

for the National World War II Memorial. The Memorial, which grew from the efforts of World War II veteran Roger Durbin, will be constructed on the Mall of the Nation's Capital and the registry will remain on permanent public display. In 1987, Durbin influenced U.S. Representative Marcy Kaptur (D-Ohio) to share his concern that millions of Americans who worked to win WWII were forgotten because of the lack of a national memorial honoring their sacrifice. The ground breaking for the Memorial will take place Veteran's Day, November 11, 2000.

Recognizing the ultimate sacrifice of losing one's life in defense of one's country, the National Funeral Director's Association (NFDA) is supporting a grass roots effort to populate the Registry. Anyone who served in the armed forces during World War II, as well as anyone who helped the war effort on the home front, is eligible to have his or her name included in the special registry. The Registry will honor those Americans who worked in defense-related industries or factories, recycled material needed for the war effort or provide other support that helped create the U.S. arsenal of democracy. Anyone can register his or her own name, family members' or friends names at no charge.

Financial contributions to support the World War II Memorial can be sent to the World War II Memorial Fund, American Battle Monuments Commission, ATTN: GRO48, P.O. Box 96074, Washington, D.C. 20090-6074.

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



## Orders Being Taken For Windbreak Trees and Shrubs

The Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is now accepting orders for windbreak and wildlife tree seedlings and shrubs. The conservation tree program is designed to offer tree seedlings at a nominal cost with the aim being to protect cropland, feedlots and buildings and to control erosion and enhance wildlife.

A wide variety of trees will be available this year. Several species of potted conifers are being offered including Afghanistan Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Eastern Red Cedar, Pinyon Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Scotch Pine and Spruce. Hardwoods available included American Plum, Aromatic Sumac,

Catalpa. Caragana Contoneaster, Desert Willow, European Sage, Flameleaf Sumac, Four Sumac, Four Wing Saltbush, Green Ash, Golden Willow, Ash, Golden whitew, Hackberry, Honey Locust, Honeysuckle, Hybrid Cottonwood, Lacebark Elm, Lilac, Lombardy Poplar, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Russian Native Plum, Russian Olive, Sand Cherry, Sand and Cne. Siberian Em b Sumac an Plum. Elm. Skunkbush Sumac, Shumard Oak and Western Soapberry. Wildlife packets will also be available. The packets include 25 seedlings each of 4 different species and are designed to enhance quail and pheasant, turkey, deer and squirrel populations.

The tree seedlings will rive at the District office at the end of arrive at the Office at the March. District representatives suggest that tree orders be placed early as many species sell out very quickly. The deadline for ordering the trees is March 16 2001. Anyone interested 2001.
