LAYERS NEED ATTENTION, TOO!

In the springtime, when most poultrymen are intent on getting their young chicks off to a thriving start, there may be a tendency on the part of some to neglect the older stock remaining on the farm. The laying flock, which is just emerging from several months of heavy winter egg production still needs constant attention. Don't overlook this need now.

Spring Cleaning
Give some special attention to the flock's quarters. After the long winter confinement, the laying house is probably in need of a thorough spring cleaning. Do a thorough cleaning job, and follow by using a reliable disinfectant.

If the birds are being allowed out of the house now, it may be a good plan to keep them shut in during a good part of the morning, so that most of their laying will have been done before they venture out-of-doors. This practice will help keep eggs cleaner.

If some of the flock is wormy, consult your feed dealer or hatcheryman about how to treat the condition. He undoubtedly can recommend a reliable treatment.

Cull Non-Layers
Strive constantly to cull the non-laying birds. After the period of heavy laying, some of the birds will have used up much of their laying reserve. These should be removed from the flock to make more room for the birds which are still in high production.

If an all-pullet flock is kept, the poultry raiser should plan to sell the adult layers in time to give the laying house a 2- or 3-month airing before housing the new pullets next fall.

Continue to gather eggs frequently. If eggs are gathered three times daily, they will be cleaner, and, in addition, the sooner they are placed in a cool storage place, the better will be their condition for marketing.

Actions Of OPS Undertaken To Aid Consumers

Many unseen actions of the Office of Price Stabilization are undertaken to aid consumers by stabilizing and controlling prices at all levels of production, the Lubbock OPS District Office points out. "You might say that the task of stopping inflation and setting ceiling prices begins at the mine and with the crop," the OPS statement said.

An example of the task of assuring the American public fair prices and insurance against the dollar-destroying threat of inflation is the recent group of beef and livestock price regulations. The beef pricing order and livestock orders are now in effect. Retail butchers are required to post their ceiling prices on beef by June 4, 1951. Consumers are entitled to see these prices, and to be sure what they should pay for beef cuts. The prices are those of the January levels when all prices were frozen.

To establish this retail beef price it has been necessary to reduce by 10 percent the prices at which slaughterers may buy beef cattle. There will be two further reductions in livestock prices and in wholesale and retail beef prices so that by October 1 consumers should be paying around seven to 10 cents a pound less for their beef, depending on grade and cut. At that time livestock prices will still be around 125 percent of parity, or 25 percent above the figure considered fair to the farmer in relation to the prices he has to pay.

Known as ceiling price regulation 34, the order will be effective May 16. The OPS District Office said the new order would benefit the public by making prices clearly visible in every retail service place. All establishments must post their prices in a prominent position within 30 days. While substantial price changes, up or down, are not expected to result from this regulation, it retains the ceiling price provisions of the general ceiling price regulation including the base period of December 19, 1950, to January 25, 1951. Service stores and offices in Lubbock County must file their prices with the Lubbock OPS District Office, Broadway Building, 1202 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas.

• Everyone knows about the "sportsmen" who shoot deer and other game at night by blinding them with a spotlight. But maybe the newest type of similar character, on the fishing side, will be news to you.

These fellows rig up a magneto-battery with a rod to charge the water and knock out the fish. With certain limitations you can reap a rich "catch" with this method. The so-called "hot-rod" fishermen are currently a problem for the Texas Game, Fish & Oyster Commission, the agency charged

with, among other things, enforcing Texas' game laws.

Maybe a few people have even thought of trying this stunt themselves. Of course, it's a foregone conclusion that this type of fishing is as illegal as using dynamite. Because the Texas laws specifically limits the means of taking fish.

And it's a good thing for the real fisherman that they do for it's just schemes like this that deplete Texas' lakes and streams.

As it is, Texas has one of the most generous sets of game laws

on the books. For instance, there is no closed season on most species and in most parts of the state. And you are allowed a very high number, comparatively, on usage of hooks and lines.

Any true fisherman loathes people such as the "hot-rod" boys who want only to destroy fish with not even a pretense of sportsmanship.

Perhaps Texas folks who like to get out on the lakes and streams can help guard against such predators by making sure of a "clean-house" themselves and urging others to stay within the law.

JUST TALK

Not long ago I got a letter from Mrs. Mamie Fenet of Paris, Texas. Mrs. Fenet invited me to a reunion of the Paris High School grads of 1927. Of course I could tell the exact date, but if I should everybody who has little enough to do to have time to read this, could guess within a year or two of what my age really is, which most folks can do anyway, but sometimes someone gets under what it really is and I feel like a "killer" for a few minutes until some young woman comes along and pays me about as much attention as she would a sack of cement that obstructed her path, or if she acknowledges my presence at all it is by patting me on the back, or by throwing her charm around as if I were as harmless as a piano.

Mrs. Mamie Fenet as I remember her, used to be Mamie Murphy, which was a good old Irish name, and she was an unusually pretty girl. Her pal in school was a red-head named Lottie Record. Lottie married a man named North who is now a wheel on the Star-Telegram. Lottie's brother was James Record who is also a big wheel on the same newspaper. My father trained James Record in newspaper reporting when James went to work on the Paris Daily Advocate. My mother also pounded some information into Jimmie when he attended the Paris High School. My mother taught History and English in Paris for years. I have tried to figure out some way to take some credit for Mr. Record's success as a newspaper man and for Lottie's having captured Mr. North. The only success I have had in this line is that I used to spend considerable time in a swing at the Record home trying to get Lottie interested in the moonshine and by so doing gave her a good example of how uninteresting a callow youth could be.

There were a lot of others who graduated in 1927, too. Red Hanna, Max Chapman, Murray Gill, and a girl named Gladys, who was the valedictorian of the class. Gladys always seemed more mature than the others and a mighty sweet girl. One graduate was a boy named Emory Moore, who was built like a milk can, dumpy, round, and solid. He and I played football on the same team and in season went around crippled up most of the time. The game was not as popular then as it is now but it was just as rugged and more boys were killed then than are now. The forward pass was unknown and we just tromped on everyone we could get our feet on.

Probably none of you who read this have ever known Mamie Murphy, Lottie Record or Max Chapman, but you have known some folks who were, or are, good fine folks like them and I cannot help but compare the actions of young folks today with those who graduated in the Paris High School of 1927 and those who so proudly face the future. They're not so different as they seem to think they are. We had our graduation play and I worked weeks learning to say a few words in the part as a King. Someone stepped on the Queen's dress train and she fell down and I do not think anyone heard the declamation I had practiced for weeks. We wore caps and gowns, too, when we received our diplomas and everything we

did for the two weeks before graduation seemed about the most important affairs of the year.

I am going to try to find my High School diploma of 1927 and endeavor to revive some of that 1927 spirit that has somehow ebbed pretty low.

There's no way to get to a satisfactory weight so far as my experience has been. When I was a bit younger and used to smoke I had a lean, haggard look with all of my joints sticking out like warts on a pickle, when I quit smoking I gained 20 pounds in a few months and had to buy new clothes in every department except hat, socks, and shoes. When my weight kept on increasing, I went on up in sizes and then after a year or two I went back to smoking and reversed the process, only I did not save the things that did not fit as I went up and my expenses increased.

Holt, Kirby Scudder and others when they drag on the weed and I mentally go through every motion with them, but when they start coughing and wheezing I remember back when I breathed like a Model-T making a hill.

Doctors who smoke say tobacco does little harm, doctors who do not smoke say it's a very damaging habit and those of us who do or do not smoke agree with one of the other according to which one who smoked cigarettes most of his life used to say that he had seen in the paper where a Mexican 101 years of age died from smoking cigarettes and that he intended to wait and die from that cause. He did not make it but so far as I know cigarettes did not get him.
