOT THE BONDS OF SAID CITY SHALL BE ISSUED IN THE AGGREGATE AMOUNT OF \$75,000.00, BEING ALLOCATED ACCORDING TO THREE SEPARATE PROPOSITIONS FOR THE AMOUNT OF \$25,000.00 FOR THE EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, AND FOR THE AMOUNT OF \$25,000.00 FOR THE EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, AND FOR THE AMOUNT OF \$25,000.00 FOR IMPROVEMENT OF THE PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS; FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HOLDING SUCH ELECTION; APPOINTING JUDGES OF SAID ELECTION; PRESCRIBING THE FORM, MANNER AND TIME OF GIVING NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION; PRESCRIBING THE MAXIMUM MATURITY AND INTEREST RATE OF SUCH BONDS AND THE METHOD OF HOLDING THE ELECTION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, in Lubbock County, Texas has determined that it is to the best interest of said City and for the protection of the well being of the citizens thereof that certain improvements, extensions and alterations be made to the Streets, Alleys, Avenues and Highways of said City, and that certain improvements and extensions be made to the Water System and the Sanitary Sewer System of said City, and that negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of said City should be issued for the purpose of paying the cost of such extensions and improvements, and that an immediate necessity exists for the extensions and improvements above mentioned for the conveniences of the citizens of Slaton, Texas, and for the preservation of the safety of the citizens of said City, which requires the suspension of the rule requiring that ordinances be read at more than one meeting of the City Commission; and it therefore having been affirmatively determined by the City Commission that the matter of determining whether or not bonds of said City should be issued for the purpose above mentioned should be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpayers of said City, in accordance with the three separate propositions hereinafter set out:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS: Section 1: That an election be held within and throughout the boundaries of the City of Slaton, Texas, on the 9th day of December, 1950, the same being the second Saturday in December, 1950, the date being not less than ten days nor more than thirty days from the date of this ordinance, at which time there shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpayers of Slaton, Texas, who own property therein subject to taxation and have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following three separate propositions:

Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$25,000.00), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Commission, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty years from their date and bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding three and one-half per centum (3 1/2%) per annum from date, payable annually or semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of providing funds for the extension and improvements of the Water System of the City of Slaton, Texas?

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO: Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$25,000.00), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Commission, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty years from their date and bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding three and one-half per centum (3 1/2%) per annum from date, payable annually or semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of providing funds for the extension and improvement of the Sanitary Sewer System of the City of Slaton, Texas?

PROPOSITION NUMBER THREE: Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$25,000.00), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Commission, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty years from their date and bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding three and one-half per centum (3 1/2%) per annum from date, payable annually or semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of providing funds for the extension and improvement of the public streets and alleys of the City of Slaton, Texas?

Section 2: Said election shall be held under the provisions of and in strict conformity with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter I, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

All persons who are legally qualified resident property taxpayers of the City of Slaton, Texas, who own property in said City subject to taxation and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Section 3: The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following, to-wit:

OFFICIAL BALLOT PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATER SYSTEM EXTENSION BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATER SYSTEM EXTENSION BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM EXTENSION BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM EXTENSION BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

PROPOSITION NUMBER THREE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the respective expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

Section 4: That said election shall be held at the office of the Chamber of Commerce in the City Hall Building, in the City of Slaton, Texas.

Section 5: That the officers of said election shall be as follows, to-wit: C. H. Whalen, Presiding Judge; O. N. Alcorn, Associate Judge; Mrs. C. H. Whalen, Clerk; Mrs. B.

A. Hanna, Clerk.

Section 6: Notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of said election ordinance at three Public Places in the City of Slaton, Texas, and at the City Hall Building, and such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the Slaton Slatonite, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Slaton, Texas, and the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election; and in deference to the provisions of Article 5, of Section 1, of the Charter of the City of Slaton, Texas, such notice shall be published one additional week prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor and City Secretary shall cause such notices to be prepared and published and posted as provided for herein and shall make due returns of the publishing and posting of same to the City Commission.

Section 7: Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the City Secretary of the City of Slaton, Texas, for canvassing by the City Commission and shall return the ballot boxes to the City Secretary for safe-keeping.

The manner of holding such election and making and canvassing the returns thereto shall be governed by the general election laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the provisions of the hereinabove mentioned statutes, and the City Commission will furnish the necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite for said election.

Section 8: The fact that it is affirmatively found by the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, that there is an urgent need to proceed immediately with the extension and improvement of the streets, alleys and highways of said City, and the Water System and Sanitary Sewer System of said City, in order to make the same more convenient for the public at large, and to protect and preserve the health and welfare of the citizens of Slaton, Texas, creates an emergency and public necessity demanding that the rule requiring the reading of this ordinance on more than one day before final passage be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended; and it is ordained that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this the 13th day of November, 1950.

Times Have Changed A Lot Since 1834

Here is a copy of what is purported to be the first printed menu in the United States. It is from Delmonico's, 494 Pearl Street, New York, and is dated 1834. This famous restaurant was founded by Lorenzo Delmonico, a Swiss immigrant, and became the favored eating place of New York celebrities of his day. The regular dinner was 12 cents. A cup of tea or coffee was 1 cent; a bowl of the same, 2 cents. Hash was 3 cents. A pie was 4 cents, and half a pie, 2 cents. Beef steak was 4 cents; pork and beans 4 cents; chicken stew 5 cents, ham and eggs 10 cents and roast chicken 10 cents. If we could just have 1834 prices, 1900 taxes, and 1950 incomes, everything would be beer and skittles—to say nothing of corned beef and cabbage at 4 cents!

A Very Juicy Deal

Last week Sen. Lyndon Johnson unearthed a war-surplus bungle that tops all of such bungling. And, from the Texas Solon's remarks about it while visiting in Amarillo, it may be the deal which will stop all such waste in the future.

While some of our readers no doubt saw the account of the deal in the news columns, it might not be amiss to recount some of the story here. An East Texas farmer, interested in war-surplus goods, put in a nominal bid for some gadgets called "aircraft computers." The farmer, a former service man himself, thought the computers might be useful in civilian pursuits as slide rules, which they closely resemble.

He was awarded the stuff on a bid of \$6.89. Then he was notified that he would have to come to San Antonio and haul it away. When he arrived to look over what he had bought he found them to be intricate aviation instruments; and it cost him around \$1,400 to have them transported to his farm.

Then he notified officials at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, of his purchase; and a group of officers came down to look the things over. They promptly offered him \$63,000 for the lot, which he accepted.

Neither Senator Johnson nor anyone else criticizes the farmer for his part in the affair. He did not try to keep it a secret. In fact, it is reported he asked to have the matter investigated.

The blunder has been closely paralleled in many other transactions in war surplus goods, although the margin of profit, and the amount of waste, might not have been so great in others. But it has served more than anything else to center attention on the gross inefficiency with which the whole business of war surplus disposal has been conducted.

In the first place, the War Surplus Administration was almost completely staffed with personnel who knew nothing of the nature and purposes of much of the material they were ordered to sell. They seem to have operated under a blanket order to get rid of everything the quickest way possible.

If this was the order under which they operated, one can only marvel at their efficiency—as far as that phase is concerned. Nor can one wonder too much at the amount of the material which found its way into the hands of Russian agents, or the fact that we practically gave away billions of dollars worth of supplies which must now be replaced at the cost of more billions. —Amarillo Globe.

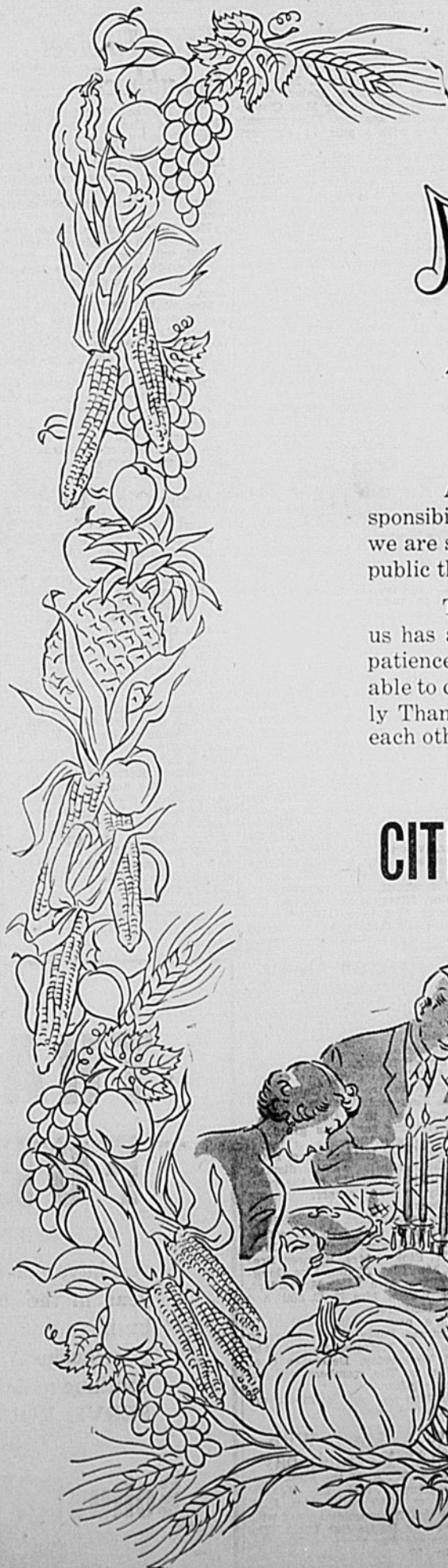

That couldn't possibly harm a flea, much less the reading public. Still, this is enough to help you find any section of the paper that might get misplaced around the house. All you need is a Geiger counter, even in the dark. —Los Angeles Examiner.

Wishful Thinking

We keep hearing supposedly "low down" reports that there is hope for an internal crack-up in Russia, that the people there will tire of their trials and tribulations and slavery, rise up and boot out the Stalin crowd just as the Stalin terrorists set off a revolution against the bureaucratic czar just 33 years ago.

These hopeful words sound familiar. We heard them from the time Hitler rose to the dictatorship in Germany until Allied armies fought their way to the portals of Berlin and then marked time until the Russians could march in for the kill. There was no significant internal dissension in Germany. It took body blows to knock out the Nazis.

We can't count on uprisings in Russia. Russia is trying to foment uprisings in this country and in a lot of other countries. And what might an uprising profit the peace-loving world? The present regime in Russia came from a revolt. There is no reason to believe that another revolution would throw the Russians on our side. Depending on "getting money from home without writing for it" would be perilous.

Too Old For What?

That's an interesting proposal by Dr. Seale Harris of Birmingham. By law, he thinks, a man should not be allowed to retire as long as he can work constructively. "Social security is probably shortening lives . . . when a man retires he's apt to sit around and eat and drink too much . . . a man has to have an interest in life."

Social security should be for those who actually need it. What is happening in this country is a leveling-off process at every age. The younger are restricted by heavy taxes from risk ventures. Past middle age, the average man waits for comfortable retirement. Week by week, year by year, a psychology of desuetude develops a psychology of the line of least resistance, a rocking-chair psychology of taking it easy.

Why should one retire when he has utility in mind and body left? Moltke, Hindenburg, Von Bulow and Foch achieved great military successes past the age of retirement. Gladstone and Palmerston were prime ministers at eighty. We might ask ourselves, in this contemporary passion for security and comforts, "too old for what?" —Dallas News.

Steel's Greatest Decade
During the 1940's about 800 million tons of steel were made. Steel employees were paid 17 billion dollars. The industry spent about 3.2 billion dollars for expansion.

Beginning of Rubber
Prehistoric Indians were the first to tap the rubber tree. They made rubber shoes, bottles and coated fabrics. Columbus discovered them playing with rubber balls. It was not until 1770 that Dr. Joseph Priestly gave it the name of "rubber." He found that the gum removed pencil marks. But Europeans found rubber too sticky in hot weather and too brittle in cold. Charles Goodyear, Yankee inventor, invented the vulcanizing process in 1839. After that the rubber industry boomed. Vulcanization made possible the many rubber products we have today—tires, clothing, insulation, foam rubber.

Coffee Prices
The lowest wholesale coffee price reached in this country in modern times—for green, that is, unroasted, "Santos 4s," a basic representative quality—was 5½ cents a pound in midsummer, 1940. The highest was in mid-November this year, 51½ cents. (The trade points out that green coffee loses 16½ per cent of its weight in roasting, which is, of course, a factor in determining consumer prices.)

TRENDS—With the freeze catching much of the cotton still unopened, farmers, gin men and others connected with the cotton business are quite at odds about how much damage has been done to the crop. But everyone is agreed on several things—the growing season has been one of the most unusual on record, that cotton has opened slower than anyone remembers, and that if the water-logged bolls do open, it will take some time for them to do so. Elzy Roberts tells an interesting story about a gin owner last year that profited from just such a situation as we have this season. This gin, which he did not name, received a lot of cotton soon after frost gathered with mechanical pullers, and containing lots of green bolls. These bolls, of course, were thrown out by the gin separator, and attendants made a big pile of them some hundred yards from the gin, where they could be burned when they dried out. A long toward the end of the season the owner investigated the huge pile and found that most of the bolls had opened or cracked. He put it through his gin and secured 28 bales of cotton, and although the grade was not too good, it represented a fairly good cotton crop for the gin owner.

Mr. Roberts used this as an illustration in urging farmers not to be too hasty in putting their mechanical pullers in the fields. —*The Crosbyton Review*

DRIFTING SANDS—We receive inquiries every day from people wanting to buy land. If Midland farms or the University would break loose and let farmers have some of the good land in the county, we could settle several hundred farmers in Andrews county this year.

We've since learned that while he was there he told friends of his bride that their home in West Texas would be in the "wide open spaces". He must have made it sound convincing. Not long after arriving in Brownfield, his wife received a letter from one of her girl friends who wanted to know "who is your nearest neighbor?" The newlyweds live in a duplex at 514 East Main with neighbors on all sides. —*The Brownfield News*

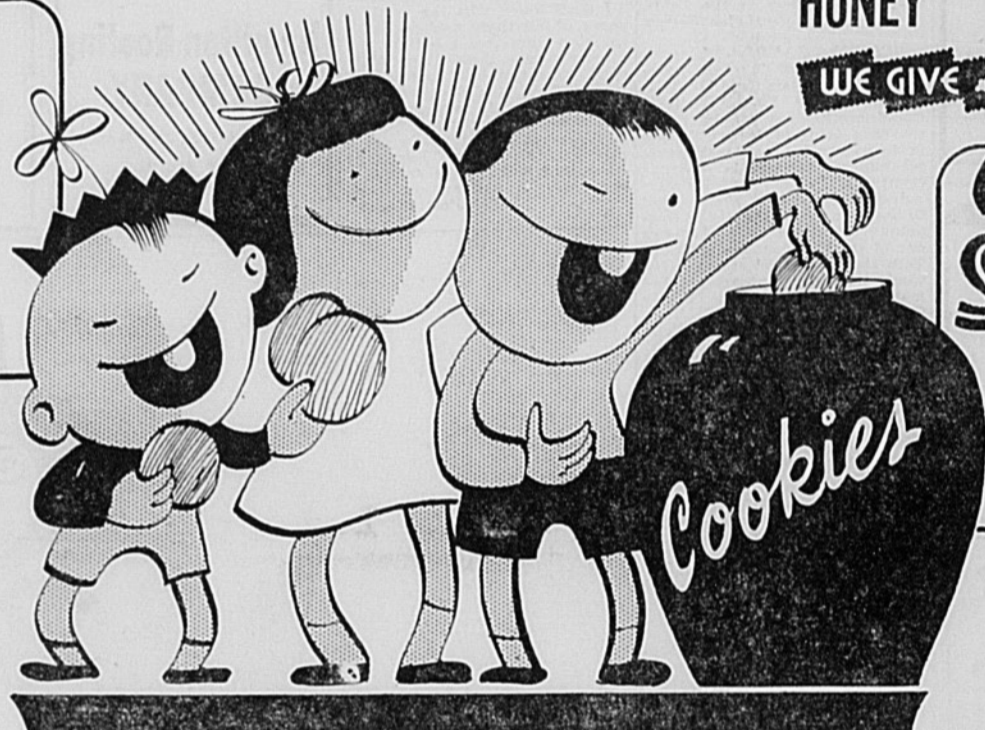

More Steel for France

Everyone To Get Plenty Of Food For Next Few Months Say Experts

What is the food outlook for future months?
It is good, says the United States Department of Agriculture, because current food reserves are large and farm production is expected to continue at record high levels—30 to 40 per cent more than in prewar years.
Prospects point to meat production in 1951 reaching 2 to 3 per cent higher than this year, most of the increase coming from pork in the second half of the year. Next year's pork output is expected to be 5 to 7 per cent above 1950. Beef production will be smaller, and mutton and lamb considerably smaller.
There should be enough eggs and poultry to give each person as much as he will eat this year—384 eggs, 26 pounds of chicken and perhaps 5 pounds of turkey.
Since dairy herds have stabilized fairly well in the past two or three years, milk production will probably go no higher than the current annual 120 billion pounds. However, the pattern of distribution will change. For instance, current stocks of cheese are extremely high, so less milk will be needed for this purpose next year. The same goes for butter. This leaves more for fluid milk and cream and ice cream.
Fats and oils used chiefly for food probably will not measure up to 8.8 billion pounds produced in 1949-50 but should continue at a

high rate.
In the major fruits, smaller packs into 1951 of sweet cherries, grapes, peaches, pears, plums and prunes will be offset somewhat by larger supplies of sour cherries, cranberries and strawberries.
Large orange and grapefruit crops will account for an increase over last year in canned and frozen juices. Cold storage stocks of frozen fruits and fruit juices should be sufficient to meet continued high demand.
Dried fruit supplies will be large enough for people to keep on eating four pounds apiece as they have for the past four years.
Markets this fall and winter will have more Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, cabbage, onions, carrots, lettuce, snap beans and peas. Substantial stocks will be carried over into 1951. There will be less cauliflower, celery, cucumbers and spinach.
Supplies of grain stocks, particularly wheat, corn, rice, barley and oats, are sufficiently large to provide about the same amounts for domestic use as this year.
These are some of the foods which will help push per capita consumption higher than it has been in any of the past three years.

ARE YOUR BIRDS FREE OF LICE?

Lice, chicken mites, and other external parasites are a constant threat to poultry flocks. Most raisers recognize this threat, but many fail to protect their flocks properly. As a result, far too many flocks are forced to go through a laying season suffering from heavy lice infestation.

Infestation with destructive, blood-sucking, biting-mouth parasites can be extremely harmful to poultry. Lower egg production, anemia, and refusal to lay in nests are some of the typical symptoms of lousy birds. Growing birds also may be troubled with poultry pests. Weak, anemic birds that grow at a slow rate frequently show-up as carriers of lice and mites.

Michigan Report

The Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association testifies to the damage lice cause birds. In one of the association's recent bulletins, Dr. King and Edgar of the Alabama Experiment Station revealed how the body louse affected laying hens over an 11-month laying period. Louse-free hens in this experiment averaged 11.17 per cent greater production than "lousy" hens. The louse-free hens also averaged heavier body weights after five or six months of the first laying year—and the mortality rate was lower.

Such findings as these typically describe conditions found in louse-infected flocks throughout the country.

One of the first precautions in pest control is the enforcement of strict sanitation measures. But perhaps the most effective way to combat poultry house pests is through regular de-lousing.

Effective Pest Control

Of course, the ideal time to de-louse hens is when you place pullets in the laying house. However, now is not too late. You can still do an effective job of de-lousing by treating your layers this month with a good commercial lice killer.

For complete control, take specific action against the most damaging kinds of poultry pests. To rid your poultry house of red mites, pests that hide in cracks and crevices of the poultry house in the daytime and prey on birds at night, spray all quarters with an effective pest spray. To control lice and feather mites, parasites that spend their entire life cycles on birds, paint the roosts with a good commercial roost application.

Proper use of the methods and treatments mentioned above will give you a sound pest-control program.

The Star-Telegram usually offers Bargain Prices later in the year, but it is likely that after the next sixty days that these special prices will be withdrawn.

The rates are for either renewal subscriptions or for new subscribers, and if you would like to get this paper along with the Slatonite we advise subscribing now at the Slatonite office.

Any one wishing to subscribe or renew mail subscriptions for the Lubbock Avalanche can do so at the Slatonite office. The present rates are: Avalanche with Sunday, \$10.95, without Sunday \$9.00 per year. Those who wish to subscribe to both the Avalanche and the Slatonite will be charged \$12.95 for Avalanche with Sunday and \$11.00 without the Sunday Avalanche-Journal.

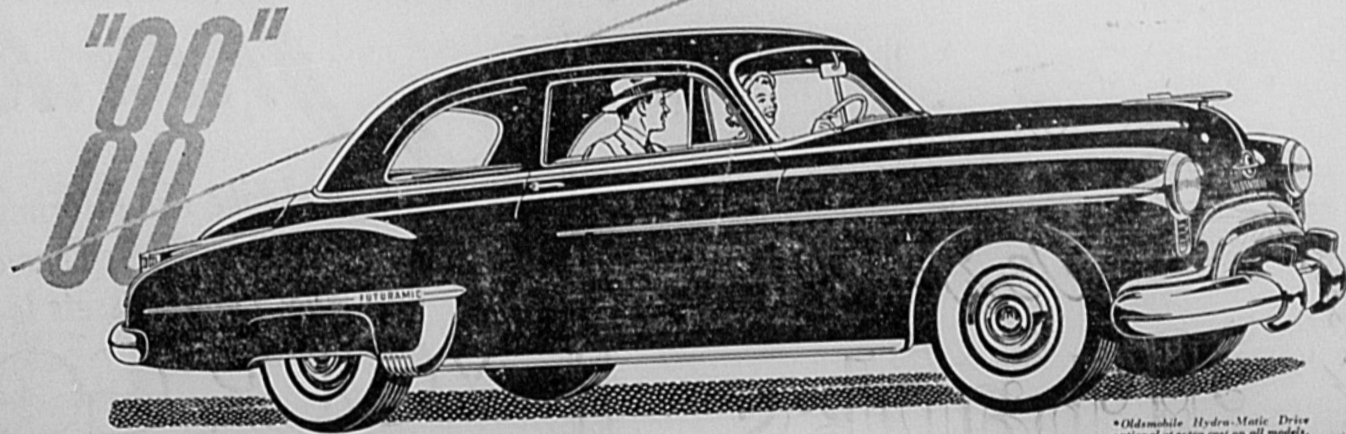

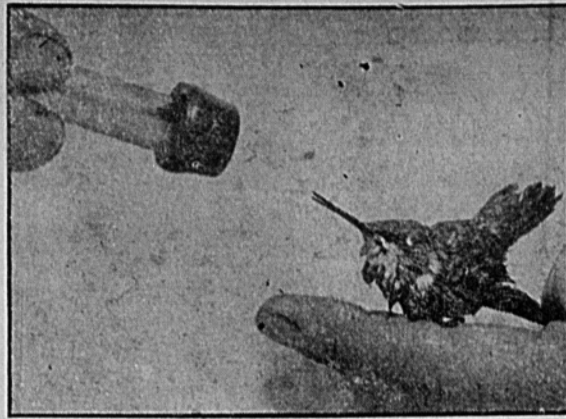
